Cross Country Team Goes to State; Vetter, Koepke in First Five

KEWASKUM PLACES SECOND IN SECTIONAL MEET AT BERLIN SATURDAY

Ten schools entered the cross country sectional meet (smaller schools—under 700 enrollment) at Berlin last Saturday looking for a chance to go to the state meet at Hartford this Saturday. Kewaskum placed second out of the 10 schools.

Finishing ahead of Kewaskum in team standings was Ripon (finishing 8, 9, 10, 16, 20 for a total of 63). Kewaskum scored 1, 4, 6, 17, 46 for a total of 74.

Dennis Vetter of Kewaskum battled his old foe, Ralph Treder from Berlin, through the whole race. He managed to close a 15-foot gap at the very end and finished a stride and three-tenths of a second ahead of Treder to place first over all the runners in the meet.

Bill Koepke also qualified for individual honors in the first five finishers, placing fourth. These first five are entitled to go to the state meet even if their team does not qualify. Russell Wampler was nosed out of a fifth place finish in the final stretch and finished sixth. Other Kewaskum runners receiving red ribbons are: Allen Koepke, Allen Rinzel, Ralph Albrecht and Roger Yeadeke.

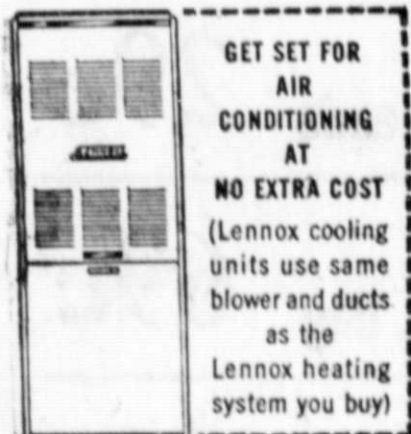

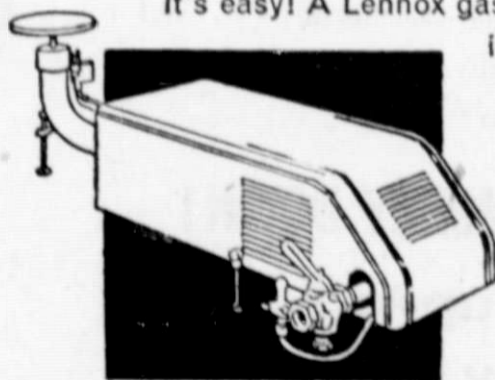

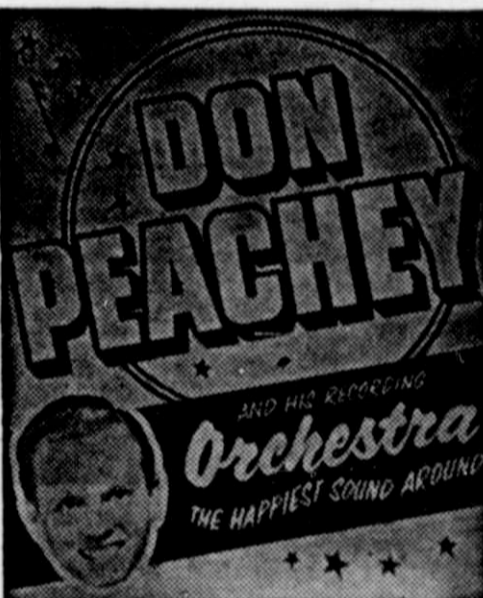

The victory gave the Indians a 3-3 record and moved them into fourth place in the Scenic Moraine conference standings. It was the sixth successive setback for the Bells.

Campbellsport came to play football and in the first half the determined Bells didn't look like a winless, tail end team. On the other hand Kewaskum started out playing spiritless, easy going football as assignments were missed, blocking and tackling was weak and far from bruising, and wobbly passes were off their mark.

As a result the Bells put up a strong early bid for their first win of the season. Touchdowns were scored by Gary Grahl on a 65-yard run and by Ron Brath on a 40-yard pass from Stoffel. Paul Hensen kicked an extra point and

the half ended, 13-0.

The Indians fought back in the third quarter as Jerry Zeidel intercepted a pass to set up the first touchdown, scored later by Tom Spartz on a 15-yard run. With the score at 13-7 in Campbellsport's favor and Kewaskum back in the ball game, the Indians generated a sustained drive in the fourth period, capped by a one-yard touchhdown sneak by Jack Theusch. Homecoming king Harry Schladweiler kicked both of the extra points to provide the Indians' with their narrow margin of victory.

In other games Friday Random Lake clinched a tie for the title by defeating previously unbeaten Pewaukee, 15-0, in the big game of the week; North Fondy sneaked past Slinger, 14-13, and Grafton routed Germantown, 43-7. Random Lake can wrap up the championship with a win in the final contest at North Fondy Friday.

Kewaskum closes its season Friday at Slinger and a win could give them third place, should North Fondy lose. The Indians have won the last three games after losing the first three. They are above Slinger in the standings but the Owls have shown much improvement and have been coming strong in the last couple of outings. Slinger lost by just one point to North Fondy last week, which team laced Kewaskum, 25-6. Other games are Random Lake at North Fondy, Germantown at Pewaukee, and Campbellsport at

Grafton.
