## New Supermarket, Lumber Yard Will Be Built Here

### Marx to Construct Large IGA Foodliner on Site Purchased From Lay Lumber Co., Railroad

#### Work on Modern Store Should Be Completed By Fall

Information was released this week by the Godfrey Company of Milwaukee that a modern, new Foodliner supermarket will be built in Kewaskum by Marx IGA. The Foodliner will be located across the street from the present store at 140 Main st. on property acquired by the owners, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Marx, from the H. J. Lay Lumber Co. and Chicago & North Western Railway.

The site purchased by the Marxes for the store includes the present municipal parking lot adjoining the railroad tracks and owned by the railway, and a large part of the Lay Lumber Co. property west of it. The present Lay store and office building and five of the six lumber and cement storage sheds on the site will be torn down to make room for the Foodliner and a large parking lot, as well as a new office, store and U-shaped lumber yard to be built by the lumber company. The front of the IGA store will face the west and the front of the Lay building will face east.

The new Foodliner will be 6,000 square feet, which is a very large store for a village the size of Kewaskum. Surrounding it will be a large paved parking lot with spacious room for 65 cars. It is expected to have construction completed in fall and the store will be opening around the end of October or the first of November. Work on the project will be started very soon and razing of the lumber company sheds is already underway. An architect's sketch of the Foodliner appears on page four of this issue.

This will be a superb modern food facility, with all of the features that a brand new supermarket has today. It will be operated by the Marx family, who have 50 successive years of food retailing in Kewaskum. R. E. Browne, Jr. of the Godfrey Company, IGA wholesalers, stated, "The Marxes are fine people who have contributed to the Kewaskum economy for the past half century. We're just very happy that they're building this beautiful new store."

The Foodliner will be a one-story masonry building with overhanging canopy and sheltered entrance. It will be air conditioned. The store front construction will employ modern aluminum settings for the plate glass. Entrance and exit doors will be of new narrow style extruded aluminum.

The interior will be pleasantly lighted with the newest fluorescent lighting. The color scheme

for the walls and floor will be designed by IGA specialists to assure patrons a pleasant shopping experience. The store will be complete in all departments and will use the newest in most modern equipment. Displayed in all departments will be the merchandise which, in addition to groceries, includes fresh fruits and vegetables, all dairy products, frozen foods and a sparkling new fresh meat department, featuring the well known Table Rite products. While the meat department will operate on a self-service basis, a qualified meat man will be in attendance for the convenience of those customers who desire special cuts.

Kewaskum is indeed fortunate in gaining such an up-to-date, convenient and metropolitan supermarket which compares to those heretofore found only in the larger cities. The store will add very noticeably to the appearance, growth and progress of our city and its business life. The Marxes are to be congratulated on their very progressive undertaking.

### Hit-Run Accident at Mauthe Lake Sunday, Other Mishaps Occur

A hit-run accident at the entrance to Mauthe lake at 7 p. m. Sunday was being investigated Monday by Fond du Lac county police. Gilbert Schildt, 48, of Appleton, told Traffic Officer Robert Daul that as he was driving westerly at 15 miles an hour an opposite-bound 1960 model car approached in the wrong lane, side-swiped his car, then continued down the license number of the vampire driver and turned over the information to police. The left side of Schildt's car was damaged. The hit-run motorist was believed to be a Milwaukeean.

A car driven by Michael J. Lipinski, 19, of Milwaukee overturned on County Trunk S in the town of Auburn at 5:45 p. m. Sunday but neither the driver nor four passengers were hurt. Lipinski notified Officer Daul that a motorcycle had approached him, and when he swerved to avert a collision with it, his auto rolled over.

#### Store Building And Five Storage Sheds to Be Razed

In conjunction with the major building project which will find Marx IGA constructing a Foodliner and parking lot on a large portion of their present lumber yard site, the H. J. Lay Lumber Co. will also build a new store, office and lumber yard on the west end of their present business location. The owner of the company is Henry J. Lay of West Bend, who also operates the Home Lumber Co. in that city.

All but one of the seven buildings now housing the lumber company will be torn down to make room for the Foodliner and new Lay buildings. Buildings to be razed include the present brick store and office, the mill work storage shed adjoining it on the east side, the cement storage shed along the railroad tracks on the east end, and four lumber storage sheds. One other storage shed, on the extreme north end, running east and west along First st. across from the Fairmont Dairy, will remain standing. One shed on the west end of the lot has already been torn down and the block has been laid for a new one which will replace it. Several trees have also been removed and moving of the lumber was scheduled to begin on Wednesday.

The new lumber company store and office, which will face east, will run north and south almost directly in line with the rear of the Bank of Kewaskum building. The store will be 76 feet long and 58 feet wide. The lumber yard will be U-shaped and will be situated in the rear of the store. It will contain 472 lineal feet of storage sheds.

The store will be of one story structure. The entrance and display windows will be of modern glass and aluminum. The interior will be finished with one-fourth inch peg board in varied pastel colors. The outside of the building will be constructed of redwood vertical boarding and stone with planters in the front. A millwork shop will be in the rear of the store. The company will also increase its line of hardware and paints. Construction will be completed by fall and an opening will be held at that time.

The lumber company has been in business and conducted by the Lay family at the same location for the past 88 years. It was taken over in 1873 by H. J. Lay and has been in the family since. Otto E. Lay followed his father in the

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

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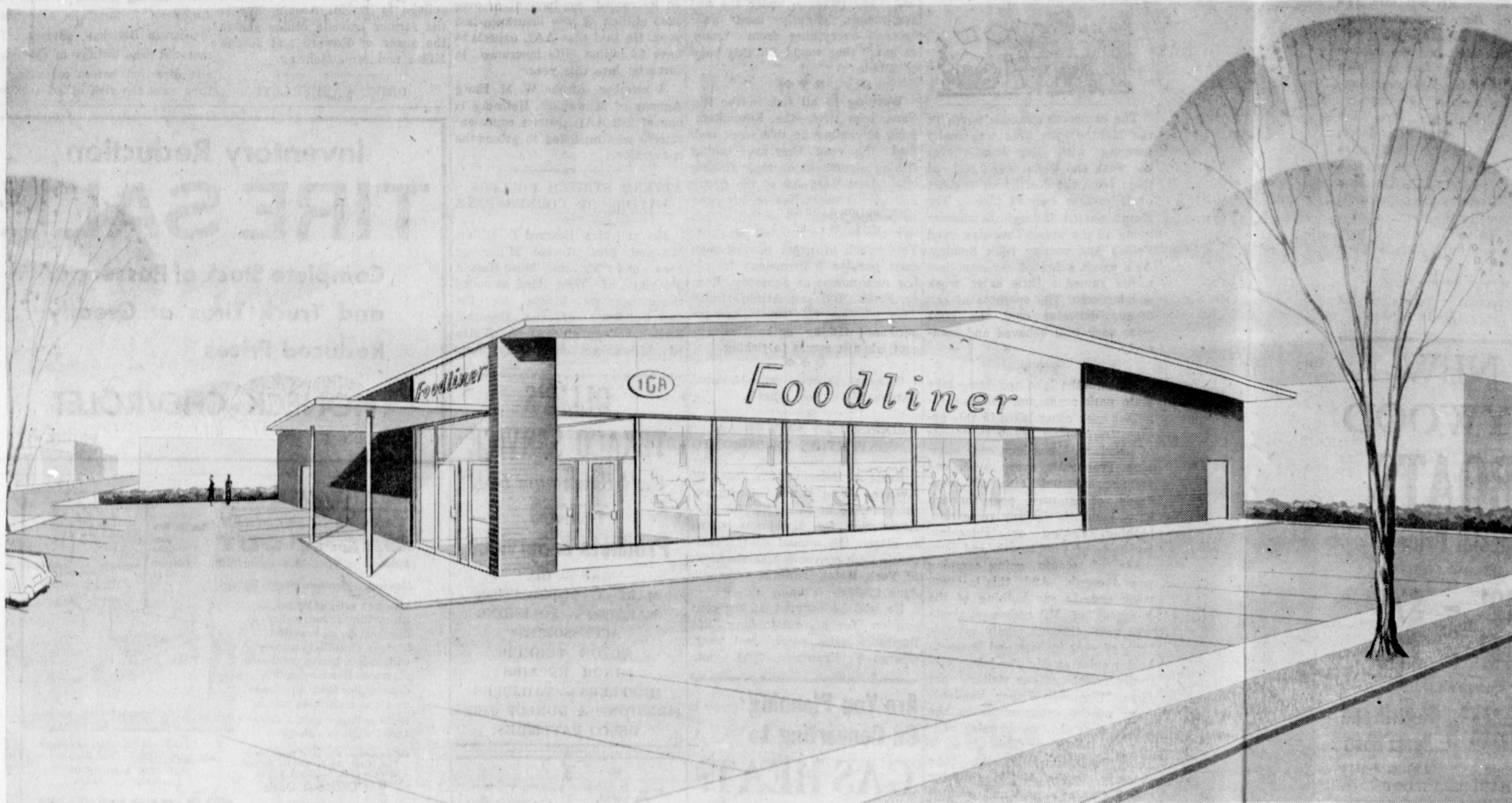
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# Kewaskum's New IGA Foodliner and Lay Lumber Company Buildings

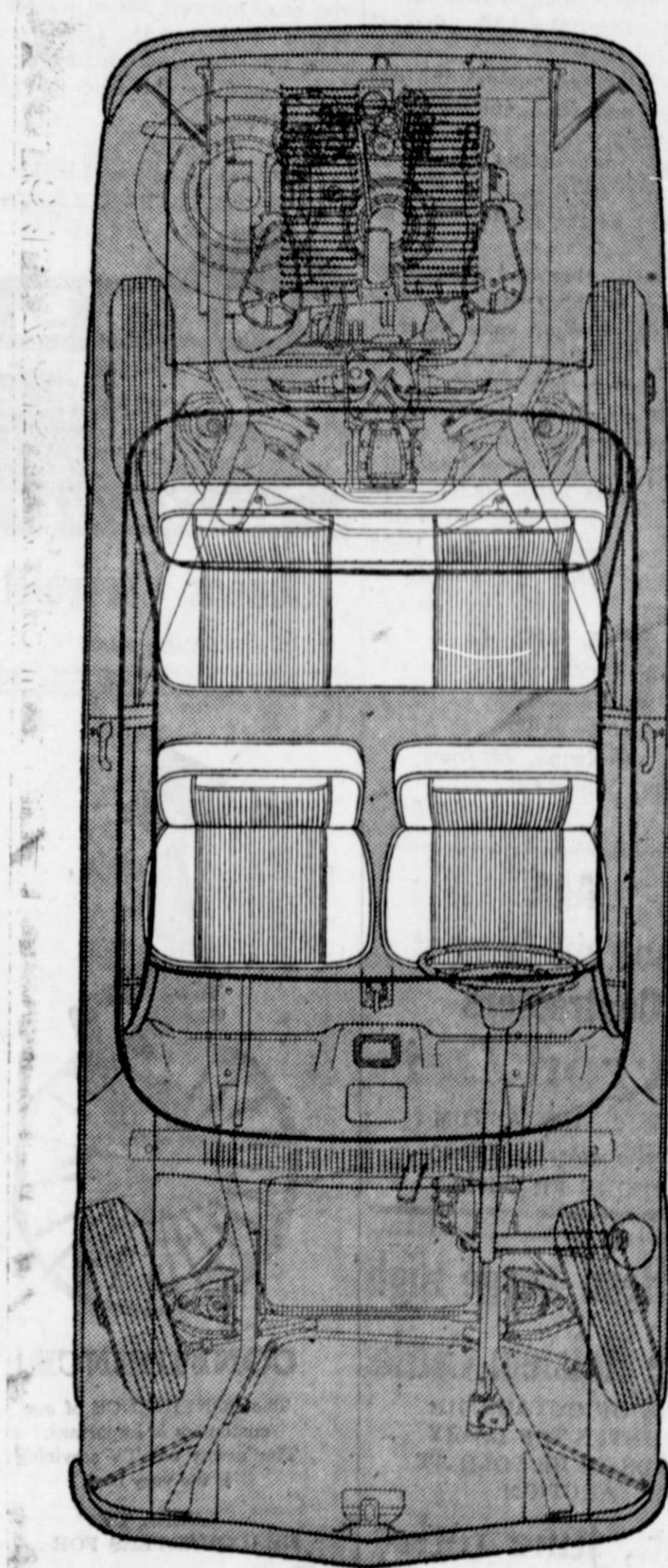
