

There are two distinct forms of crabgrass, both equally destructive to lawns: smooth, wide leaf crabgrass and large, hairy crabgrass. Chemicals are available to kill both easily.

Do you remember when laboriously weeding out crabgrass plants so that the desirable grasses could have a chance to grow was a regular summer pastime? This chore made time pass

All right, but was hardly enjoyable. Nowadays, killing crabgrass is as easy as walking across the lawn pushing a fertilizer spreader, because that's the tool that applies crabgrass - killing themicals.

There are two different types of these: postemergence, those that kill the mature or maturing crabgrass plants, and preemergence, those that kill

emerging crabgrass seedlings. While it is possible to use the first type when you see crabgrass starting to take over your lawn, it is much more sensible and easier on the grass to use the latter type.

Timing of application is of utmost importance. Preemergence crabgrass killers are called that because they are applied to the lawn BEFORE the crabgrass seeds sprout. They form a barrier layer which kills the seedlings as they come up.

They may be put on the lawn any time up to whenever apple blossoms bloom in your area-after that it's too late. By a week or so later crabgrass seedlings are too large to be stopped by a preemergence killer.

Chemicals used for preemergence crabgrass control are of many kinds and with many different characteristics. The thing they have in common is

ease of application. They differ in three regards: 1. Their toxicity to humans and animals. Some contain ar-senicals so children and pets

must be kept off the treated area for a week or so after application. Others are harmless except to crabgrass.

2. Their effect on grass seed planted at or near the same time as the killer is applied At least one manufacturer says that seeds can be sown immediately after applying this particular brand of control. Other manufacturers say that 8 weeks must elapse after applying their crabgrass controls before grass seed may be sown and will grow.

3. The price it costs to apply a given brand of crabgrass controls to a given area of lawn.

Your local garden supply dealer probably carries several brands of preemergence crabgrass controls. Visit him and ask to see which he has to offer. Then take the time to read the labels and compare the prices before you buy so you know what you are getting.

But, above all, use a pre-emergence killer so that you can cross crabgrass off your list of garden pests.
