





DEER SEASON OPENS SATURDAY

Mild weather the past ten days provided excellent walleyed pike and perch fishing at Pike lake.

The deer season opens statewide except for Milwaukee county on Saturday, Nov. 18, at 6.23 a. m. In Washington and Ozaukee counties, you may use shotguns with slugs, (rifles are not allowed), for buck deer only. A legal buck is a deer, with antlers not less than 3 inches in length.

Waukesha county has a two day any deer season. Deer killed in Waukesha county must be registered there, do not bring them into Washington county for registration. Deer may be registtered at any reasonable hour at the offices i of the Ozaukee or Washington county sheriffs. The Hartford Police Department will be open for deer registration daily 9.00 a. m. te 5.00 p. m.

All hunters, rabbit, squirrel or deer, must wear red clothing, Nov. 18th to 26th, inclusive.

In the event you wish to contact a warden, call West Bend Federal 4-3588, Port Washington, Atlas 4-5575 or Hartford 58. The message will be relayed by radio to men in the field.
