## 94 Seniors Will Graduate at High School Exercises June 6

### Class Is Largest Ever to Graduate From High School

38 8TH GRADE GRADUATES WILL ALSO RECEIVE DIPLOMAS

Ninety-four members of the 1962 senior class of Kewaskum Community High school will receive their diplomas at exercises to be held in the school auditorium on Wednesday evening, June 6, at 8 o'clock. The class of 94 outnumbers last year's class of 71 graduates by 23 students and is the largest ever to graduate from the high school.

Allan Rinzel, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edmund Rinzel of R. 1, Kewaskum, is valedictorian of the class. His average for the four years is 96.90. Dona Mueller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Mueller of R. 1, Fredonia, is the salutatorian with an average of 94.31. The valedictorian will speak on "The Time and the Challenge," while the salutatorian's topic will be "A Gate Closes" at the commencement program.

The annual class banquet for the seniors and faculty members was held at the Holy Trinity church hall on Thursday evening, May 24. The annual class trip to Chicago was held on Friday, May 4. Details on these affairs appeared in earlier issues.

## Direct Mail Phase of Cancer Drive Underway

LETTERS SENT OUT TO ALL HOMES NOT CONTACTED BY 'NEIGHBOR' CAMPAIGN

The direct mail phase of the Washington county unit of the American Cancer society's campaign to rural residents of the county is underway this week with letters sent to all homes not contacted by the community "Neighbor to Neighbor" campaign.

D. J. Kenny, Washington county unit chairman, and campaign chairman, Richard C. Klein, report that all direct appeal letters were in the mail to county residents on Tuesday.

In the town of Germantown this year a "Neighbor to Neighbor" campaign will be scheduled for the first time under the co-chairmanship of Mrs. Harold Schaezel and Mrs. Art Schaezel. The Germantown campaign will be similar to those conducted in West Bend, Hartford and Kewaskum, with envelopes containing cancer information and contribution requests passed from home to home.

Recognizing that cancer has often struck its deadly blow within the past year in Washington county, the chairmen are emphasizing the fact that cancer plays no favorites. They ask for a generous response to the campaign plea.

"Neighbor to Neighbor" packets are now circulating in each city block of Kewaskum and West Bend. The chairmen urge residents to read the advice offered in the educational leaflets contained by the envelopes and continue to pass the packet around the block.

The county unit expects to complete its entire campaign by June 30. Persons on the unit mailing list are urged to mail their contributions promptly and full cooperation is asked in passing the "Neighbor to Neighbor" envelopes around city blocks.
