Grand Opening This Week End at Ollie's New Texaco Station

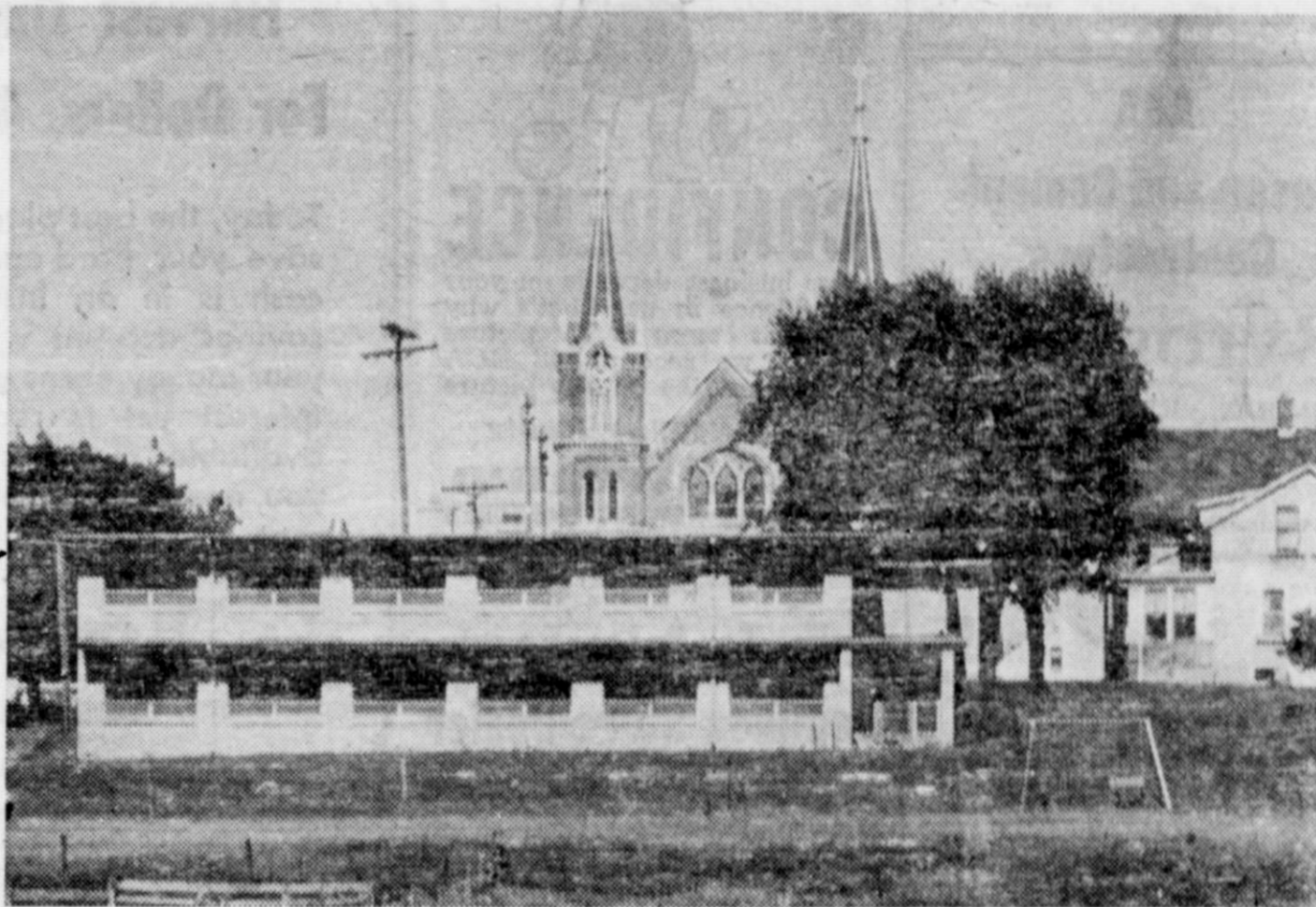
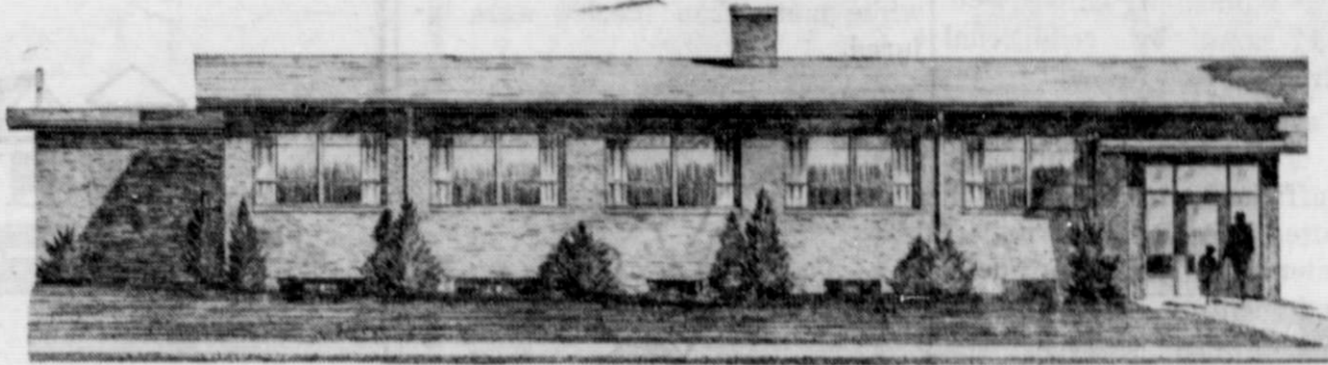

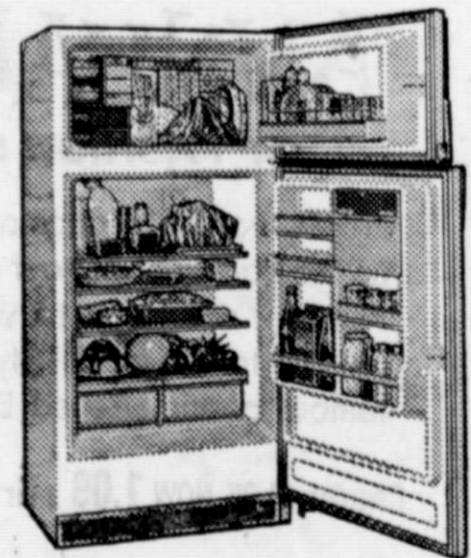
