Village Board Votes To Make Assessor's Office Appointive

FIRE DEPT. COMMITTEE TO PRESENT RECOMMENDATION FOR NEW EQUIPMENT

Regular Meeting August 7, 1961

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all board members present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Wietor, seconded by Trustee Degner and duly carried.

Armand Schaefer appeared to present and explain a preliminary plan for the subdivision of some land near the south village limits.

Mrs. Schmidtbauer appeared to inquire what progress had been made on a plan to beautify Kewaskum street in the area of their home.

Marie and Walter Dei appeared to question the correctness of a billing for some concrete steps constructed by the Wiesler Construction Company.

Chief Pledl presented a report of State Forester Larry Fenton on Dutch Elm disease as it might affect the Kewaskum area.

Chief of Police Pledl was authorized to attend the Police Chiefs Convention at Janesville on August 29 and 30.

Fire Chief Harry Schaefer reported that the Fire Department equipment committee would soon be ready to present to the board its recommendation for the addition to a new piece of fire fighting equipment.

The board voted unanimously to place the position of Village Assessor on an appointive basis rather than elective and Village Attorney Stephen O'Mearra was instructed to institute the necessary legal action.

The application of Walter A. Buss for an operator's license was approved upon motion by Trustee Eberle, seconded by Trustee Degner and duly carried, and the commissioner was authorized to issue the proper license upon payment of the required fee.

E. SCHOWALTER DRIVER TRAINING BILL PASSED

A bill sponsored by Assemblyman Elmer J. Schowalter of Jackson to raise additional funds for a more extensive driver-education program in Wisconsin was passed by the Assembly recently after receiving favorable action in the Senate. The bill was returned to the assembly for action on a minor amendment, but was passed unchanged.

The bill, which is expected to raise about \$1 million annually to provide additional funds to expand the driver training in the state, will increase driver license permits from \$1 to \$1.50; driver licenses from \$2 to \$2.50, and driver license renewals from \$1 to \$2.

It will also provide for appropriation of an amount annually equivalent to receipts from chauffeur's license fees.

Milwaukee Official Hurt in Auto Crash

Milwaukee county supervisor, Richard J. White, Jr., 63, is recovering at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, of injuries suffered in an auto crash at the intersection of Hwys. 41 and 28 Saturday afternoon.

White suffered fractured ribs and a fractured left arm. Other passengers in the car in which White was traveling to Milwaukee from Boulder Junction included his brother-in-law, Peter McBride, 62, Shorewood; McBride's son, Joseph, 34, Milwaukee; Peter's wife, Eleanor, 60, and a daughter, Sally, 29, of New York City.

Peter suffered a shoulder injury, Mrs. McBride a leg injury, Joseph, who was driving, a mouth injury and cuts and Sally was shaken up. All were reported in good condition at the hospital Monday. White, Mrs. McBride and Joseph all were taken to the hospital in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance.

The driver of the other vehicle involved in the accident, Mrs. Marcella Kohl, 53, of R. 1, Theresa, was believed to be the most seriously injured. She and her husband, Cornelius Kohl, 53, who suffered cuts, were taken to St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac.

School Committee of County Sets Hearings

PROGRAM OF PLACING ALL TUITION AREA IN HIGH SCHOOL DIST. BEGINS

The Washington County School committee has started on its program of placing all county tuition area in a high school district. A state law requires that all such tuition area be placed in a district which operates a high school by July 1, 1962.

The first of these hearings will be held at the West Bend high school on Aug. 23 at 8:00 p. m. This hearing is the result of a petition filed by the electors of School District Jt. 7 of Jackson village and township. This petition requests the attachment of that district to the City of West Bend district.

On Aug. 25, at 8:00 p. m. a hearing will be held in the Washington High school of Germantown on the attachment of the Jt. 4 Polk district territory to the Washington Union High School district.

On Aug. 28 two hearings will be held in the Washington High school. The first is scheduled for 8:00 p. m. It is on the proposal to attach the territory of District No. 6 Jackson, to the Washington High School district.

The other hearing is scheduled for 9:00 p. m. It is on the proposal to attach the territory of District No. 4 Jackson to the Washington Union High School district.

Another hearing will be held in the Slinger High school building at 8:00 p. m. on Aug. 30. This hearing is on the proposal to attach School District No. 2 of Polk township to the Slinger School district.

The last of the hearings will be held in the Slinger school on Sept. 6, one at 8:00 p. m. and the other at 9:00 p. m. The first hearing is on the attachment of School District Jt. 7 Polk and Richfield townships to the Slinger district.

The 9:00 p. m. hearing is on the attachment of School District Jt. 8 of Polk and Richfield townships to the Slinger district.

Two districts, namely, Jt. 2 Trenton and Jt. 1 Jackson will be scheduled at a later date.

The order which attached portions of School District Jt. 2 of West Bend to the Slinger and West Bend city districts has been "stayed" by an appeal of a circuit court decision to the supreme court. The circuit court decision upheld the county committee order as being a legal order.

These hearings have been scheduled to be heard in the high schools involved. This has been committee policy.

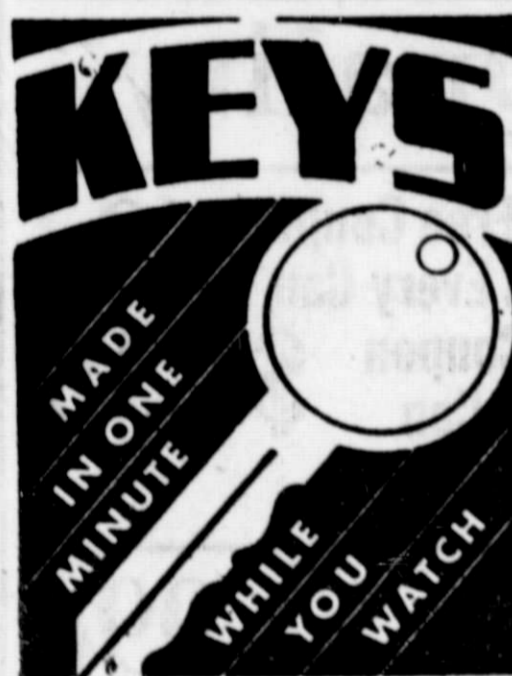

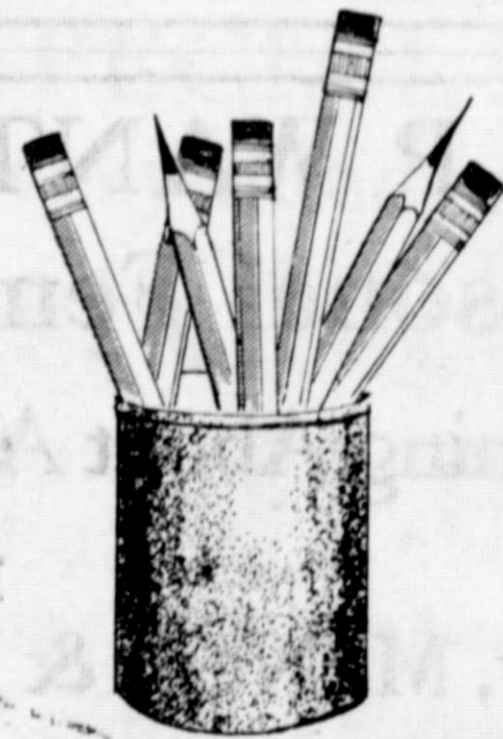
