Kewaskum Runners Overpower Cudahy & Greendale, West Bend & Germantown In Triangular Meets; Go to Sectional

INDIAN HARRIERS EASILY BEAT WEST BEND'S LITTLE TEN CHAMPS; VETTER SETS RECORD AT CUDAHY

Kewaskum Community High school's crack cross country team won two more big victories in triangular meets the past week, defeating West Bend and Germantown in a home test at the Hon-E-Kor Country club and overpowering two much larger schools, Cudahy and Greendale, in a meet at Cudahy.

The Kewaskum harriers previously defeated Menomonee Falls, Port Washington and Berlin in dual meets, losing only to West Bend, placed fourth out of nine schools in the Port Washington Invitational meet, and placed third out of six schools in the Brookfield Invitational, won by Brookfield Central, which already has won three invitational meets and the Braveland conference run. What makes Kewaskum's record all the more outstanding is the fact that the team is participating in cross country running for the first time this year. This is a great tribute to Coach John Lutz and his boys.

Win Home Triangular

The final home meet for the Indian harriers resulted in a decisive victory for Kewaskum over West Bend and Germantown last Friday afternoon. In winning over West Bend, Kewaskum beat the Little Ten conference champions, the Badgers copping the conference title at Hartford Tuesday afternoon by a decisive margin.

In the Little Ten conference meet at the Hartford Country club, West Bend's Del Schneider also repeated as conference champion. He was top runner in the meet with a time of 11:25.5. In Kewaskum's meet with West Bend three of the Indians' runners came out ahead of Schneider, although the time was slower. Dennis Vetter finished first, Bill Koepke second, Russell Wampler third, and Schneider fourth.

Strong northerly winds prevented any new record setting in the triangular meet here last Friday. In fact it seemed to break the spirit of the visiting runners, because

YOUNG MAN IS ALSO NAMED DELEGATE TO NATIONAL 4-H CONFERENCE

Aldwin Seefeldt, son of Alfred H. Seefeldt of Kewaskum, received the Wisconsin 4-H Key Award at the annual Achievement program held in West Bend last Friday. A member of the Kewaskum 4-Hers club he has been the president of the Wisconsin 4-H Junior Leaders Council.

The Key Award is given to outstanding 4-H members in Wisconsin for accomplishments over many years of 4-H club work. This includes excellence in projects, taking part in club and community activities, and leadership and participation in county 4-H organizations.

The county achievement awards were also presented at the program and members who did outstanding work in junior leadership also were honored. Seven received graduation certificates for completing their last year of 4-H club work.

Paul Cypher, president of the Washington County Leaders association, was master of ceremonies for the achievement program. An audience of over 500 people attended. Robert Schmidt, who has been an IFYE delegate to Australia, showed slides and talked about his stay in Australia. Mrs. Carl Fredrickson, county 4-H song leader, led the audience in singing.

Seefeldt also is one of four Wisconsin 4-H youths who have been named delegates to the national 4-H conference in Washington Apr. 21 through 27. Two others were picked to represent Wisconsin at a leadership conference at Camp Miniwanca in Michigan next August. The six were selected from 25 youths named as honor members this year.

Seefeldt, 20, has served as vice-president and president of the state 4-H Junior Leaders' Council, was president of his local club twice and has served four years as a 4-H junior leader. His main project has been the management of 60 colonies of bees.

Second Immunization Clinics for Children Will Begin Next Week

CLINIC FOR SCHOOL PUPILS OF KEWASKUM SCHEDULED FOR TUESDAY, OCT. 24

The second series of immunization clinics for Washington county school children will begin next week.

Children may receive protection for diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus (lockjaw), and smallpox. Smallpox vaccinations will be offered at this time. Every child should have at least one vaccination which left a scar. Medical authorities advise that the vaccination be repeated every 5 - 7 years. The cost of the immunization will be 50 cents per injection.
