The Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum has annually sponsored the "Beauty on the Bridges" contest in order to enhance the natural wonders by which our village has been blessed, namely our north creek, south creek and the Milwaukee river, over which pass cement bridges of architectural stateliness and grandeur. Flower boxes were placed on these bridges in 1960 for the first time and the visitors were greatly impressed to see such evidence of real civic pride so displayed by some of our good people.

To continue this project is the plan and desire of Kiwanis and to this end the club has arranged to place four more boxes on the Milwaukee river bridge by next spring. Our good teacher of manual training, Roy Esser, has told Dr. R. G. Edwards, chairman of the Kiwanis committee on public and business affairs, he will have all the iron brackets reformed so that each flower box will be well above the bridge railing next year. This will make the flowers readily visible to all.

In addition chairman Edwards is happy to inform you that we have a really good civic minded individual who will attend to the watering of every box of flowers all season long. This man came to the rescue in July of this year and helped to keep the flowers alive and beautiful during the hot dry weather. He is JACK TESSAR, SR. Moreover when July arrived and the boxes on our north creek bridge were still empty, our good florists, TOM AND MILLIE HERMAN planted them all with a stipulated promise exacted from Dr. Edwards, that they wanted no prize money, but that they did wish to see our entry bridges all look pretty and inviting to everyone passing by.

Kewaskum's State Champions



Shown above is Kewaskum Community High school's fine cross country team which attained an outstanding achievement by winning the state small school championship its first year of competition in the sport. The state meet, which was held at Hartford on Saturday, Oct. 28, brought a surprisingly successful season to a close.

Coach John Lutz' seven man team of runners, which gained much renown for Kewaskum, placed first among nine schools in contention for the state championship. All of these had previously been sectional meet winners. Kewaskum easily beat second place and favored Ripon for the title, 58 points to 66. Janesville won the large school state title, while Whitefish Bay took the medium school championship.

Dennis Vetter, the ace of the Kewaskum team, took first place in the team score in the state meet. Other Indian runners to place were Bill Koepke, 5th; Russ Wampler, 8th; Allen Koepke,

13th, and Allen Rinzel, 31st. Kewaskum's winning score of 58 was the best in all three divisions of the state meet. The team received a trophy and individual medals for winning the title.
