Beechwood Area Is Invited to Join District

PAULA PETRI RE-ELECTED; \$6,000 ADDED TO BUDGET FOR BAND UNIFORMS

KEWASKUM COMMUNITY HIGH SCHOOL JOINT DISTRICT NO. 2 BUDGET HEARING July 17, 1961

The budget hearing was called to order by Melvin Riley, director of the Board of Education, with 23 electors present.

The proposed budget was read and explained to the electors.

A motion was made by Clifford Stautz and seconded by Charles Miller that the proposed budget be presented at the annual meeting. Carried.

The budget meeting was declared closed by Mr. Riley.

ANNUAL MEETING July 17, 1961

The annual meeting was called to order by Melvin Riley with 64 electors present.

Mr. Riley called for nominations for chairman of the meeting. Charles Miller nominated Melvin Riley; and it was moved by L. N. Peterson and seconded by Harvey Janssen that the nominations be closed, and that a unanimous ballot be cast for Melvin Riley. Motion carried.

Minutes of the July 18, 1960, annual meeting were read. Charles Miller made a motion, seconded by August Koch that the minutes be accepted as read. Carried.

It was moved by L. N. Peterson, seconded by Ray Schaefer to accept the auditor's report. Carried.

A motion was made by Charles Miller and seconded by Walter Wesenberg to dispense with the reading of the treasurer's report of expenditures. Carried.

It was moved by Clifford Stautz, seconded by Harvey Janssen, to accept the treasurer's report of receipts. Carried.

L. N. Peterson moved and Albert Hron, Jr. seconded that the clerk's report be accepted. Carried.

The following resolutions were adopted:

RESOLUTION NO. 1—Be it resolved that the 1962 annual meeting of this district be held on the third Monday in July the year 1962 at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

It was moved by Elmer Plaum and seconded by Walter Liepert to adopt resolution No. 1 Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 2—Be it resolved by the electors of School District No. 2 or the Kewaskum Community High School that the school year be set at nine and one-fourth months or 185 days.

It was moved by Walter Wesenberg and seconded by Charles Miller to adopt resolution No. 2. Motion carried.

L. N. Peterson moved that

\$6,000.00 be added to the proposed budget for the 1961-1962 school year for band uniforms, seconded by Albert Hron, Jr. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 3—Be it resolved that a tax be levied on all the taxable property of the district for operating expenses for the year commencing in 1961 and ending in 1962 in the amount of \$156,550.00

It was moved by Clifford C. Stautz, seconded by Harvey Janssen to adopt resolution No. 3. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 4—Be it resolved that the school board of this district be and they hereby are authorized to make such temporary loans as may be necessary to pay the operating expense until funds for the payment thereof are realized from the current tax levy.

It was moved by Al Zehren, seconded by Lloyd Teeselink that resolution No. 4 be adopted. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 5—Be it resolved that the salaries of the members of the school board of this district be fixed at \$200.00 per annum.

It was moved by Marvin A. Martin and seconded by Henry J. Weddig, Sr. that resolution No. 5 be adopted.

Veterans Posts Hold Meeting to Consider County War Memorial

A meeting of representatives of all veterans posts of Washington county was called for Monday evening, July 10, at the court house in West Bend by D. J. Kenny, chairman of the board of the World War Memorials, Inc. of the Lt. Ray Dickop post of The American Legion, to obtain the views of World War II and Korean veterans particularly regarding the erection or establishment of a memorial for Washington county.

During World War II a fund was accumulated and collected by the Lt. Ray Dickop post of The American Legion, and that fund with interest has grown to almost \$5,000 and will be made available to apply toward the cost of a Washington county memorial for veterans of World War II and veterans of the Korean War.

Representatives of the eight American Legion organizations and four V.F.W. posts as well as the Disabled American Veterans and Veterans of World War I were invited to the meeting, and 10 of the organizations were represented by delegates.

Over the last several years there have been several meetings with the county board and a committee of the county board to consider a war memorial in connection with the new court house including, among other things, consideration of moving the dough-boy memorial from the old court house grounds to the new court house site. Over the years there has been considerable discussion among veterans themselves as to the type and location of a proposed memorial.

The Monday meeting was preliminary and organizational and another meeting of the veterans posts is being called for Monday evening, July 31, at the court house at 7:45 in the hope that the views of veterans themselves may be crystallized for the advice and information to the county board and to citizens of the county who are interested in the establishment of a memorial for veterans of World War II and veterans of the Korean War.

Paul Bruhy of West Bend served as secretary of the meeting. The veterans posts of Hartford, Germantown and Jackson were not represented but will be urged to attend the July 31 meeting.

25 Years Ago

The Kewaskum Statesman
July 10, 1936

A gang of three robbers failed in an attempt to crack the safe at the Kewaskum post office early Saturday when shots fired by a neighbor scared them away before gaining entrance to the safe. Awakened by sounds about 2:15 a. m. August E. Koch, 22, who lives across the street saw three men tampering with the front door. He awakened his parents and called the telephone exchange. Marshall Geo. Brandt, Deputy Geo. Kippenhan and Postmaster Frank Hepe were notified. They were on their way when the explosion of the safe door caused by the yeggmen occurred. When the men arrived they could see no one as the burglars probably were lying on the floor, having been frightened by shots fired by Edw. C. Miller. As officers approached the front of the building Geo. Brandt, Jr., son of the marshal, drove his car to the rear of the office and fired at the robbers as they made a dash for liberty, but they escaped through dark streets to a hidden automobile some distance away. Sheriff Jos. Kirsch and Under-sheriff Ed Groth of West Bend were also notified and rushed to the scene. They made a search for the car, as did Fond du Lac county officers, but the robbers must have escaped on a side road. The blast wrecked the safe door but only a small amount from the cash drawer was taken. A sledge hammer and fingerprints were left behind. Mr. Hepe said that three men answering the descrip-

McMarold claims to have served in the Black Watch, famous Scotch regiment, of which Victor McLaglen, movie star, was captain. He wears a silver knee cap substituting for part of his knee he lost in battle. The man claims he speaks five languages and is acquainted with Mahatma Ghandi, whom he met traveling in India. During the past ten years he has worn out 450 pairs of shoes and his mascot dog wore out 112 pair of special foot protectors. He aims to hike

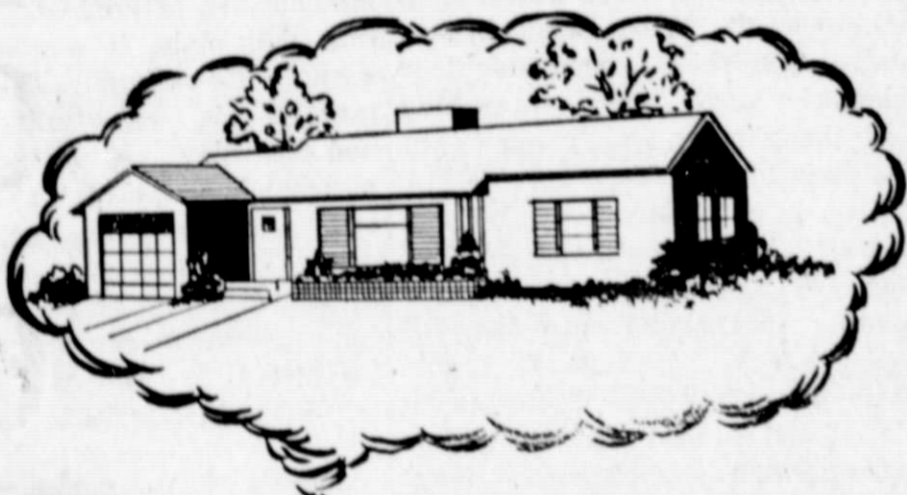

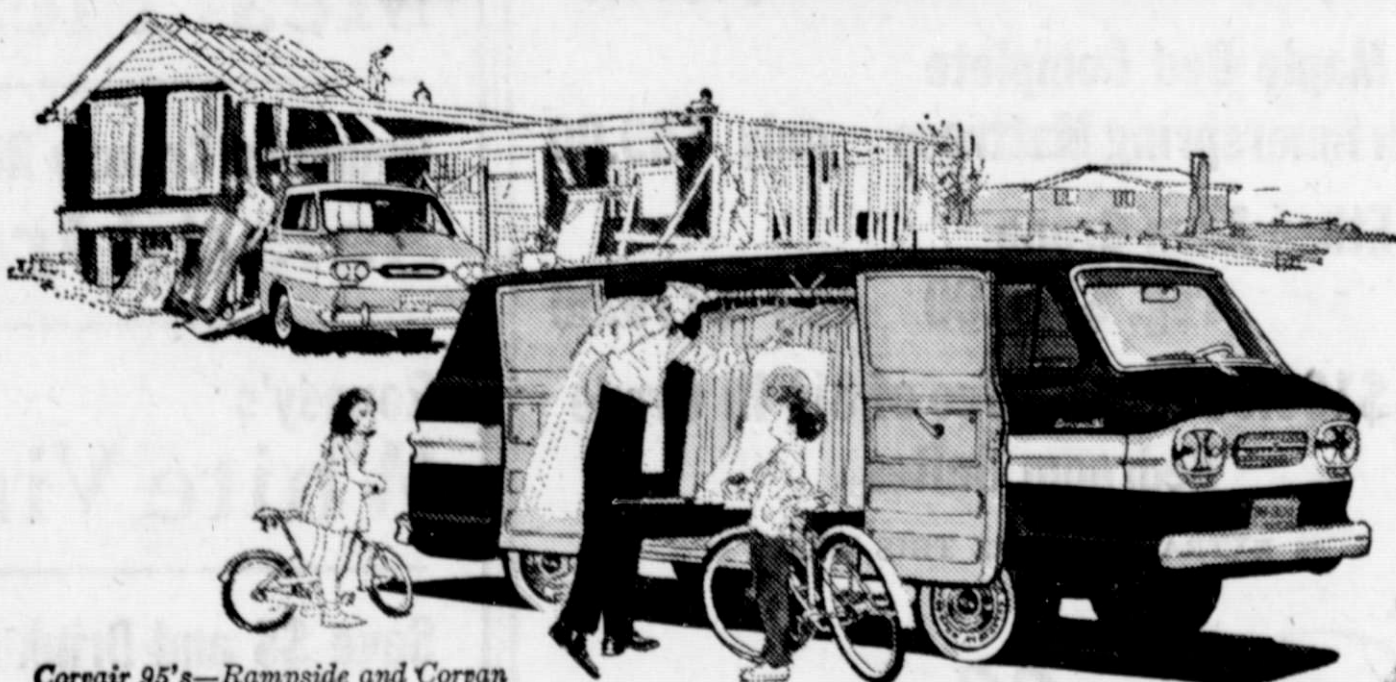

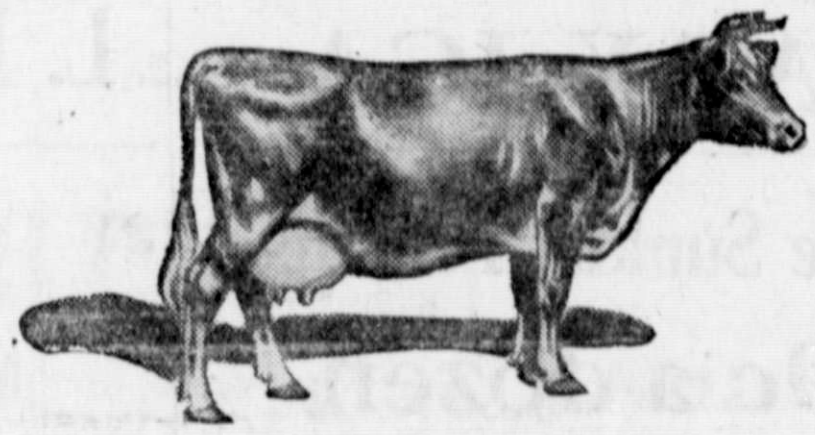

Plan CD Sessions to Acquaint Personnel on Emergency Hospital

SCHEDULE MEETINGS AT WEST BEND JULY 25-27

Phillip Hoffman, M. D. of Hartford, Washington county, medical director for Civil Defense, and Drs. W. A. Nielsen and J. E. Albrecht, representing West Bend physicians, have announced that orientation sessions, primarily designed to acquaint medical and paramedical personnel with the operation of the emergency hospital, will be held in West Bend on July 25, 26 and 27.

These sessions are a part of the Civil Defense health-medical services program carried out by the State Board of Health, in cooperation with local civil defense authorities and medical groups. The orientation sessions are made available to communities storing 200 bed emergency hospitals. Two units received from the federal government by the Wisconsin State Office of Civil Defense are stored in Washington county at the Hartford city hall and the West Bend High school.

Dr. Nielsen stated that equipment and supplies representing each section of the emergency hospital will be set up and exhibited in the West Bend High school cafeteria (old gymnasium). He indicated that the following schedule will be utilized but in case anyone has difficulty in meeting with a specific group, attendance at any session is permissible.

Dr. Albrecht stated, "Washington county is to serve as a reception area, therefore, we have a responsibility to organize a skeleton staff of technical people, based

on available personnel, for this emergency hospital. To accomplish this we must not rely on an existing hospital staff." He added, "This does not mean that an existing hospital and the 200 bed emergency hospital cannot be utilized in conjunction with each other during an emergency even though they may be operated in separate buildings."

State and assumed target city survival plans call for evacuation of these target areas if warning time permits before enemy attack. The emergency hospital staff would be augmented by professional personnel who have successfully evacuated target cities.
