Annual Picnic Here Is Tremendous Success, Sets All-Time Record

THOUSANDS JAM STREETS TO SEE BIGGEST PARADE EVER; WINNERS NAMED

Fine weather helped make the firemen's picnic here Saturday evening and Sunday another outstanding success and the annual affair set an all-time record in attendance as well as financially. The parade Sunday, too, was the biggest and finest ever held and was seen by a record number of spectators. Streets were lined with people all along the line of march with the greatest crowd jamming Main street from the railroad tracks to the entrance to the park.

Last year's event set a new record but this year's picnic was even more successful by far. The crowds in the park were larger and the crowd which witnessed the parade was estimated by traffic officers, firemen and spectators to be greater. All told the picnic grossed approximately \$1,000 more than last year. Practi-

cally of the stands in the park were busier and reported a substantial increase in business over last year, with the beer stands, hamburger and bratwurst stands reporting very sizable increases. For example, in the vicinity of 1,000 pounds of hamburger were sold, which would amount to about 8,000 hamburgers. In other words the hungry crowds consumed a couple head of cattle to say nothing of the pigs consumed in the bratwurst, sales of which also were way up.

The big parade took over a half hour to pass through. There were six bands and drum and bugle corps in the parade, many very beautiful floats, visiting firemen and Legionnaires, numerous old cars and horses, scores of children with their specialties, comic floats, bikes, trikes and other units. Among outside units which drew much attention were the float and large delegation of men, women and children from Fillmore advertising the coming centennial at that place. They were dressed in old fashioned clothes and the men wore beards. The Wayne Wranglers, a real large group of horseback riders, and Eggert's Western horseback riders, also made up a large part of the parade. During the parade traffic was tied up for almost a mile on Hwy. 45 south of the village.

Prize winners for the best commercial floats in the parade were: 1st, Wigwam Drive-In, \$50.00; 2nd, Miller's, \$35.00; 3rd, Regal

Kewaskum Woman Leaves \$14,415.43 Legacy to Cancer Society; Largest Gift Ever Contributed



The Washington county unit of the American Cancer society has been named the recipient of a legacy amounting to over \$14,000 in the will of Miss Delia Oeder of the town of Kewaskum, County Chairman D. J. Kenny announced this week. The contribution is the largest gift ever willed to the Cancer society by a resident of Washington county.

Miss Oeder died April 13, 1961, at the age of 79, the victim of cancer. She was preceded in death by two brothers, Charles and John, both of whom also were cancer victims.

After specific bequests, the residue of Miss Oeder's estate which she entrusted to the Cancer society to aid its research efforts, amounted to \$14,415.43.

McLean pointed out that funds made available to the society

through legacies, many of them memorials to cancer victims, have grown tremendously in recent years. He said that all bequests are used entirely for research by the society when they are conveyed by unrestricted clauses in wills.

The state director said the Oeder legacy is among the largest gifts in history to the state society from a relatively small estate.

Receipt of the Oeder bequest comes just as the 1962 Cancer Crusade is nearing a successful completion in Washington county. As Kenny received the estate check, the largest ever presented to the local society unit, he suggested that others may wish to include clauses in their wills as memorials to loved ones to provide the funds necessary to carry on the battle against cancer.

Attorney Henry Renard is the legacy chairman for the Washington county unit of the Cancer society. He will aid interested parties with legacy details, or any other volunteer officer of the society may be contacted for information.

Boy Cyclist Struck By Car After Parade Here

In a mishap which occurred at 1:25 p. m. Sunday, shortly after the picnic parade here when traffic was heavy, a bicycle driven by Charles McClain, age 6, of 1217 Meadow Lane, Kewaskum, was struck by an auto driven by Francis O. Loomis, 24, of R. 1, Kewaskum, at the corner of Fond du Lac and Prospect avenues. Loomis was southbound on Fond du Lac and the McClain boy was driving his bike west on Prospect and was crossing Fond du Lac when the auto struck the rear fender of his bicycle. The boy suffered a

bruise to his right hand and was taken to his home by his father. The rear basket and fender of the bike was damaged.

Ralph H. Stange, 19, of R. 1, Adell, told Fond du Lac county authorities that he took a curve too wide on County Trunk G in the town of Auburn and struck a car driven by Shirley A. Gruber, Kewaskum. The accident was reported at 8 p. m. last Thursday. Stange was heading south on G when he apparently had swung into the other lane while making the curve. The left side of the Stange auto scraped against the left side of the Gruber vehicle, which was heading north. No one was injured.

All incumbent Republican office holders are facing opposition on the Democratic ticket except the county treasurer, sheriff and surveyor. But none of the candidates are facing opposition on their own tickets for nomination in the November election.

BRUNET ISLAND STATE PARK

Are you really interested in hiking along a well maintained foot trail through forestland? Then follow up with a swim in a supervised beach with a diving area? And for good measure, try your hand at fishing, either pan fish or pike, all in the same area?

All this—and more—is yours for the day at Brunet Island State Park, one mile north of Cornell on the Chippewa River in West-Central Wisconsin. Brunet Island is one of the most ideal picnic areas for a family with children for an inexpensive day's outing or a camp out.

The 179 acre park includes considerable forest cover, separate picnic and camping areas, each with water, picnic tables and fireplaces, toilets; a children's playground, and boat launching sites.

Hiking Trails

But most interesting are the two miles of well maintained hiking trails through the park, an excellent chance to interest your children in nature trail hiking, not to mention that a two mile hike would be good for the "old man." This walk can be followed by a swim in the Chippewa River that includes a sandy beach as well as diving facilities supervised by lifeguards.

Literally, the park is a large island in beautiful surroundings, with small channels of the Chippewa River cutting through the island in many places making it

ideal for boating in calm, clear waters, and also affording excellent fishing from the shoreline or from a boat. All game fish can be found here as well as panfish which are most important to the youngsters who want "to catch something."

Old Abe War Eagle

About 12 miles south of Cornell in a wayside on Highway 178 near Jim Falls is the state historical marker to Old Abe, The War Eagle, which might interest your children to read more about Wisconsin history. This wayside is on part of the McCann farm where in 1861 a band of hungry Chippewa Indians traded a young eagle for corn. The

eagle became a pet, and later made Civil War history. The crippled Dan McCann offered his eagle's services as mascot to Company C, Eighth Regiment, for Civil War duty feeling that "someone from the family ought to go."

During battle Old Abe spread his wings and screamed encouragement to his "Eagle Regiment", the louder the noise of battle, the louder and fiercer were his screams. In 42 battles he lost only a few feathers.

After three years of service, Old Abe was presented to the State of Wisconsin which equipped a room for him in the Capitol and employed a man to care for him. Old Abe lived until March 28, 1881, and pictures of Old Abe and his story can be reviewed in the Civil War Museum on the top floor of the State Capitol in Madison.

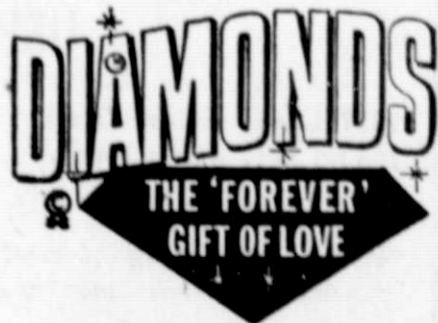

25 Years Ago

July 9, 1937

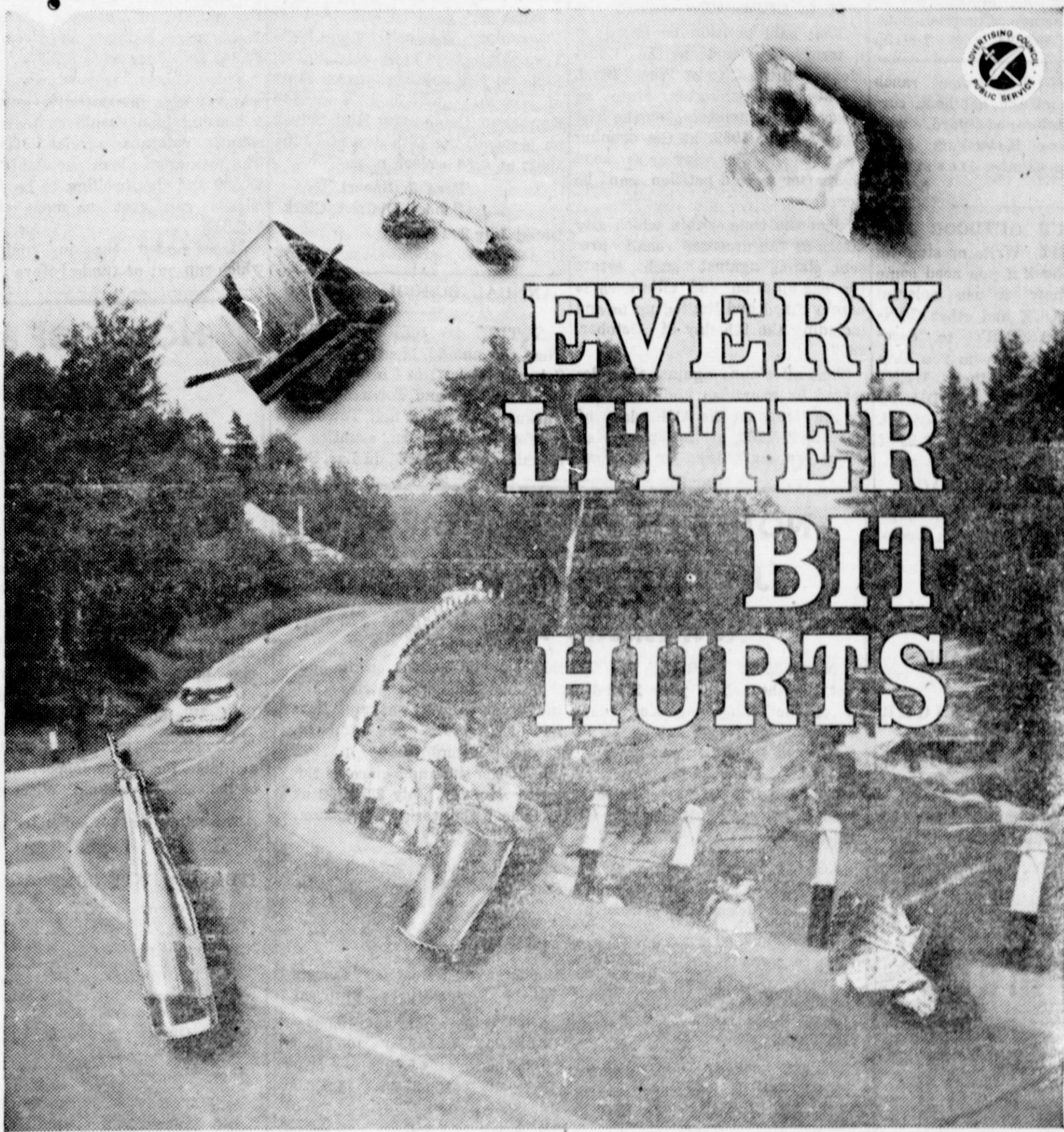

COUNTY GETS \$30,904 FOR VETERANS HOUSING LOANS

Welcome news for county veterans wishing state housing loans is the announcement to the county veterans service officer of the new housing fund allocation by John R. Moses, director of the Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs. Washington county's share of the \$2,861,494 allocated is \$30,904.

This money is now available and veterans interested in getting a housing loan should contact the county veterans service officer. The maximum loan available is \$3,500 and the dwelling to be purchased can cost no more than \$17,500.

Moses added that in counties which ran out of funds before July

1, housing applications were accepted and processed and approved loans were held in abeyance until the new allocation was made. Commitments for these loans are now being sent out. In Washington county committed loans have reduced the allocation to \$27,011.

The next reallocation of housing funds will be on Nov. 1 when the unused funds will be turned back and redistributed according to the veteran population in each county as determined by the 1960 census. Moses explained that prior to 1961 funds were reallocated only once a year.

There is good crappie fishing (small minnows for bait) at Friess lake, in fact one fisherman caught a 14" rainbow trout while fishing for them. Very good northern pike fishing at Big Cedar, (large chubs for bait). The majority of these fish are taken on weekdays when the number of motorboats cruising around are at a minimum. Bass fishing continues good in the late evening and early morning hours.

The law provides that a swimming area be identified by buoys painted with alternate green and yellow stripes. This is to inform the boat operator and to protect the swimmer. Many resort operators are having trouble with swimmers moving or cutting the anchors. One operator, for his own protection, covered the top of his barrels with axle grease. (IT WORKED).

It is remarkable how wild animals change their feeding habits

at times, example, a family of muskrats living in a drainage ditch in the Rockfield swamp. This spring the water was high enough to provide a home and sufficient cat tail roots for their feed. Now the ditch is nearly dry and they are feeding on the farmers' corn, cutting the three to nine inch stalks and dragging them to their feeding bed a few feet away. In a short time as the young become older and the corn too tough to eat they will move on looking for a new home farther downstream.

Transient motorboat operators towing water skiers close to swimmers and the shore line of private property caused one irate owner to fire his shotgun into the air to keep them away. Actions of this kind are causing lake dwellers to request town boards to enact an ordinance much more strict than state law.

Race said he would campaign extensively throughout the district which includes Calumet, Fond du Lac, Ozaukee, Sheboygan, Washington and Winnebago counties.

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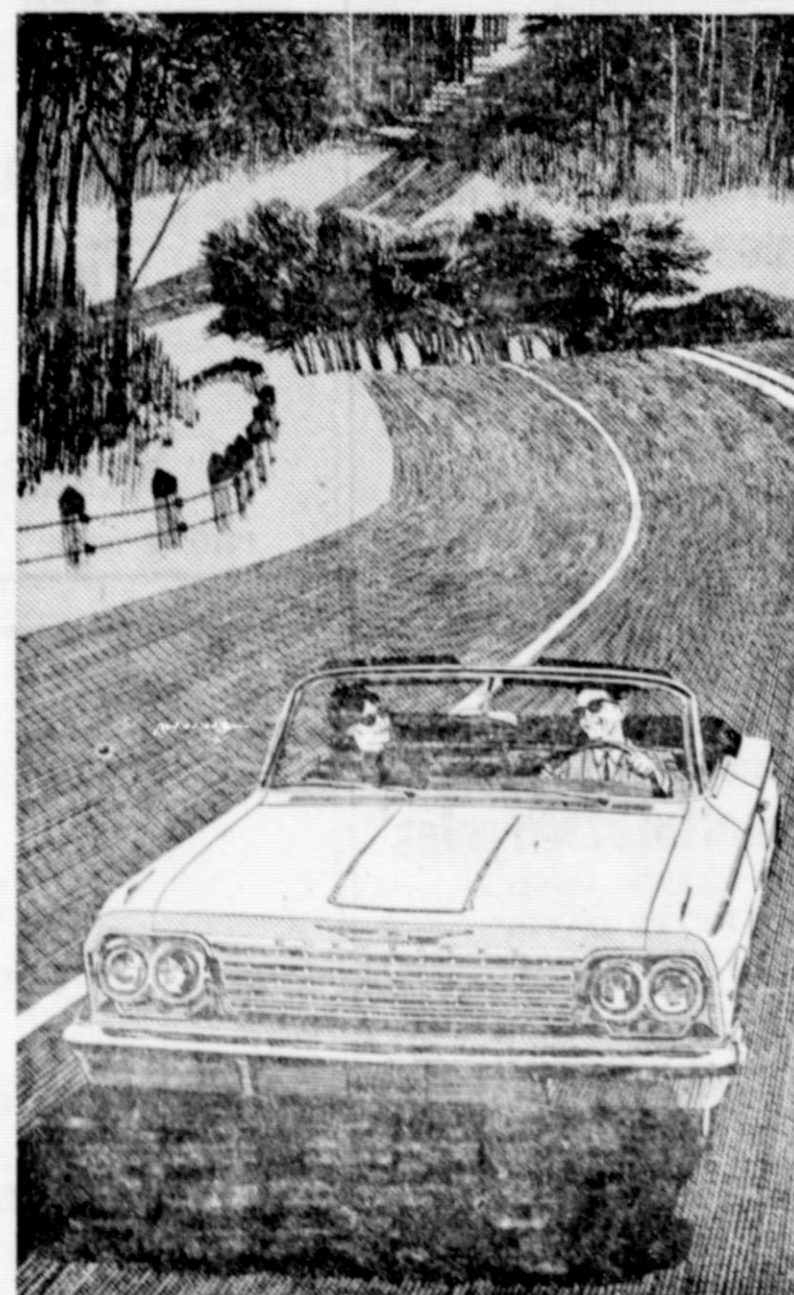
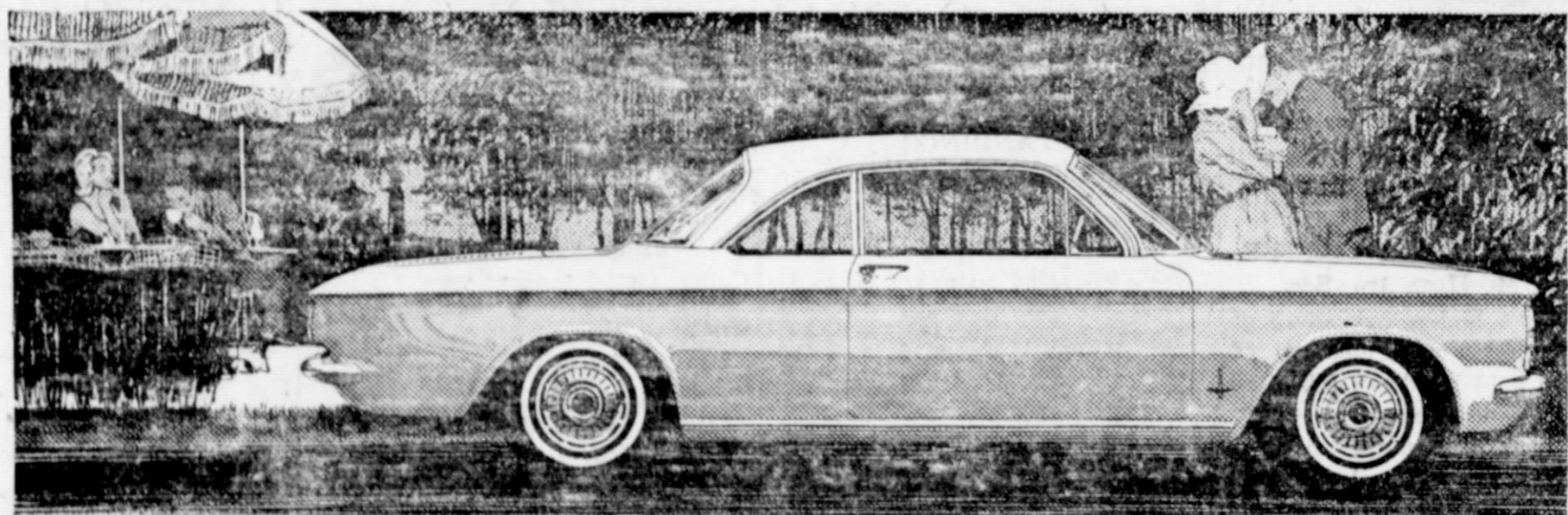
