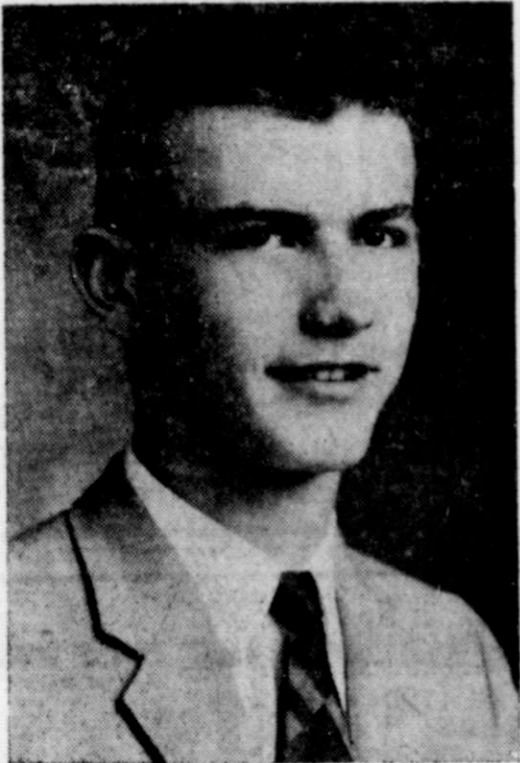

Aldwin Seefeldt to Represent 4-H at National Meeting

Will Represent Two Million 4-H Members of Nation

Aldwin Seefeldt of R. 1, Kewaskum, was recently selected to represent the nation's two million 4-H members at the national meeting of the American Institute of Cooperation in Minneapolis. The national 4-H office in Washington, D. C. asked him to appear as the official representative of the nation's 4-H'ers at one of the sessions which will be attended by

about 3,000 adults and 1,000 junior delegates from throughout the United States.

Aldwin is the son of Alfred H. Seefeldt of Kewaskum. During his past seven years as a 4-H club member he has shown exceptional ability in his individual projects and has gone out of his way to be helpful to younger members, his local club and the county and state junior leaders councils. He is a member of the Kewaskum 4-H club which is under the leadership this year of Mrs. Wilmer Bunkelman. Gerald Stoffel of Kewaskum had been the general leader of the club for many years before Mrs. Bunkelman took over the responsibilities as a general leader. These people and the other 4-H leaders in the club are partly responsible for giving him the opportunity to take part in 4-H club work which eventually led to this recognition and honor of representing the nation's 4-H'ers.

During the course of his 4-H work Aldwin has served as president of the Kewaskum 4-H club, has been on the board and the president of the County Junior Leaders Council and for the past two years has been vice-president and president respectively of the State Junior Leaders Council. As an officer of the State Junior Leaders Council, he had the responsibility of helping to plan and carry out State 4-H Club Week which was recently attended by over 1,000 delegates from throughout Wisconsin and held at the University of Wisconsin campus.

He is presently a junior at Lakeland college where he is planning to major in law.

Fireworks Display in Village Park July 3

Kewaskum will have its traditional Fourth of July holiday fireworks display again this year. Sponsored jointly by the fire department and village, the fireworks will take place in the village park on Monday night, July 3, under the supervision of the firemen. In case of rain, the fireworks will be held on the night of July 4.

A sample of water from the river was sent to Madison recently to be analyzed and the report came back that the water tested good and is fit for swimming.

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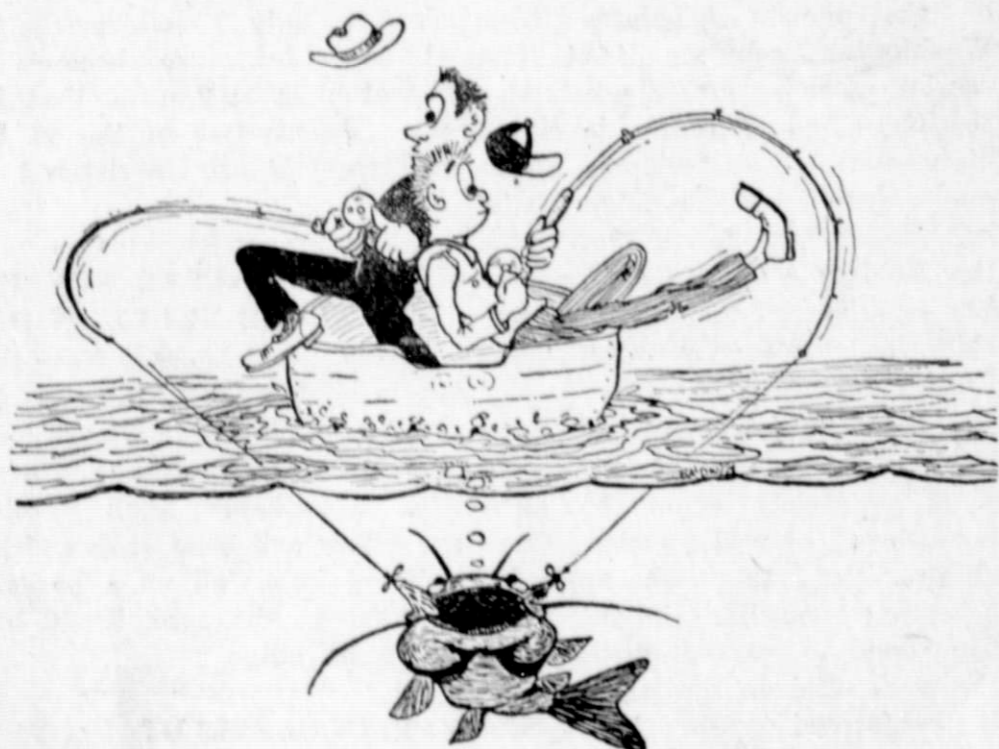
