## E. Mitchell at Kiwanis Convention in Toronto

Ernie Mitchell of 121 Prospect ave., Kewaskum, accompanied by his wife and family, attended the 46th annual convention of Kiwanis International at the Maple Leaf Gardens in Toronto, Ontario, July 2-6. A total of 17,000 people were on hand for the affair, the largest in Kiwanis' history.

Principal speakers on the program, in addition to Kiwanis International President J. O. Tally, Jr., Fayetteville, North Carolina, were Right Honourable John G. Diefenbaker, Q. C., P. C., Prime Minister of Canada; the Honorable Brooks Hays, assistant secretary, U. S. Department of State; Charles B. Shuman, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, and Lieutenant General Roscoe C. Wilson, USAF, Deputy Chief of Staff for Development.

Business accomplished at the convention included the election of officers and trustees for 1961-62, recognition of top clubs throughout the United States and Canada for contributions to their individual communities, and the adoption of resolutions upon which the organization's 1961-62 community service program will be based.

Other convention features included the appearance of the presidents of Kiwanis' two youth organizations, Steven D. Copple, Yuma, Ariz., president of Key Club International, a high school boys' service organization, and John Hoyt Blalock, University, Alabama, president of Circle K International, a college men's service organization. There was an extensive program for the ladies and the youngsters on hand as well.

## 25 Years Ago

July 3, 1936

Louis Bath suffered painful burns when gas fumes ignited as he lighted an acetyline torch to begin welding a car in the Remmel Mfg. Co. plant. As a precaution he had removed the gasoline tank from the car and waited 20 minutes before lighting the torch. The car was standing over a drain pit, which Mr. Bath crawled into to begin work. Apparently there were still fumes at the bottom of the pit, which ignited and severely burned his face and hands. He immediately turned off the torch and jumped from the pit. Other workers assisted him and a doctor was summoned. Although the burns are healing rapidly, his hands and face are covered with bandages.

Three men were taken into custody by Marshall Geo. F. Brandt the past week, arraigned and fined for misdemeanors. Walter Suter, Fond du Lac, was arrested for driving a motorcycle on the streets while in an intoxicated condition and endangering lives of pedestrians. He was arraigned in Judge Hayden's court at West Bend and fined \$50 and costs. Arthur Torkelson and Ted Maglio of Milwaukee were also brought to court and fined \$1.00 and costs for peddling without a license. The men went from door to door selling razor blades at cut-throat prices.

### RECIPIENTS OF SURPLUS FOOD TO BE RECERTIFIED

Robert G. Hintz, director, Washington County Public Welfare Department, announced that the Surplus Commodity Distribution Center, 220 N. 6th ave., West Bend, would be open from 1 p. m. to 4:30 p. m. Monday, July 10, for the purpose of recertifying eligibility of individuals who applied during March and April. Hintz explained that all unemployed persons not receiving public assistance need to be recertified every 90 days.

Hintz said persons who were originally certified during March and April will not be eligible for surplus commodities during July unless they are recertified on July 10.

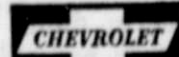

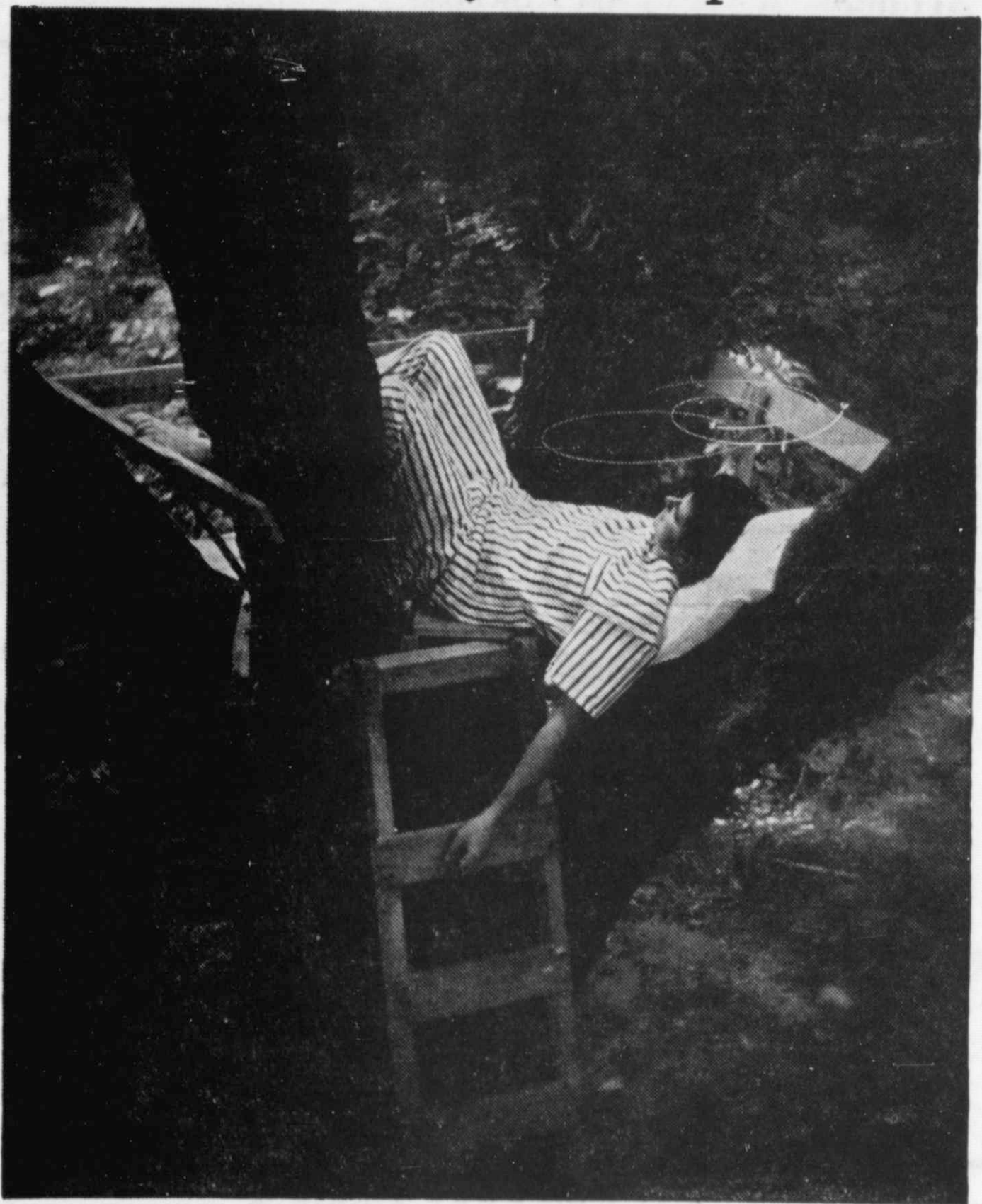
