NEW MARX IGA FOODLINER WILL OPEN NEXT WEDNESDAY, JAN. 24



Modern Supermarket Features Complete 'One Stop Shopping'

On Wednesday, Jan. 24, at 10 a. m., something excitingly different will take place right here in Kewaskum... the doors will swing open on a new concept of food merchandising. That day will mark the opening of Washington county's finest "one stop shopping" center at the new, large, ultra-modern Marx IGA Foodliner at 140 Main st. (right next to the Bank of Kewaskum).

The grand opening will continue for four days, Wednesday through Saturday, Jan. 24-27. Store hours will be from 10 a. m. to 9 p. m. on Wednesday, 8 a. m. to 9 p. m. on Thursday and Friday, and 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. on Saturday. Outstanding values to be offered are listed in a two-page advertisement elsewhere in this issue.

A few of the IGA Foodliner's outstanding features include a self-service Table-Rite meat department (the first in the Kewaskum area), sparkling fresh fruits and vegetables, complete frozen food and dairy departments, fresh Elm Tree bakery and complete health and beauty aid section, plus spacious, convenient parking.

The former Marx IGA store locked its doors with the close of business on Saturday and remained closed all this week to move the remaining stock and some equipment to add to the huge stock in the new IGA Foodliner.

The new Foodliner covers 6,000 square feet, a very large store for a town the size of Kewaskum. It is surrounded on three sides by a large paved parking area with room for 65 cars. This superb modern food facility has all of the features of a brand new supermarket.

The Foodliner is a one story masonry building with overhanging canopy and sheltered entrance. It will be air conditioned. The store front construction employs modern aluminum settings for the plate glass and the entrance and exit doors are of new narrow style extruded aluminum.

The interior is pleasantly lighted with the newest fluorescent lighting. The color scheme for the

walls and floor were designed by IGA specialists to assure patrons a pleasant shopping experience. The store is complete in all departments and will use the newest in most modern equipment. The merchandise will be displayed in all departments. While the meat department will operate on a self-service basis, a qualified meat man will be in attendance for the convenience of customers who desire special cuts.

The store will be operated by the owners, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Marx, and other members of the Marx family, who have 50 successive years of food retailing in Kewaskum. The family has been with IGA (Independent Grocers' Alliance) since its origin 36 years ago.

The new store compares favorably to those found only in the larger cities and Kewaskum is fortunate indeed in gaining such an up-to-date, convenient and metropolitan Foodliner. The store adds largely to the appearance, growth and progress of our little city. The Marxes are to be congratulated on their beautiful new store.

Four Day Event Next Week Will Open Wednesday

A grand opening will be held next Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Jan. 24-27, at the H. J. Lay Lumber company's attractive new store and office building, lumber yard and storage sheds, located at the rear of the Bank of Kewaskum building on Main st.

The new and complete store will be open evenings on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of the event. It will be closed Tuesday, Jan. 23, to make final preparations for the gala celebration. The store contains many, many new items for the home and Lays invite everyone to attend the opening and see what they have done. The opening will be held on the same days and evenings of the grand opening at the new Marx IGA Foodliner next door.

The former Lay store and office building and all but one of several mill work, cement and lumber storage sheds were razed to make room for the new buildings, Foodliner and large paved parking area. The only storage shed left standing is the one at the extreme north end of the yard.

The new lumber company store, which faces east, is 76 feet long and 60 feet wide. The store is surrounded on three sides (rear and sides) by a horseshoe or U-shaped lumber yard containing 472 lineal feet of storage sheds.

The store is of one story construction with display windows of modern glass and aluminum. The interior is finished with one-fourth inch peg board in varied pastel colors. The outside of the building is constructed of redwood vertical boarding and field stone with planters in the front. A millwork shop is at the rear of the store. The company also has increased its line of hardware and paints.

The two new lumber storage sheds are 24 by 158 feet and 22 by 161 feet in size.

one of the sheds has not yet been completed but the foundation has been laid. It will be finished in spring to complete the U-shape. The lumber yard has been oper-

ating in Kewaskum for 96 years. It was purchased 88 years ago by H. J. Lay, who operated it until his death in 1906. Otto E. Lay then conducted the business from 1906 until his death in January of 1940. He also purchased a yard in West Bend in 1917 and operated both the Kewaskum and West Bend yards successfully. Mr. Lay was a past president of the Wisconsin Retail Lumbermen's association, was very active in all community affairs and held many municipal and county positions. Since January of 1940, the Kewaskum and West Bend lumber yards have been operated by his son, Henry J. Lay.

Congratulations to "Bud" Lay for taking this step in the direction of progress and modernization. The new store and lumber yard will serve the community better and provides another marked improvement to our little city.

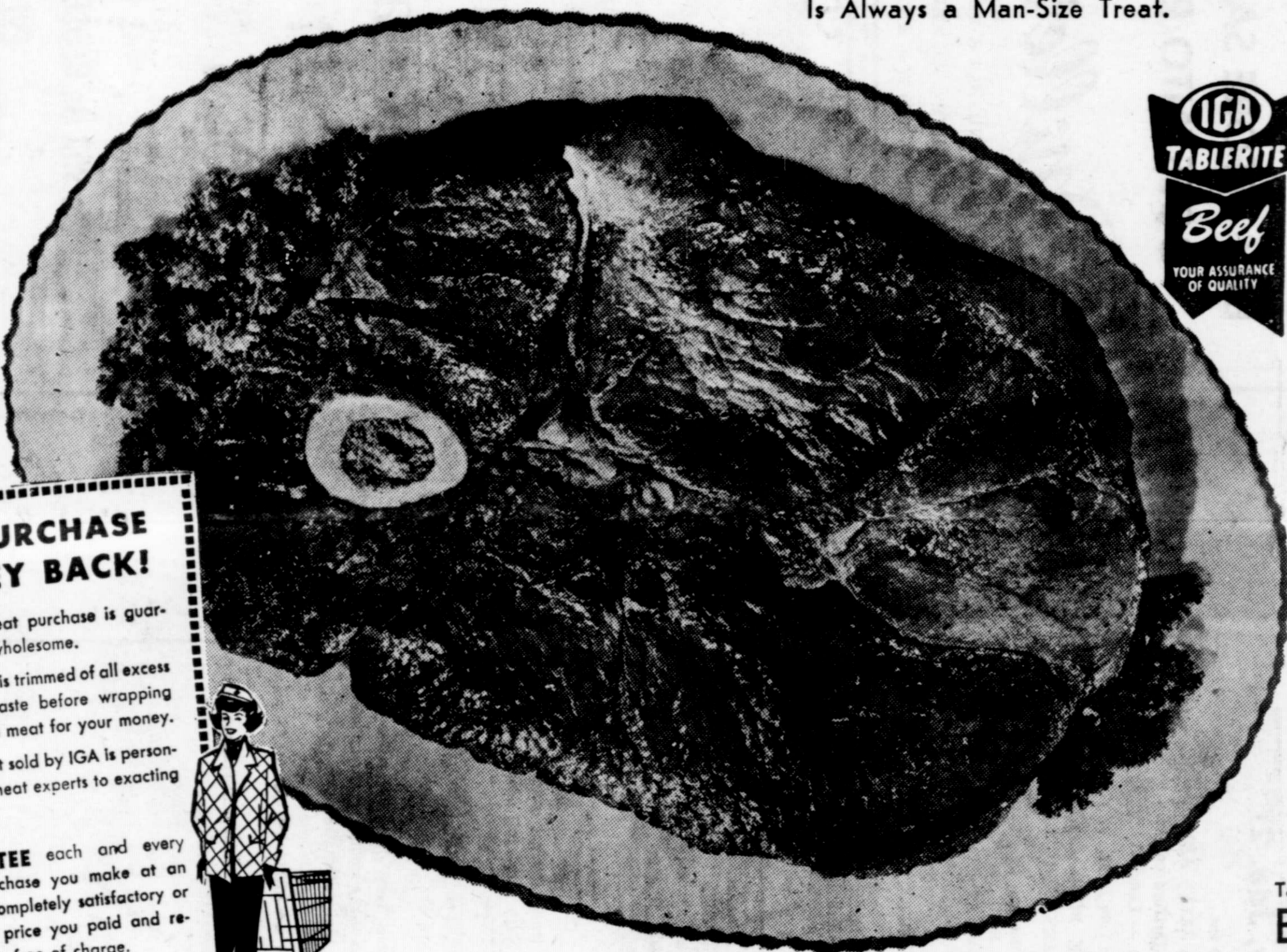

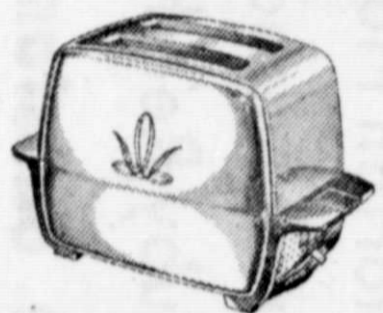



PROF. GEORGE WALTER OF LAWRENCE COLLEGE TO BE SPEAKER

An outstanding speaker will talk to members and their husbands. He is Professor George Walter, director of teacher education at Lawrence college.

"Versatility" is, perhaps, the word which best describes Professor Walter. A dynamic college professor during the school year, in the summer months he swings an axe and hikes the trails in the back country of Glacier Park, working for the National Park Service.

He was a football star in both high school and college — captain at West Division High school in Milwaukee, and all-conference fullback at Lawrence — yet he feels now that the highest achievement of his undergraduate days

was being chosen college poet laureate. To demonstrate that poetry is still a vital concern of his, he has delighted and informed student, teacher, and adult groups of many kinds all over the state with his rollicking talks on poetry.

Professor Walter possesses great enthusiasm for the community theater movement. A talented actor, he has played leading roles with the Racine Theater Guild, Valley Players, and Attic Theater.

He has held important administrative posts in education: four years as principal of the Washington Park High school in Racine, and seven years as dean of men at Lawrence college, from 1949 to 1955. At the same time he continued his interest in athletics, having coached football in high school and college seventeen years, officiated in football and basketball, and shared in the administration of school athletics in both high school and college.

During his tenure as director of

teacher education at Lawrence college hundreds of young people have crowded his classes, seeking to catch his boundless enthusiasm for teaching, and his insight into the art of teaching effectively.

Professor Walter is, himself, a graduate of Lawrence college. He completed his graduate work at Ohio State university.

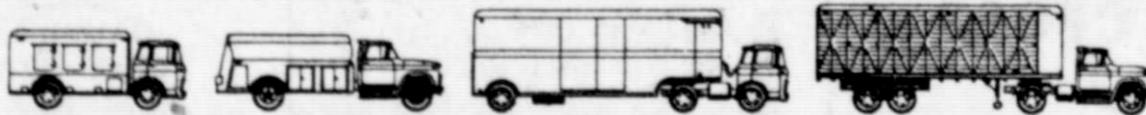
