## Kewaskum Chapter Plans Activities for FFA Week Feb. 17-24

### WINDOW DISPLAYS, KIWANIS CLUB PROGRAM PLANNED

Future Farmers of America members throughout the nation are scheduling special activities to focus public attention on the work of their organization during National FFA Week, Feb. 17-24.

"Honoring Rural Opportunities and Responsibilities" is this year's FFA Week theme. The farm boys will undertake a campaign to inform the general public about the importance of the agricultural industry to America, and of the numerous and wide variety of opportunities that exist in this field for young men who have a background of farm experience and training.

Locally, members of the Kewaskum FFA chapter plan to have window displays around town as well as a program for the local Kiwanis club.

Membership in the FFA is made up of farm boys who are students of vocational agriculture in high school. The organization's activities are designed to help develop rural leadership and citizenship, and to stimulate the boys to better achievement in their study and work toward successful establishment in farming or other agricultural occupations.

The Kewaskum FFA chapter has 66 members. Officers are:

President, Ronald Gross; vice-president, Jack Theusch; treasurer, Dave McChain; secretary, David Williams; reporter, Gene Krause; sentinel, Russ Breit.

Roy J. Esser, vocational agriculture instructor in Kewaskum High school, serves as advisor of the FFA chapter.

The national Future Farmer organization has 380,000 members, with 9,000 local chapters in the 50 states and Puerto Rico.

Future Farmers choose the week of George Washington's birthday each year for the observance of National FFA Week. Although usually recognized as a Revolutionary War general and our first president, Washington's first love was the farm he called Mount Vernon.

There, he was one of the first in the nation to practice contour planting, crop rotations, fertilization, and other soil conservation and improvement methods. It was more than a century after Washington's death before general use was made of many of the sound agricultural practices that he advocated.

### 25 Years Ago

Feb. 12, 1937

Thirty-one members of the Peace Ev. church of this village and Beechwood Young People's societies accompanied their pastor, Rev. Richard M. A. Gadow, to Waupun where they were shown through the state prison and hospital for the insane.

As a result of prompt action by Joe Knoeck, who operates a filling station on Hwy. 55 several miles south of here; and George F. Brandt, village marshal, two bandit suspects are occupying cells in the county jail, awaiting trial in circuit court on charges of attempted assault with a dangerous weapon with intent to rob. They are William Donahue, 35, and Martin Lonigro, 23, Chicago. A colt .38 special pistol with sawed off barrel was taken from Lonigro. Bail was fixed at \$5,000 for each. The men entered Knoeck's station and tav-

ern and while one covered Knoeck with a gun the other attempted to remove a slot machine. Unsuccessful because the machine was fastened down they left, driving north, with Knoeck following. In Kewaskum Knoeck enlisted the help of Marshal Brandt, who phoned Fond du Lac county officers before giving pursuit. At Alfred Ludwig's tavern, five miles north of the village, Brandt spotted a car such as Knoeck had described. Brandt, with his son George Jr. found the suspects and arrested them.

Edw. Weddig purchased the Math. Schmit residence on Prospect ave. He and his family moved there from the Hausmann home on Fond du Lac ave.

### FIFTY YEARS AGO

Kilian Honeck sold a team of black horses to Wm. King of Mitchell.

Jos. Strachota was awarded the contract by the village board to build the cement sidewalks this spring on Wilhelmina and Buckeye sts.

The Milwaukee Salvage Co. for the insurance companies who carry on the L. Rosenheimer Malt & Grain plant, have a large force of men at work here loading barley into cars. The barley was partly burned in the recent malt house fire. The grain is shipped to Milwaukee to be kiln dried, cleaned and disposed of. They are loading three cars a day and about fifty carloads will be taken out of the ruins.

## 2 Accidents in Village Reported During Week

Two traffic accidents in the village were reported by Chief of Police Roland Pledl during the past week.

In a crash which occurred at 2:15 a. m. Sunday on Fond du Lac ave. an auto driven by Norbert Gau, 19, of 1142 2nd st., West Bend, collided with a parked car owned by Arthur W. Otto, 23, R. 2, Fond du Lac. Gau was southbound on Fond du Lac ave. and claimed he was forced off the road by a northbound vehicle, causing him to crash into the Otto auto parked at the curb. The mishap occurred at midblock between Prospect ave. and Main st. Damage to the Gau vehicle was estimated at \$75 and that to Otto's car at \$100.

In another mishap reported at 1:30 a. m. Friday an auto owned by Alfred Bruhn, 127 Elm st., Kewaskum, and driven by Otto J. Ramthun, 19, of 337 Habeck st., village, crashed into the garage door of a building owned by L. Rosenheimer at the rear of the Rosenheimer store. The car was traveling west in an alley when the driver lost control on the slippery road in attempting to avoid striking a car parked in the alley and a snowbank. Damage to the garage door was estimated at \$125 and to the left front fender of the car at \$50.

## Random Lake's Champs Defeat Indians, 51-40

Unbeaten Random Lake, which sewed up the Scenic Moraine conference title already a couple of weeks ago, won its 13th straight game here Friday night in downing Kewaskum, 51-40. The setback dropped the Indians back to third place behind Slinger.

Although the Ram team has no particular standouts and does not appear to be a real classy, smooth-working squad, they play hard and always seem to get the job done. This has been the case all season. The Indians, who lost at Random Lake earlier by just one point on a free throw after regular time had ended in giving the Rams their toughest battle of the season, did not play near as good a brand of basketball here Friday. They fumbled, over-dribbled, lost the ball frequently, and their shooting was off form. This year's team missed 6 foot, 4 or 5 inch sophomore John Thorn, who made the squad last year as a freshman. Thorn broke a leg or ankle playing football and was lost to the Indians for the year. His presence on the team could have made a big difference in the outcome of the conference race.

Gary Hamm, who leads the conference in scoring with 251 points, paced the Rams in scoring with 22 points, tops for the evening. Reliable Bill Koepke led the Indians with 17 points, even though he had to leave the game with five personal fouls. Ron Gross also fouled out, while the Rams

didn't lose a player.

The game was very close until the closing minutes when the Lakers pulled away. The Rams led by only a small margin at halftime. Random Lake sank 11 free throws and the Indians 8.

Kewaskum plays its final home game Friday, entertaining Slinger, which beat the Indians in the first meeting there. A win would put the Indians back in second place ahead of Slinger. The season's finale will be at Germantown Fri-

day, Feb. 23, before the team enters regional tournament action.

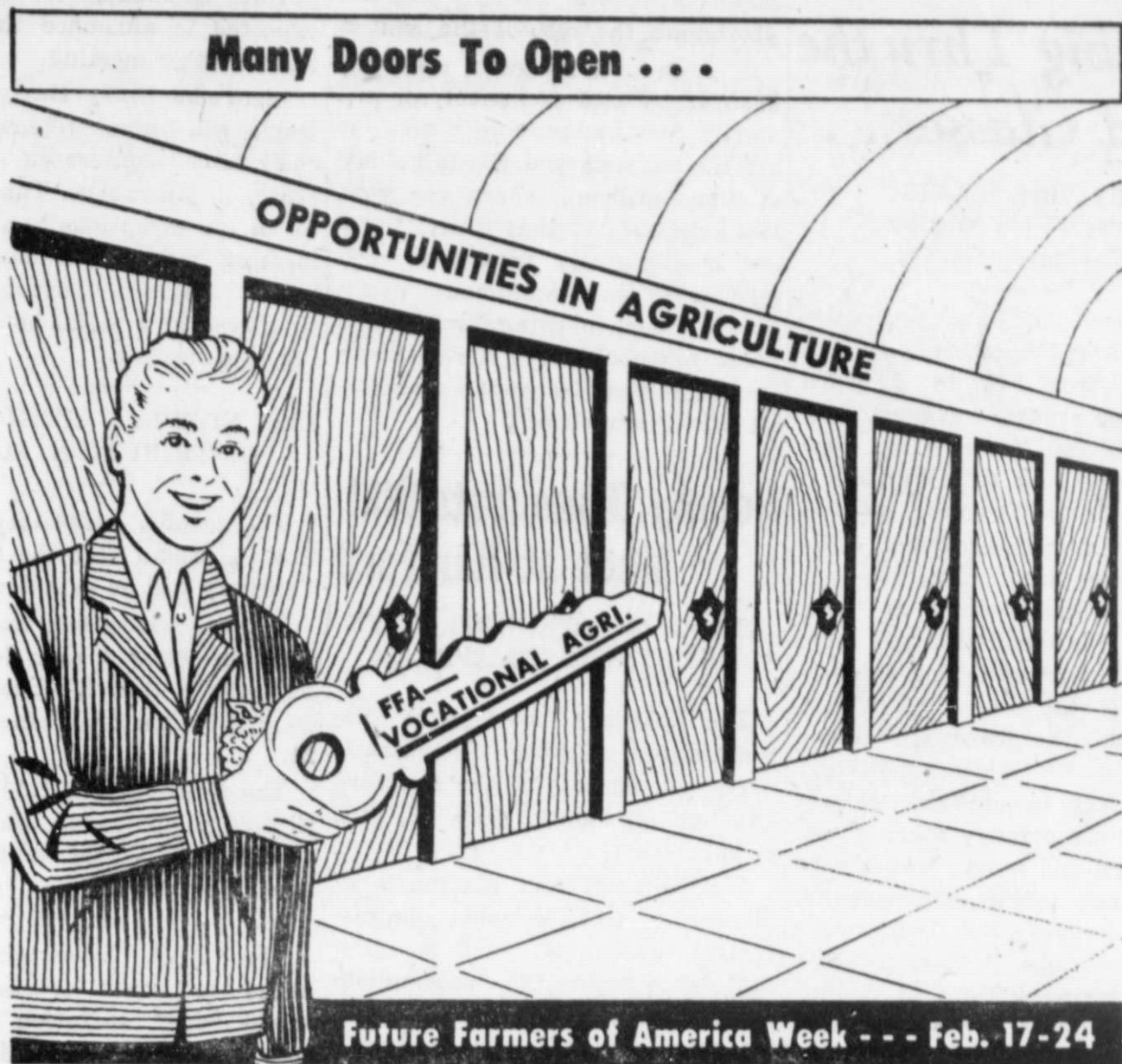

## Looking Thru the Field Glasses . .

The season on walleyed pike, black bass and northern pike will be closed from Feb. 16 to April 27, 1962, both dates inclusive. Feb. 15 was the last day to fish trout in Big Cedar and Friess lakes.

Under a new Wisconsin statute, a Public Service Commission (PSC) permit is required in order to enlarge a navigable water by construction of a canal, channel, ditch, lagoon, pond or other waterway.

The PSC will issue a permit only if it finds the proposed enlargement will not injure fish and game habitat. In addition the project must not damage other riparian owners and must conform to sanitary and zoning requirements.

All such artificial waterways constructed under the permit must be open to the public.

April 1, 1962 is the effective date for the new park sticker recently voted by the Wisconsin legislature. The fee for both residents and non-residents will be 50 cents per day or \$2.00 per season.

All fish shanties must be removed from the ice on or before March 5. This regulation affects all waters south of State Highway "64".

Each year it is necessary to make arrests for violation of this regulation; in most instances, it is just a case of an individual failing to take care of a responsibility. An appearance before a judge with the usual fine and costs usually impresses upon the individual that he does have such a responsibility.

This has been a tough year for travel on the ice, and it would take

almost a miracle for any big improvement the rest of the winter.

If yours is a sturgeon spearing shanty and used exclusively or primarily for that purpose, take it off the ice with you the last day of the sturgeon season or your last trip out. At that time, there are usually roads plowed on the lake or at least equipment available for such plowing. But if you wait, you could have a real problem in getting to your shanty—let alone removing it.

Several candidates for office are expected to announce their intentions at this meeting.

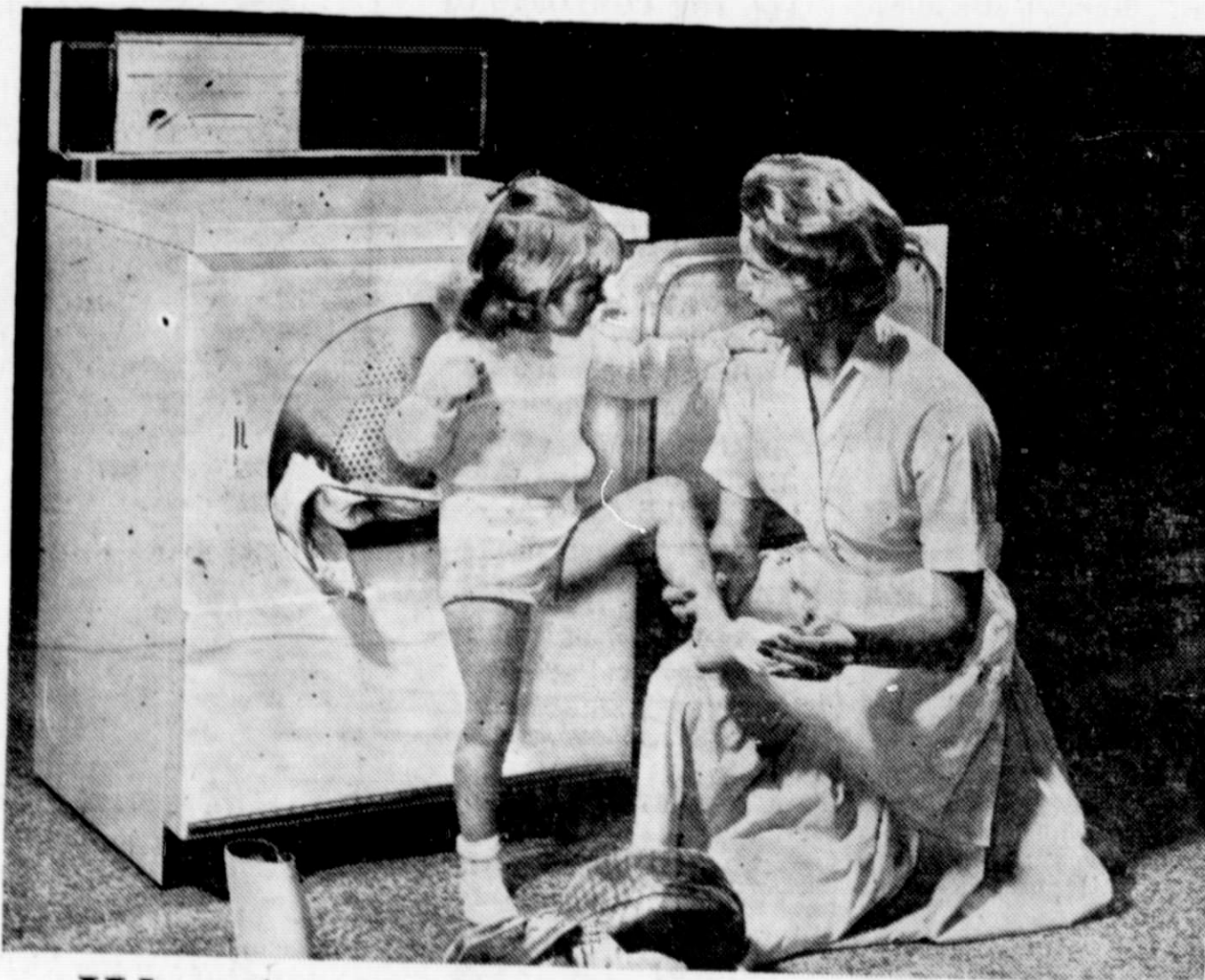

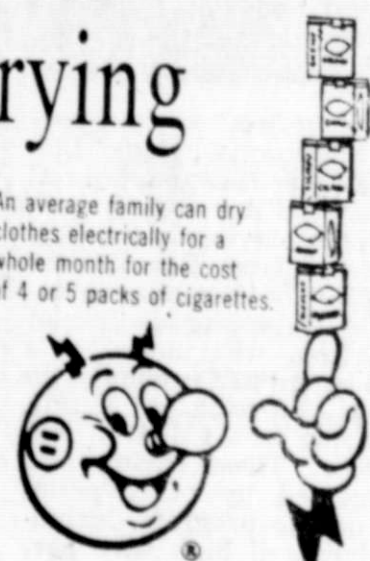

## Village Board Adopts Ordinance Annexing Territory to Village

Regular Meeting  
February 5, 1962

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session. President Reigle and Trustee Eberle were absent. All other members were present.

Village Attorney O'Meara opened the meeting and upon motion by Trustee Merwin, seconded by Trustee Wietor and carried, Trustee Tessar was selected as acting President.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Degner, seconded by Trustee Wietor and duly carried.

Myron Belger and William Ruth conferred with the Board and the Village Attorney regarding the location of proposed future streets outside of the incorporated limits of the village as established by the official map.

### ORDINANCE NO. 62-1 AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING TERRITORY TO THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

**SECTION 1. Territory Annexed.** In accordance with s. 66.021 of the Wisconsin statutes of 1957, and the petitioner for direct annexation filed with the village clerk on the 6 day of November, 1961, signed by all of the owners of land in the territory hereinafter described in the town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, is annexed to the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin:

All that part of the South Half

of the Southeast Quarter (S½ SE¼) of Section Nine, Township Twelve North, Range Nineteen East in the Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, described as follows:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the North Line of the Southwest Quarter of the Southeast Quarter (SW¼ SE¼) of Section Nine with the centerline of U. S. Highway "45"; thence South 28 degrees 52 minutes East 296 feet along the centerline of said highway; thence North 85 degrees 8 minutes East 278 feet; thence North 73 degrees 59 minutes East 273.4 feet to the Westerly right-of-way line of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway; thence Northwesterly along the right-of-way line to the North line of the Southeast Quarter of the Southeast Quarter (SE¼ SE¼) of said Section 9; thence North 88 degrees 45 minutes West along said North line 588.7 feet to the point of beginning.

Excepting therefrom that portion heretofore conveyed for highway purposes.

**SECTION 2. Effect of Annexation.** From and after the date of this ordinance the territory described in section 1 shall be a part of the Village of Kewaskum for any and all purposes provided by law and all persons coming or re-

siding within such territory shall be subject to all ordinances, rules and regulations governing the village of Kewaskum.

**SECTION 3. Severability.** If any provision of this ordinance is invalid or unconstitutional, or if the application of this ordinance to any person or circumstances is invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provision or application.

**SECTION 4. Effective Date.** This ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication as provided by law.
