## Cancer Crusade Goal Again Is Exceeded; Over \$7,800 Donated

KEWASKUM VOLUNTEERS CONDUCT NEIGHBOR TO NEIGHBOR CAMPAIGN

D. J. Kenny, chairman of the American Cancer Society, reported volunteer workers have concluded their 1961 educational and fund-raising campaign with record results.

In making public a detailed report, Kenny said, "The response has been heart-warming. We have again exceeded our minimum goal. The reaction here and across the country is proof that Americans want urgently to stamp out a killer that takes more than 265,000 lives each year."

Last year's record Crusade total for Washington county was \$7,515. This year the amount has surpassed \$7,800. More than 6,000 individual, business and industrial gifts were given for the continuation of cancer research, education and allied services.

Kenny pointed out that while the local drive has ended, the Crusade continues through the year. Persons who have not had the opportunity to contribute or those who may wish to make a special contribution in memory of a friend or loved one who has fallen victim to cancer can do so by mailing their envelope directly to "American Cancer Society, Washington County Unit, Security Building, West Bend, Wis." Information regarding specific bequests to the society can be obtained from Attorney Henry F. Renard of West Bend, chairman of the Washington County Legacy committee of the American Cancer Society.

During the 1961 Crusade, 123 volunteers circulated "Neighbor to Neighbor" packets in West Bend, Hartford, Barton and Kewaskum. Campaign Chairman Richard C. Klein coordinated Crusade activities.

Mrs. Hy. Rosenheimer and Mrs. Howard Backhaus served as Kewaskum co-chairmen. Assisting volunteers were Mesdames Ralph Rempel, Edwin Fickler, Armin Oppermann, Desmond Smith, Paul Albrecht, Orville Behnke, Myron Perschbacher and Armin Schaefer. Fifteen township and village chairmen conducted a successful direct mail campaign. Alfred Seefeldt was town of Kewaskum chairman.

Direct mail receipts from townships and villages amounted to \$1,412.07; business and industries in West Bend, Barton and Kewaskum added another \$1,208, while receipts from Hartford in the same categories totaled \$403.50.

In the neighbor to neighbor phase, West Bend, Barton and Kewaskum residents contributed \$3,127.70. An additional \$1,300.28 was collected in the Hartford neighbor to neighbor campaign. Memorial contributions amounting to \$382 brought the total amount collected to \$7,833.55.

SLIGHT GAIN OVER LAST YEAR EXPECTED; NEW SISTER ADDED

Holy Trinity Catholic school will open next Wednesday, Sept. 6, with an expected enrollment of 252 pupils, a slight increase over last year when 250 registered on the opening day. The school term will begin with a high mass in the parish church at 8 a. m. On opening day there will be only a half day of school, with classes being dismissed at noon.

A staff of five Sisters of St. Agnes and one lay teacher will teach the eight grades. The staff will be composed of Sr. M. Brian, Sr. Stella Marie, Mrs. Caroline Fellenz, Sr. Mary Ellen, Sr. M. Charitas and Sr. M. Audrey. M. Angelica will be the domestic sister.

Sister M. Charitas is a new teacher at the school. She attended school at Marion college in Fond du Lac last year. Sr. M. Charitas replaces Sr. Jean Louise, who taught grades 6 and 7 and was organist. She was transferred to Waunakee, Wis.

Grades to be taught by the sisters and lay teacher are as follows: Grade 1—Sr. M. Brian; grades 2 and 3—Sr. Stella Marie; grades 3 and 4—Mrs. Caroline Fellenz; grades 4 and 5—Sr. Mary Ellen; grades 6 and 7—Sr. M. Charitas; grades 7 and 8—Sr. M. Audrey.

## All Public Schools of County to Open Sept. 5

All of the county public schools will be opening for the 1961-1962 school term on Tuesday, Sept. 5. Some of the high schools had students report on Friday, Sept. 1, for registration and orientation purposes.

### Physical Examinations

Parents of beginner pupils, either kindergarten, 1st grade or 9th grade are advised to have their children examined by the family physician. It is important that the teacher know the condition of the physical welfare of her class, because she can better understand their school development progress.

Freshmen entering high school will be required to participate in physical education classes. These classes are going to be more strenuous because of the added emphasis placed upon the schools by the federal government to condition the youth of this country. Some mild heart conditions can be discovered by these exams, and corrective measures can be applied to help this child develop normally.

### Birth Certificates

Teachers of 1st grade and kindergarten children are being instructed by their principals and the county office to require birth certificates upon registration. The state law prevents pupils from being registered for these classes unless they will attain the age of 6 or 5, respectively.

Parents should accompany their children to the school and check

the record for this registration. The census record is not sufficient.

### Substitute Teachers

Any former teachers who are interested in doing substituted teaching should make personal application at the county office. Upon registration, they will be asked to complete the permit or license application form, or telephone FEderal 4-4204 for an appointment.

### Extension Courses

A course in art 62-A will be taught in room 226 of the West Bend High school. The first meeting is at 6:30 p. m. on Monday, Sept. 11. This is a 3 credit course in dimensional design, and is strictly for undergraduate credit.

A course in geography 10 will be taught at the Hartford High school. The first meeting of this course will be at 6:30 p. m. on Sept. 12. This is a 3 credit course,

Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

Fishing pressure is light in Ozaukee county. Due to low water and hot weather fishing is poor.

Fishing pressure is light in Washington county. Fishing is poor to fair, it will pick up when the weather turns cool.

Large flocks of teal and mallard are flying morning and evening in this area. Water levels on the Milwaukee river and the cedar bogs are ideal for them. Pheasants and rabbits are showing up well so far this year. The number of raccoon has increased at a rapid rate, in fact they are about to become a nuisance. The number of damage complaints reported is terrific.

The Wisconsin bounty law was changed by the 1961 legislature. From now on the county clerk or the conservation warden must cut off and destroy both ears of the animal brought in for bounty. In other words, if you wish to mount the animal do not bother to bring it in for bounty.

The following is an old law. However, many people forget it each year. It is illegal to have in possession a shotgun or rifle, on or along inland waters where waterfowl are to be found from Aug. 15 to the opening date for hunting aquatic or upland game birds.

We are approaching the time when many of you hunters are preparing for the opening of the waterfowl season and some will be building your blinds.

A few words about the prospects for the waterfowl season. The duck season as anticipated will be very limited. It is as follows: open Saturday, Oct. 14, at 12:00 noon, closes Nov. 12—a total of 30 days. The bag limit is 2 and the possession limit 4. The season on canvasback and redhead is closed. The possession limit may include 1 wood duck or 1 hooded merganser. This is the most curtailed duck season in many years and reflects the severe drought condition of the prairie provinces of Canada and the Dakotas.

The cool damp nights of the past week have increased the high-

way kill of small game animals in the night-time. Highways hold the heat of the sun and attract rabbits, raccoon, skunk and opossum.

A large doe fawn was killed Friday night on US Hwy. 41, two miles north of County Trunk K. This animal was still in the spotted coat.

The sportsmen's license will expire on Aug. 31. This type of license will be available at the various license depots in the county this week end.

Many of you have probably seen and heard our law enforcement airplane in the last few weeks.

The plane is equipped with a loud speaker and is used to urge you to comply with the conservation laws as well as the boating law. Much of the East Central area has been covered by the plane.

The plane is also equipped with a two-way radio and has constant contact with boats and ground crews working the same area. In case the plane notices violations the radio-equipped boats and ground crews are notified and they move in to contact the violator.

Also, the plane carries photographic equipment which is used to take pictures of violations. These make excellent evidence should a case go to trial.

The Milwaukee Sentinel on Friday, Aug. 4, carried an article in regard to the sturgeon that was caught at Big Cedar lake. This fish was sixty-four inches long and weighed in at seventy-five pounds. Due to the fact that the fish was hurt and could not be returned to the water, it was con-

fiscated by the Wisconsin Conservation Department.

H. W. MacKenzie, former director of the department, A. G. Langenbach of West Bend and Lester Smith of Port Washington were very much interested in the fishing potential of the lake. They compared it to the Finger lakes of New York State, which had a Sturgeon population.

In 1936 the department planted about twenty fish, (twenty-four to thirty inches in length) in Big Cedar. In the event the one caught was the largest, it has taken twenty-five years for it to grow thirty-four inches.

The smaller song birds are starting to migrate south. Mourning doves, martins and swallows in large numbers are on the electric wires and in a short time will start south. The local hatch of ducks can be seen in early morning or evening testing their wings.

Some sportsmen's clubs in this area have started to release pheasants that were raised in the day old chick program, from birds delivered by the state game farm. Due to the activities of a few poor sportsmen, many of the clubs are releasing only the hens at this time. The cocks will be released during the season, giving the honest hunter a chance to shoot a bird.

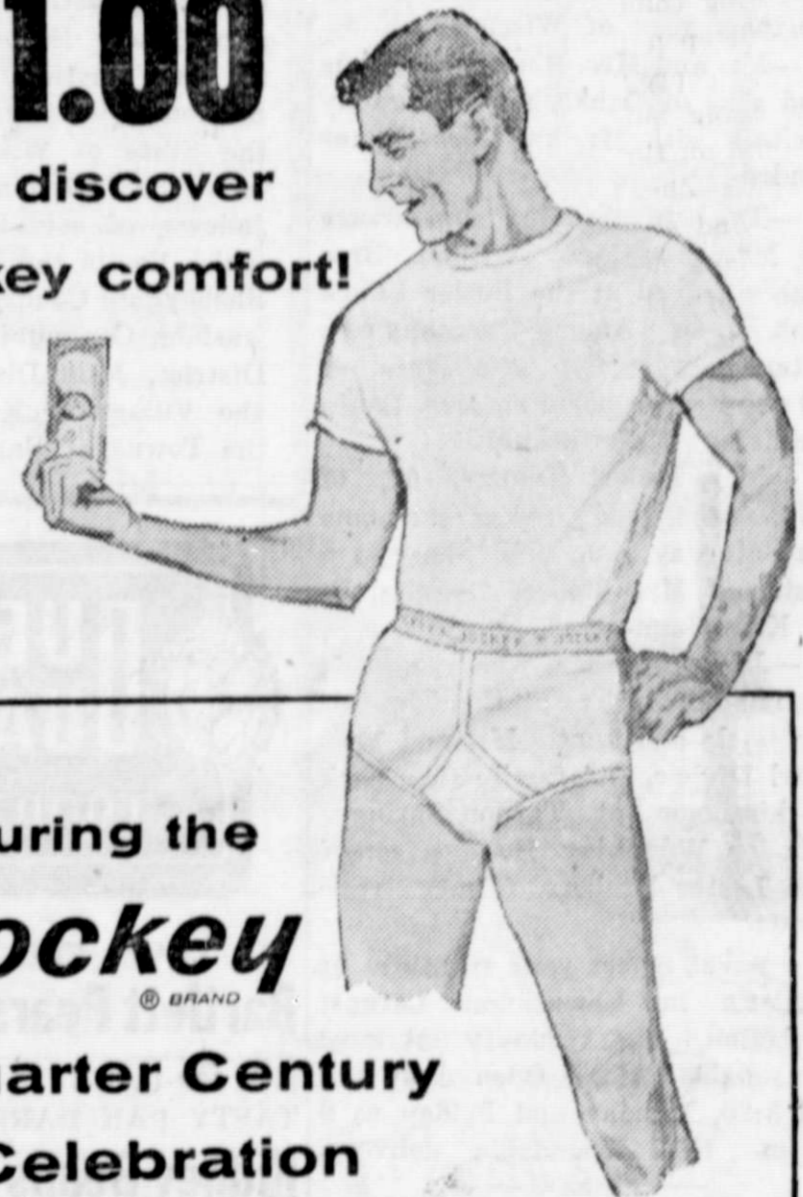

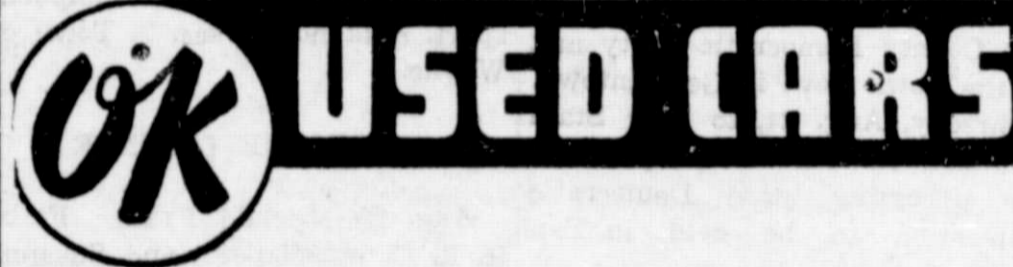

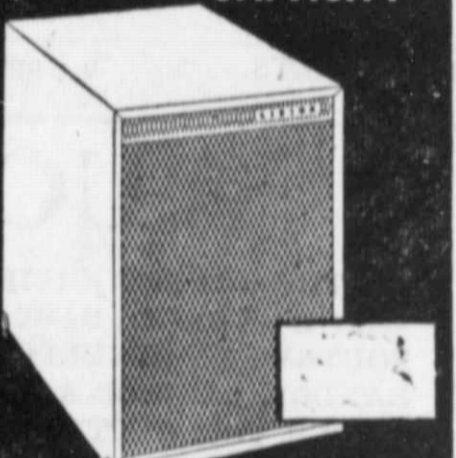

## Cedar Lake Home in Midst of \$86,000 Expansion Program

The Cedar Lake Home for the Aged, serving the local community, is in the midst of an \$86,000 expansion program.

Opened in July, 1957, the home celebrated its fourth anniversary this past July. Serving aged people of all faiths, the home is operated by the Benevolent Society of the South Wisconsin Conference of the United Church of Christ. In January, 1959, an eighteen-bed nursing addition to the home was opened. In October of 1960, a lower annex marked another ten-bed expansion. The project to date will add seven nursing beds, a large therapy assembly area, a nursing wing dining-living room plus an elevator to the lower annex and added storage areas.

"The present expansion program will greatly benefit our fifty-four residents," explained the superintendent, the Rev. L. C. Riesch. "However, we actually have dire need for another fifty beds."

"Does it look like this bed-challenge will be met in the future" the question was asked.

"I cannot answer that," Superintendent Riesch replied. "We have never campaigned for funds from the citizens of the community and do not plan to do so now. However, the Benevolent Society placed us on a self-sustaining basis as of July 1, 1961 and this means the home must meet the \$86,000 expansion bill plus the original debt and daily operation." "We do appreciate," Mr. Riesch continued, "the many community individuals who have been supporting our program in so many fine ways. It is only through their

interest and help now that the Cedar Lake Home will be able to continue to care for the aged and grow in its services."

The present Cedar Lake expansion, under the direction of architect William Wenzler of Brookfield, will be completed in September or October of this year.
