## E. "Mike" Gnacinski Receives Silver Beaver Citation, Highest Award in Scouting Leadership

On Tuesday, May 15, at Waupun, the Badger Council of Boy Scouts held their annual dinner and award night. Scoutmaster E. "Mike" Gnacinski of Kewaskum received the Silver Beaver, the highest award a volunteer worker in Scouting may receive. Joe Rodenkirch of Fond du Lac also received the Silver Beaver.

L. N. Peterson, Kewaskum, read the following "citation" before presenting the award to Gnacinski:

"I am happy to be able to read this citation for a fine Scouter, father and outdoorsman. He has been active in the program of Scouting for many years and has earned the rank of Eagle Scout. He is a lover of camp life and the out-of-doors. His hobbies are many and include camping, fishing, golfing and hunting and very often some of his Scouts can be found accompanying him on these nature outings. He has also been found in summer camp with his Troop for a week of camping at Shaginappi.

"His interest is wide for a background in Scouting leadership and he has earned the Scouter's Key training award for adult Unit Leaders. He has also attended the Woodbadge Training and proudly wears the Woodbadge beads. This Scouter has been active as a leader of boys since 1946 when he became an assistant Scoutmaster. He took over as Scoutmaster in 1947 and still serves in this capacity to date. He has taken part in regional and national training courses in 1950, 1951 and 1953. He participated in the Regional Wampum Conference in 1959 and the Region 7 Hoe Down in 1948. His service spread as he became the Assistant Scoutmaster for the 1950 Valley Forge Jamboree Troop.

"This Scouter is a Vigil member of the Order of the Arrow. He is an active member of the Holy Name society of Holy Trinity church. He has worked diligently with all recipients of the Ad Altare Dei religious award in his area and is an active member of the Volunteer Fire Department and of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post of Williams Bay. He enlisted in the U. S. Marine Corp in 1943 and took part in the war in the Pacific as a member of the 'Carlson Raiders' of the 5th Marine Division, 28th Co., better known as the 'Flag Raisers on Iwo Jima.' He is a holder of the Purple Heart.

"In addition to being employed at Regal Ware, Inc., he is a district agent for the Modern Woodman of America Insurance Company and is secretary of Local Camp 2233.

"He really lives Scouting, not only away from home, but at home as well. His wife Jeanette has been a Girl Scout leader for years, his daughter Linda is a first class Scout and holder of the Marian Award for Catholic Girl Scouts, and no doubt the greatest thrill he ever had in Scouting came last October when he pinned the Cub Scout pin on his son James.

## Arrest 3 Milwaukee Youths for Molesting Local Girl on Street

Three Milwaukee young men charged with disorderly conduct for molesting an 18-year-old Kewaskum girl on a local street Sunday night were brought into court at the municipal building here Tuesday afternoon to appear before Judge Robert Stoltz of Branch 2 of county court and were given stiff fines.

The young men arrested were Richard S. Wiczorek, 20, 3539 N. 49th st., Frederick Albrecht, 20, 3715 N. 100th st. and Dennis Pfeil, 19, 4476 N. 76th st.

The offense took place at 8:20 p. m. according to the report of the officer on duty, Marriner Frank. The 18-year-old girl's complaint stated that she was walking west on Main st. when a car drove up alongside of her and one of three men in the auto came up to her and told her to accompany them, stating that they wouldn't harm her. The girl said she asked them to leave and started walking toward the police station a short distance away. When she reached the front of the Rempel Mfg. Co. plant the car again pulled alongside and the same young man got out and attempted to get her to go along. When she tried to leave he grabbed her by the arm and wouldn't let go. She struck him with her hand and the youth immediately struck her back, knocking her to the pavement.

He then returned to the car and as the trio drove away the girl obtained the license number. A check later revealed that the license had been issued to Pfeil. The young lady stated that she could positively identify her assailant and would be glad to do so. Pfeil was located later at his home in Milwaukee and ordered to appear with his companions at the local police department at 8 p. m. Monday for questioning.

Albrecht, who committed the offense, was fined \$100 and costs in court Tuesday. Pfeil, the owner of the car and Wiczorek, who was driving Pfeil's auto, were given lesser fines of \$25 and costs. All three of the young men admitted that they had been drinking prior to the incident. In fining the men, Judge Stoltz told them Washington county will not tolerate having our girls molested or assaulted. He then proceeded to assess the fines.

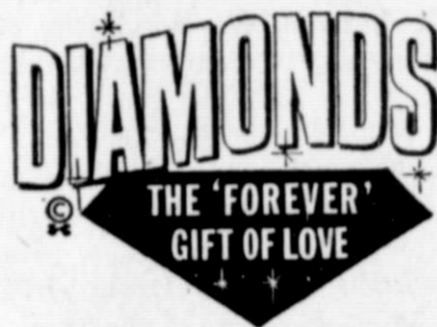

### NO STICKER REQUIRED AT LIZARD MOUND PARK

Due to weather conditions the past week end fishing was slow. A few northerns taken on the Milwaukee river. Perch fishing should pick up as the weather warms. Crapples starting to hit at Friess lake and a few bass taken at Lake Five. Fishing fair for northern at Big and Little Cedar lakes.

The car kill of deer is mounting. One was killed on Highway 57 about a mile north of Saukville, another, on US 45 north of Kewaskum and the third on US 41 just south of Allenton.

Admission stickers will not be required in the following state parks: Astalan, Copper Culture, Cushing Memorial, First Capitol, Lizard Mound, Lost Dauphin, Oibwa, New Glarus Woods and Old Wade House.

Stop and think before you dump those unused minnows overboard. If you can't save them for your

next fishing trip, take them home for the cat. If you have no cat, bury them in your garden because minnows make wonderful fertilizer.

Why? Dumping minnows overboard always runs the risk of introducing exotic or undesired fish. Lakes poisoned and stocked with trout can be spoiled quickly by competing minnows. How serious it would be to stock carp in a nice clear lake from the innocent contents of a minnow bucket!

Don't forget that stocking fish without a permit is illegal. It is also illegal to transport alive, rough fish such as carp, dogfish, garfish, lawyers or eelpout, lamprey eels and smelt.

A squirrel nesting box that will take the place of a large den tree, be easy to build, and will resist shotgun pellets, may be worth up to \$500.00 to the man who designs it. Rules for the nesting box competition may be obtained from: Frederick Chapter, Maryland IWLAW, Box 561, Frederick, Maryland.

Material may not be removed from the bed of a Wisconsin lake unless a contract is obtained from the state through the Public Service Commission.

Many inquiries are coming in regarding the snagging of fish. The 1962 fishing regulations under general fishing restrictions lists the following: (It is unlawful: To possess or use any snag hook, snag line or snag pole. To take fish by snagging or fouling with any hook).

It is the responsibility of the boat rental agency to see that the craft is registered, the numbers placed on the bow and that the certificate of registration is aboard the boat when operated by an

outboard motor. It is the responsibility of the individual riding in the boat to have on board his or her life preserver.

## ARE YOU MISSING OUT ON SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS?

Residents of the Kewaskum area may lose hundreds of dollars in Social Security benefits if they do not file an application. The people who stand to lose these benefits are still working and past the age of 65.

K. A. Albrecht, district manager of the Milwaukee Social Security office said today that many of these people may still be under the impression that earnings of over \$1,200 per year would cause them to lose their benefits. Mr. Albrecht pointed out that changes to the social security law this last summer make it possible in some

cases for a family to receive some benefits even though the worker has yearly earnings of as much as \$4497.

Mr. Albrecht urges residents of this area who are 65 years of age and over who are working and have not filed an application for Social Security benefits to contact the local social security office.

The social security office in Milwaukee will be glad to advise you of your rights. The office is located at 342 North Water st., Milwaukee 2. If you care to call that office the number is Broadway 2-8221. There is a local security representative in West Bend on the first three Thursdays of each month. The office is located in the basement of the library and the hours are 10:00 a. m. to 12:30 p. m.

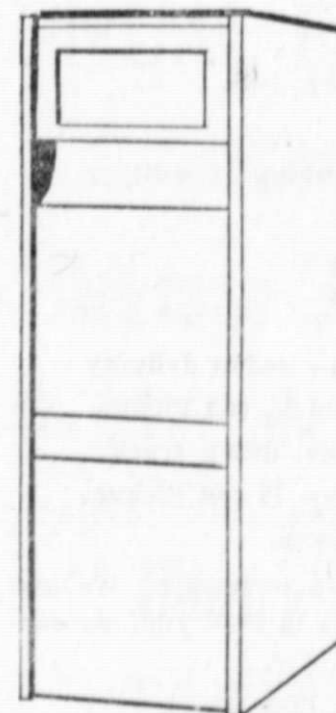

### ANNUAL RURAL MAILBOX IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

The week of May 21-26, has been designated Mailbox Improvement Week it was announced this week by Postmaster Harry E. Koch. Mailboxes on rural routes are to receive attention during this period.

Patrons are requested to furnish mail receptacles which are convenient and safe to use, neat appearing, and protect the mail. Boxes that are properly erected and maintained contribute to efficient, speedy delivery of mail.

Rural patrons are required to provide mailboxes of the standard approved type. Patrons who are still using boxes of the top-opening type should not be required to discard them, provided they have been continuously in use by the

same owner and at the same location for many years, they are kept in good serviceable condition, and can be easily served by the carrier from his vehicle.

Names of the owners should be shown on the side of the box visible to the carrier as he approaches, or on the door if boxes are grouped. The box number may be shown on the box. Boxes and supports should be kept painted. Rural patrons are to group boxes where practicable, particularly where turnouts can be provided.

Postmaster Koch further states that boxes that are not properly

installed or kept in good serviceable condition retard the delivery of mail and may expose it to the weather. Unserviceable boxes must be replaced. It is hoped that all rural patrons will check their mail boxes and make improvement where necessary.

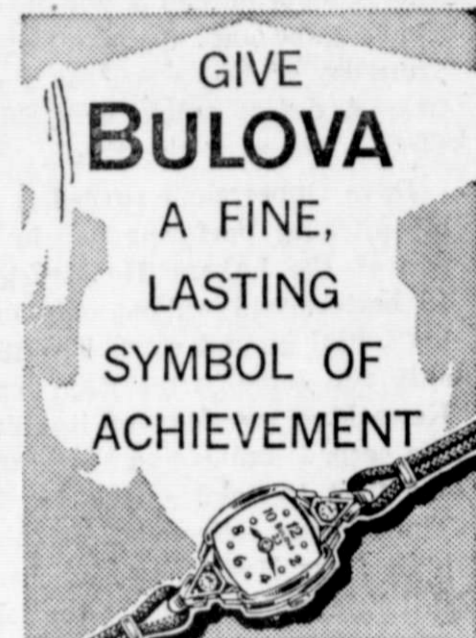
