Dr. Wesenberg of Kewaskum was among 82 candidates receiving their MD degrees at the ceremonies. Following the commencement exercises, relatives of Dr. and Mrs. Wesenberg were entertained at the Cuba club, Madison, as guests of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Wesenberg.

Dr. Wesenberg graduated as valedictorian of the class of 1955 at Kewaskum High school. As an undergraduate at the UW, he became a member of Phi Eta Sigma and Phi Kappa Phi, honorary fraternities, and received sophomore and senior honors. He was awarded his bachelor of science degree in 1959 at the UW. In medical school, he was elected to membership in Sigma Sigma and Alpha Omega.

Nettesheim, 47, of R. 2, Germantown, at the north end of the overhead bridge at the junction of Hwy. 45 and CTH V beyond the north village limits.

The young lady was driving to work at Gehl Mfg. Co. in West Bend and had stopped for the arterial. She made a right turn into the northbound lane on Hwy. 45 and struck the approaching truck head-on.

The girl was taken to the hospital in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance and received surgery. The front end of the Kudek vehicle was severely damaged and the truck also was damaged some.

## Local Student Winner In Time Magazine Test

## TOWER HILL STATE PARK

Did you ever hear of a "shot tower shaft?"

Well, it's a 200-foot hole, dug by hand through rock over a hundred years ago, and used for producing lead shot. A tunnel below was filled with spring water, and melted lead dropped down this 200-foot shaft, came out below, cool and hardened, in perfectly shaped balls.

Over 5,000 shot of various sizes were turned out per day, weighed, sacked and shipped by steamboat on the Wisconsin River to all parts of the nation. Lead from nearby mines was hauled by ox-team to the smelter at the top of the hill where it was melted and dropped.

The site of this pioneer industry is located in Iowa county along the Wisconsin River just south of U. S. 14, near Spring Green. The visit is quite a treat, especially if you have children interested in following trails along wooded bluffs that provide a grand sight of the Wisconsin River.

### Look Down; Look Up

It is even more exciting when these trails lead to the top of the bluff where you can look down into this 200-foot shot tower shaft and note a little streak of light in

the tunnel below. After a little insistence from your small fry, it is obvious that in a short while—after many steps—you will be down below, in the tunnel, looking up at the sky through the shaft!

In addition to its interesting historic significance, the 108 acres of Tower Hill State Park include large picnic area, playfield, family camping grounds, boat launching site, hiking trails, shelter area, well water, and several lookout points along the rocky ledges. A concession stand is available.

It was in 1831 that residents of the now deserted village of Helena dug out the shot tower shaft through rock, largely by hand, using mining tools of that day. Work was interrupted during the Black Hawk War (1832) while the houses in Helena were torn down and their logs used to raft soldiers across the Wisconsin River.

For 30 years the shot making industry prospered until 1861 when the scarcity of gold, demanded in payment for lead, made operation impossible. The men departed for the Civil War, and only a hillside cemetery of worn headstones dating back to 1829 remains of Helena.

## 25 Years Ago

Donald, 6-months-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Nic Kirst, town of Wayne, residing between Kohlsville and Wayne Center, was fatally burned in his baby buggy about 8:30 a. m. Tuesday when the blankets evidently caught fire from a nearby stove in the home. At the time Mr. Kirst was at work in a field and Mrs. Kirst was working in the barn. Screams from the other Kirst children were unheard by the parents but a neighbor, Oscar Griepentrog, heard the cries and dashed to the nearby home. He snatched the baby from the buggy and then pulled the buggy outside. The blankets and buggy were destroyed. Griepentrog first notified the parents and then ran to the home of Oscar Bachman and phoned a Kewaskum physician. The doctor found that he arrived too late as the infant was fatally burned.

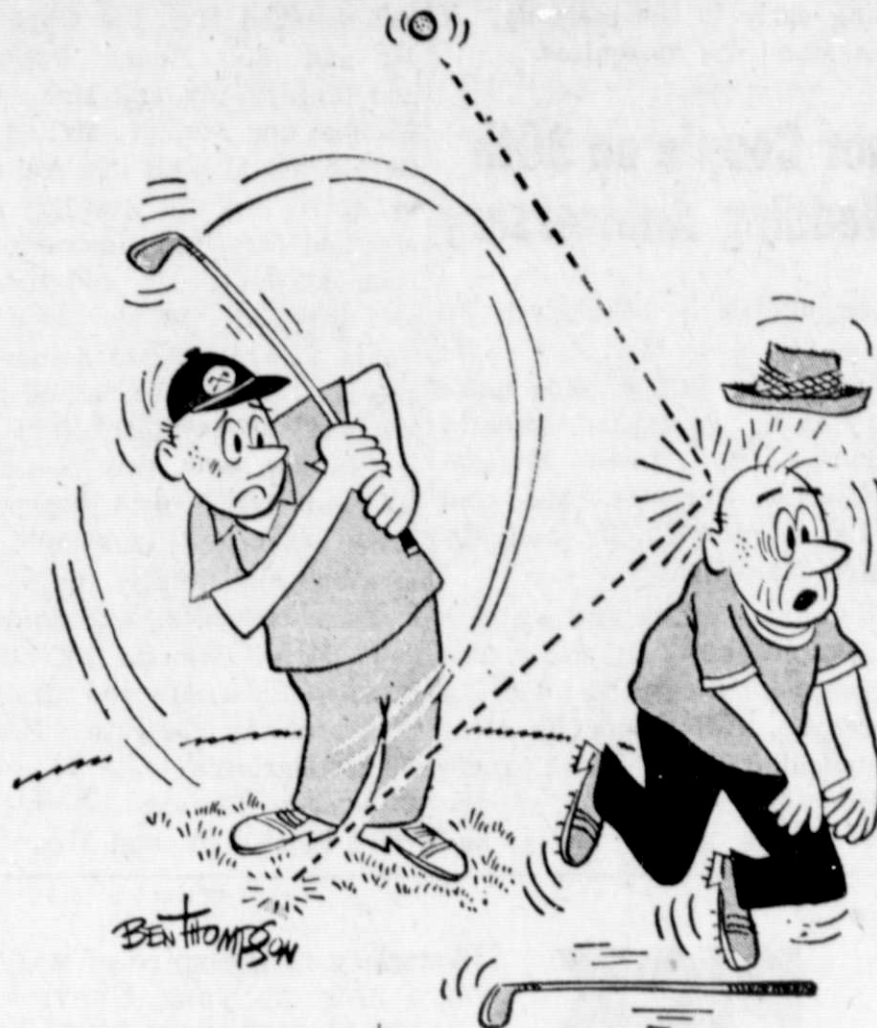

You are never too old to take up the game of golf, since we have a young man by the name of Hubert Wittman, age 70, who has taken up the game of golf this year, and is progressing rapidly as his instructor and pro, Al Hron, Sr., is teaching him some of the fine points of the game. A ball hit into a sand trap cannot be touched while addressing the ball, and neither should you touch the sand in front or behind the ball. The club head should be held directly above the ball and the sand hit about an inch or two behind the ball when swinging the club, and if you are lucky the ball should pop out of the trap onto the green. That is why it is very important to rake the traps after you leave, to remove your foot prints, since if the next golfer to go into the trap finds his ball in a deep foot print, he will

## Golf Tips

### UPHILL LIE

Take a practice swing to estimate where club will touch ground. Use a less lofted club than you would normally use. Keep weight balanced between feet. Play ball forward of center. Swing with slope. Aim to right to compensate for probable hook.

### Standard distance chart:

Yards 115—iron 9, yards 125—iron 8, yards 135—iron 7, yards 145—iron 6, yards 155—iron 5, yards 165—iron 4, yards 175—iron 3, yards—185—iron 2.

## TWO DEER KILLED NEAR KEWASKUM

Fishing is generally slow in both Ozaukee and Washington counties. Due to the cool weather of the past week, few people were fishing. Fishermen on the breakwater at Port Washington were coming in with small catches of perch. Crappies have been biting at Friess lake, some perch at Pike lake, an occasional northern at Big Cedar.

Individuals who purchase boats that have been registered with the Wisconsin Conservation Department must send in the certificate of registration and request that a new certificate be issued with their name on it.

A coast guard approved life jacket or cushion for each person aboard a boat must be carried thereon when the boat is in operation. This means all boats.

A deer was killed on US Hwy. 45 about 1 1/2 miles south of Kewaskum at 2:30 a. m. the morning of the 23rd, another was reported hit on Highway 28 west of Kewaskum. The animal was never found, evidently it had enough strength to escape to the woods

The Electric company at Port Washington reported a deer breaking its neck when it ran into the fence on their property early Monday morning. A buck deer was killed on Hwy. 57 just north of the Fredonia crossing Sunday morning.
