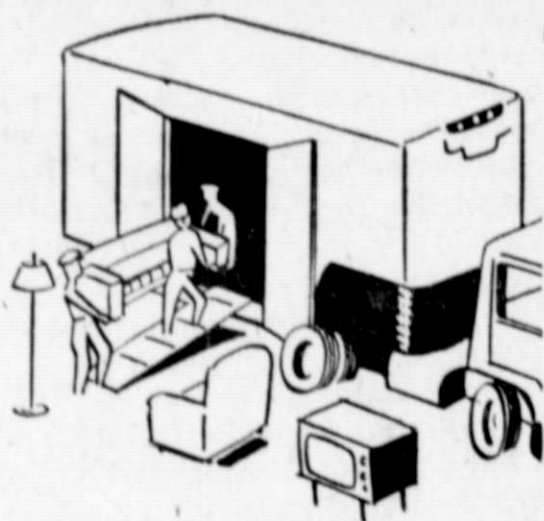

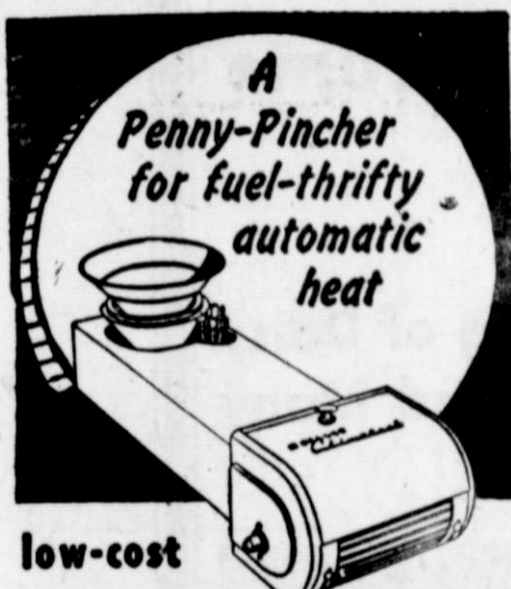

Catholic Charities Drive Opens Sunday

The 1962 Catholic Charities and Seminary Appeal for \$1,200,000 will open in the 286 parishes in the ten counties comprising the Archdiocese of Milwaukee on Sunday, April 1, and will continue until April 15.

The annual campaign raises funds to assist the poor and less fortunate receiving benefits

through the varied charitable establishments in the archdiocese. These include, among other things, homes for children, the aged specialized child care, rehabilitation, medical and hospital care and treatment, family assistance, a complete leisure-time program for youth and instructional facilities for both youth and adult.

The funds collected will also be used to retire the indebtedness incurred in the construction and repair of St. Francis Major Semin-

ary; this work was completed in 1960. In addition, the ground has been broken for the erection of the vitally needed De Sales Preparatory Seminary.

His Excellency William E. Cousins, Archbishop of Milwaukee, in commenting on the need for early training to protect and cultivate the dearly needed vocations recalled for recollection and consideration the following words of St. Vincent de Paul: "No matter how we seek, we shall always discover

ourselves unable to contribute to anything more great than to the making of good priests."

The archbishop will appear on a special television broadcast on WTMJ-TV (Channel 4), at 3:15 p. m. on Sunday, April 1.

Annual Vines For Unusual Beauty

Canary bird vine, moonflower, hearts and honey, balloon vine—aren't these names intriguing? Don't they sound like plants you'd enjoy growing in your garden this year? When you consider that all of them are vines, are annuals and are easy,

quick and inexpensive to grow, the prospect becomes even brighter.

Naturally you won't discard your favorite morning glories or sweet peas, but save a little room along the fence for one of the dainty vines like canary bird or cypress vine and plan to use moonflower, appropriately named because it blooms at night, near your porch or outdoor living room.

There are many other annual vines available to you — all rapid growing, some with large leaves to serve as first-rate screens between your yard and the neighbors', others that tolerate shade so that their flowers will light up your shady spot. One furnishes vegetables as well as flowers, several will fill your house with cut blooms, and one is grown for its unusual seed pods.

The vines for screening include the morning glory, of course, with the satiny white flowers of variety Pearly Gates, the scarlet and cardinal red blooms of Scarlett O'Hara and Cornell, the wine red blooms

of Darling and the popular blue flowers of Flying Saucers and Heavenly Blue Improved.

But they also include the hyacinth bean with its broad leaves and purple to white flowers on stiff stems, the cup-and-saucer vine with rosy-lilac flowers shaped as the name implies, the scarlet runner bean which would be perfectly placed near the kitchen door for you can pick its bright flowers or let them mature and pick its edible beans.

Hearts and honey is related to the morning glories but has smaller flowers that change from pinkish orange to rose pink in a day. It, too, can be used for screening purposes.

To light that shady spot, use either black-eyed-susan vine, which has flowers of white, yellow, buff or orange, each one centered with a dark eye, or canary bird vine with its finely cut leaves and yellow flowers which your imagination may liken to a canary bird.

The sweet pea is without peer as a producer of cut flowers, the hyacinth bean and the scar-

let runner bean also furnish plenty of blossoms that last well in water.

The balloon vine has inconspicuous flowers, but is grown for its inflated seed pods which look like miniature balloons. Children adore them.

Certainly with all these odd and lovely vines from which to choose, your garden this year should intrigue both you and the visitors who come to see it.

ICE BREAKING UP

As this is written, river ice is breaking up and in some places streams are overflowing. Lake ice is still solid in deeper water. However, shore ice is becoming thin, and one should be very careful at the inlet and outlet of any body of water, particularly where there is a current. In fact one fisherman fell thru the ice at the south end of Little Cedar lake over a week ago.

There is a northern pike and walleye season on the Rock river downstream from the Hustisford dam in Dodge, Jefferson and Rock counties, Lake Koshkonong and all waters in Waukesha county. This season will begin on Saturday, March 31.

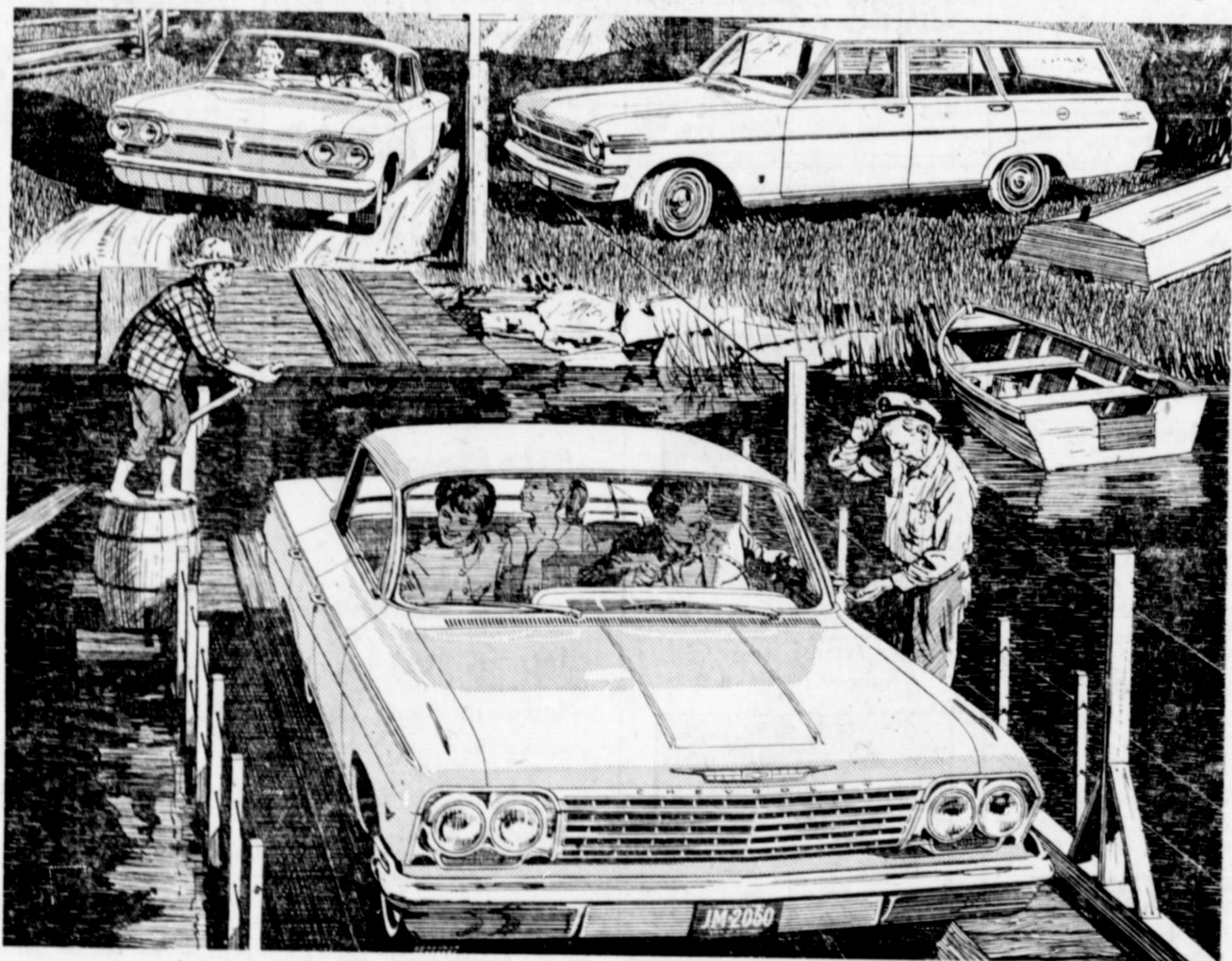
