Live Wires Snap and Fall Into the Street, Endangering Citizens

CAUSE BRILLIANT FLASHES OF LIGHT, DISRUPT LIGHT AND POWER

Live electric wires which fell to the ground on Railroad st. between Main and First sts. around 11 p. m. last Thursday disrupted power and light in many sections of the village and endangered pedestrians and motorists in the immediate area.

The "hot" wires, dangling from poles and running along the ground, gave off brilliant flashes of light that could be seen in the sky for many miles around and made very loud, crackling noises sounding almost like thunder. The blinding flashes and accompanying explosive sound immediately blew out the lights in many homes and a number of street lights, throwing a scare into nearby residents, many of whom ran into the street to find out what had happened. Others who had retired jumped out of their beds.

The fire siren was sounded but after only one or two blasts the power went off and the siren was dead. However, many firemen were already rushing to the scene after seeing the flashes and noise. They stood by in case of fire in nearby buildings and with police blocked off the street from pedestrians and cars.

The electricity formed arcs from one wire to another and from one pole to the other throwing current along the ground and through the air like striking lightning. Fortunately the electricity burned itself out without causing any fires or serious damage. The ground wire on one pole burned off and the pole was scorched. The heat given off by the wires also burned into the ground and blacktop in places. This was directly in front of the Rempel Manufacturing Co. building. One of the wires fell on the building but it had burned itself out and luckily the frame structure didn't catch fire.

The cause of the lines snapping is not known. The weather was calm at the time although it had rained in the afternoon Thursday, accompanied by high gusts of wind. The wires may have snapped off from the weight, they might have crossed and shorted from the wind, or they may have come in contact with the branches of a large tree standing next to the high lines. The wires, ground and tree were still wet at the time. Witnesses said that when the wires snapped and came in contact with the tree the electricity flashed throughout the entire tree.

Police officer Marriner Frank, who was cruising on the street in his squad car, witnessed the entire occurrence. He reported that the series of flashes and accompanying cracking were terrific and blinded him. The officer remained in his halted auto until he was sure all of the wires had burned out near him.

Workers of the Wisconsin Electric Power Co. from West Bend clipped off remaining dangerous wires and repaired the broken lines. Light and power was restor-

St. Kilian Farmer Is Electrocuted While Filling Silo

Sylvan Wondra, 29, of St. Kilian, R. 3, Campbellsport, was electrocuted Friday afternoon when a motor apparently short-circuited as he was working on a silage loader on the family farm near St. Kilian.

Coroner Frank H. Decker of Fond du Lac county, who announced the cause of death following an investigation with a Campbellsport physician, said the accident occurred about 3:30 p. m. as Sylvan was working with his father Anton.

According to the coroner, Sylvan had climbed to the top of the silo to adjust a silage blower. The silage was piled up to about one foot from the top of the silo. Sylvan was standing on the wet silage. The blower's electric motor apparently had been wet from the severe storm earlier in the afternoon (the same one which developed in tornadoes in other surrounding areas).

When the victim had adjusted the blower, his father turned on the motor and the resulting short circuit sent an electric charge throughout the equipment. Sylvan had been holding on to the blower and he received the full brunt of the shock, Decker said. He let out a shout and his father ran to the tractor to turn off the engine, then pulled out the electric motor's plug. Sylvan fell forward dead from the charge.

A Campbellsport physician and a priest from St. Kilian were summoned. The priest climbed the silo to administer the last sacraments of the Catholic church. The physician pronounced Sylvan dead.

Mr. Wondra was born June 17, 1932, at St. Kilian to Anton and Regina Serwe Wondra. He attended St. Kilian Parochial school and was farming with his father. Surviving are his parents, two sisters, Mrs. Donald Schickert, Campbellsport, and Mrs. Ervin Matthews, Hartford. One brother, Ralph, died in 1950 and one brother in infancy.

Funeral services were held Monday at 10 a. m. at St. Kilian's church, the Rev. J. B. Reichel officiating. Burial was in the church cemetery.

Three Tornadoes Hit Kettle Moraine Areas, One at Campbellsport

Farms in the Campbellsport and Greenbush areas suffered damage in a torando which swept through the areas last Friday afternoon. The tornadoes apparently were part of a series of storms which swept through portions of the Kettle Moraine area north and south of Washington county.

At the southern reaches of the tornado damage was reported in the Whitewater area in Walworth county and adjacent counties shortly after noon. South of Whitewater the twister destroyed a barn, leveled a concrete silo on another farm and blew sheets of metal from the silo roof across a highway causing a motorist to swerve his car into a ditch, ripped the roof off of a barn, demolished a home, killed 100 pheasants or let them escape when their pens were destroyed, and leveled other buildings. A Whitewater college student was critically burned when struck by lightning.

Another tornado touched down on the Oswald Weiland farm about three miles northwest of Campbellsport about 2 p. m. The twister knocked down several sheds and a chicken coop, killing many chickens and also blew down many large trees. About two miles north of Campbellsport a large 106x36 barn on the Alvin Seefeld farm on Hwy. W, a concrete milk house and several brooder houses were demolished and a number of cattle were killed or injured and had to be shot. Aerials on the farm house were doubled over.

A large tree was toppled on the house of Edgar Sook about two miles away when the tornado touched down again. Seven trees were split on the Sook farm on Hwy. 45, one-half mile north of Waucousta. A mail box was uprooted and about 25 acres of standing corn were flattened in the storm's wake. Corn in the other areas hit by the storm was also flattened and power and telephone service was interrupted.

Farms near Glenbeulah and Greenbush in Sheboygan county, farther northeast were also reported damaged. The twister also touched down west of Sheboygan. Vincent Sippel, cashier at the Glenbeulah State bank, said the storm "sounded like a jet." Norman Dick of Greenbush said he saw the twister coming, dived for cover and looked up seconds later

to find a two-car garage a few yards away had been disintegrated. Twenty-two children in the Waucousta school sighted the funnel shaped cloud over the treetops. "We watched it until we could actually see it spinning, and when it was apparently coming close to the building, we went into the basement," said Roland Watkins, upper grade teacher. They were joined by 23 other youngsters in Miss Erma Rosenbaum's class. The children were excited but went to the basement shelter in orderly fashion. Watkins described the twister as coming out of the west and moving diagonally across the village.

Near Campbellsport Seefeld and his son Vernon were outside when the tornado struck. Vernon ran to the house to warn his mother, wife Collette and infant daughter. He said later: "The wind sounded like a diesel truck running wide open. It was hard to see anything." The five took shelter in the basement of the home until the tornado blew over a few moments later. Mrs. Seefeld said she saw huge chunks of earth and tree branches being whipped about

through a basement window. "It was terrible," she said.

Ronald Tonn, a General Telephone Co. repairman, reported that about a half mile of line was downed in the area and it took four hours before service was restored.

Forester took the visitor to Milwaukee for his return trip to Dakota and in that city the two enjoyed a dinner at Maeder's German restaurant.

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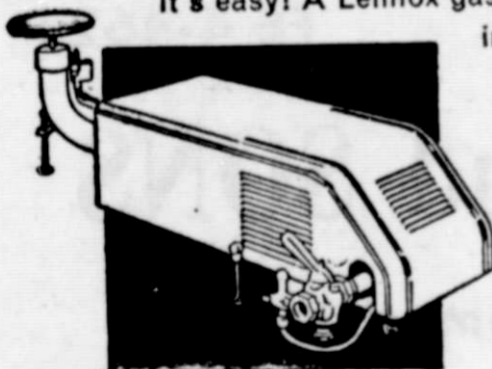

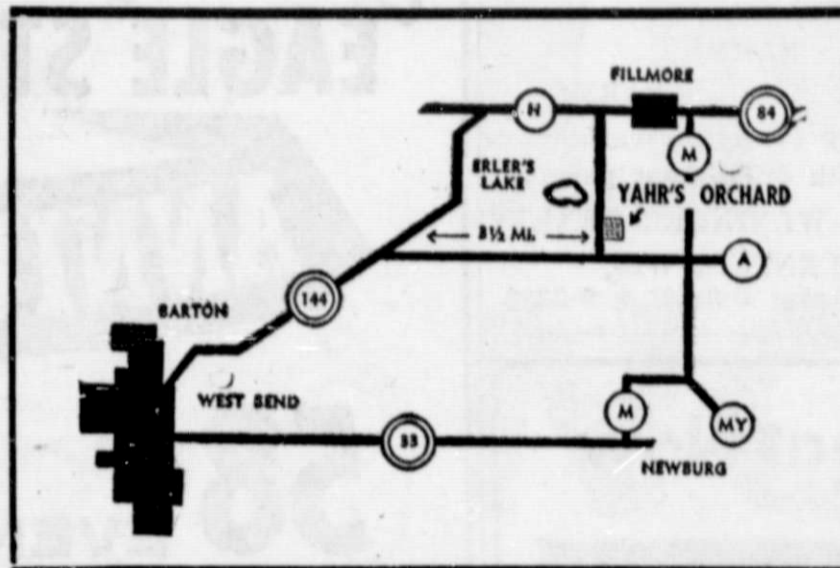

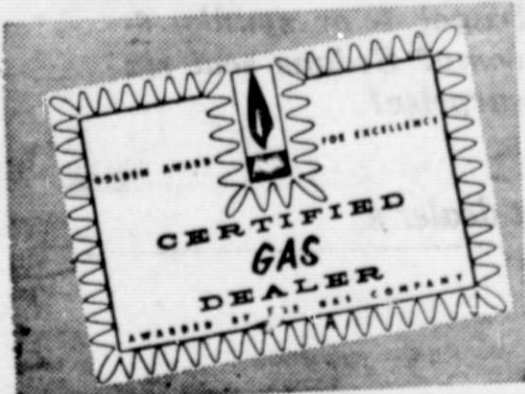

Kewaskum 4th in Port Invitational Tourney

KEWASKUM AND BROOKFIELD MONOPOLIZE FIRST FIVE INDIVIDUAL FINISHES

Sixty-three runners representing nine varsity cross country teams massed at the starting line of the Port Washington Invitational tournament last Friday afternoon. The race began in a sudden cloudburst which seemed to awaken rather than dampen the eagerness of the boys.

Assemblemer of Brookfield Central, defending champs, was out ahead immediately, setting a gruelling pace (4:56 at the mile) which he was able to hold for the full 2.1 mile course. His time of

10:34 is a new course and tournament record at Port. Dennis Vetter of Kewaskum, running a comfortable third for the greater part of the race, put on a strong surge in the last 1/4 mile to finish second. In a surprise move, Bill Koepke of Kewaskum, who was lying back in 10th place for the first mile, moved up to 5th place at the finish to assure a second individual finish trophy for Kewaskum. Brookfield men took the rest of the first five individual finish places.

In team standings, Brookfield also won going away with a total score of 29 (finishing 1, 3, 4, 10, & 11). Kewaskum, with one man short because of injury, placed fourth in team standings among the nine schools with a score of 125 (finishing 2, 5, 16, 44 & 58).

Second and third places went to Sheboygan South with 86 points and West Bend with 98 points respectively.

Indians Handed Second Loss by Pewaukee, 18-0

Pre-season title favorite Pewaukee ran over the Kewaskum Indians here Friday night, 18-0, to take another step towards the championship. The setback was the second for the winless Indians and dropped them into a cellar tie.

Playing ragged ball Kewaskum didn't stand a chance against the strong invaders, who scored all of their 18 points in the first half and had no trouble holding the lead. Halfback Doug Hackbarth punched

across the first of the three touchdowns on a five-yard run. Mike Kowalke and Meyer counted on pass plays.

Along with Pewaukee, Random Lake also won its second straight game Friday, beating Grafton, 18-6. The two are tied for the lead. In other contests North Fondy trounced Germantown, 27-0, and Slinger blanked Campbellsport, 18-0.

This Friday night the Indians host North Fondy, which has a 1-1 record and is the defending champion. The Orioles lost to Pewaukee the week before, 12-7. The remainder of the schedule finds Gratfon at Pewaukee, Campbellsport at Random Lake and Slinger at Germantown.

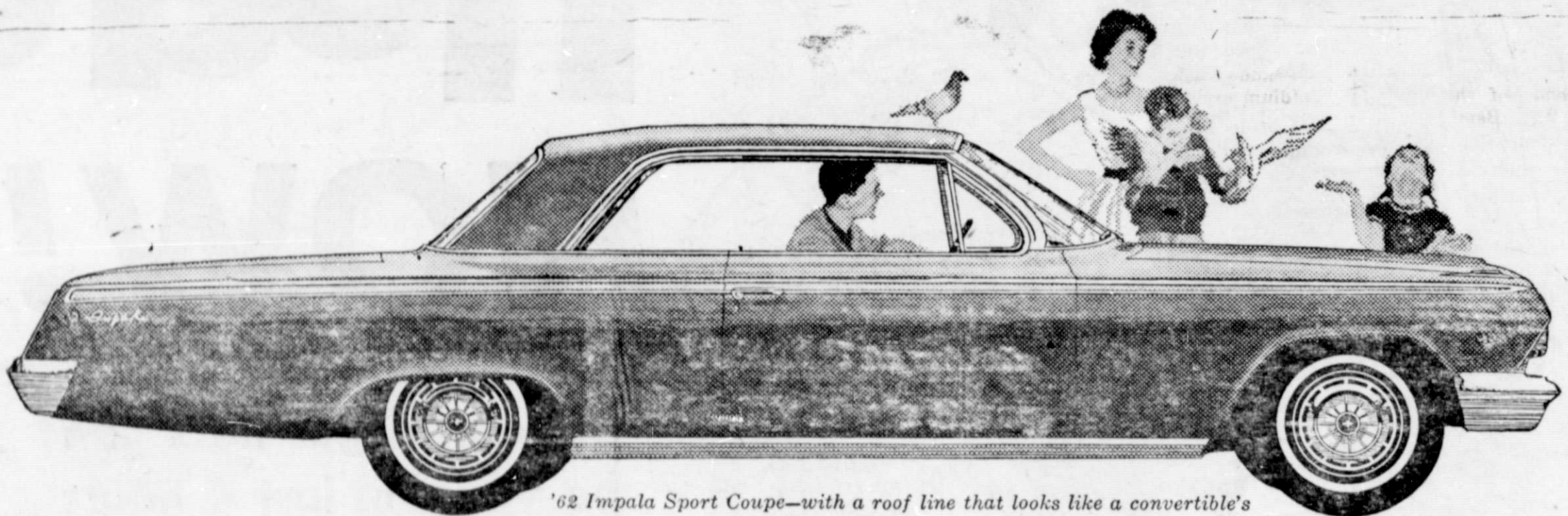
