Farmer Is Burned When Tractor Catches Fire

The Kewaskum fire department answered two rural calls during the week on successive days.

At 4:15 p. m. Tuesday the firemen were summoned to the Ed Gutschenritter farm in the town of Kewaskum, several miles southeast of the village, when a tractor caught fire. Gutschenritter's son, Vincent, reported that he had filled the tractor with gasoline and when he turned on the ignition to start the vehicle it burst into flames.

In attempting to put out the blaze, Vincent got too close to the flames and his clothing caught fire. He suffered bad burns on his arm and body. The injured man was given first aid on the scene by a member of the fire department rescue squad and then taken to a physician's office for treatment of his burns. The tractor was damaged in the fire, which was extinguished by the firemen.

Early Wednesday afternoon the firemen made a run to the R. Charles Weier rural home in the town of Wayne, several miles southwest of Kewaskum. Mrs. Weier was burning paper in a rubbish burner and the grass around it caught fire. The flames spread to a nearby shed, burning a small

County Clamps Down on Young Drivers to Reduce Drinking Violations

VIOLATORS, 18 TO 25, FACE STIFF CHECKS, IMMEDIATE \$200 BONDING OR JAIL

In action taken to reduce traffic accidents among drinking young people and to discourage young people from surrounding counties and metropolitan areas from disregarding or flagrantly violating traffic laws in Washington county, Judge Robert J. Stoltz of Branch 2, county court, the past week issued a directive aimed at reducing such offenses.

This move was made, Judge Stoltz stated, because accidents and traffic violations involving young people are showing an alarming increase in Washington county. Copies of the directive were sent to all traffic and law enforcement agencies in the county, including the county sheriff, county court officer of Wisconsin state patrol, and court officers of the various municipalities in the county.

Judge Stoltz's directive, particularly aimed at preventing traffic violations which result when young people have been drinking, sent to all law enforcement agencies states as follows:

"Because of what apparently is becoming an increasing problem in Washington county, you are hereby advised that effective April 13, and until further notice, the Uniform Bond Schedule acceptable to the county courts of Washington county is hereby revised so as to provide that:

"In all cases of alleged moving traffic violations, where the defendant is between the ages of 18 and 25, the arresting officer is to interrogate the alleged violator, as to his whereabouts during the two hours immediately preceding the alleged violation; and, if the officer should have reason to believe that during that two-hour period, the alleged violator has done any drinking of intoxicating liquors, or, has been in any minor bar, or any other place where intoxicating liquors are sold, then he shall require the immediate posting of a bond in the sum of \$200.00, or hold the alleged violator (in the county jail) until the next hour thereafter that court convenes.

"I do not intend hereby to revoke the discretion to be used by officers in exceptional cases and in the light of exceptional and unusual facts.

"I am not concerned with the driver who can and does drink in such a way that such drinking, clearly, does not affect his driving habits. However, I am concerned with the combination of a consumption of liquor together with a possibly resulting moving traffic violation.

"Since this directive is aimed at preventing traffic violations, it should be given as much publicity as possible. I expect you to immediately transmit this notice to all law enforcement officers working in Washington county."

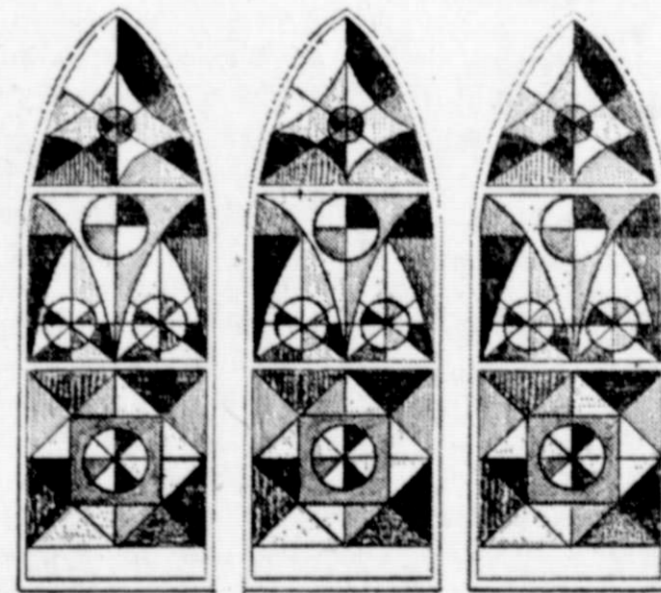

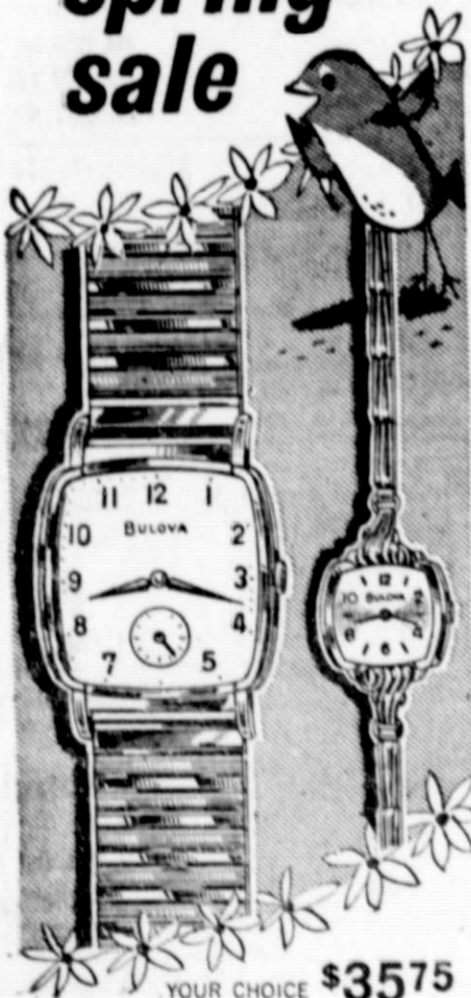

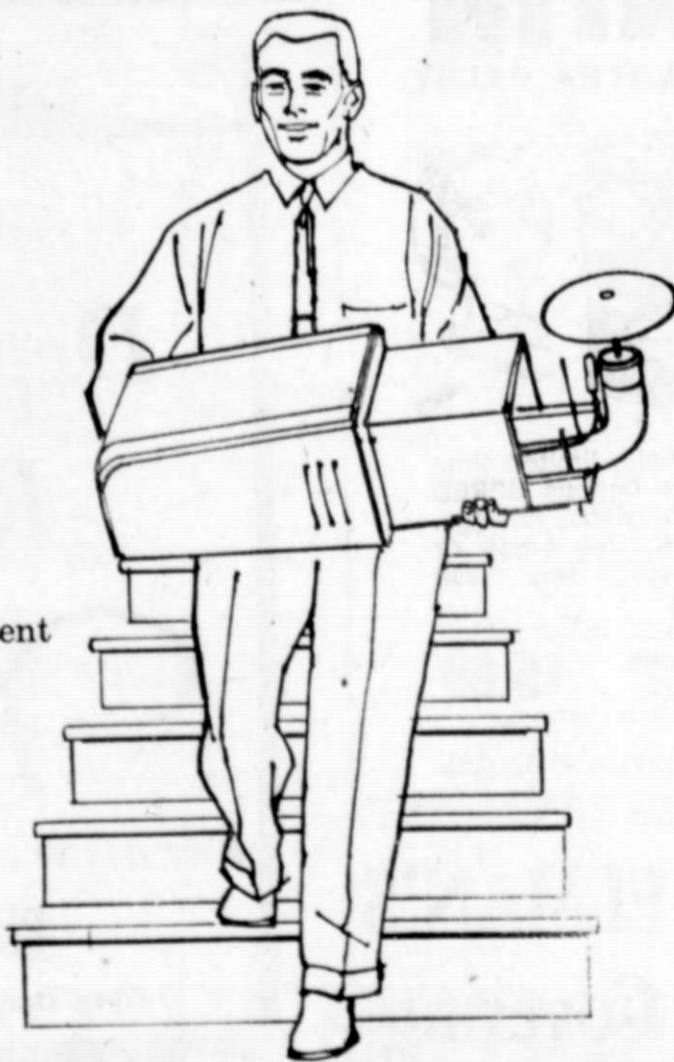

Kewaskum Chevrolets Grand Champions of Lakes League

Whip Beaver Dam In First 2 Games of Playoff for Crown

Hail to the champions! The Kewaskum Chevrolets are the new champions of the Land o' Lakes basketball league as the result of two victories over Beaver Dam over the week end in a best two-out-of-three playoff series. The Chevs needed only two games to dethrone last year's titlists, whipping them by a surprising, decisive margin at Beaver Dam Saturday night, 86-64, and repeating the win here Sunday night, but by a closer 82-75 score.

This is Kewaskum's first championship in three years, after a former long reign during which the Chevs won seven basketball titles in a nine-year period. The team completed its season with an overall record of 15-2 in Lakes play.

During the campaign the Chevs and Beaver Dam had 6-0 records in the first half of play but the Beavers nosed out Kewaskum by one point in a make-up playoff overtime game to take the first half title. The Chevs tied Menomonee Falls for the second half title (6-1) but beat them in playoff to cop second half crown. This set up the playoff series between the Beavers and Chevs for the grand championship.

The champions will receive a trophy and awards at a league banquet to be held at a later date. The team's sponsor, Kilian Honeck, treated the team and their wives to a victory celebration after the game Sunday. With the playoffs and all, it has been a long season since last November for the Chevs, but a very successful one that has now finally ended.

Not to be denied, Kewaskum was a determined, better organized team than Beaver Dam there Saturday night. The Beavers took a 19-17 lead at the quarter but after the Chevs got the feel of the floor they outscored Beaver Dam in every period after that, continuing to expand their advantage to win easily by a lopsided margin, 86-64. The Chevs outpointed their opponents in the second quarter, 22-12 to take a 39-31 halftime advantage. They also outscored the Beavers in the third stanza, 24-21, and in the final quarter, 23-12.

Free throws made a big difference in the score, Kewaskum sinking 26 while Beaver Dam made only 12. Five members of the Kewaskum team scored in double figures, led by young and fastly improving Otto Ramthun, who had his best game of the year with 21 points: Don Meisenheimer scored 19, Augie Bilgo 16, Tom Larson 15 and Al Tenneis 11. Peterson, with 19 points, and Stephens with 12 paced the Beavers.

Sunday's return encounter here was far closer. Strangely the Chevs always seem to win easier at Beaver Dam on the Beavers' own floor than they do at home. The contests here almost always are very close and hard fought. The Chevs went right to work to take a 19-10 lead in the first quarter. But they tapered off badly in the second period to be outscored by the Beavers, 24-15, to knot the score at the intermission, 34-34. In a closely fought third quarter, Beaver Dam got slightly the best of it, making 24 points to the Chevs' 23. This gave the visitors a 58-57 lead. But Kewas-

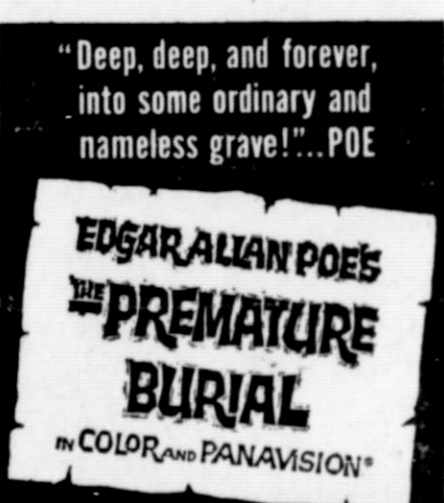
kum came through like the champions they are with 25 points in the final stanza, while holding the Beavers to 17, to win by a 7-point margin.

In the last quarter Beaver Dam came within two points of the Chevs with about 6 minutes to play. A tip-in by Meisenheimer, pivot shot by Ramthun, who was a hawk on rebounds, and two free throws by Bilgo gave Kewaskum a 73-63 cushion with less than 4 minutes to play. Meisenheimer scored two more rebound shots before the Beavers began to peck away at a 77-66 deficit by applying a press. Peterson's side push shot finally again brought the Beavers very close to Kewaskum with less than a minute left. The Chevs went into a stall that was more effective than the Beavers' press and caused them to foul in an attempt to gain possession of the ball. Kewaskum flipped in four free throws, the last two by Bilgo with six seconds left to give his team an 82-77 win. Helping Beaver Dam to narrow the gap in the closing minutes were a number of missed free throws by the Chevs but when the chips were down they sank four in the last 38 seconds of play.

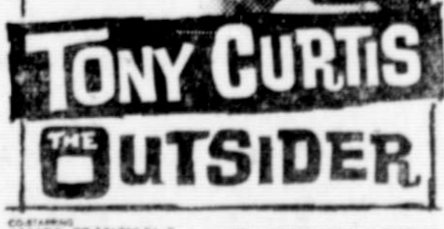
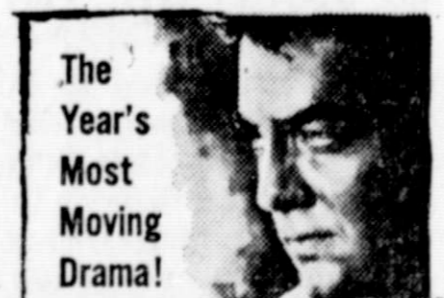

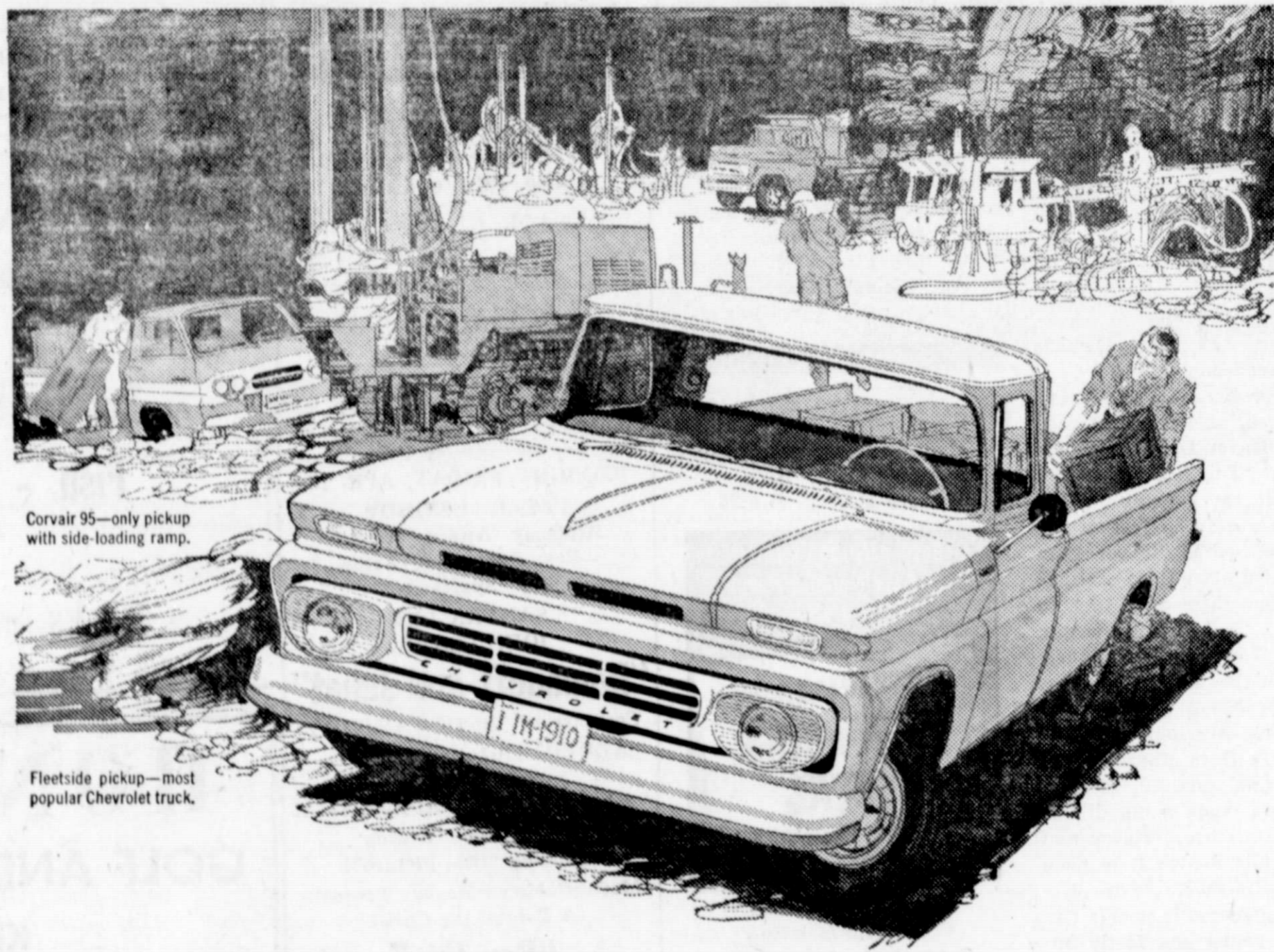
