455 Students Enrolled in High School, Freshman Class Of 138 Set All-Time Records

Total Enrollment Shows Increase of 71 Over Last Year

NUMEROUS TRANSFERS FROM OTHER SCHOOLS HELP UP ATTENDANCE

By far the largest total enrollment and freshman class in history enrolled at Kewaskum Community High school last week. The 455 students in high school and 138 freshmen both set all-time high records. Freshmen started school on Tuesday, while upper classmen reported on Wednesday.

The 455 in high school exceeds last year's total enrollment of 384 by 71 students, a very sizable increase. The freshman class of 138 outnumbers last year's group of 104 by 34 students, another big gain.

Thirty students, an exceptionally large number, who transferred to Kewaskum from other schools, also aided considerably in raising the enrollment. Quite a few of the transfers came from Waldo High school, which has been closed.

Mentioned in the last issue was the fact that the Kewaskum Elementary school opened with an all-time high enrollment of 442 pupils, an increase of 66 over the previous year. This figure of 442 in the grades, added to the 455 in high school and 252 at Holy Trinity Catholic school, makes a total of 1,149 young people who are attending school in Kewaskum this term, an increase of 136 over last year. This also is the first time in history that school attendance in the village soared over the 1,100 mark.

Annual Kiwanis Live Turkey Shoot Sunday

The Kewaskum Kiwanis club will sponsor its ninth annual Live Turkey Shoot on Sunday, Sept. 17, at the Bar-N Dude Ranch, 6 miles northeast of Kewaskum on County Trunk GGG, the beautiful Kettle Moraine Drive.

Patterned after the historic turkey shoots which were so popular in frontier days, this fascinatingly interesting annual event has become an outstanding attraction. Thousands of men, women and children from all over the state attend as participants and spectators.

The Turkey Shoot is handled as follows: Large live turkeys are protected behind an earthen bunker at the end of the rifle range with only their heads exposed to the marksman. For a fee of \$1.00 for three shots, (four shots for a dollar on advance sale tickets) the marksman attempts to hit the turkey's head from the firing line, using a .22 rifle. The turkey he hits is the turkey he gets for the family larder. Rifles and ammunition are furnished.

A live trout fishing contest is another popular attraction. It offers fine sport for the pro and amateur alike. The angler keeps all the fish he catches. Additional prizes are offered for those catching the largest fish.

Other events include trap and deer target shooting. Sportsmen desiring to enter these events bring their own shotguns, rifles and ammunition. An authentic cross-bow direct from Switzerland will be used in a target event. Here's an opportunity for Robin-hood admirers to test their skill. In addition, there are games for every member of the family to enjoy. Shelter, hot and cold food and beverages will be available.

The Wanbuli Indian Dancers will perform throughout the day. The Wanbuli are a group of 50 students of Indian Lore who have studied the customs, clothes and rituals of many North American Indian nations. Their dances and costumes are authentic to the last detail and are thrilling to both young and old.

The club will honor 1960 advance sale tickets this year because a heavy rain during the afternoon last year made it impossible for them to handle everyone who had purchased tickets.

The shoot is sponsored by the Kewaskum Kiwanis club with all profits going to their youth and community benefit funds.

Much Progress Made During 30 Years As Chief

After 30 years of dedicated service, Harry Schaefer has resigned as chief of Kewaskum's volunteer fire department. His resignation was turned in to Village President James D. Reigle on Sept. 7 and was accepted by the village board.

The board appointed Armin Opperman, assistant chief, to fill the post on a temporary basis. The acting chief will hold the position until the annual fire department election on the first Thursday in December. At that time a new chief will be selected for a five year period, starting Jan. 1, 1962.

Chief Schaefer's primary concern for the welfare of the citizens of this community and his interest in a hard hitting efficient fire department have brought him to the conclusion that he must step aside. His health no longer permits the active, aggressive role he has played in the past.

The village and the fire department are losing the support of one of their staunchest boosters. During Mr. Schaefer's reign as chief, the fire department has undergone monumental changes. From hand drawn equipment, with the river and the Rosenheimer Malt & Grain company well the only dependable sources of water in 1931, to our modern department equipped to fight all types of fires in any imaginable place in 1961—the progress is unbelievable. After promoting and supporting these changes, volunteer firemen serving under Mr. Schaefer have undergone extensive training and retraining so that they are fully qualified to work with the new facilities for our protection.

Our fire insurance rates and the comparatively low fire loss ratio attest to the success of these undertakings.

The popularity of the annual summer picnics has made it possible for the department to make large contributions to the village for new equipment over the years.

Realizing that greatly expanded and improved housing was necessary, the department purchased the property immediately east of the old municipal building in 1944. When it was decided to build the new municipal building, fire department and library at its present location, that property was sold and the proceeds, running into several thousands of dollars, were turned over to the village government.

In 1951, after Edward E. "Pat" Miller donated his hearse to the department, an ambulance service and rescue squad was organized. This program continues today and has been invaluable to our community.

During 1960 Harry Schaefer served as president of the Badger

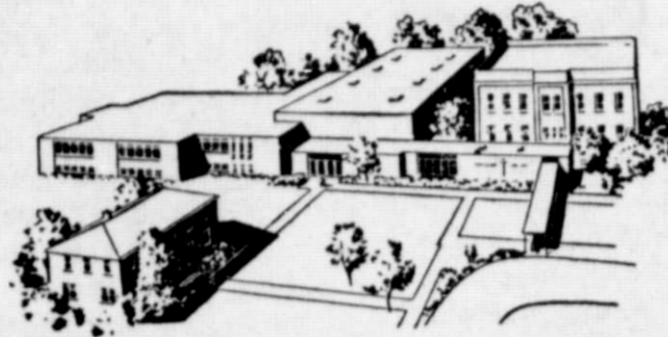

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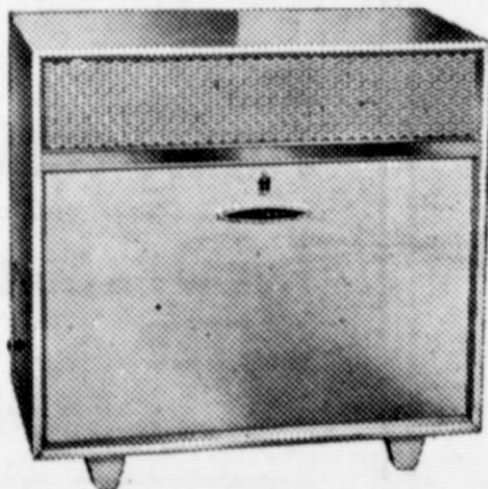

Immunization Clinics For School Children Of County to Be Held

KEWASKUM CLINIC TO BE HELD NEXT TUESDAY, SEPT. 19

Washington county school children, grade school through high school, will be offered protection against diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus (lockjaw) and smallpox. Public immunization clinics will be held throughout the county. West Bend school children will be offered this protection at the offices of the West Bend physicians. The cost will be 50 cents per injection both at the West Bend physicians' offices and at the county clinics. This health program is arranged by the public health nurses.

This program is for school children only. However, families requesting financial help may obtain a special permit for pre-school children from the public health nurse before the day of the clinic. This special permit is necessary for all pre-school children.

Children five years of age, who have never had any immunizations may receive protection from diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus. These injections will be given in a combined dose (triple shot). It is not recommended that children over six years of age receive the whooping cough protection. They will be eligible for diphtheria and tetanus. These booster shots should be repeated every 3 - 4 years. Smallpox vaccinations will be offered at the second and third clinics. This vaccination should be repeated every 5 - 7 years.

An immunization request card will be sent home with every child in the county schools. No child will receive immunization without a request card signed by the parent or guardian.

The first program in the city of West Bend will be conducted in the offices of the West Bend physicians during the week of Sept. 25 - Sept. 30. Parents are responsible for making an appointment with their family physician.

- Kewaskum—Municipal building, Sept. 19, 9:30-10:30 a. m.
- Slinger—Public school gym, Sept. 20, 9:30-10:30 a. m.
- Richfield—Fire hall Sept. 21, 9:30-10:30 a. m.
- Barton—Public school gym, Sept. 22, 9:30-10:30 a. m.
- Newburg—St. John's school, Sept. 25, 9:30-10:30 a. m.
- Germantown—Fire hall, Sept. 26, 9:30-10:30 a. m.
- Jackson—Public school, Sept. 27, 9:30-10:30 a. m.
- Hartford—Lincoln school, Sept. 28, 9:30-10:30 a. m.
- Hartford—Washington school, Sept. 28, 1:00-2:00 p. m.
