Kiwanis Club Honors Conservation Farmers



The Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum observed its fourth annual "farm-city week" by again awarding plaques and honoring two outstanding conservation farmers. Recipients of the awards this year were Mr. and Mrs. Ray Schaefer, R. 2, Kewaskum, and Mr. and Mrs. LeRoy Becker, also of R. 2, Kewaskum.

A score of farmers were present as guests of Kiwanis members, as were award recipients of past years: Roman Forester, Louis Opgenorth and Allen Reindl.

Speakers for the occasion were Roy Esser, vocational agriculture instructor at Kewaskum High school; Louis Opgenorth, R. 2, Kewaskum award winner of 1958;

Harold Ryan, Washington county soil conservationist and Maurice Hovland, Washington county agent.

Ray Schaefer carried out conservation practices on 97 acres of land; 24 acres of contour strip cropping, 9 acres of pasture improvement, 16 acres of woodland protection, and 45 acres of wild life area.

LeRoy Becker carried out conservation practices on 69½ acres of land; 55 acres of contour strip cropping, 3½ acres of pasture improvement, 2½ acres of wild life area, and 2400 feet of planned grass waterways.

The Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum, by honoring these outstanding conservationists, hopes that these practices will continue and will also be carried out by many other farmers for their own welfare and that of the nation.

\$29.00 Tax Rate Proposed; Up \$4.00

Where Does Your Village Tax Dollar Go?

The 1962 proposed budget of the Village of Kewaskum, as published last week, presents a situation which should be of interest to all tax payers.

Out of every dollar that will be paid in real or personal property taxes, only 13 cents is retained by the Village of Kewaskum. The balance or 87 cents goes to the state, county and schools.

It was interesting to learn that the village's share of the annual appropriation has fluctuated from an all time high of \$40,287.45 in 1956, to a low of \$15,850.45 in 1958, to a happy medium of \$29,759.26 in 1961, despite the fact that many improvements have been made in the village to streets, sidewalks, curbing and street lighting.

The state annual apportionment has constantly increased from \$1,293.40 in 1954 to an estimated \$2,000.00 in 1961.

The same holds true for the county which has increased from \$24,027.53 in 1954 to an estimated \$43,500.00 in 1961.

The largest percentage of increase is reflected in the School District appropriation which has increased yearly from \$54,060.30 in 1954, the year consolidation became effective, to \$148,911.32 in 1961, an increase of 275%.

For the year 1961, the state appropriation shows an estimated increase of approximately \$250.00 over 1960 or about 14%. The county shows an estimated increase of approximately \$5,400.00 or about 14%. The school appropriation shows an increase of approximately \$36,000.00 over 1960 or an increase of 32%.

The village's share of the 1961

appropriation has been DECREASED approximately \$10,000.00 or about 25% under the 1960 appropriation.

Of the total of \$318,310.07 requested in the proposed budget, \$224,170.58 must be raised by general taxation. This means that the proposed tax rate will be \$29.00 per \$1,000.00 of assessed valuation for the year 1961 or an increase of \$4.00 per thousand over 1960. Comparing the 1961 individual tax rates with the 1960 rates we found the following: The state rate increased from 22 cents to 26 cents or 4 cents per \$1,000.00 of assessed valuation. The county rate increased from \$5.17 to \$5.63 or 46 cents per \$1,000.00 of assessed valuation. The school rate increased from \$14.64 to \$19.26 or \$4.62 per \$1,000.00 of assessed valuation. The village rate is the only one which showed a DECREASE, from \$4.97 in 1960 to \$3.85 in 1961 or a decrease of 88 cents per \$1,000.00 of assessed valuation.

The difference between the \$224,170.24 raised by general taxation and the total of \$318,310.07 requested in budget is derived from other outside revenues such as income tax return, corporation and utility taxes, occupational taxes, liquor tax returned by the state, licenses and permits, justice fines, state aid for streets, highway privilege tax, water department taxes, special assessments, etc.

The present assessed valuation of the village is \$7,730,030.00 which is approximately 89% of the state equalized full value of \$8,722,020.00.

County Deer Kill Totals About 30

With the close of the deer hunting season Sunday, a total of 36 bucks were reported registered at the two county checking points, the Washington county sheriff's department and the Hartford police station and one other deer was reported registered by conservation department men in the field, making a total of 36 animals registered. Reports Monday indicated that of this number a total of 30 of the 36 deer registered were killed in Washington county.

Chevs Shade Meno. Falls in Opener, 59-57

KEWASKUM HOSTS HORICON
THIS SATURDAY NIGHT

In a hair-raising Land o' Lakes league basketball opener here Saturday night, Kewaskum stood off a last quarter rally to nose out Menomonee Falls by two points, 59-57. Falls won the first half title in the league last season.

Strengthened by several new players on the squad this year, the Chevs took a comfortable 10-point lead in the initial quarter, 18-8, and doggedly hung onto it as Falls narrowed the gap as the game progressed. At the intermission Kewaskum was on top by 9 points, 31-22, and the visitors narrowed the margin to 7 points, 47-40, at the end of the third period. The Chevs still possessed their 7-point margin with only 3½ minutes remaining and victory seemed assured. But Falls put on a press, stole the ball a couple of times, snared rebounds off the Kewaskum board on shots that shouldn't have been taken, sank a few quick baskets, and came within 2 points of tying the score in the torrid closing seconds. The scoreboard showed a tie but a time out was called and after some confusion and discussion the official scorer's book showed two more points for Kewaskum, giving them the lead and win.

Leading scorer in the tilt was Paul Timm of Falls with 17 points, followed by Robbel with 16. Top scorers for the Chevs were Tom

Larson with 16 points, Al "Tiger" Tennes, new man who formerly played with West Bend, 15 and Don Meisenheimer with 12. Kewaskum lost one player, Otto Ramthun, on personals and had two others with four fouls. The fact that it was the opening game showed as both teams played some ragged ball at times. When the Chevs become more accustomed to playing together, they should have a strong squad.

Kewaskum plays another home game this Saturday night, when they entertain Horicon at 8 p. m. Horicon beat Mayville in their opener, 75-67, last week. In the other games Beaver Dam, defending champ, easily defeated Cedarburg 97-69, and Hustisford nosed West Bend, 62-61.

Girls, Boys Eligible For Annual Cooky Decorating Contest

CONTEST OFF TO GOOD START WITH DEMONSTRATION AT ELECTRIC CO.

Like getting out to enjoy the first snowfall, boys and girls enthusiastically turned out in goodly numbers to get in on the beginning activity of the Electric Company's eighth annual cooky decorating contest.

Girls, boys, mothers and leaders of the youth groups were treated to a cooky decorating demonstration by Miss Viola De Jang and Mrs. Dorothy Gresbach, members of the Electric Company Home Service Department. To have original designs, they were encouraged to trace a pattern from a coloring book or picture book, or draw their own. Designs should be kept simple and the cooky must be limited in size to 6 inches by 6 inches.

A cardboard pattern laid on the rolled dough may be cut out by use of the point of a paring knife, round toothpick, or darning needle.

Some cooky decoration may be done before baking. Miss De Jang showed how to trace a design on the dough by making impressions with the end of a wooden skewer or the tip of a watercolor brush handle. These marks may then be used as a guide for applying colored silver balls, or for applying food coloring with a watercolor brush. Food coloring may be applied before or after baking a light-colored dough.

Any edible decoration that does not melt or become too brown may be applied to the raw dough. Nutmeats, candied fruit, raisins, gumdrops, chocolate bits and colored sugar may be used for this purpose.

The dough should be thick enough so that the cooky may be handled without danger of breaking. All cookies should be a single layer rather than three dimensional, but small areas of an additional thin piece of dough may be used to bring out a detail of design. The dough used may be either light or dark in color, or a combination.

In giving hints for decorating after baking cookies, Mrs. Gres-

bach suggested using a frosting that will harden, as a soft frosting may smear. When using more than one color, allow the first color to dry before applying the next.

In tinting frosting, shake the coloring bottle well, and add only a drop or two at a time, mixing well until getting the desired color. Soft colors are more desirable than bright tones. Frosting may be applied with a small spatula, water color brush, or a toothpick in small areas. Mrs. Gresbach advised that not all of the surface of a cooky need to be frosted. The natural color of the cooky may be part of the design. Additional printed instructions for these and other decorating tips may be obtained at the Electric Company.

Contest Rules

1. The contest is open to any Scout member who is in grade 5, 6, 7 or 8 of a troop in West Bend, Barton, Kewaskum, Campbellsport or the Menomonee Falls area, also Pioneers of St. John's Lutheran church and 4-H members of Washington county are eligible as determined by the county club agent.

2. Entries from each grade will be judged separately.

3. In each grade, electric corn-poppers will be given for prizes as follows: a prize for up to 25 entries; an additional prize if there are over 25 entries; an additional prize if there are over 50 entries, etc. In addition, cookies will be selected for honorable mention, for which the prizes will be cooky sheets donated by the West Bend Company. Each contestant who enters will receive a souvenir.

4. Each contestant may enter 3 cookies, to be judged as one entry, each contestant is eligible for only

one prize. Cookies are to be no larger than 6 inches long or wide. Please wrap each cooky separately and seal securely with Scotch tape or staples. Use a transparent wrapping such as Saran, freezer weight cellophane or clear plastic. Important! Leave a 2 inch wrapping heading at the top. Only rolled cookies are acceptable. Three dimensional cookies are not eligible.

5. Cookies are to be brought to the Wisconsin Electric Power company office at 337 North Main St., West Bend, on Monday, Dec. 4, 1961, between 3:30 and 5:15 p. m. accompanied with the entry blank.

6. After judging, the cookies will be displayed at the Electric Company sales room until a few days before Christmas. Then they will be delivered to local institutions.

All who have entered cookies in the contest will be invited to a party at the Electric Company at 7:15 p. m. Wednesday, Dec. 6. Winners will be announced and prizes awarded at that time. There will also be entertainment and treats.

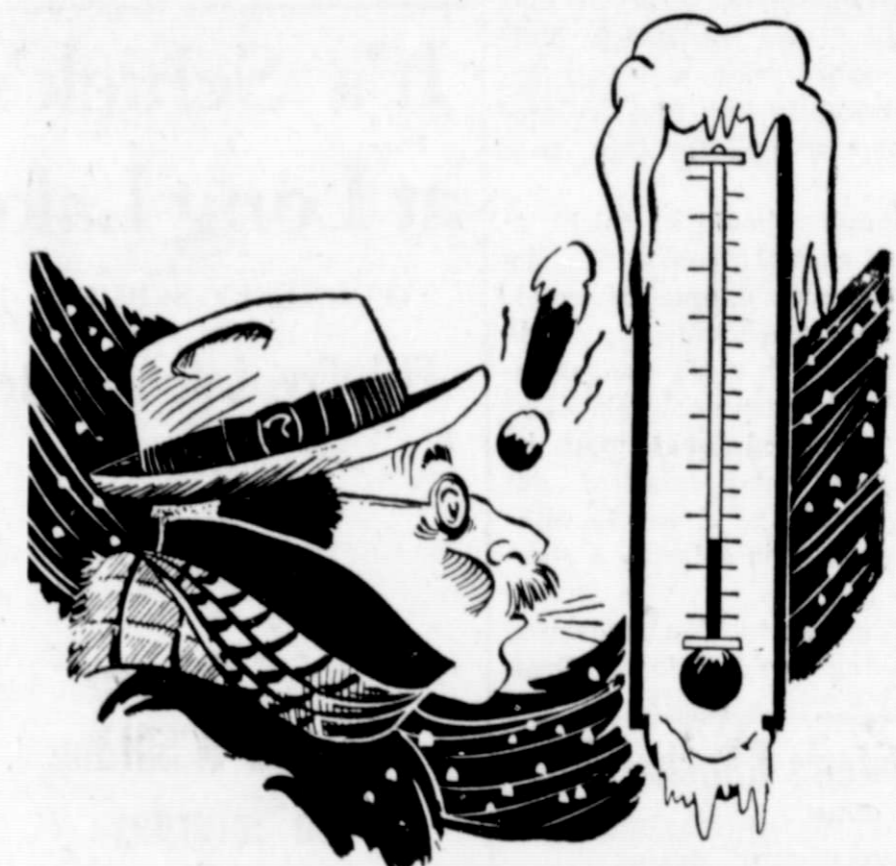
