Official Golf Opening at Hon-E-Kor Club Saturday

Tee-Off Dinner To Open Season; Greens Excellent

Kewaskum's beautiful new Hon-E-Kor Golf and Country club will have its official golf opening this Saturday, April 28. A Tee-Off dinner has been arranged as part of the opening day events.

Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert "Bud" Korth are managers of the semi-private club located on Kewaskum's southeast side. The nine-hole course is designed eventually for 18 holes.

All of the greens will be in excellent condition for opening day, Moe Mariucci, groundskeeper, said. More warm weather and rain will further improve the appearance of the remainder of the course. Tom Larson, the club pro, has begun his duties and is giving daily golf lessons. An eighth grade teacher in the Kewaskum public schools, he is a graduate of Superior State college and gained much of his golfing knowledge as an understudy of Joe Kuta.

Club officers this year include: Willard Bartelt, president; Clayton Stautz, vice-president; Albert M. Hron, Jr., secretary, and Ralph Marx, treasurer. The board of directors includes the four officers, plus Charles Sparks, George Fassbinder and Bud Korth.

Officers of the women's general committee are Audrey Bartelt, president; Doris Pomahac, vice-president; LaVerne Hron, secretary, and Janet Koch, treasurer. On the board are Eleanor Marx and Marge Althaus. Some of the men's and women's officers are from West Bend.

The beautiful clubhouse has been open for the past year but opening of the course was delayed until this spring. Included in the men's golf program will be a Tuesday Nite Men's league, from May 15 through Sept. 25, open to members. The Korths announce that the Men's league is just about filled up. Thursday will be men's day from May 3 through Sept. 27. The course will be restricted to men members and their guests after 12 noon. A member's guest will be charged \$1.25 for nine holes of golf—\$2 for 18 holes.

Regular ladies' day activities start on Wednesday, May 16, with a dinner and meeting at 7 p. m. The following Wednesday, May 23, will be the first "golf-luncheon-cards" date. Fourteen of these Wednesday "golf-luncheon-cards" events will be held during the season. There will also be a ladies' tournament, luncheon and cards on Aug. 22 and dinner-meeting-cards on Sept. 19.

Other social events after Saturday's Tee-Off dinner include a flag tournament Sunday, Apr. 29; mixed two ball foursome and dinner Memorial Day, May 30; mixed two ball foursome and dinner Saturday, June 16; flag tournament and family outdoor bar-

Schoofs, employed by his father, had parked the truck in front of Ramthun's hardware store while he carried milk to the rear. Upon coming back he saw two unknown men jump into his truck and drive away before he could stop them. He notified Chief of Police Brandt. Sunday afternoon Milwaukee police received a call from a man who said there was a man dumping milk from a truck into the street. When a squad car arrived the truck was gone. The truck was recovered Monday when, abandoned and milkless, it was found by an officer at 1332 N. Astor st.

An alarm of fire was sounded in the village early Tuesday morning when a milk truck owned by Dorwin Perkins started to burn while parked at the rear of his home on Main st. Mr. Perkins was getting ready to make his regular trip to Chicago and had left the engine running while he went into the house for breakfast. 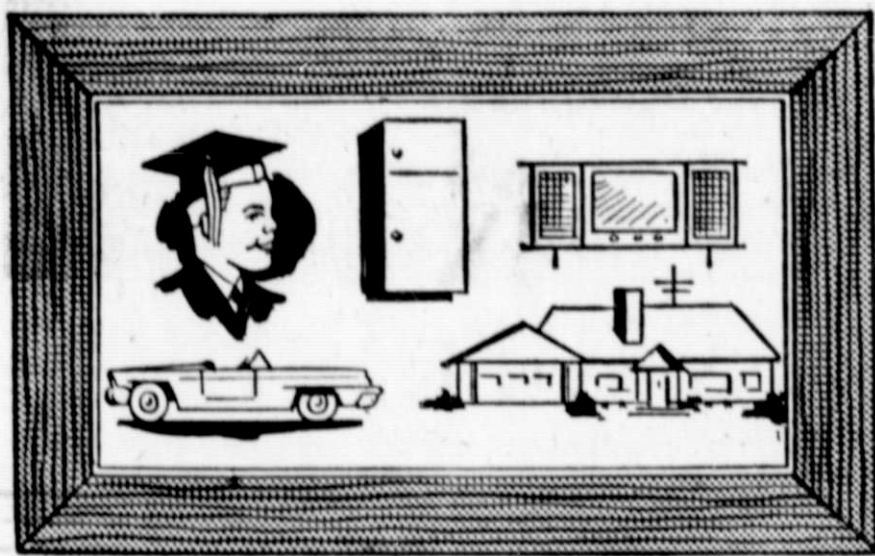

Workers Burned in Explosion and Fire

Two men were badly burned on Saturday in an explosion and fire at the Al Schladweiler repair shop in Silver Creek in Sheboygan county. Schladweiler, 40, was taken to St. Nicholas hospital, Sheboygan, for treatment while Lester Puestow, 37, Cedarburg, was taken to the burn center at St. Mary's hospital, Milwaukee.

According to reports, the two were working on a propane gas tractor when the explosion occurred, blowing the roof off the building. The blast and ensuing fire is believed to have occurred when a spark from a welding tool ignited fumes.

Damage to the building and shop was estimated at approximately \$45,000.



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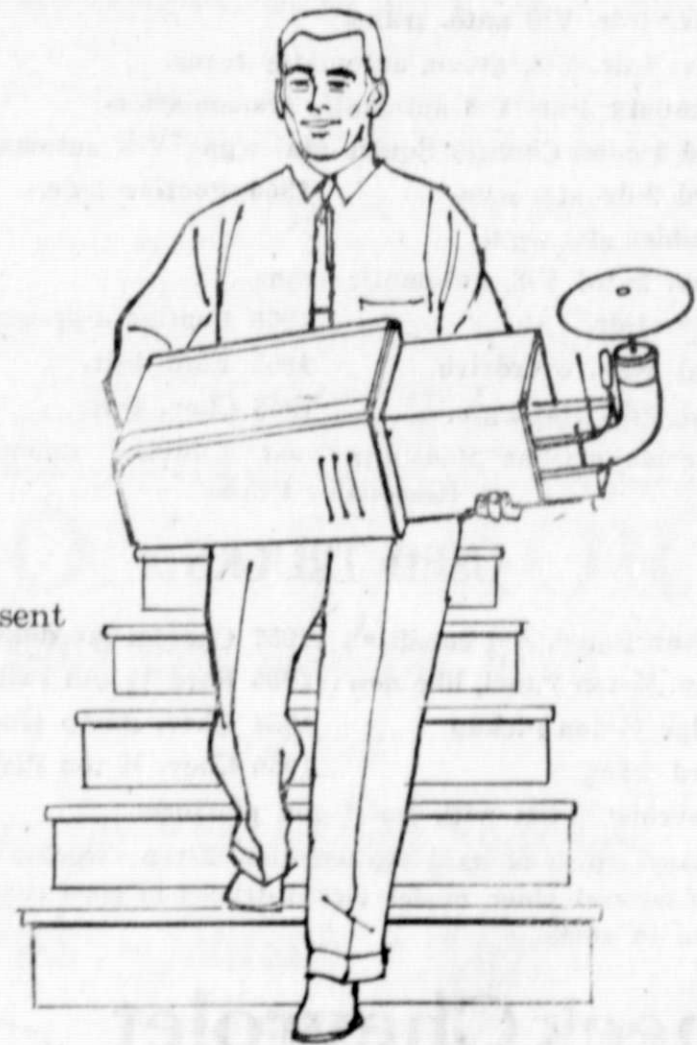

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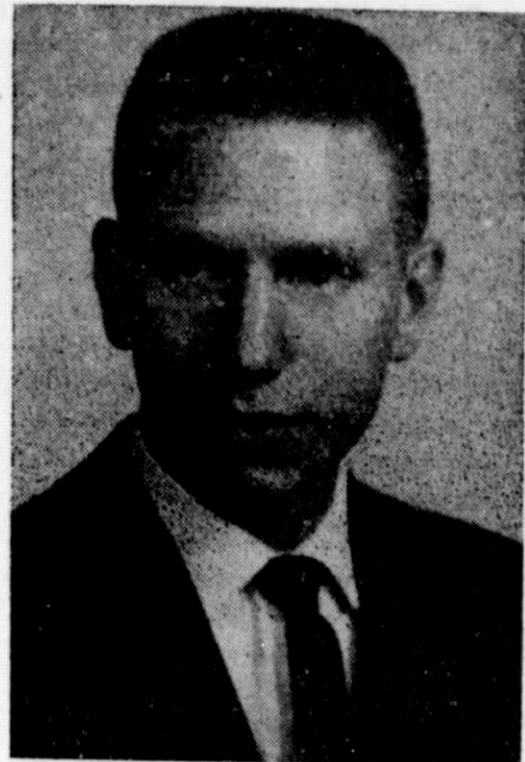

This week Kewaskum played a non-conference game at Cedar Grove and opened the Scenic Moraine season at Campbellsport Thursday. The results will follow.



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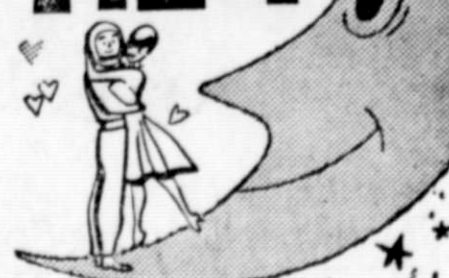

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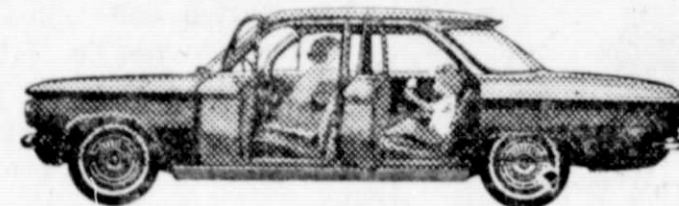
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
