## Telephone Co. Buys Land To Erect New Building Here

### Construction to Begin Dec. 1 on Mertes Property

#### NEW STRUCTURE TO HOUSE DIAL EQUIPMENT

In a real estate transaction completed recently by Bill Ruth Real Estate, the General Telephone Company of Wisconsin purchased a parcel of land from Mrs. Minnie Mertes and daughter Mona, on which they will erect a new building. Work on the structure will begin about Dec. 1, according to George Wirtz of the Plymouth office.

The land purchased is lot 10 of block 30 of the assessor's plat. It is located near the center of the block between Main and First sts. and between the Mrs. Meta Koch and Norman Held properties. A barn on the lot is now being razed to make room for the new structure.

The land purchased is a full 74 by 160 foot lot, a portion of which was purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Held. The telephone company bought the south 55 feet and east 120 feet, while the Helds purchased the west 40 feet and north 19 feet from Mrs. Mertes and Mona.

The telephone company will erect a masonry building on the site which will be utilized to house dial equipment. The company will change over to dial telephones in Kewaskum in 1962, Wirtz stated. Construction will begin within the next two weeks or so.

In another transaction closed by Bill Ruth Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Gahlman of West Bend purchased the Mrs. William F. (Billy) Schaefer home and property on the corner of River View dr. and Habbeck st. The Gahlmans planned to move into the home from West Bend this week.

## John H. Martin, Retired Rural Mail Carrier, Fireman 50 Years Dies

A well known resident of Kewaskum, John H. Martin, who was a retired rural mail carrier and active member of the Kewaskum Fire Department over 50 years, passed away on Sunday, Nov. 12, at the Park Avenue Rest Home in Fond du Lac at the age of 86 years. He had been ill for the past two and one-half years with complications attributed to his advanced age.

Mr. Martin had served as a church trustee of St. Lucas Lutheran church for a number of years, was a past president of the Lutheran Aid, and was a member of the Rural Letter Carriers' association. He served as secretary of the Kewaskum Fire Department for many years and was presented with a watch in recognition of his 50 years of service with the fire department. At the time of his death he was an honorary member of the department.

Mr. Martin was born on Sept. 3, 1875 at Wayne Center in the town of Wayne, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Martin. He lived there until the time of his marriage to Elizabeth Klumb at St. Peter's church in the Town of Wayne on Oct. 29, 1898. The couple came to this village after their marriage and have lived here since. He served as a rural mail carrier out of Kewaskum for many years before his retirement, beginning his route in the horse and buggy days.

He is survived by his wife, two daughters, Mrs. Celesta Koerble, Kewaskum, and Elizabeth J. (Mrs. Carl Johnson) of R. 3, West Bend; one son, Marvin A. Martin, of Kewaskum; nine grandchildren, 10 great-grandchildren, and two brothers, George Martin of Bradenton, Fla., and William of Fond du Lac.

The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home after 2 p. m. Tuesday and at St. Lucas Lutheran church from 12 o'clock noon until 2 p. m. on Wednesday, the time of services. The Rev. Donald Bitter officiated and burial was in Lutheran Memorial Park.

## Mrs. H. Rosenheimer on UW Field Staff for Co. Research Unit Survey

Some 30 households in Washington county will be visited during the next few weeks by an interviewer employed by the Wisconsin Survey Research Laboratory—a research unit of the University of Wisconsin in Madison. Nov. 20 is the starting date for the first in a series of state-wide surveys designed to get an accurate picture of how Wisconsin people feel about a number of current topics.

Since it would be impossible to talk with each of the million families in the state, a cross-section sample has been scientifically selected. Such a sample includes people of all ages in all types of work and living in cities, towns and on farms. Use of a cross-section sample of this type furnishes an accurate reflection of opinions and attitudes of the adult population of the entire state.

The results of all the interviews are combined and published in reports which represent the state as a whole. The report is entirely statistical and no person is ever identified.

All interviewers are in the employ of the University of Wisconsin and carry university identification cards. These men and women are trained to record opinions of the people they interview accurately and objectively.

Mrs. Henry Rosenheimer, a member of the Wisconsin Survey Research Laboratory's field staff, and a Kewaskum resident, will be the laboratory's representative in Washington county.

## Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

### DEER SEASON OPENS SATURDAY

Mild weather the past ten days provided excellent walleyed pike and perch fishing at Pike lake.

The deer season opens statewide except for Milwaukee county on Saturday, Nov. 18, at 6:23 a. m. In Washington and Ozaukee counties, you may use shotguns with slugs. (rifles are not allowed), for buck deer only. A legal buck is a deer, with antlers not less than 3 inches in length.

Waukesha county has a two day any deer season. Deer killed in Waukesha county must be registered there, do not bring them into Washington county for registration. Deer may be registered at any reasonable hour at the offices of the Ozaukee or Washington county sheriffs. The Hartford Police Department will be open for deer registration daily 9.00 a. m. to 5.00 p. m.

All hunters, rabbit, squirrel or deer, must wear red clothing, Nov. 18th to 26th, inclusive.

In the event you wish to contact a warden, call West Bend Federal 4-3588, Port Washington, Atlas 4-5575 or Hartford 58. The message will be relayed by radio to men in the field.

BE SURE THAT IT IS A BUCK DEER THAT YOU ARE SHOOTING AT AND NOT YOUR HUNTING PARTNER.

Again this year few changes regulations.

(1) There will be only one general state-wide season, the dates

being Nov. 18-26.

(2) There will be no party permit this year.

(3) It is again unlawful to transport any deer in or on any motor-driven vehicle from the time it is killed to the time it is lawfully registered unless the deer is carried openly exposed and in such a manner that the deer tag attached cannot be handled or manipulated by any occupant of the vehicle.
