Dairy Day Event Is Huge Success, Over 2,000 Attend

824 Served Free Dairy Lunch; Joan Hoepner Is Queen

**SCHAEFER, BECKER RECEIVE
CONSERVATION AWARDS;
MANY PRIZES GIVEN**

Kewaskum's fourth annual Dairy Day event held Saturday at the high school was another outstanding success with crowds estimated at over 2,000 persons attending the afternoon and evening programs. The affair was sponsored by the Kewaskum Business association.

Crowds milled about the gymnasium, agriculture rooms and corridor booths all day to view the displays, attend the programs and partake of the free noon dairy lunch. The dairy lunch set a new record for number of persons served, totalling 824 people. The booths opened at 11 a. m. and serving of the luncheon began at 11:30.

Following a concert by the high school band to open the afternoon program, County Agent Maurice Hovland gave a talk. Then the men and women split into their own groups for programs of special interest to each. For the women, the home economics department and FHA girls put on a pre-Easter fashion show and food demonstration.

The men jammed the cafeteria to capacity to hear talks by agriculture experts. Dr. Wayne Bursch professor of veterinarian science at the University of Wisconsin, gave a talk on mastitis. "Dairying in Russia" was the topic of a talk presented by Prof. E. Heizer, dairy scientist at the University of Wisconsin. Both talks were very well received. The awarding of prizes ended the afternoon's activities but many persons remained, came and went steadily to visit the various displays and booths, many of which gave away prizes and souvenirs.

A program by the high school chorus at 7:30 opened the evening festivities, which were attended by another packed house, many of whom had to stand. Walter Wesenberg, Kiwanis club president, next presented the Kiwanis conservation awards to Ray Schaefer and LeRoy Becker, local farmers, for soil practices carried on by them during the year.

Ernie Johnson of the Milwaukee Braves organization and former Braves pitcher, spoke next and was one of the star attractions of the all-day event. Ernie, following his informative, interesting and witty talk, then crowned the Dairy Queen. Joan Hoepner, to provide a suitable climax to the event. Joan received the most pennies in the penny balloting used to determine the winner. Other princesses in the contest were Linda Mueller, Bernadine Fellenz, Claudia Oppermann, Jean Schuppel, Carol Yogerst, Carol Herriges and Caroline Vollmer.

Mother, 2 Daughters Injured in Collision

A Kewaskum mother and her two daughters were injured about 5:55 p. m. last Friday in a two car collision on Hwy. 28, one-half mile east of the village, when autos driven by Mrs. Vaneta Hansen, 30, R. 2, Kewaskum, and Doris Vorpahl, 30, Kewaskum crashed.

Injured were Mrs. Hansen, who suffered cuts and bruises, possible fractures and internal injuries; Sherri Hansen, 9, cuts on the head, possible concussion and bruises, and Cynthia Hansen, 11, cut on head and other injuries. All of the injured were removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance.

According to the police report, the collision occurred when Miss Vorpahl attempted a U-turn on the highway and was struck by the car driven by Mrs. Hansen, who was blinded by the setting sun. Both autos were extensively damaged.

Kenneth Rochwite, 36, R. 1, Kewaskum, was injured Saturday evening when his car left the Wallace Lake road, just east of the N. Trenton school road, and struck a tree.

Woman's Club to Hear Atty. Clyde Schloemer

Degner, Geidel, Merwin Are Re-elected Trustees

All three incumbent trustees of the village of Kewaskum were re-elected at Tuesday's spring election. As was expected a light vote was cast, a total of only 210 ballots being marked.

Incumbents re-elected are Harold Degner, John Geidel and Arvin Merwin. Geidel polled the largest number of votes with 174, while Degner and Merwin both tallied 162 votes each. The two other candidates for office who were defeated by the incumbents were Francis "Booby" Bohn and Charles E. Sparks. Bohn received 57 votes and Sparks 49.

Robert Kroncke, who was unopposed for the office of justice of the peace, was re-elected, receiving 172 votes.

This was the only balloting in the village and therefore the turnout was small, less than one-third of the village voters going to the polls to mark their ballots.

Park stickers are now available for sale at the Mauthe Lake headquarters of the Northern Purchase Unit, Kettle Moraine State Forest.

The annual stickers (covering the period April 1 to Oct. 31) are \$2.00 per year. The daily entry fee is 50c. The daily sticker is enforced from 9:00 a. m. to 10 p. m. at the Mauthe Lake and Long Lake areas.

12:30 noon - 4:30 p. m. week
days and 8 a. m. - 12 noon
Saturday.

New Home Is Damaged in Blast and Fire

A new home under construction in Roseland Heights in the village was extensively damaged in an explosion and fire shortly after 9 a. m. Monday morning. The blast in the basement of the new ranch type home shook the area and brought out the Kewaskum fire department to extinguish the resulting blaze.

Owner of the home which was almost completed but unoccupied, is a Kewaskum High school teacher, Earl Buswell. It is located at 1220 Meadow Lane, on the west side of the village.

The explosion and fire occurred when an excavating contractor's backhoe hooked a temporary underground natural gas service line and tore it loose from the meter in the building basement. The gas then ignited and the ensuing fire, believed to have been caused by the furnace, damaged the basement, floor and walls of the building. Sections of the building were torn loose and shifted from their foundation moorings. The outside of the home was damaged in places and several windows were shattered. Resulting flames caused damage to the basement ceiling and between the walls. Members of the fire department checked the blaze until the Gas company turned off the gas leading into the Buswell home.

Buswell said that the fire was extinguished by the time he arrived, but that no estimate of damage had yet been made. He reported that the building was insured. Buswell said contractors were ready to install brick surfacing on the outside of the building when the mishap occurred.

No one was injured by the incident.

Chevs Beat Menomonee Falls For Lakes 2nd Half Title, 78-62

Open 3-Game Series With Beaver Dam for Grand Championship

FIRST GAME AT BEAVER DAM SATURDAY, SECOND HERE SUNDAY

The Kewaskum Chevrolets won the Land o' Lakes league second half basketball championship Sunday night here by beating Menomonee Falls easily in a playoff game, 78-62. Kewaskum now will meet Beaver Dam, first half finalist, in a best two-out-of-three series for the grand championship.

Beaver Dam and the Chevs tied for first place in the first half (6-0) but the Beavers took the crown by shading Kewaskum in a disputed overtime contest a couple of weeks ago, 84-83. The first game in the championship playoff will be played this Saturday night, April 7, at Beaver Dam. The second contest will be played here the following night, Sunday, April 8. If a third game is necessary it will be played in Kewaskum a week from Saturday, April 14.

An unfortunate accident could put a crimp into Kewaskum's chances against Beaver Dam. Frank Krueger, a regular on the Chev team, last Sunday morning ran his hand into a power saw, requiring 20 stitches. He will be lost for the series with the Beavers, at least in the two games this week end. Although Kewaskum beat Falls without him, his absence may be too much of a loss in the Beaver Dam series.

Kewaskum outscored Menomonee Falls in every quarter to beat them handily in Sunday's playoff. After a close first period the Chevs led 21-18 and then built up a comfortable 45-31 halftime lead by outscoring Falls in the big second stanza 24-13. They then coasted to victory, outpointing the visitors by two points in each of the third and final periods to win by a margin of 16.

Don Meisenheimer was the pacesetter with 21 points, followed by Augie Bilgo with 17 and Tom Larson with 15. The league's leading scorer, Paul Timm, led Falls with 16 points. Kewaskum sank 24 free throws compared to Falls' 13.

Kewaskum and Beaver Dam are well matched and the champion-

ship playoff series between these rivals should be a real humdinger. In three meetings thus far this season the Beavers have copped two, one in tournament play. But it should have been the other way around as the Chevs actually should have won the first half playoff tilt, lost through a scorer's error.

Harlem Diplomats Treat Basketball Fans to Real Show
