Fire Destroys Barn, Equipment on John **Oelhafen Farm in Town Wayne Saturday**

LOSS ESTIMATED AT OVER \$30,000, HOME SAVED IN DISASTROUS BLAZE

A large barn, machine shed and hog barn, five tractors and most other major farm machinery as well as 11 heifers and a hog were destroyed by fire Saturday night on the John Oelhafen farm, R. 2, Kewaskum, located north of Kohlsapproximately 160 ton of chopped Milwaukee market. and baled hay, some grain and other equipment and supplies.

The fire broke out about 10:45 p. m. Firemen remained at the scene most of the night and returned once more Sunday to extinguish smoldering embers to prevent the flames from spreading and causing further damage.

Mr. and Mrs. Oelhafen were attending a golden wedding in West Allis at the time of the fire and approximately 5:18 p. m. Sunday their two sons, John, 20, and when he was struck by an auto on James 15, were at a ball game in West Bend, while a daughter, Cvnthia, 4½, was spending the day with her grandmother at West Bend. Cause of the fire was not determined but the Oelhafens said the flames spread so rapidly and the heat was so intense that firemen and neighbors were unable to enter the building to save any cattle or equipment. All of the main farm machinery and other supplies were stored in the large machine shed near the barn, which was completely destroyed. Another hog shed was saved, although one side of the building was scorched. Sparks from the large 38 by 112 foot barn and nearby sheds endangered the house all the time but firemen devoted their efforts to saving the residence. The fire was fanned by a northeast wind.
