Tornado-Like Windstorm Causes Extensive Damage Here; Loss in Thousands

Trailer Smashed, Roof Blown Off, Golfers Injured

LARGE TENT IS TORN APART, SILOS, TREES, WIRES, DOWN; FUNNEL CLOUD SIGHTED

The Kewaskum area was rocked by one of the most severe windstorms in many years early Sunday evening. Tornado-like winds lashed the village suddenly and unexpectedly, leaving a widespread path of destruction and extensive damage.

Some of the damage caused by the fierce, howling storm included a smashed trailer, part of a roof blown off, many roofs damaged, a large tent torn apart, numerous trees twisted off, injuries to a family of golfers, silos blown down, wires downed, and boards, branches, toys, garbage cans, lawn furniture and other loose objects flying through the air.

The "twister" threw a scare into local people and sent many of them scurrying into their basements and other protective places to escape the fury of the storm. Although it might not have been officially a tornado it was as close to one as Kewaskum's residents care to get. It had been a hot, humid day before the storm brewed. Before it struck, radio warnings were given that storms were approaching very rapidly out of the southwest and a severe squall line was heading for Washington, Ozaukee, and parts of Fond du Lac and Sheboygan counties with severe thunder storms, damaging wind and hail predicted. The same situation existed over most of the state although not as bad in most surrounding areas. The Beaver Dam, Horicon and Wausau areas were also hard hit.

Several persons reported seeing a funnel-shaped cloud south of the village heading in this direction. They said that as it approached Kewaskum the funnel flattened out and seemed to spread out into two directions. This probably is true as the brunt of the storm struck just south and north of Kewaskum while the village escaped with very little damage.

Evidently the storm was the worst just south of town in a path running from west to east. At the Johnson trailer court on the south side of the Kewaskum hill a large, 50 foot house trailer owned by Harry Maaske of West Bend was lifted up and tossed some distance against five trees standing along a fence line. The trailer was thrown against the trees with such force by the wind that it was almost completely damaged. Both ends of the trailer were demolished, a bedroom on one end being sheared off like it was struck by a train. Most of the furnishings were also damaged. Fortunately no one was occupying the house trailer, which, new, was valued at about

BAYFIELD SCENIC DRIVE

Sight-seeing is at its best along the "top of Wisconsin" in the Bayfield Peninsula. There is much to see, plenty to do, and thousands of acres of forest land, lakeshore, and water to do it on.

Starting at Ashland you should see giant freighters loading iron ore, or unloading coal along the water front. The size of the docks and the freighters is impressive. You might even catch a pulpwood raft being assembled.

Deer, duck, and swan are within feeding distance at Ashland's Prentice Park which also boasts tent and house trailer camping facilities in addition to ample picnic and playground space.

Many Parks, Camps

Bayfield county contains the north tip of Chequamegon National Forest plus 12 other county, city, or town parks with swimming, boating and fishing privileges available along with picnic and campsite grounds.

But if it's sight-seeing, pure and simple, that you want, start north out of Ashland on Highway 13, along the Lake Superior shore on the Bayfield Peninsula to Port Wing for 65 miles of beautiful and rugged scenery. There are plenty of places to stop enroute to let the kids run down the hills,

across the sand, along the rocks, climb fire towers, and even visit the state trout fish hatchery near Washburn.

Other sights include lighthouses, a deer farm, and commercial fishing docks. Three states and Canada can be seen from one fire tower.

Enjoy Lakeshore Walks

We enjoyed most of all several excursions off the highway onto dirt roads to the Lake Superior shoreline where we walked along the rocks and sand searching for driftwood and odd shaped stones. Here you can spend hours!

At Bayfield several ferry boats run hourly to Madeline Island, charging 50 cents per person round trip, or \$3.00 round trip for car and driver. Madeline, largest of the 22 Apostle Islands, stands on unusual archways and pillars carved by thousands of years of erosion.

Madeline also contains one of Wisconsin's oldest settlements, an old burial ground, a museum of original hand-hewn logs, both Catholic and Protestant mission houses with bell and bible dating back to 1834, and considerable wild game.

One should have many hours to spend on the Bayfield Peninsula. But for a pure scenic drive, the area can be covered in a half day of driving.

Alfred "Doc" Johnson, owner of the trailer court, who watched the storm pass through, said that swirling dust and stones, boards and branches flying through the air almost completely blocked one's vision. He reported that on a large garage building in which his school buses are housed, the sections of roofing stood straight up during the height of the storm and the tops of a large elm tree and other trees on the lot bent so that they touched the ground. There was also damage to a section of another trailer on the court. Johnson said the terrific wind made a thunderous, whistling sound.

Across the highway from the trailer court a car standing in the driveway of the Sylvester Schmidt home, occupied by two of the Schmidt boys, was said to have been lifted up by the wind. The front end of the auto raised up and then was dropped down again. A pile of boards aside of the Schmidt house was missing after the storm. The wind had carried the entire pile away.

East of there, along the storm's path, at the Hon-E-Kor golf course, members of a West Bend family were injured as a result of the wind. They were Mr. and Mrs. Ed Backhaus and children. It was reported that Mrs. Backhaus had her glasses blown off and when she stooped to retrieve them the wind caught her, knocked her to the ground and rolled her along the ground. She suffered bruises to her knees and elbows. The others also dropped to the ground. It is told that one boy leaped into the rough (a small

swamp area) and laid flat on his face. Other golfers hurried off the course before the windstorm hit, some of them without having time to retrieve their golf balls.

Just north of the village at Steve & Mary's minor bar, a large section of the roof on the building was ripped from its moorings and crashed into a wooded area to the north. Concrete blocks and mortar which broke loose were strewn around the building. At the nearby Harold Krueger rural home a large tree was twisted off and fell on the house, damaging a corner of the roof. Electric wires were torn, loose along Hwy. 45 north of town.

The only serious damage reported in the village was at Regal Ware, Inc. where a large, temporary storage tent was torn loose from its moorings and almost ripped in half.

As the storm followed a path to the west damage was reported all the way past New Fane. Several trees were blown down on the Byron Klein farm and a silo toppled on the Ralph Kern farm. Both are northeast of Kewaskum. Many trees and branches were blown down in the New Fane area and a chimney toppled at the former school house now owned by Donald Matthies. A silo was felled and barn doors damaged on the Art Backhaus farm northeast of New Fane and other wooden silos were reported down. Farmers fields suffered from the wind and loose top soil was seared away, new crops destroyed and hay and straw piles scattered over the countryside. Insurance agents and adjusters were kept busy this week answering

claims and much clean-up work had to be done.

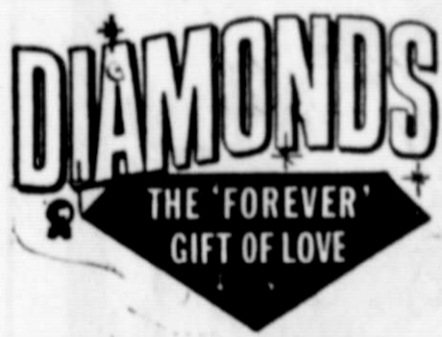

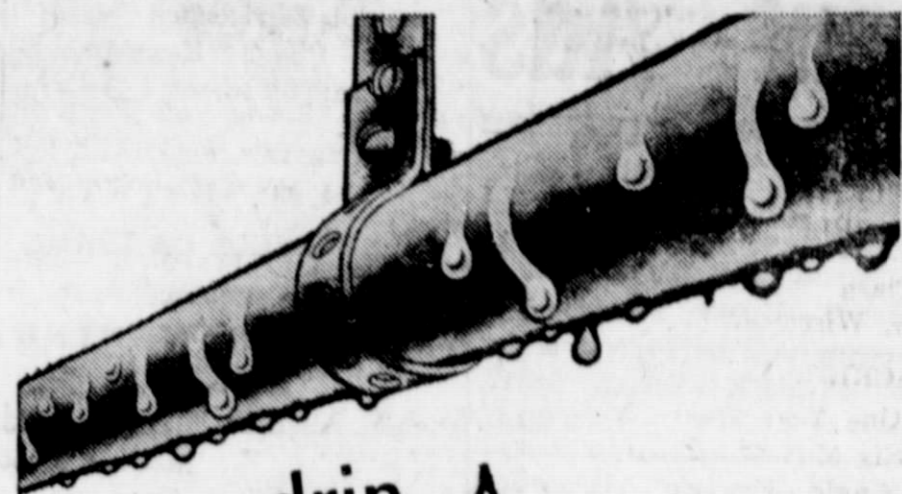

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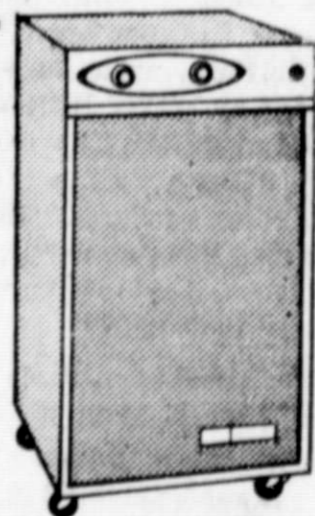

Free CD Course in Mass Feeding Will Be Taught

THOSE INTERESTED SHOULD CONTACT MARVIN MARTIN

A course in mass feeding will be taught at West Bend Vocational school on June 26, 27, 28 and 29, from 7:30 to 9:30 p. m. The course will culminate in an outdoor cookout on Saturday, June 30. Miss Kelma Fuller, home economics coordinator for the West Bend Vocational school, has been engaged as the instructor.

The objective of this course is to train personnel in mass feeding techniques which would be necessary in a large scale natural disaster or civil defense emergency. This course will also test the capability of a "crash" training program to meet emergency needs.

Instruction will cover care and storage of foods which have been subject to radio-active contamination, emergency sanitation and purification measures, menu planning, improvised cooking and serving techniques, and actual preparation of a meal for 125 persons.

Civil Defense workers are urgently needed at this time to provide leadership in Washington county's Civil Defense program. The instruction can also be applied to interest you may have for your family and community. Anyone interested contact Marvin A. Martin, Civil Defense director.
