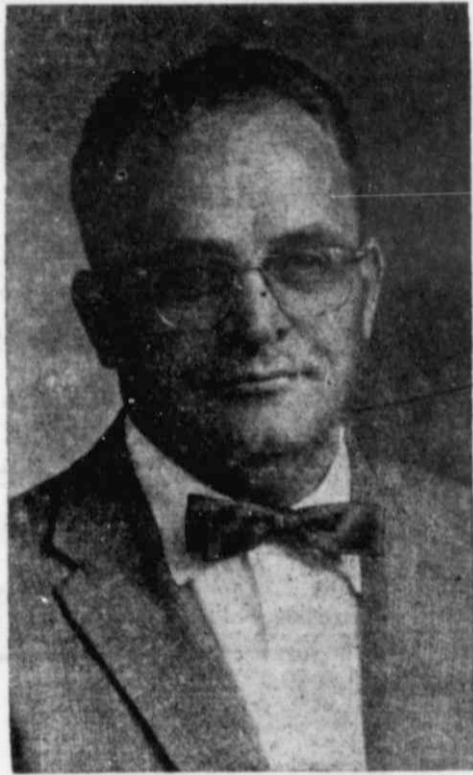

### THIRD FASTEST GROWING COUNTY IN STATE MAY REACH POPULATION OF 80,000 BY 1970

Whether we like it or whether we don't, we live in a changing community in Washington county. In fact, the Washington county community is changing so rapidly that we wonder sometimes what is going to happen in the next ten years if the population growth continues as it has in the past ten years.

If we check the census figures, we find that in 1920, Washington county had a population of 25,000 people. In the next 10 years it gained a thousand. In the next ten years it gained 2,000, and in the next 10 years it gained 5,000. By 1960 it had gained 12,000 over 1950.

If we plot this population growth and continue the lines on for the next ten years, it is entirely possible that Washington county will have 80,000 people by 1970. Whether it will or not is something that nobody can say, but it looks very much as though it might.

The big growth in population was in the town of Germantown. In the last ten years Germantown has grown 89 per cent in its total population. Richfield grew 52 per cent, Jackson 26 per cent, West Bend grew 24 per cent. This points out the growth in population is starting in the townships of the southeast corner of Washington county, and will continue out into the county until eventually statisticians tell us that we will have a solid city all the way from Kewaskum to Chicago.

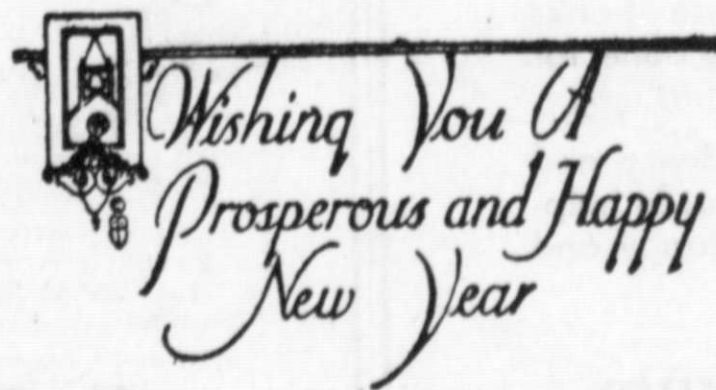
We don't know when this will happen, but we do know the changing in population is going on at a tremendous rate. Between 1940 and 1950 Washington county was fifth in its rate of growth among counties in the state. Between 1950 and 1960, Washington county moved up to third place. Washington county grew 36 per cent in its total population between 1950 and 1960. The two counties that exceeded it were Waukesha and Ozaukee. Washington county is now at the same place that Waukesha was between 1940 and 1950.

Will it move up? We think it will. Yet there are things that may happen to change this picture.

This study was recently reviewed in the county extension office to give an idea of what is going on in the many towns, villages and cities within Washington county. There are problems that will arise as this population growth begins to really get started. These problems are many, and they are varied. But they are things that many people are going to have to be concerned with in the not too distant future.

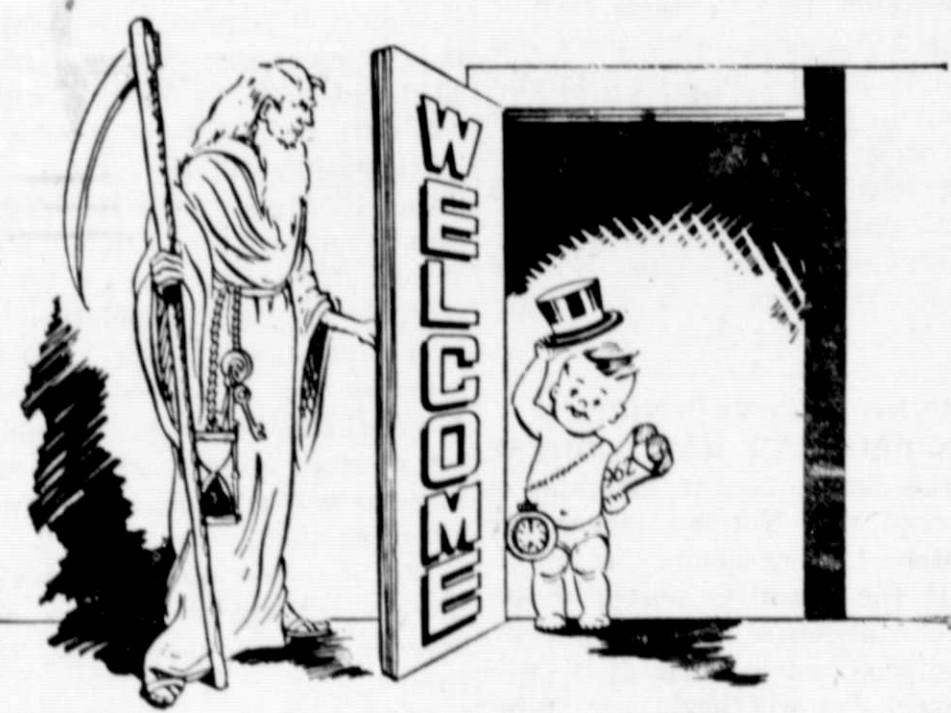

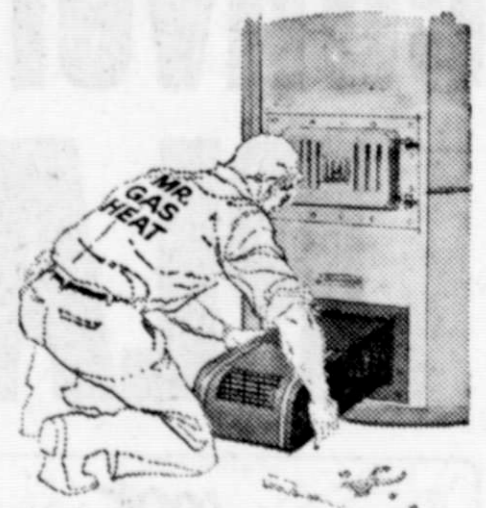

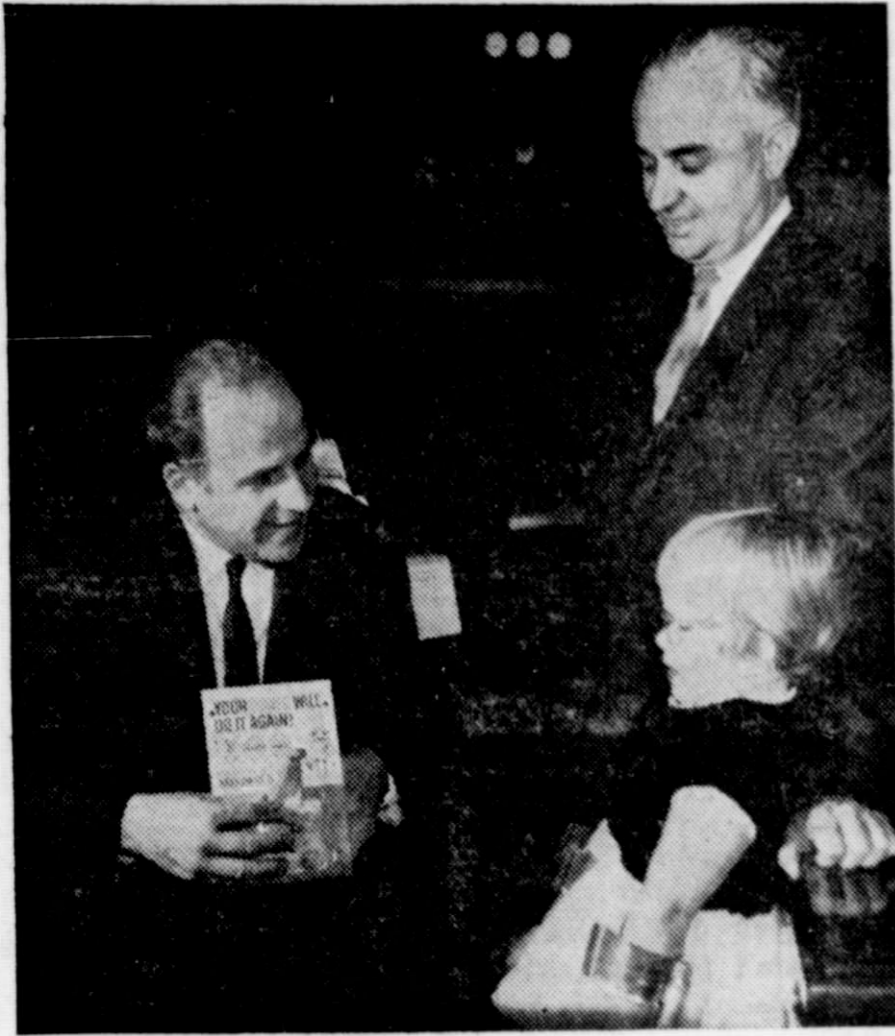

#### DR. RUMSEY OF KEWASKUM KILLS BIG DEER WITH BOW

As this is written the wild birds and animals have had so far good food and shelter. Indications are that things will grow worse. As the snow increases in depth and temperatures drop, food will become increasingly scarce. Drop out to your favorite hunting grounds, look the situation over, perhaps some of your wild friends will need help before spring. Do not wait until it is too late.

H. L. Rumsey, Kewaskum, killed a large doe deer with bow and arrow in the vicinity of Lake Fifteen this past Sunday. This season will close on Dec. 31.

Fishing in general is slow in Ozaukee and Washington counties. A few panfish caught at the north end of Big Cedar lake. Some walleyed pike and panfish taken at Pike lake.

The general fishing license will expire on Dec. 31. The 1962 fishing license and copies of the 1962 Wisconsin fishing regulations are available at all license depots. Read the regulations before you fish.

Fishing for trout in Wallace lake is prohibited. The season closed on Sept. 7, 1961 and will not reopen until April 28, 1962.

The ice is forming and the fishermen will soon be out on the lakes trying their luck. The ice is not very thick and a heavy cover

of snow on thin ice will act as a blanket and prevent further freezing for some time. The fishermen should stay away from these places.

Lawrence Gross, R. 3, West Bend, recently killed a nice doe deer with a bow and arrow in the town of Farmington. Two deer were killed by cars the same day, one in the morning on the West Bend Country Club road, the other in the evening on Highway 32 just south of Port Washington.

It is illegal for taverns or night clubs to serve venison to their patrons. The fine for such a violation is \$200 to \$500. This, I might add, includes serving of moose. The only exception is confiscated animals sold by the Wisconsin Conservation Department.

During the past season Ozaukee county registered fourteen deer. Ten were killed by residents of Ozaukee county, two by Milwaukeeans, one each by a resident of Random Lake and Kewaskum.

Thirty-five deer were registered in Washington county. Twenty-five were killed by residents of Washington county in the county. Five Dodge county residents registered their deer at Hartford. Three Sheboygan county and one deer killed in Fond du Lac county by Washington county residents were registered at West Bend.

Of forty-nine deer registered in the two counties, residents killed thirty-five, or about 75% of the kill. The local boys seem to have a better batting average than many of the groups that hunted in the north country.

Now that most of the hunting seasons are completed most people are turning to other kind of recreation. We do however, still have a few rabbit and squirrel hunters.

Each year we get some complaints and make several arrests

for the illegal shooting of pheasants at this time of the year.

I believe you hunters will all agree that the pheasant population is dangerously low and when the remaining birds have been smart enough or maybe lucky enough to get through the open hunting season, they should be kept for the spring breeding season.

Surely if we are to build up the population of pheasants again we must have all the breeders possible in the spring.

The birds will have their troubles before spring without man adding to them. Predators will no doubt take some birds—bad weather will take its toll when and if it comes, and some will die from injury, disease, and shot they are carrying from the open hunting season.

We sincerely hope that everyone will refrain from shooting pheasants during the closed season, both so you do not get in trouble and to keep the birds for breeders in the spring.
