New Six-Unit Modern Motel Building to Be Constructed At Kewaskum by Des Smiths

Work on Structure Off Hwy. 45 Will Begin This Month

MOTEL WILL BE COMPLETED, READY FOR OCCUPANCY EARLY NEXT SUMMER

Another new business venture will be entered into and another new commercial building will be constructed in our continuously growing, expanding community of Kewaskum. This will be the seventh new business place to be built here within the past year or so, others being the IGA Foodliner, H. J. Lumber Co. buildings, Hon-E-Kor Country club, Wunderberg Ski Hill Chalet, Ollie's Texaco Service station and General Telephone Co. office building.

This newest building will be a modern, six-unit, one story motel, with accompanying office and residence to be constructed by Desmond (Des) Smith and wife, the former Valeria Koerble. It will be located just off of Hwy. 45, on the west side of a town road (north of the new Henry Becker home) at the south end of the Kewaskum hill and about 1/2 mile south of the village.

The motel will be built on a piece of land purchased by the Smiths containing 475 feet of frontage and running 150 feet in depth. Construction work is scheduled to begin within the next week or two and the motel is expected to be completed and ready for occupancy by the early part of next summer, probably in June.

It will be a one story structure with living quarters on the south end. Next to the living rooms will be an office and a utility room will be located at the rear of the office. The building will have a basement under the office and utility room only.

The north part of the building will house the six motel units, each of which will be 18 feet by 18 feet in size. The entire building will measure 152 feet in length. The residence portion will extend 42 feet farther back than the motel units which will be 18 feet in depth.

Each unit will include a bath and shower and modern conveniences. All beds will be full size with three units containing two beds and the remaining three having one bed.

The entire front of the motel and residence rooms will be of redwood construction, while the rear wall will be of cement block. A decorative exposed cedar decking roof will complete the building. There is sufficient land and the motel has been planned so that additional units can be added in a continuous line at the north end of the building at such a time when and if the Smiths find it necessary or desire to increase the number of units in their motel.

All of the work on the building where possible will be done by

local contractors. The construction work has been contracted to Bunkelman Builders, Johann Plumbing & Heating will install the plumbing and heating, and Schmidt Electric will do the electrical work.

A motel is needed and should be a going business in a recreational area such as Kewaskum, with our vast Kettle Moraine area tourist travel, many nearby lakes and parks, golf course, ski hill, and steady construction and improvements.

Mrs. Norton's Pekingese "Champion Golden Rule Sand Man's Return" also won top best of breed honors at this show. Both dogs have taken extensive top wins throughout the Midwest and southern shows and have been handled by Mrs. Norton and her agent, Lorraine Heichel from Indiana.

PURCHASE INCLUDES SEVEN GARAGES, APARTMENT; REMODEL INTERIOR

In another business transaction completed this week, the former Marx IGA store building on Main st. was purchased from the owner, John Marx, by John "Jack" Jadro, owner of Jack's Appliance, which will be moved there from its present location in the Kewaskum theatre building on Fond du Lac ave.

Included in the purchase of the building and property, is the apartment above the store and the seven-stall car garage at the rear of the structure. Jadro expects to have all of his stock, equipment and fixtures moved into the newly purchased store before March 1 and plans to hold a grand opening there on Friday and Saturday, March 2 and 3.

The interior of the store will be remodeled before moving in and the new owner also plans to improve the exterior of the building at a later date. Jack stated that his reason for moving is to be able to better serve the people with larger facilities for warehousing, display and service of merchandise and to be located in the new village shopping center area with ample space for the parking of cars.

The new place of business will have an extended line of appliances, electrical supplies and lighting fixtures with the possible addition of some non-electric household items.

Jadro has been in business in the theatre building for the past seven years, 5 1/2 years for Burckhardt Electric, the former owner, and for the past 1 1/2 years for himself purchasing the business. His business has increased to such an extent since he took it over that it became necessary to move into larger quarters.

For the present Jack will continue to serve his many customers and friends in the present building and asks them to watch this newspaper for further announcements concerning his moving and grand opening at his new location.

Village Board Accepts Petition to Annex Town Of Kewaskum Territory

OPPERMANN APPROVED AS FIRE CHIEF FOR FIVE YEAR PERIOD

Regular Meeting

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all board members present except Trustee Eberle.

The minutes of the previous meeting were accepted as presented upon motion by Trustee Degner, seconded by Trustee Geidel and duly carried.

Marvin Martin presented to the board a valuation report as prepared by the Home Mutual Insurance Company.

RESOLUTION NO. 62-1

RESOLUTION OF VILLAGE BOARD ACCEPTING PETITION FOR ANNEXATION

WHEREAS, a petition for direct annexation of the following territory of the town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, to the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, was filed with the Village Clerk on December 4, 1961.

All that part of the South Half of the Southeast Quarter (S½ SE¼) of Section Nine,

Township Twelve North, Range Nineteen East in the Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, described as follows:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the North Line of the Southwest Quarter of the Southeast Quarter (SW¼ SE¼) of Section Nine with the centerline of U. S. Highway "45"; thence South 28 degrees 52 minutes East 296 feet along the centerline of said highway; thence North 85 degrees 8 minutes East 278 feet; thence North 73 degrees 59 minutes East 273.4 feet to the Westerly right-of-way line of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway; thence Northwesterly along the right-of-way line to the North line of the Southeast Quarter (SE¼ SE¼) of said Section 9; thence North 88 degrees 45 minutes West along said North line 588.7 feet to the point of beginning.

Excepting therefrom that portion heretofore conveyed for highway purposes.

WHEREAS, the Village Clerk has investigated said petition and certified to the Village Board that it was signed by all of the owners of land in the territory proposed for annexation as of the date of filing of the petition and that the territory to be annexed is properly described in the petition and shown

on the scale map attached thereto, is contiguous to the Village of Kewaskum, and is unincorporated;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, determines that the petition for annexation of the above described territory is a sufficient and legal petition conforming with the requirements of s. 66.021 of the Wisconsin statutes; and

That the village clerk is hereby directed to notify the clerk of the town of Kewaskum, of this resolution of acceptance in accordance with s. 66.021 (5) (a) Wisconsin Statutes.

Linda Discards Braces, Crutches; Mother Praises March of Dimes

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Dorothy E. Brees, young Columbus, Ohio, mother, tells of the remarkable progress made by her daughter in overcoming the disability caused by a severe birth defect.)

My little Linda has done far more things in her five years than most people even dream of being able to do in an entire lifetime.

As the March of Dimes 1961 National Poster Child, she met President Kennedy in person and rode on a float in his inauguration parade. She starred in an hour-long television program with some of the country's most popular television and movie stars.

Linda has traveled from coast to coast and seen her picture in nearly every newspaper printed. She has autograph books filled with the signatures of celebrities and famous people she has visited.

These are just some of the things Linda has done that are beyond the reach of most of us. But the one thing we wanted most for her was something the average person takes for granted—the ability to walk alone and unaided.

There were many times during the years that my husband, Dean, and I thought that Linda would never be able to throw away her braces and crutches. And to be truthful, there were terrifying moments when we feared we might even lose her.

Linda was born with an opening in her spinal column, a condition known medically as *spina bifida*. As a result, her body was seriously affected from the waist down.

When she was only a few hours old, Linda underwent a delicate operation that partially corrected this condition. The surgery was performed at Children's Hospital in Columbus where subsequently The National Foundation with March of Dimes funds established the first of its Birth Defects Clinical Study Centers in 1959.

When she was nine months old, it was found that Linda had water on the brain, which has the medical name of *hydrocephalus*. This condition was

treated by the insertion of a "shunt" tube which drains the excess fluid from the head into the blood stream.

You can imagine how much we worried about our little girl in those early days, because we knew she was never far from death. It could have come at any time. After all, 250,000 infants are born in this country each year with a significant birth defect and 21,000 of them die.

But Linda continued to improve. She received specialized treatment at the March of Dimes-supported center. She got her leg braces and crutches. Linda hated them, but she learned to use them.

When, though—if ever—would she be able to run and play with her sister and two older brothers and the other neighborhood children?

The answer to that question depended on Linda, her doctors, the rehabilitation therapists, and us. We all worked together. We worked long, and we worked hard, but it was worth it.

Only the other day, Linda took her first halting steps across our living room without her crutches or leg braces. It was an unforgettable experience. In my excitement, I telephoned the good news to everyone I knew—and probably quite a few I didn't know. It was a real shout-from-the-housetops event.

Linda has won through. She improves every day. Now her trips to the birth defects center have been cut to just one every three months. Best of all—we have been able to enroll her in kindergarten.

Dean and I and the children remember the gloomy days. We know that many other parents of afflicted children are going through similar days of anxiety and heartbreak right now. **Young Man Hurt in Crash
Returns From Hospital**

James K. Steingraeber, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kermit Steingraeber, R. 1, Adell (near Beechwood), returned to his home on Thursday from Memorial hospital, Sheboygan, where he was confined since being seriously injured in an auto crash about a week and a half ago. The victim's father is an employee at Regal Ware, Inc. in Kewaskum on the second shift.

The young man wandered in a daze in sub-zero temperatures following the crash. He was found shortly after 6 a. m. in a semi-conscious, near-frozen condition sitting behind a knoll in a pasture on County Trunk SS, two miles southeast of Beechwood. Investigation determined that Steingraeber's

car crashed headon into a bridge abutment on SS about one mile west of his home.

James' father discovered the wrecked car about 5:45 a. m. and when he was not found in the immediate vicinity Mr. Steingraeber called the Sheboygan county sheriff's department for help. They found footprints leading away from the wreckage in an erratic manner, which they followed and found James a short time later. It was determined that the young man had wandered in large circles and later crawled on his hands and knees for the equivalent of several blocks. He was wearing light clothes in temperature about 10 below zero. James sustained a severe nose fracture, concussion, multiple cuts, scrapes, bruises, shock and exposure but is now in very satisfactory condition.

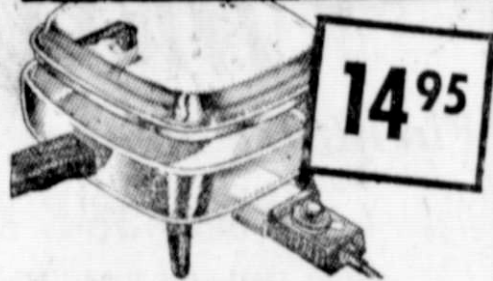

HERE IS EASIEST WAY TO PUT ON TIRE CHAINS

It can be done in six minutes, and without a jack!



1. W. B. (Walt) Lashar, Jr., chairman of National Safety Council test committee, shows Marion Olund, Clintonville, Wis., the first step. Spread chains on the ground to remove tangles. Reinforced chains are best, and the projecting teeth or cleats should be up.



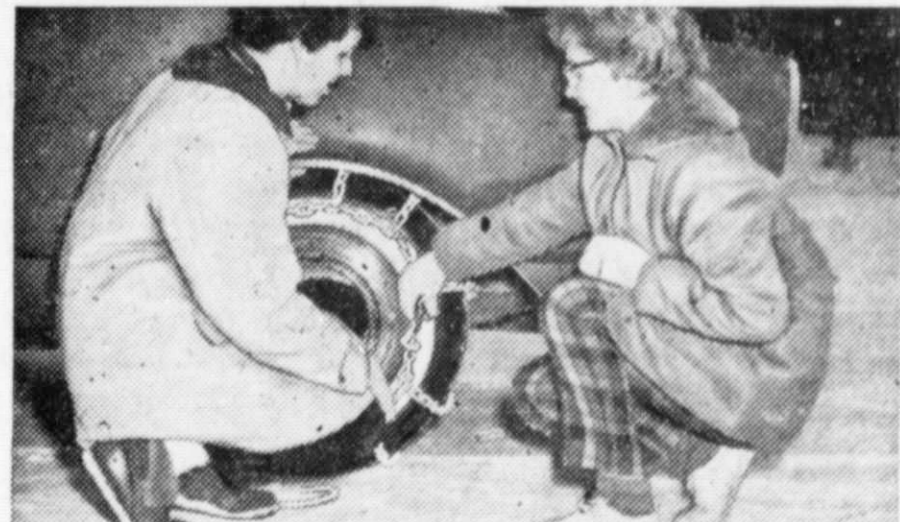
2. Then put end links of side chains on loops of "applicator" and push onto tire as shown. No jack is needed.



3. It is wise to gather the cross chains up close in back of tire on some cars, so chains won't catch on back of fender when car is moved forward to encircle the rear wheels.



4. Now drive ahead one wheel revolution, until side chain fastener is near fender. Remove the spring steel wire "applicator" and fasten the inside hook. Lashar shows Marion that the usually difficult inside hook can be fastened by "feel" (without getting under car) after you practice it once and learn how.



5. Marion has now learned how to put on a pair of tire chains in six minutes, the easy way. She is seen showing Joan Klemp, Clintonville, the final step—fastening simple outside hook.



6. Lashar congratulates the girls on their aptitude and reads them Council's tips for safe winter driving, one of which is "always carry reinforced chains and use them for severe snow or ice conditions to help avoid traffic blockades and accidents."

After losing three successive games to the conference's top teams, the Kewaskum Indians now have another three game winning streak going as the result of the past week's contests in the Scenic Moraine loop. The team has passed up Campbellsport and moved back into third place in the standings.

The Indians led, 16-7, at the quarter and 29-14 at the intermission. Then Kewaskum fell completely apart in the third period to be outscored 13-2, cutting their lead to 31-27. North Fondy came within two points of a tie in the final quarter before the Indians jelled again and opened up a gap in the stretch to win by 11 points.

Oppermann's 17 points was the top performance for the winners, while mates Al Koepke and Ron Gross chipped in 9 each. Crowley's 9 points were top for the losers. Kewaskum made good on 17 free throws and the Orioles on 12.

This Friday Kewaskum travels to Pewaukee (3-6) and next Friday, Feb. 9, they entertain unbeaten, conference leading Random Lake.

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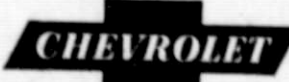
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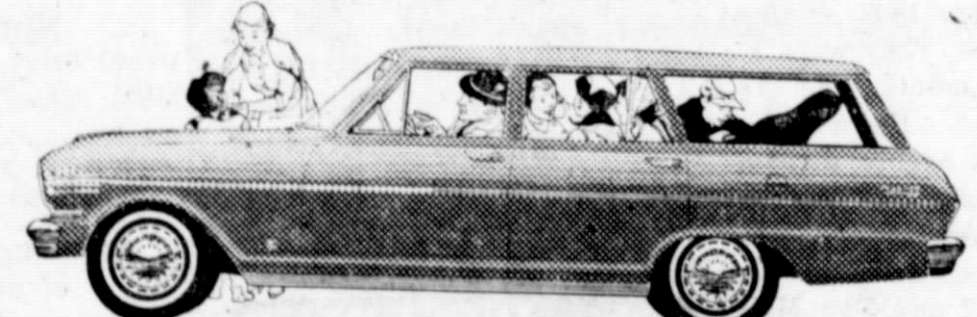
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
