Fire Destroys Barn, Equipment on John Oelhafen Farm in Town Wayne Saturday

LOSS ESTIMATED AT OVER \$30,000, HOME SAVED IN DISASTROUS BLAZE

A large barn, machine shed and hog barn, five tractors and most other major farm machinery as well as 11 heifers and a hog were destroyed by fire Saturday night on the John Oelhafen farm, R. 2, Kewaskum, located north of Kohlsville in the town of Wayne. The loss was estimated as ranging from \$30,000 to \$40,000. Also lost were approximately 160 ton of chopped and baled hay, some grain and oats, all milking equipment and other equipment and supplies.

The fire on the farm of Mr. Oelhafen, who is town chairman of the town of Wayne, was discovered by Wilmer Herman, Kohlsville fire chief, as he returned from a fire meeting. Eldor Wulff, a neighbor, also noticed the blaze. Herman immediately summoned firemen. The flames spread so rapidly, however, that the firemen had all they could do to save the Oelhafen residence, which was in danger of being destroyed.

The fire broke out about 10:45 p. m. Firemen remained at the scene most of the night and returned once more Sunday to extinguish smoldering embers to prevent the flames from spreading and causing further damage.

Mr. and Mrs. Oelhafen were attending a golden wedding in West Allis at the time of the fire and their two sons, John, 20, and James, 15, were at a ball game in West Bend, while a daughter, Cynthia, 4½, was spending the day with her grandmother at West Bend.

Cause of the fire was not determined but the Oelhafens said the flames spread so rapidly and the heat was so intense that firemen and neighbors were unable to enter the building to save any cattle or equipment. All of the main farm machinery and other supplies were stored in the large machine shed near the barn, which was completely destroyed.

Another hog shed was saved, although one side of the building was scorched. Sparks from the large 38 by 112 foot barn and nearby sheds endangered the house all the time but firemen devoted their efforts to saving the residence. The fire was fanned by a northeast wind.

John Roden Injured When Struck By Car

John Roden, 72, of West Bend, a former resident of rural Kewaskum, suffered a fractured right leg and lacerations of the head at approximately 5:18 p. m. Sunday when he was struck by an auto on County Trunk Hwy. GGG south of the entrance to Mauthe lake.

The Rodens had been attending a family reunion at the Schladweiler farm, it was reported, and the car which struck Roden was driven by Gilbert Seil of West Bend.

Roden was taken to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance.

TWO YOUNG MEN HURT IN COLLISION SUNDAY

Rheinold J. Fenske, 23, West Bend, and his companion, Roger Meyer, 21, R. 2, Kewaskum, suffered injuries at about 6:20 p. m. Sunday when the foreign sports car driven by Fenske was struck by an auto driven by Sam Chemer, Jr., 31, Theresa.

The collision occurred when the Fenske car, which had halted with part of the vehicle out on Hwy. 28 in the westbound lane of traffic, east of St. Michaels, was struck by the Chemer vehicle as it traveled west on Hwy. 28. The sheriff's department reported that Chemer came over a knoll and the driver applied the brakes and the auto skidded into the Fenske car, pushing it into the ditch. The Chemer auto continued into the eastbound lane of traffic and stopped there.

Fenske suffered cuts at the left eye, left temple, back of the head and abrasions of the right elbow. Meyer incurred abrasions of the left elbow, wrist and left side. The injured young men were removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance.

August Schaefer, 89, Former Town, School, Church Official Dies

August H. Schaefer, 89, well known, lifelong resident of Kewaskum, passed away on Tuesday morning, July 17, at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, where he had been a patient for four days.

He was born March 8, 1873, in the town of Kewaskum, the son of the late Henry and Louisa Suda Schaefer, and spent all of his 89 years in the Kewaskum area. His marriage to Mary Kocher took place Feb. 6, 1897 and she predeceased him on April 13, 1936. Mr. Schaefer lived in retirement with his granddaughter, Mrs. Ralph Erdman, and her husband at the north village limits.

Surviving are three daughters, Esther (Mrs. Henry Petermann), and Loring (Mrs. Art. Petermann), both of the town of Auburn, R. 2, Campbellsport. Lorinda (Mrs. Jack Tessar) of Kewaskum; two sons, Marvin and Reuben Schaefer, both of Kewaskum; 20 grandchildren and 26 great-grandchildren. Another son, Alfred, died on April 9, 1931.

Mr. Schaefer was a past president of Peace United Church of Christ and was a member of the church council for 28 years. He served on the town of Kewaskum board for several years and was a school board member many years of the Prairie Villa school.

The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home in Kewaskum from 2 p. m. Thursday until 11 a. m. Friday and at the Peace church from 12 noon until the time of services at 2 p. m. Friday. The Rev. Harry W. Baumer officiated and burial was in the church cemetery.

Esser Sets Meeting For Local Farmers

EVENING SESSION ON WEED AND FLY CONTROL TO BE HELD JULY 30

R. J. Esser, vocational agriculture instructor at Kewaskum High school, has announced an evening meeting for local farmers interested in weed control and fly control.

The meeting will be in the form of an evaluation of the weed test plots and a demonstration of fly control.

The date is Monday, July 30, at 8:00 p. m. at the Karl Schultz farm located about four miles north of Kewaskum on Hwy. 45. The weed plot is about a quarter mile north of the farm.

The weed control plot has been sprayed with Atrazine, Linuron (or Lorox) and a combination of Dacthal and Dacamine. Farmers in the area have had a variety of results with their chemical weed control this season. Some are ready to sell their cultivators, for chemicals have answered their needs and given perfect control, while others were not satisfied with the control. This meeting would be a good place to get some of these questions answered.

Fly control at the barn, a problem on the dairy farm, will also be demonstrated.

**NELSON DEWEY STATE PARK
STONEFIELD**

The southwest corner of Wisconsin is probably the most underrated scenic and historical area of the state. In that far corner at Cassville is Nelson Dewey State Park overlooking the Mississippi River, and Stonefield, the official Farm and Craft Museum of Wisconsin. We have stressed places where you might take the kids, places where they can run, have fun and see unusual sights of interest. This is also true of Nelson Dewey State Park area, but here we would like to add that it is a wonderful place to take grandma and grandpa, and especially if they have ever farmed the land.

Nelson Dewey State Park is one of the few midwest places where a development similar to the plantation homes of the old south may be seen. The park's 590 acres were once part of the elaborate 2,000 acre estate of Nelson Dewey, Wisconsin's first governor who was elected in 1848 at the age of 35.

The park is worth visiting for its scenic value alone; wooded bluffs and valleys overlook the Mississippi and extensive foot trails leading along two high ridges provide exciting views. There are picnic and camping area, plus a playground for children, Indian mounds, and an old lead mine.

Interest To Farmers

But of even more interest is the rapid development of "Stonefield," once the great stone barn for Dewey's imported Arabian horses, but today it is the home of

the Farm and Craft Museum containing over 12,000 items connected with agriculture! Grandpa and grandma will enjoy being asked what all those "funny" things were used for on the farm. We suspect many of the younger generation will not know, while their parents may relive their lives recalling those agricultural implements of the past.

Here a cow barn portrays the history of dairying in Wisconsin, while other "pole and roof" structures display the McCormick reaper, an 1882 milking machine, early treadmill, threshing machines, balers, steam engines, and fancy buggies of post-Civil War days including the "surry with the fringe on top."

Just across the creek from this barn the State Historical society is supervising the re-creation of a typical village of 1890. Some units have been completed including a carpenter's shop, schoolhouse and general store, while others such as a harness and hardware store, milliner's shop, barber shop, pharmacy, bank, meat market, cooperage, wagon shop and printing shop will be completed this summer.

This village will add to the memories of the past for grandpa and grandma, while the youngsters may picnic and climb to the lookout points. Admission is free to members of the State Historical society; otherwise a small fee is charged.

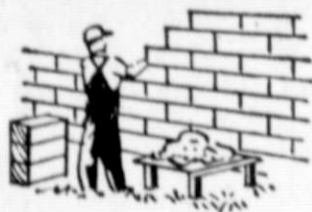

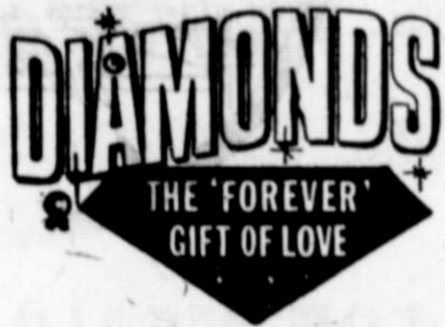

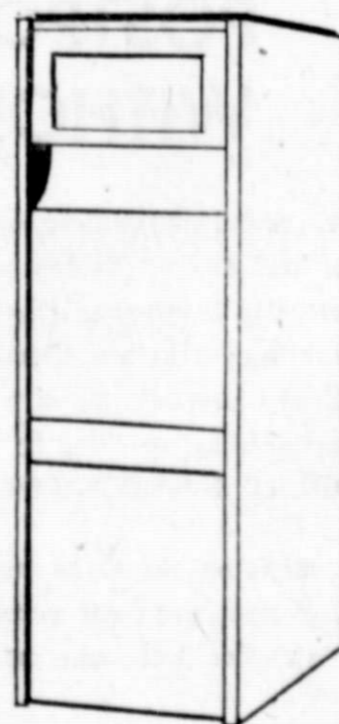

'Bishop of Babenhausen' (Fr. Mayer) On Way Home After 5 Years in Germany

The "Bishop of Babenhausen" in Germany is on his way home after serving as an army chaplain in that country for the past five years. He is flying home from Germany and is expected to arrive any day to spend a 30-day leave before reporting in Chicago for further assignment.

Who is the "Bishop of Babenhausen?" Residents of Kewaskum and Washington county will be surprised to learn that they are well acquainted with him. The "Bishop" is none other than Chaplain (Major) William J. Mayer, who was born in Kewaskum and educated in Holy Trinity school here before entering St. Francis seminary at Milwaukee.

Father Mayer is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Mayer of Kewaskum. He is the brother of Mrs. Robert (Alexia) Ours of this village. Carl Mayer, member of the West Bend police force and former police chief of Barton, and Mrs. Allan (Mary Jane) Hermans of Milwaukee.

Ordained at St. John's Cathedral in Milwaukee on Nov. 30, 1943, Fr. Mayer served as assistant pastor at St. Agnes church there and also as assistant pastor of St. Monica's parish in Whitefish Bay and at St. Anthony's parish in Milwaukee before he received permission to join the army reserves.

In 1956 Fr. Mayer went on active duty and was eventually assigned to duty in Europe. He has outlasted five commanding officers at Babenhausen where he has been stationed with the U. S. Army as chaplain.

Fr. Mayer acquired the nickname of "Bishop of Babenhausen" shortly after his arrival in Germany in 1957 when Mayor Fritz Klein of Babenhausen called the army post to inquire for some help on a town project and asked if he could speak "to the bishop."

The euphonious nickname stuck. Father Mayer met the residents of Babenhausen soon after his arrival and the people soon referred to him as the bishop. Hence, when the mayor inquired for the chaplain to seek his assistance, the nickname quickly spread and he unofficially, of course, became "the Bishop of Babenhausen."

Fr. Mayer's familiarity with the German language, which he learned from his grandparents, who immigrated from Germany to Wisconsin, and from his parents, who spoke German and English at home, has helped "bridge many a gap between the army post and townspeople" according to Ray Wright, a staff writer for the European edition of The Stars and Stripes.

Wright devoted a double page spread of pictures with a feature article in the April 19 issue of The Stars and Stripes to Fr. Mayer and his accomplishments as a popular U. S. Army chaplain. The issue, a copy of which is on display at the Statesman office, shows six pictures of Fr. Mayer. They show him reading mass in a large wall tent while on maneuvers, reading to relieve the monotony when luck's no good while out hunting, chaplain's rectory walls lined with a sampling of his vast collection of guns and trophies, Mrs. Peter Nachreiner and children paying a social call, the chaplain in the No. 2 spot taking a bead on the target in the trenches, and Fr. Mayer out for a stroll with the mayor and Fr. Anthony Schubert.

Fr. Mayer's knowledge of German and his ability to wangle a bulldozer, wrecker or extra hands

from army sources to give assistance for civic projects, a building project, carnival or playground in Babenhausen has made him a one-man public relations department for the army in solidifying relations with the natives.

As shepherd of his army flock, Chaplain Mayer took his duties so literally that he sometimes drifted around the fringes of the bars and gasthouses to round up strays from his unit when they should have been safe in their billets instead of "on the town." He has been frequently known to "pay the tab," Wright says, to hurry his charges on their way home.

Tall and weighing over 200 pounds, Fr. Mayer is a competent bowler with a 170 average and is also an ardent hunter. And, although his job does not require it, he has qualified as an expert with the M-1 carbine, M-1 rifle and .45 calibre revolver.

His rectory walls were lined with hunting trophies. He especially likes to hunt wild boar, rebock and pheasant. He has a collection of around 300 guns, but had only about a dozen with him in Germany. His favorite weapon is a 44-40 Colt single action revolver which he believes was made around the turn of the century. He also collects wood carvings and has a fine sampling of Oberammergau work.

His hunting expeditions made him so familiar with the Babenhausen area that the farmers frequently called on him for advice on settlement of damage claims against the army following maneuvers or field problems. Each time "the bishop's" name came up for transfer a request came through asking for his extension. This time his transfer came through "for sure" however.
