## Robert Sparks Suffers Neck Fracture in Crash

A fracture of his neck and a cut on the top of his head were sustained by Robert M. Sparks, 23, of 1425 Roseland dr., Kewaskum, when his car left County Trunk G about one mile south of Dundee shortly after 1:00 a. m. Sunday. The young man was on his way home from a dance at Kettle Moraine Lake when the mishap occurred.

The auto was reported to have left the road, rolled over approximately three times, and landed in a field some distance from the highway. Sparks reported that he was blinded by the lights of an oncoming car on a curve at the scene. The vehicle was demolished.

Passing motorists lended assistance to Sparks and brought him to a local physician's office, from where he was removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance. Bob will have his neck in traction for two weeks, following which he will be required to wear a brace for approximately three months. His condition was reported as satisfactory and somewhat improved on Thursday of this week.

## Swimming Lessons to Again Be Offered at Village Park Beach

VILLAGE WILL SPONSOR TWO SESSIONS; REGISTRATION FOR FIRST ON JUNE 23

Two sessions of swimming lessons will again be offered by the Village of Kewaskum at the village park beach in conjunction with the West Bend chapter of the American Red Cross. Allan Becker of West Bend will again be in charge of the program.

The first session will run from June 25 to July 20. The second session will be from July 23 to Aug. 17. Five classes will be conducted each morning at 9:00 a. m., 9:30 a. m., 10:00 a. m., 10:30 a. m. and 11:00 a. m.

Registration for the first session will be on Saturday, June 23, from 9:00 to 11:30 a. m. in the council room of the municipal building. Registration for the second session will be Saturday, July 21, from 9:00 to 11:30 a. m. at the same place. If the classes become too large, the children residing in the village will have priority.

The beach will be supervised daily, Monday through Saturday, from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:30 to 6:00 p. m. On Sundays the beach will be supervised from 1:00 to 6:00 p. m. only. Swimming at all other hours will be at the risk of the individual.

The convention was held at the American Baptist Assembly at Green Lake June 11, 12 and 13. The boys were accompanied by their advisor, R. J. Esser, vocational agriculture instructor at Kewaskum.

## Dedication of New County Court House And Jail on Sunday

PARADE WILL OPEN RITES AT 12:30 P. M., SEN. WILEY SPEAKER

On Sunday, June 17, the new \$1 1/2 million Washington county court house and jail will be formally dedicated at 1:45 p. m. at West Bend. Dedication of the attractive new building will mark one of the major achievements of county residents in the long history of the area.

To commemorate the event, a parade will be held at 12:30 p. m. Sunday. Participating units, officials and dignitaries will congregate at the old court house building, from where the parade will proceed to the new building. Veterans organizations from throughout the county have been invited to take part in the march as well as high school bands, including West Bend, Kewaskum, Washington Union and Slinger, from whom acknowledgements have been received. In addition, members of the county board and other county officials and guests will take part.

The dedication program at the new court house will follow. Reuben Schmah of the Town of Jackson, chairman of the dedication committee, will act as master of ceremonies. Music will be provided by the high school bands. The invocation will be given by the Rev. George P. Jentges, pastor of St. Peter's church, Slinger.

All participating county veterans organizations will take part in a "massing of colors" for the flag raising ceremony. A new American flag, presented by county VFW organizations, will be formally presented and will be accepted by Mrs. Norma Courtney, a member of the county board from Hartford. The bands will play the National Anthem and Circuit Judge Milton L. Meister will lead the assemblage in the Pledge of Allegiance.

County Clerk Anton P. Staral will introduce the members of the county board and E. M. Romaine, Kewaskum, chairman of the board, will introduce the guests and give a brief address.

The act of dedication of the new building is scheduled to be performed by Architect Ray Gauger and V. A. Verhulst, while the Rev. H. Baumer of the E and R church, West Bend, will say the prayer of dedication. Alexander Wiley, senior U. S. senator from Wisconsin, will be the dedication speaker. The formal program will close with benediction by Rev. Ralph A. Keller of the First Methodist church, Hartford.

Following the benediction, all of the bands will join in the rendition of God Bless America. After the formal dedication ceremonies there will be conducted tours of the new building by members of the county homemakers.

## TERRY ANDRAE STATE PARK

Both wildness and peacefulness, depending on the weather, are combined in the 186 acres of beach, sand dunes, and forest at Terry Andrae State Park on the shore of Lake Michigan, four miles south of Sheboygan.

A variety of recreational activities is featured. There is a wide beach, three-fourths of a mile of shiny white sand, which affords the children a chance to dig to their hearts content, or leap over waves that always return.

We were content to stretch out on the white sand after our swim, and then watch the lazy, sometimes chatty birds circle the air in their never ending search for lunch.

### HIDE IN SAND DUNES

This stretch of white sand is backed by high undulating sand dunes where the youngsters may run and hide, and dig themselves in deeper. Once secure in their sand dune cave, they may imagine themselves in a pirate world!

Back of the sand dunes is a tall forest of white pine.

Marked trails along the sand dunes and through the white pine, and along the lake shore lead to interesting and unusual flowers, plus a wide variety of both water and land birds. The park acts as a

bird sanctuary, and just eight miles south is Cedar Grove Wildlife Sanctuary, popular spot for bird watchers.

In windy weather, the beach affords another view, similar to that of the ocean shore, with a pounding surf that chases bathers back into the sand dunes. A hardy swimmer may chance a "ride" on the towering waves.

### Many Facilities

Many facilities are available: separate tent and trailer camp sites with toilets, water, tables and benches and picnic areas. Two large bathhouses are located at either end of the beach; picnic supplies may be purchased at two refreshment stands.

In case you get tired of spending lazy hours stretched out on the sands of Terry Andrae, you might drive west on Highway 23 for 25 miles to the village of Greenbush, site of the famous Wade House, a century old stage-coach inn, completely restored, and with costumed guides.

Admission is free for State Historical Society members; otherwise a modest fee is charged. (Old Wade House will be described in a separate column at a future date.)

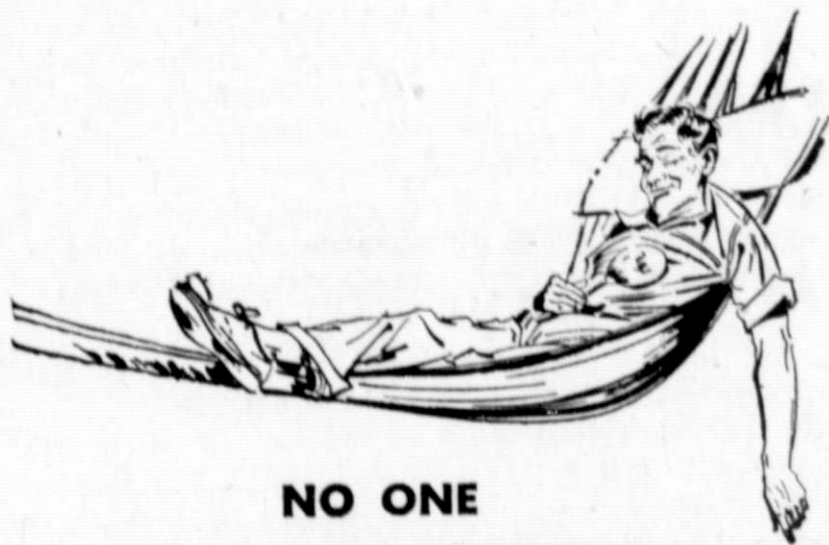

"If the state continues to use state highway funds for non-construction projects, Wisconsin will be left with a second-rate road system."

Jack Olson, secretary of the Wisconsin Good Roads association, told the Kewaskum Kiwanis club at their meeting June 11 at 6:15 p. m. that forest and park roads, lake access, tourist advertising and rising highway maintenance costs are taking desperately needed road construction funds away from the State Highway Commission.



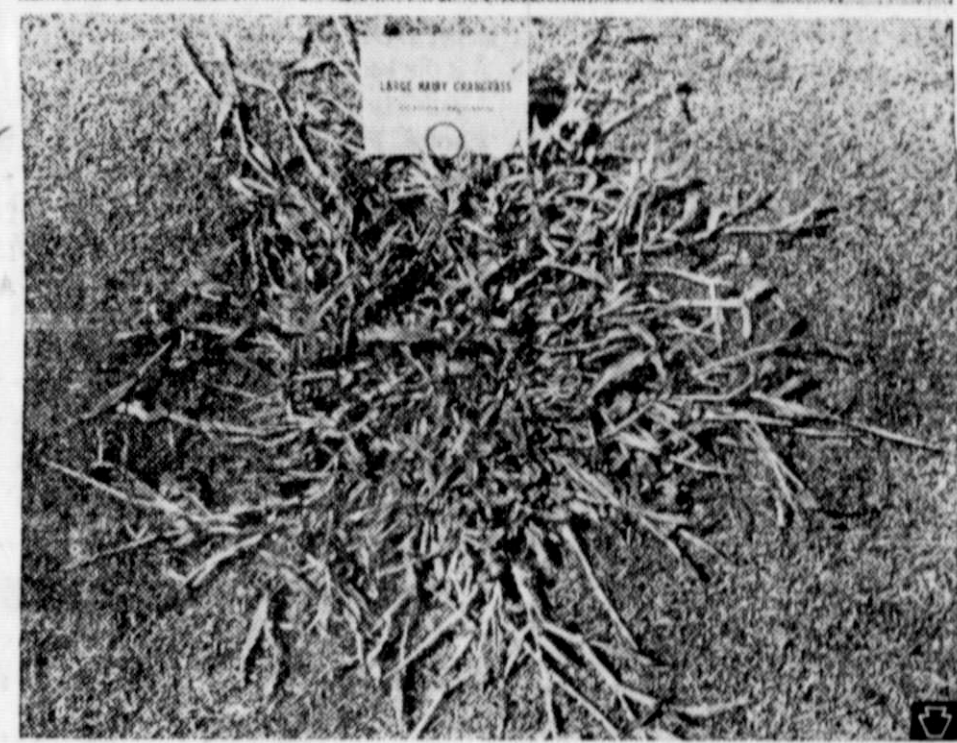
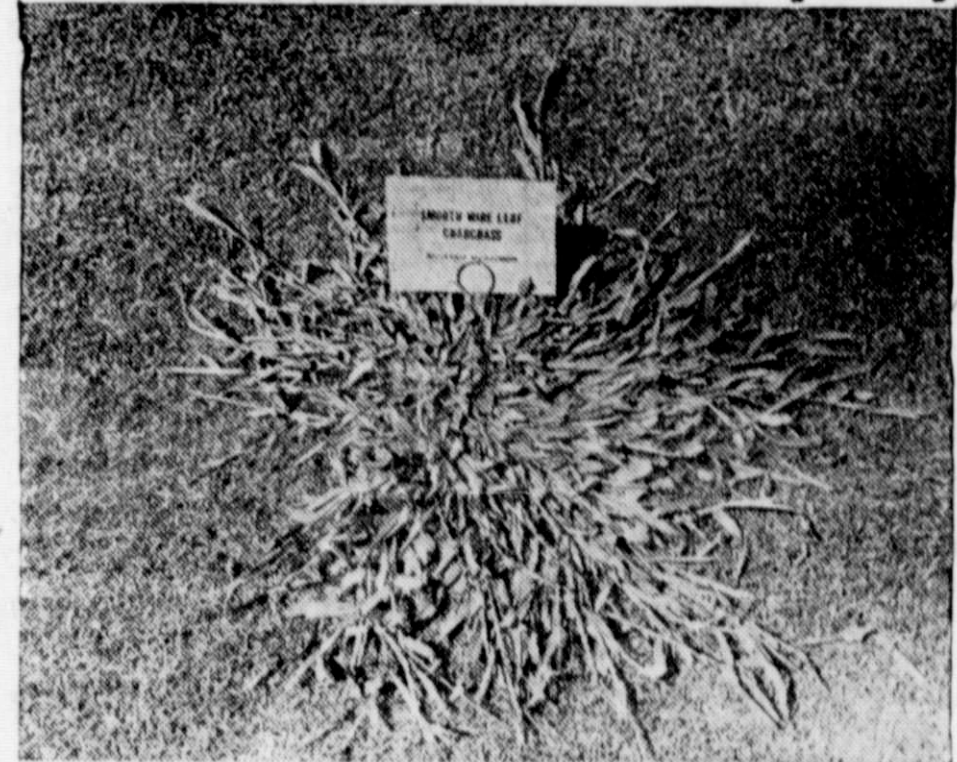

### Pulling Crabgrass is Fasse — Kill The Pest The Easy Way



There are two distinct forms of crabgrass, both equally destructive to lawns: smooth, wide leaf crabgrass and large, hairy crabgrass. Chemicals are available to kill both easily.

Do you remember when laboriously weeding out crabgrass plants so that the desirable grasses could have a chance to grow was a regular summer pastime? This chore made time pass all right, but was hardly enjoyable.

Nowadays, killing crabgrass is as easy as walking across the lawn pushing a fertilizer spreader, because that's the tool that applies crabgrass-killing chemicals.

There are two different types of these: postemergence, those that kill the mature or maturing crabgrass plants, and preemergence, those that kill emerging crabgrass seedlings.

While it is possible to use the first type when you see crabgrass starting to take over your lawn, it is much more sensible and easier on the grass to use the latter type.

Timing of application is of utmost importance. Preemergence crabgrass killers are called that because they are applied to the lawn BEFORE the crabgrass seeds sprout. They form a barrier layer which kills the seedlings as they come up.

They may be put on the lawn any time up to whenever apple blossoms bloom in your area—after that it's too late. By a week or so later crabgrass seedlings are too large to be stopped by a preemergence killer.

Chemicals used for preemergence crabgrass control are of many kinds and with many different characteristics. The thing they have in common is

ease of application.

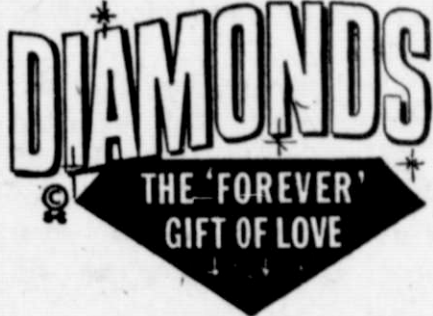
They differ in three regards; 1. Their toxicity to humans and animals. Some contain arsenicals so children and pets must be kept off the treated area for a week or so after application. Others are harmless except to crabgrass.

2. Their effect on grass seed planted at or near the same time as the killer is applied. At least one manufacturer says that seeds can be sown immediately after applying this particular brand of control. Other manufacturers say that 8 weeks must elapse after applying their crabgrass control before grass seed may be sown and will grow.

3. The price it costs to apply a given brand of crabgrass control to a given area of lawn.

Your local garden supply dealer probably carries several brands of preemergence crabgrass controls. Visit him and ask to see which he has to offer. Then take the time to read the labels and compare the prices before you buy so you know what you are getting.

But, above all, use a preemergence killer so that you can cross crabgrass off your list of garden pests.

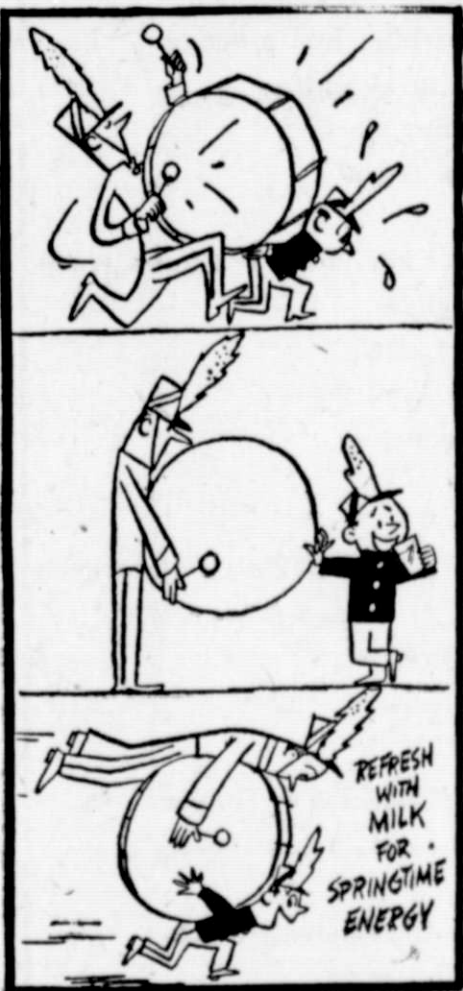
