Roof Damaged in Fire At Zehren Farm Home

The Kewaskum firemen were called out at 3:10 p. m. last Thursday to extinguish a roof fire at the Leo Zehren farm home on R. 3, Campbellsport, located west of St. Kilian.

The blaze, believed to have started from sparks from a chimney, burned a hole several feet in diameter in the southeast corner of the roof of the home. The fire had a pretty good start before it was noticed. When firemen arrived members of the Zehren family and neighbors had the blaze fairly well under control by dousing it with buckets of water.

The department remained at the scene about an hour putting out the rest of the flames and standing by. After the fire was apparently out and the firemen ready to leave, flames broke out again in one part of the roof and they had to go up once more to complete their task.

The fire occurred in zero weather and was fanned by a brisk wind. An estimate of the damage was not available.

Applications Accepted For Rural Carrier Here

An examination for rural carrier for the post office at Kewaskum, Wisconsin, will be open for acceptance of applications until Jan. 23, 1962, the U. S. Civil Service Commission announced the past week.

Applicants must take a written test for this position. They must have resided within the delivery of the office for one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. There is no maximum age limit. However, persons who have passed the age of 70 may be considered only for temporary renewable appointments of one year.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.

County Democrats to Hold District Caucus

Washington county Democrats will meet with party members from other 6th district counties at a special caucus on Friday, Jan. 12, at 8 p. m. at the Fountain Park Hotel, Sheboygan, to formally kick off the 1962 election-year campaign, it was announced today by Democratic chairman, Lawrence E. Harty.

The meeting to be held on Friday, Jan. 12, in Sheboygan will be attended by the party membership in each county in the district. Jim Buckley, state organizational director, and Al Charapata, the 6th district chairman, will outline the party's organizational projects for the first four months of the new year.

These projects, Harty said, are designed to ready the party for the actual campaign activities. Scheduled between now and the end of May, they will include the party membership drive, precinct workers' schools, appointment of precinct committee officials, and an intensive voter canvass, by which they intend to find the Democrats, get them to register, and, on election day, get them to vote.

Especially significant in the party's plans for the first part of the new year is an intensive effort to recruit full and active precinct committees, including precinct committeemen in each ward, and a full corps of booth workers to serve as election board officials in every voting precinct. Attorney General John W. Reynolds will attend each caucus to explain the legal requirements and responsibilities of those who serve on precinct committees.

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Chevs and Beaver Dam, Two Unbeaten Teams, To Clash for Lead Here

The biggest and most important basketball game of the season in the Land o' Lakes league will take place this Saturday night right in our own home gym when the Kewaskum Chevs and Beaver Dam tangle. These two teams are both undefeated and tied for first place with 4-0 records.

This will be the return to loop action for both teams after being idle over the holidays. Beaver Dam is the defending league champion and has a very powerful squad, which includes two or three former college stars. Kewaskum has an improved team this year but will have to be at its very best to stand a chance against the champs. It should be a "barn burner" with the visitors favored to cop.

Saturday night's tilt could decide the first half championship and the largest crowd of the season should be on hand to see these two fine teams. Game time is 8 p. m. and admission only 50 cents for adults.

On Thursday night of this week the Chevs were scheduled to play a practice game with the strong Port Washington five of the Eastern Shore league at Port to round back into shape for Saturday's important clash with Beaver Dam. John DeMerit, who was with the

Milwaukee Braves last season, is a member of the Port team.

Indians Battle Random Lake for First Place

Following the holiday recess, the Kewaskum High school Indians will resume action in the Scenic Moraine conference Friday night at Random Lake in a battle to settle the league lead. The Rams are in first place with a 5-0 record, while the Indians are right on their tail with 4-0, a half game behind, as the result of playing one less game.

In this head-on clash between two undefeated teams, Random Lake should be picked as the favorite to win because of their all-around strength and advantage in height and experience. They have won all games to date by comfortable margins while Kewaskum has barely sneaked past some of the same opponents. A victory would give the Indians the lead, while a defeat will drop them 1½ games behind.

25 Years Ago

The Kewaskum Statesman Jan. 1, 1937

Arnold Kohn, 25, son of the Wm. Kohns of the town of Kewaskum, an employee of the Kewaskum Creamery Co., was fatally injured when a truck loaded with milk he was hauling to Chicago crashed into the rear of a motor transport truck stalled on a hill and parked without lights early Thursday, Dec. 31, on Hwy. 45 south of the Racine county line near Union Grove. He died the same afternoon at St. Catherine's hospital, Kenosha. The driver of the stalled truck was Dominic Moretti, Chicago. Herbert Backhaus, Jr. of this village, a companion riding with Kohn, was severely injured. The young men were pinned in the wreckage for hours before they could be re-

leased by a rescue squad, police, firemen and volunteers working with acetylene torches, power jacks and hack saws. Both were conscious and suffered intensely. Kohn was crushed by the steering wheel and the motor of their truck was almost in the lap of the two men. The two were administered hypodermics. The trucks were locked together so tightly that it took several other transport trucks and a wrecker to pull them apart. Funeral services for Kohn were held Monday at Holy Trinity church.

Seriously injured a week ago when an auto driven by her son John, 17, in which she was a pas-

senger, collided with a rig near Campbellsport, Mrs. John Foerster, 50, wife of a Wayne tavernkeeper, died at the Fond du Lac hospital.

Hugo Vorpahl, 49, of the village was seriously injured when he fell ten feet from a platform while repairing machinery on a stone crusher in the Northern Gravel Co. pit near Barton, where he is employed as a crusherman. He was taken to the West Bend clinic where it was found he suffered a brain concussion, fractured ribs and chest and head injuries.

Mrs. Wm. F. Schultz had the misfortune of having a finger amputated as the result of a severe case of blood poisoning.

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
