## 42 Attend Annual Meeting Of Public School District

### Re-Elect Koch to Board, OK Tax Levy Increase

KEWASKUM PUBLIC SCHOOL  
JT. DISTRICT NO. 1  
BUDGET HEARING  
JULY 24, 1961

The budget hearing was called to order by August Koch with twenty-six electors present.

The proposed budget was read and explained to the electors.

Following a discussion it was moved by Mr. Bingen and seconded by Mr. Frank to accept the budget as proposed. Motion carried.

It was moved by George Egert and seconded by Wayland Tessar to adjourn the budget hearing. Motion carried.

#### ANNUAL MEETING JULY 24, 1961

The meeting was called to order by August Koch, president of the Board of Education with forty-two electors present.

The minutes of the last annual meeting of July 25, 1960 were read. It was moved by Henry Weddig and seconded by Mrs. Erdmann to accept the minutes as read. Motion carried.

The auditor's report was read by Mr. Dale Nollstram of Kanneberg and Marx, Certified Public Accountants. It was moved by Mr. Frank and seconded by Wayland Tessar to accept the auditor's report. Motion carried.

It was moved by Charles Miller and seconded by L. N. Peterson to dispense with the reading of the clerk's report and accept it as printed. Motion carried.

It was moved by Wayland Tessar and seconded by George Egert to dispense with the reading of the treasurer's report and accept it as printed. Motion carried.

Under new business, August Koch, president of the Board of Education, brought to the attention of the electors the need for additional space. It was the opinion of the electors present to pend any action on this problem to a future date rather than set up a reserve.

The chair called for nominations for a board of education member to succeed August Koch. Charles Miller nominated August Koch. There being no further nominations, it was moved by L. N. Peterson and seconded by Henry Weddig that the clerk cast an unanimous ballot for August Koch. Motion carried.

The following resolutions were adopted:

RESOLUTION NO. 1—Be it resolved by the electors of Kewaskum Jt. School District No. 1 that a tax be levied on all the taxable property of the district for operating expense for the year commencing in 1961 and ending in 1962 in the amount of \$121,930.00.

It was moved by Fred Spoerl and seconded by Charles Miller to adopt resolution No. 1. Motion

carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 2—Be it resolved by the electors of Kewaskum Public School that the school year be set at nine and one-fourth months or 185 days.

It was moved by Wayland Tessar and seconded by George Egert to adopt resolution No. 2. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 3—Be it resolved by the electors of Kewaskum Jt. School District No. 1 or the Kewaskum Public School that there be furnished free textbooks to all elementary students for the ensuing year.

It was moved by Mrs. Marion Erdman and seconded by Mrs. Viola Spoerl to adopt resolution No. 3. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 4—Be it resolved that the salaries of the members of the school board be affixed at \$200.00 per member for the year 1961-1962.

It was moved by Walter Wesenberg and seconded by L. N. Peterson to adopt resolution No. 4. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 5—Be it resolved that the 1962 annual meeting of this district be held on the fourth Monday in July the year 1962 at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

It was moved by Marvin Martin and seconded by Francis Gilboy to adopt resolution No. 5. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 6—Be it resolved that the school board of this district be and they hereby are authorized to make such temporary loans as may be necessary to pay the operating expense until funds for the payment thereof are realized from the current tax levy.

It was moved by Henry Weddig and seconded by Lloyd Teeselink to adopt resolution No. 6. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Fred Spoerl and seconded by Lloyd Teeselink to adjourn. Motion carried.

## Cornerstone Laying Ceremony at the New Court House Aug. 10

### PROGRAM IS ARRANGED; REV. BUDDIE TO GIVE INVOCATION

Plans for the cornerstone laying at the new Washington county court house were discussed and completed at meetings of the Cornerstone and Dedication committee held at the court house last Thursday afternoon and on Monday evening of this week. The ceremony will be held at 2 p. m. next Thursday, Aug. 10.

Reuben Schmah of the town of Jackson was elected chairman of the committee. Other committee members are Mrs. Norma Courtney, city of Hartford; Adolph Schmidt, town of Polk; Alfred Liesener, village of Jackson, and Fred Sager, city of West Bend.

At the Thursday session it was revealed that a picture of the county board members will be placed in the cornerstone. Correspondence from the Waukesha county clerk and Joseph Gundrum was read relative to suggestions for a cornerstone laying program.

County Clerk Anton P. Storal informed committee members that the architect, Ray Gauger, and the general contractor, Don Smith, had both offered to supply coffee and doughnuts for the program. It was suggested that milk also be provided.

A program of approximately an hour's length has been planned. Mr. Storal was asked to extend an invitation to Father John Budde of Kewaskum to give the invocation and Reuben Schmah was asked to contact Rev. Ralph Maschmeier of Jackson to give the benediction. Circuit Judge Milton L. Meister will give the main address. The mayors of Hartford and West Bend as well as clerks and county board chairmen of neighboring counties will be invited.

Ray Bast, county board vice-chairman, will introduce the architect and contractor. E. M. Romaine, Kewaskum, county board chairman, will speak and will introduce members of the building committee and county board.

Copies of the West Bend News, Hartford Times-Press and Kewaskum Statesman will be included in the contents of the cornerstone box.

At another meeting of the cornerstone committee held Monday evening, July 31, and called to order at 8 p. m. by Chairman Schmah, all members of the committee were present. A discussion was held.

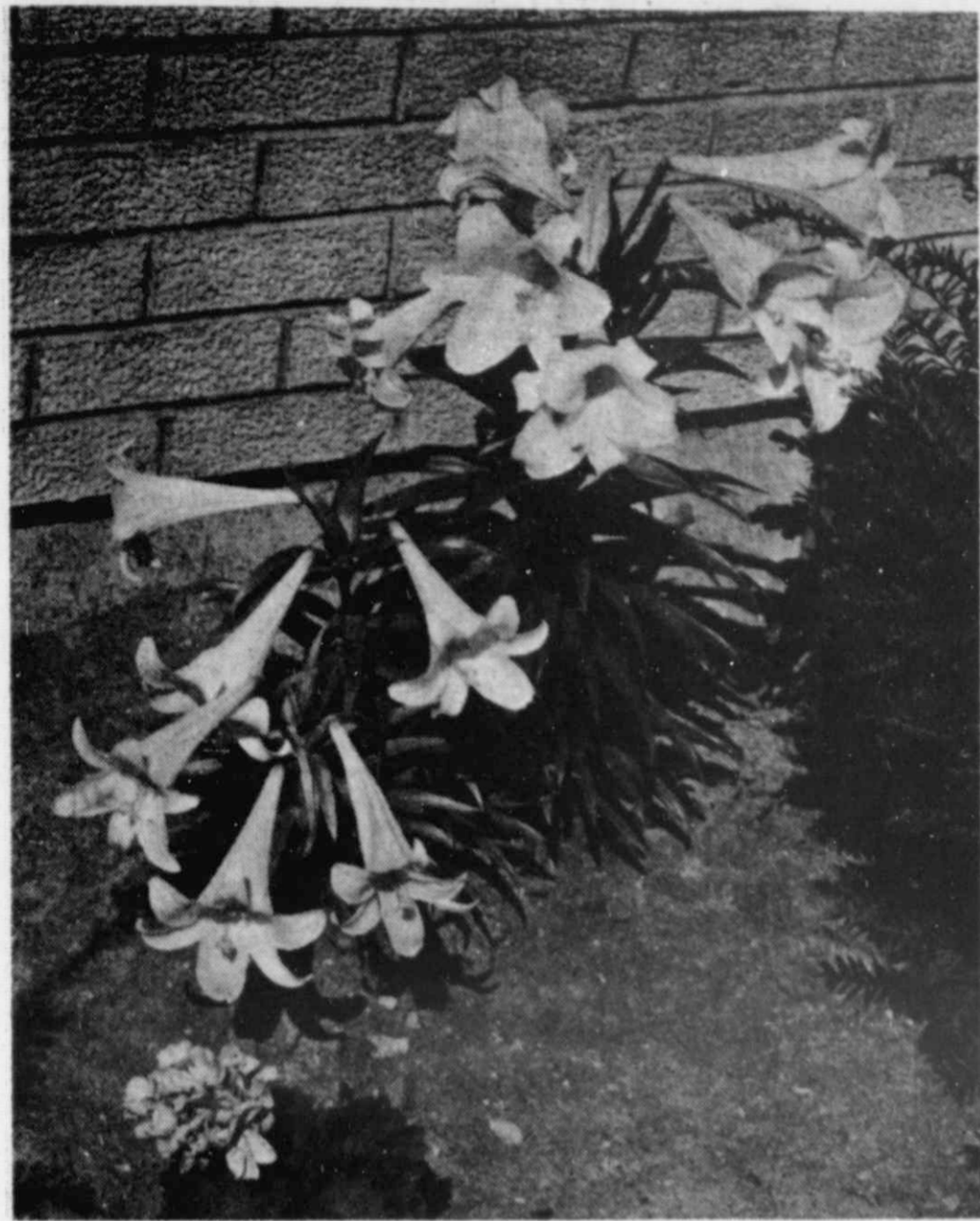

## INDICATE PREFERENCE FOR WITHHOLDING TAX AT COUNTY FAIR POLL

The income tax with withholding is preferred by more than three times as many people as prefer a sales tax as a revenue source for the state of Wisconsin, according to a poll conducted last week end at the Washington county junior fair in Slinger.

The poll, conducted by the Washington county Democratic party, asked the following question:

"To raise additional state revenue, would you favor use of the (1) Income tax with withholding; (2) 3% sales tax?"

A total of 813 people were polled. Of those who indicated a preference, 432 chose the income tax plan with the withholding feature. Only 143 favored the use of a state Sales tax; 238 no opinion.

The question was asked as part

of an entry blank used by the political organization to give away a prize at the fair. The prize, a 40-cup Regal coffee maker, was won by Miss Janice Jansen, R. 2, West Bend.

## Our Police Chief Says

Two years ago the legislature enacted a law which reads: "It shall be conclusively presumed that an infant minor who has not reached the age of 7 shall be incapable of being guilty of contributory negligence or any negligence whatsoever."

In other words, if a driver hits such a child, no matter what the child was doing, the child's conduct cannot be used in the driver's defense. He alone is legally liable.
