Tee-Off Dinner To Open Season; **Greens Excellent**

Kewaskum's beautiful new Hon-E-Kor Golf and Country club will have its official golf opening this Saturday, April 28. A Tee-Off dinner has been arranged as part of the opening day events.

Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert "Bud' Korth are managers of the semiprivate club located on Kewaskum's southeast side. The ninehole course is designed eventually for 18 holes.
