Local Senior Honored For High Performance In National Merit Test

One senior at Kewaskum Community High school has been honored for his high performance on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT) given last spring. Each student who is endorsed by his school receives a formal letter of commendation signed by his principal and the president of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

Clifford M. Rose, the school's principal, has announced that the commended student is Leon A. Guntly.

John M. Stalnaker, president of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, stated:

"In recognition of their excellent performance on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, nearly 25,000 students throughout the United States are being awarded letters of commendation.

"While these bright youngsters did not reach the status of semifinalists in the 1961-62 Merit Program, they are so capable that we wish to single them out for special attention. The semifinalists and commended students together constitute less than 2 per cent of all high school seniors, and this certainly signifies noteworthy achievement."

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation gives recognition to two groups of students who achieve high scores on the NMSQT. The semifinalist group is composed of the highest-scoring students in each state and in U. S. territories. Some 10,000 semifinalists will take a second examination in December to establish further their eligibility to receive merit scholarships.

The commended students were among the high school juniors in more than 15,000 schools who took the NMSQT last March. The test is a three-hour examination that covers five separate areas of educational development. It was the first step in the seventh annual merit program.

This year's program will conclude about April 26, 1962, with the naming of students who will receive four-year merit scholarships to the colleges of their choice.

The commended students and the semifinalists who do not win merit scholarships are considered for certain other scholarships that are offered through the facilities of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

Mishaps Here Involve Two County Vehicles

Two vehicles owned by the Washington County Highway Department were involved in two separate traffic accidents on village streets this week. The county is blacktopping streets in the village at present.

In the first mishap which occurred at about 1:20 p. m. Monday a heavy county road roller operated by Thomas J. Walsh, 34, R. 1, Hartford, crashed into a 1961 Volkswagon owned by John T. Schoofs, 51, Kewaskum, which was parked at the curb at 1235 Fond du Lac ave. According to the police report the road roller was southbound on Fond du Lac ave. when the hydraulic steering failed. The driver was unable to control the machine and before Walsh could bring it to a halt it struck the left rear of the Schoofs wagon, which was damaged.

In the other accident at 10:50 a. m. on Thursday at the intersection of River View dr. and Main st. an auto driven by Mrs. Robert (Darlene) Gross, 33, 451 Main st., collided with a dump truck owned by the county highway department and driven by Roy R. Wornardt, 36, 642 Penn. ave., West Bend. Mrs. Gross was southbound on River View dr., stopped for the arterial at Main st., then pulled out and struck the right front fender and bumper of the truck, which was westbound on Main. Mrs. Gross reported that she did not see the truck. She suffered a laceration to her forehead and left leg and the car was quite extensively damaged.

6 Civil War Units to Skirmish Sunday at Sportsman's Grounds

On Sunday, Oct. 15, there will be a demonstration of shooting of Civil War firearms by young men in Civil War uniforms. Some of these guns and uniforms are 100 years old. This event will take place at the West Bend-Barton Sportsman's club grounds on Hwy. 45 about four miles south of Kewaskum.

Sgt. Ernst A. Frankenberg advises that the individual shooting will take place starting at 9:00 in the morning and the eight-man teams will start at about 1:00 in the afternoon. There will also be cannon shooting.

No admission will be charged. School children as well as adults could learn more about history in an hour than from reading many history books. There will be refreshments sold on the grounds.

A big treat is in store for the people of this area in this "Badger Skirmish." Six Civil War units have signified their intention of participating in the team events, thus assuring at least 58 competitors for the program. A total of at least 100 men will participate in the "skirmish."

Included in the entries is Co. I, 2nd Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry Regiment, with Sgt. Frankenberg of West Bend commanding. Co. I is a group of young men interested in history and firearms. They have gone to much trouble and expense to equip themselves with authentic Civil War uniforms and original muskets and flint locks, carbines and cannons. They train and parade and practice shooting.

It is through their association with like groups that this shoot has come about. Invitations have gone out to Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Minnesota and teams will be coming from neighboring states to compete in volley firing, target shooting and parade. It is expected that the men will bring their families and bivouac right on the club grounds.

One of the highlights is expected to be the volley fire at a silhouette target when all participants fire at one time when the command is given. Each contingent will fire at their respective targets and the resulting mass firing is expected to give spectators a good idea of how Civil War soldiers fired at the enemy in battle. There will be many other events including firing at clay pigeons, balloons, water filled canisters, "stake cutting" by firing at stakes driven into the ground until the stakes are "cut off."

The winning team will engage in a contest against two men from the West Bend-Barton Sportsman's club who will be armed with modern M-1 army rifles.

The contest between the musket-armed men and the modern weapons usually proves to be another highlight of the skirmishes.

This event is the first such skirmish to be held in Wisconsin. It should be of vital interest to Civil War scholars, gun collectors and camera fans.

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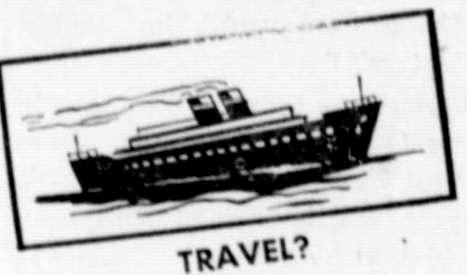

The Kewaskum Indians finally
managed to eke out a win after
three straight setbacks in the Sce-
nic Moraine conference, defeating
Washington Union at German-
town Friday afternoon. In a thriller,
the Indians scored a touch-
down and extra point in the closing
minute of play to salvage a 7-0
victory over the Warhawks. The
win moved them out of the base-
ment and into a tie for sixth place
with Germantown.

Kewaskum waited until only 40
seconds were left in the contest to
complete a 25-yard touchdown
drive for the game's only score.
The Indians recovered a fumble of
a punt on the Warhawk 25 yard
line to start the drive. Senior Full-
back Tom Spartz lugged the ball
11 yards for the TD and Lineman
Harry Schladweiler kicked the ex-
tra point.

The Indians controlled the ball
most of the game and got inside
the Germantown 10-yard line four
times in the first half but each
time they neared pay dirt their
drive bogged down. Spartz, who
scored the touchdown, was a stand-
out on offense, while Schladweiler
turned in the best defensive game
on the squad according to Coach
Ernie Mitchell.

In other games Friday, the con-
ference leaders both won. Pewau-
kee drubbed Campbellsport, 55-0,
while Random Lake topped Slinger
13-0, to maintain a first place
tie. The loop lead and possibly the

Mr. Corn Farmer, are you looking forward to a good corn harvesting season this year? Your Kewaskum chapter of Future Farmers of America asks that you take just a moment of your time to heed the message of safety they are offering to assure you the "good harvest season."

The Kewaskum FFA chapter members are participating in a nation-wide program to prevent accidents to farm people resulting from careless operation of corn pickers. During the Safe Corn Harvest program the chapter members will try to visit every farm family in the community. They will review with the farm family the safe precautions necessary in the operation of corn picking as well as check over the

corn picker unit.

Gene Krause, chairman of the Safe Corn Harvest program, offers a few suggestions which he considers extremely important for safe corn harvesting. Repair and adjust your equipment before beginning to pick corn. Check to be sure all shields are securely in place. Take it easy on the first few rounds to get the feel of picking corn again. Stop the picker when unlogging the snapping or husking rolls. Do not hurry when dismounting from the unit. Keep the engine area clean of trash to avoid fire.

Fingers, arms or possibly a life are only as important to you as the effort you put forth to follow the common sense rules of safety.

Harriers Beat Berlin, Meno. Falls, Place 3rd In Brookfield Meet

DENNIS VETTER SETS NEW COURSE RECORD IN DUAL MEET WITH FALLS

Kewaskum High school runners finished 3, 8, 12, 29 and 34 for a total of 86 points to place third in the Brookfield Invitational cross country meet on Friday, Sept. 29. They were competing against all larger schools. Brookfield Central again won handily with 23 points, placing 1, 2, 4, 5 and 11.

Although Kewaskum's Dennis Vetter failed to catch Treder, he led the team for a solid 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 place finish.

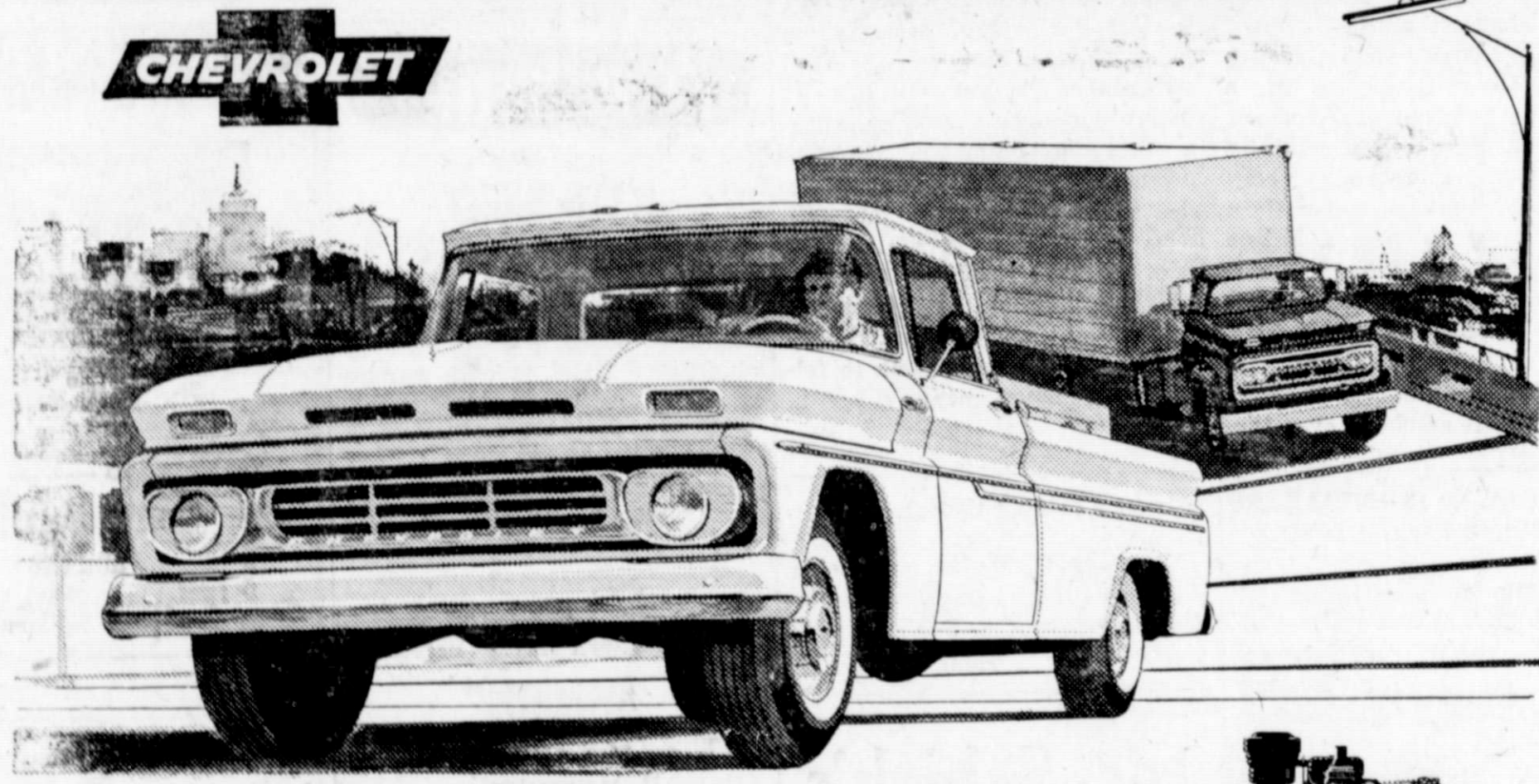
