Elementary School Opens With Record, Overflow Enrollment Of 442; Facilities Inadequate

Increase of 66 Over Last Year; More Expected

LARGE LATE KINDERGARTEN ENROLLMENT NECESSITATES HIRING EXTRA TEACHER

The Kewaskum Elementary school opened on Tuesday with another record enrollment. A total of 442 pupils reported as compared with 376 on opening day a year ago. This is an increase of 66 and the total does not include those who were absent.

As a result, the facilities at the school will be inadequate to handle future pupil gains, according to Principal Richard Zarling.

A very large last minute enrollment of kindergarten pupils forced the board of education to hire an additional teacher to handle the over-flow. This year there will be a morning section and two afternoon sections of kindergarten. The new teacher hired on a half-time basis is Mrs. Carl Leisering of Fillmore.

More students may have enrolled after the opening day when the above figures were taken.

The huge enrollment has caused all available rooms to be used as classrooms and no others are available for future use. The special education class has been moved to the basement and now occupies the former band room.

"The pressing need for additional classrooms was brought out at the annual meeting, however, the electors present failed to authorize the board of education to begin planning an addition to the building," Zarling said. "Unless this is done shortly, next year will find one and possibly two classes having to be scheduled in another building somewhere in the village. Each year thereafter, an additional class will have to be housed elsewhere."

He added, "needless to say, this is not very desirable from an education standpoint and it is imperative that the district begin the necessary addition to the building with the least amount of delay."

Holy Trinity School Opens Wednesday With Enrollment of 252

Holy Trinity Catholic school opened on Wednesday morning with an enrollment of 252 pupils, a decrease of one from last year's total of 253. On opening day there was only a half day of school, with classes being dismissed before noon. The total enrollment consists of 140 boys and 112 girls.

Thirty-two children started school in the first grade, a decrease of three from last year's total of 35. Three of last year's pupils transferred to other schools, while only one new pupil transferred to Holy Trinity school.

Fairmont Foods Co. Donates Tank Truck To Fire Department

Fairmont Foods Co. of Kewaskum, now under new management, has donated a much needed piece of equipment to the Kewaskum Fire Department, a 1954 model International tank truck.

The tank truck will be used mainly by the fire department for fighting fires in the surrounding rural areas where there is a shortage of water. The truck, which is in very good condition, already has been turned over to the firemen and will be put into use within about two weeks.

The tank has a capacity of 10 tons or 20,000 pounds of water, which is equivalent to about 1,800 gallons. It will greatly increase the water supply available to the firemen in fighting rural fires. The capacity of the tank on the department's present Ford fire truck is 600 gallons and the 1,800 gallons which the International tanker holds will give the department four times the ready water supply it formerly carried.

A new piece of equipment of this type would cost in the neighborhood of \$12,000 and the donation of it by Fairmont Foods has provided a great saving for the fire department. The firemen and village are very grateful to Fairmont for donating this valuable and much needed equipment which will allow the department to render much better fire fighting service to the rural areas surrounding Kewaskum.

The tank truck formerly was utilized by Fairmont Foods to haul whey.

Annual Kiwanis Live Turkey Shoot at Bar-N Ranch Sunday, Sept. 17

The Kewaskum Kiwanis club will sponsor its ninth annual Live Turkey Shoot on Sunday, Sept. 17, at the Bar-N Dude Ranch, 6 miles northeast of Kewaskum on County Trunk GGG, the beautiful Kettle Moraine Drive.

Patterned after the historic turkey shoots which were so popular in frontier days, this fascinatingly interesting annual event has become an outstanding attraction. Thousands of men, women and children from all over the state attend as participants and spectators.

The Turkey Shoot is handled as follows: Large live turkeys are protected behind an earthen bunker at the end of the rifle range with only their heads exposed to the marksman. For a fee of \$1.00 for three shots, (four shots for a dollar on advance sale tickets) the marksman attempts to hit the turkey's head from the firing line, using a .22 rifle. The turkey he hits is the turkey he gets for the family larder. Rifles and ammunition are furnished.

A live trout fishing contest is another popular attraction. It offers fine sport for the pro and amateur alike. The angler keeps all the fish he catches. Additional prizes are offered for those catching the largest fish.

Other events include trap and deer target shooting. Sportsmen desiring to enter these events bring their own shotguns, rifles and ammunition. An authentic cross-bow direct from Switzerland will be used in a target event. Here's an opportunity for Robin-hood admirers to test their skill. In addition, there are games for every member of the family to enjoy. Shelter, hot and cold food and beverages will be available.

The Wanbuli Indian Dancers will perform throughout the day. The Wanbuli are a group of 50 students of Indian Lore who have studied the customs, clothes and rituals of many North American Indian nations. Their dances and costumes are authentic to the last detail and are thrilling to both young and old.

The club will honor 1960 advance sale tickets this year because a heavy rain during the afternoon last year made it impossible for them to handle everyone who had purchased tickets.

Natural Gas Service To Begin About Oct. 1; Project Nearing Finish

FINISH MAIN WORK IN TWO WEEKS; 50 SERVICES ALREADY CONNECTED

Construction of natural gas distribution facilities in Kewaskum has been moving smoothly and on schedule, according to the Gas Company's district manager Frank D. Sprtel.

"Our progress in fulfilling present applications for gas service has been so good," said Sprtel, "that we are able to handle additional applications for service if they are received promptly. Kewaskum residents who desire natural gas service for the winter heating season can still be connected this year by applying at our West Bend office."

Construction of natural gas mains in Kewaskum is virtually complete except for work along Main st. and on the north and south ends of Fond du Lac ave. The contractor Williams Brothers Company, estimates that main construction will be finished in another two weeks. A 25-man crew is installing gas mains.

Service piping is considered approximately half finished with 50 services already connected. Another 50 are scheduled with more applications for piping anticipated as fall weather arrives. The 13-man service installation crew is presently connecting services at the rate of 7 a day.

"Particularly pleasing," said Sprtel, "is the success we have had with our clean-up program in Kewaskum. Grass has grown nicely in those places where it had to be replanted and we were able to satisfy the one complaint we had regarding the quality of our clean-up work. We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation the people of Kewaskum have afforded us."

Construction of a natural gas transmission line from Barton to Kewaskum is presently being delayed until a permit can be obtained. It is estimated that gas service will begin in Kewaskum on Oct. 1.

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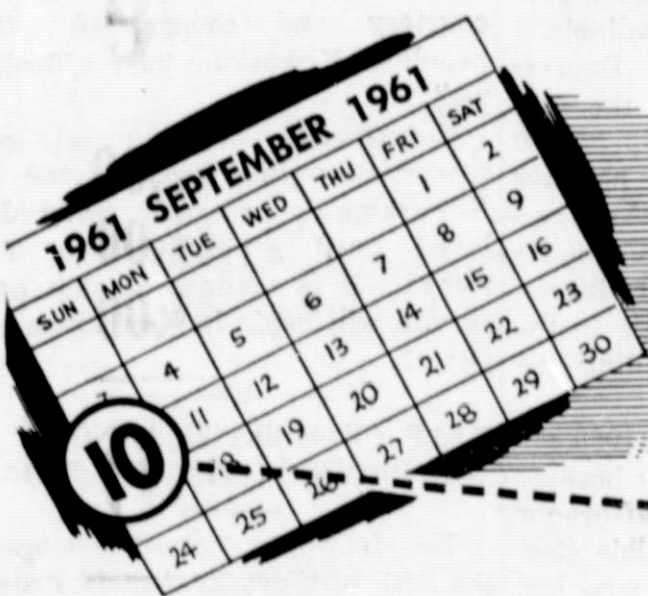

County Bar Association Honors Bucklin Memory

Tuesday afternoon marked a special observance by the Washington County Bar association in memory of the late Frank Bucklin, who served many years as county judge. The memorial was held at the Washington county courthouse and was presided over by Circuit Judge Milton Meister. Fellow lawyers, relatives, friends, and distinguished guests crowded the courtroom to pay tribute to the memory of a widely respected and much-loved citizen.

Clyde Schloemer, president of the County Bar Association, was chairman of the event which presented a series of speeches from the late judge's colleagues which praised his long service on the bench as well as his devotion and help to his community. Ted Simester, West Bend attorney, emphasized the tangible effect of the Bucklin personality as shown in the establishment of a fine public school system and hospital as well as the intangibles which left a mark on the community he served. The intangibles of character and moral fiber, the combination of intellect with understanding, the pairing of justice with toler-

ance, all contributed, according to Mr. Simester, to a lifetime of unselfish service.

County Judge Lester Buckley and Jess Peters, Hartford attorney, praised the record of Bucklin, emphasizing his fairness and courage in the court of law and his reputation as a devoted family man and advisor to his community. Robert Stoltz, county court judge, branch 2, pointed out the great service of Bucklin to education and community welfare. He underscored the qualities of wit and patience and the memorable "conviction of doing the right thing."

Also speaking at the Bar Association memorial tribute were Dodge County Judge Joseph Schultz and newly elected Dodge county judge, branch 2, Clarence Traeger. Both mentioned the honor of knowing a man who was not only a brilliant lawyer, but a wise judge and a great humani-

tarian. Judge Meister ordered that a record of this tribute be made for the circuit court of Washington county and that copies be sent to Frank Bucklin's relatives.

Mary Jane Van Fleet, the late judge's daughter, and family and Miss Ella Kuelthau, his sister-in-law, attended the memorial tribute. An old friend said sadly, "our town will miss his conscience." Chairman Clyde Schloemer concluded the tribute to "our best citizen" with a quote from the poet Joaquin Miller, "all that you can hold in your cold, cold hand is what you have given away." The entire tribute, "brief and orderly" as was the wish of Frank Bucklin in whatever he undertook, was a testimony to the gratitude of his profession and his friends, county-wide.

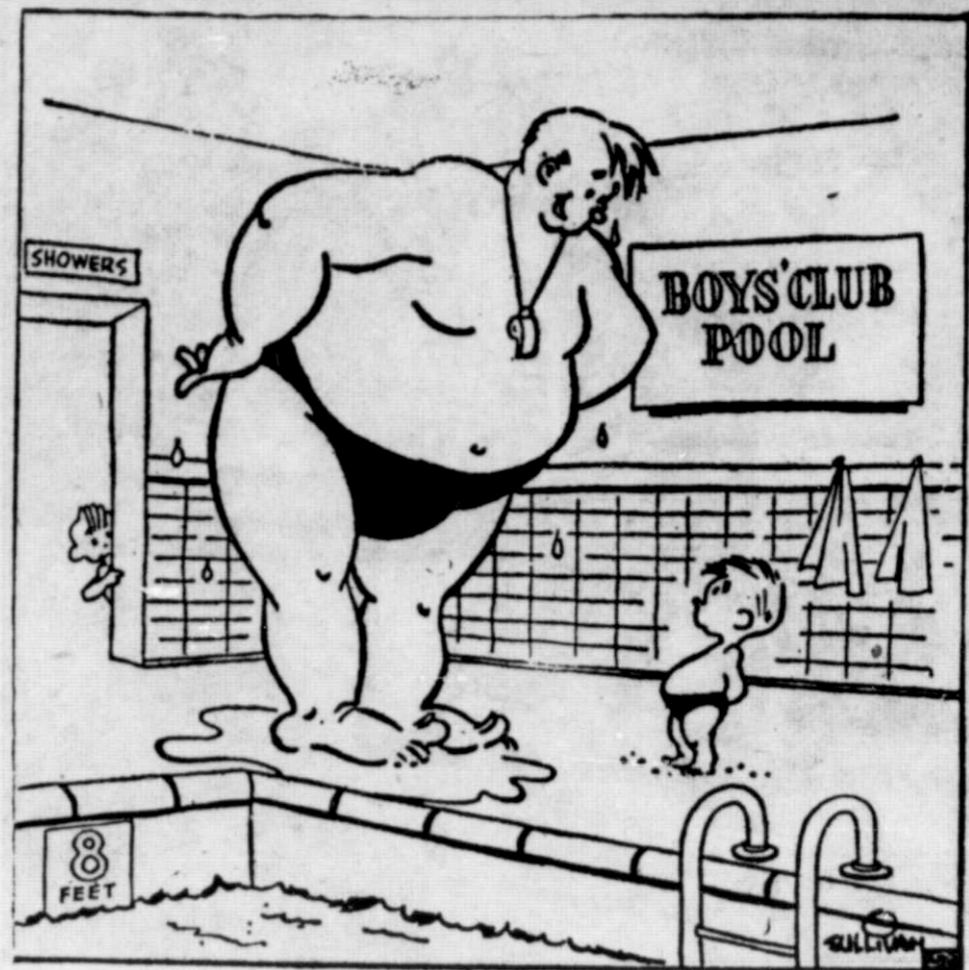

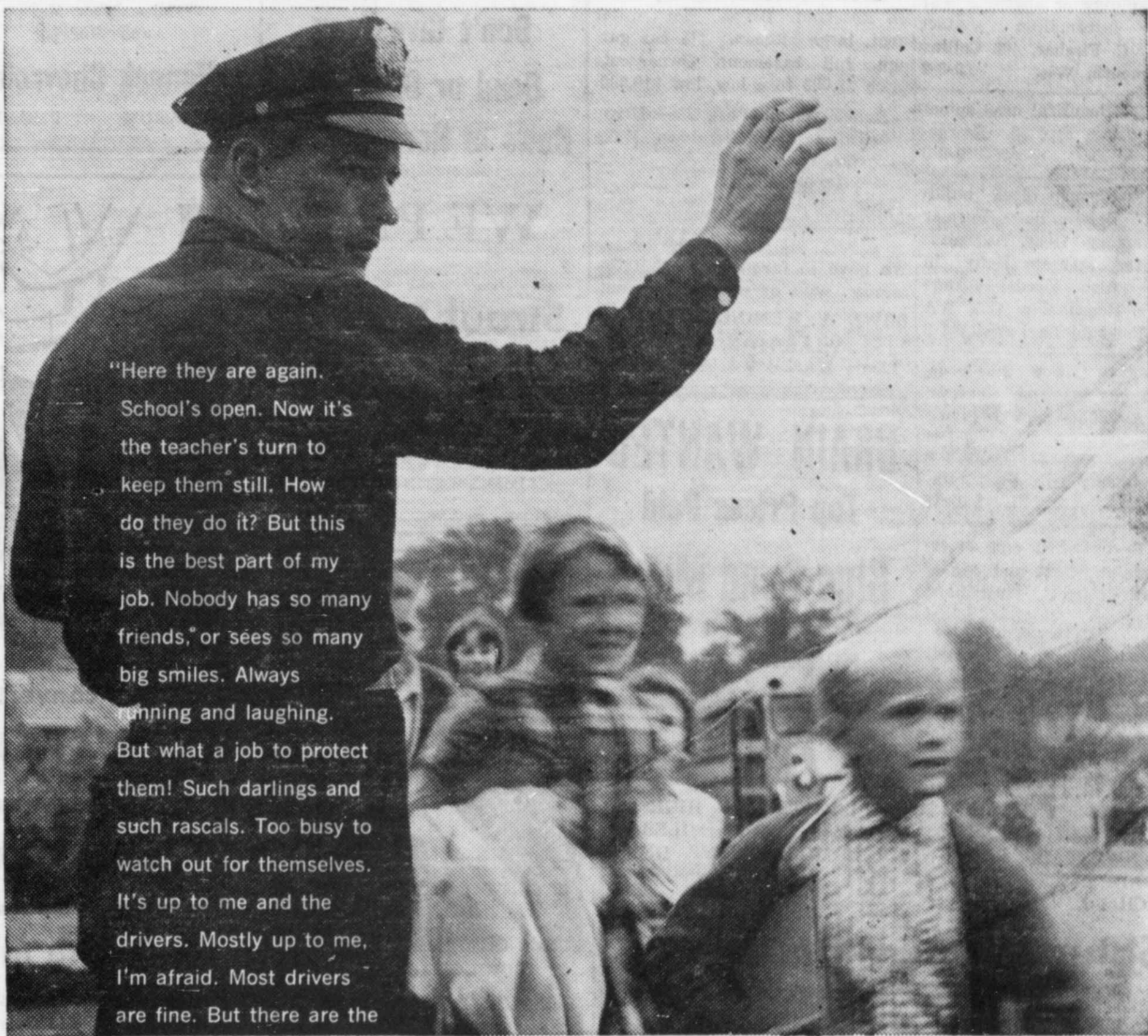

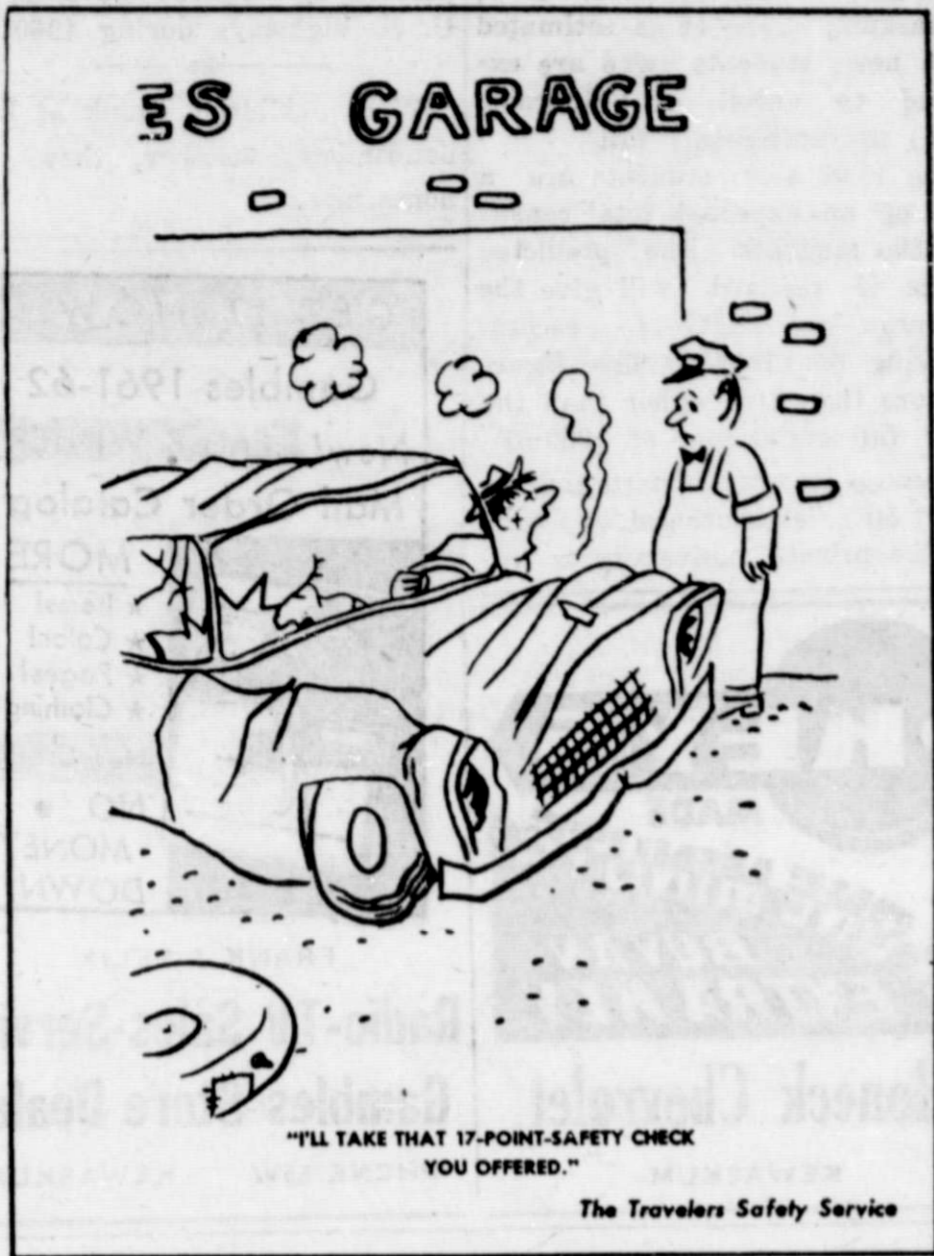

APPLICATIONS FOR GOOSE BLINDS NOW AVAILABLE

The Labor Day week end found fishing poor on most waters in Ozaukee and Washington counties. The exception was Pike lake. The boys fishing late at night and early in the morning were taking walleyed pike with spinning tackle.

Early last Saturday morning a doe deer was killed on Highway 45 just south of 143. At about the same time Sunday morning her fawn was killed in that same vicinity.

Applications for goose blinds on the Horicon marsh are now available at all license depots. Hunting licenses must be purchased or the application will not be honored.

New legislation. Chapter 29.22 (1) of the Wisconsin Statutes now reads: (No person shall hunt within 1700 feet of any hospital, school grounds or sanatorium. The conservation commission may furnish signs designating the restricted area. No conviction shall be had for a violation of this subsection unless the restricted area is designated by such signs.

We have just received the official information on applying for blinds in the managed hunting units at Horicon marsh.

Only one application is allowed. Anyone submitting more than (1) application will have all applica-

tions rejected. Official applications must be used and may be obtained from county clerks, conservation wardens and conservation department field stations. (These are now available). The hunting license number of the applicant must be shown on the application. Otherwise, the application will be rejected.

Only applications postmarked through Sept. 15 will be accepted. Applications postmarked after this date will be rejected.

Successful applicants will receive their reservation about Oct. 1.

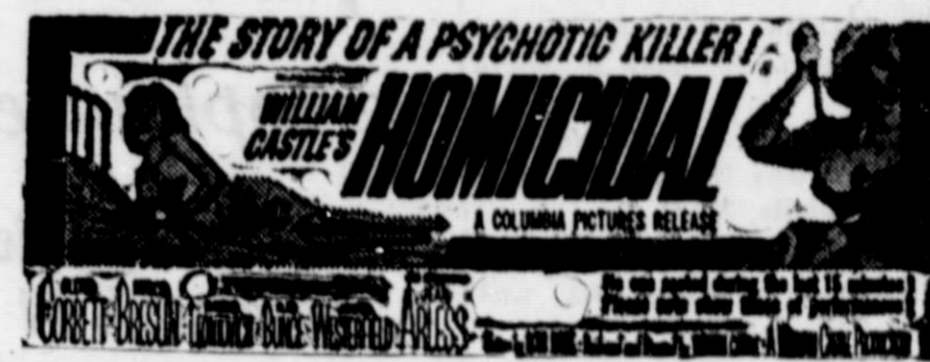
