Budget Hearing
July 16, 1962**

The budget hearing was called to order by Paula Petri, vice-president of the Board of Education, with 29 electors present.

The proposed budget was read and explained to the electors.

A motion was made by Giles Wierman, seconded by Mrs. Lloyd Schmidt, to include \$15,300 for site improvement on the proposed budget. The motion was defeated, 37 to 28.

A motion was made by Clifford Stautz and seconded by Albert Hron, Jr., that the proposed budget in the amount of \$222,490.00 be presented at the annual meeting. Carried.

The budget meeting was declared closed by Miss Petri.

**Annual Meeting
July 16, 1962**

The annual meeting was called to order by Paula Petri with 80 electors present.

Miss Petri called for nominations for chairman of the meeting. L. N. Peterson nominated Paula Petri; and it was moved by Clifford Stautz and seconded by Walter Wesenberg that the nominations be closed and that an unanimous ballot be cast for Paula Petri. Motion carried.

Minutes of the July 17, 1961, annual meeting were read. Harvey Janssen made a motion, seconded by Elmer Plaum, that the minutes be accepted as read. Carried.

It was moved by William Martin, seconded by John Battaglia, to dispense with the reading of the auditor's report, the treasurer's reports and the clerk's report, and to accept them as printed on the sheets handed to the electors. Carried.

The following resolutions were adopted:

RESOLUTION NO. 1—Be it resolved that the 1963 annual meeting of this district be held on the third Monday in July the year 1963 at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

It was moved by Marvin A. Martin and seconded by James D. Reigle to adopt resolution No. 1. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 2—Be it resolved by the electors of School District No. 2 of the Kewaskum Community High School that the school year be set at nine and one-fourth months or 185 days.

It was moved by Walter Wesenberg and seconded by John Battaglia to adopt resolution No. 2. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 3—Be it resolved that a tax be levied on all taxable property of the district for operating expenses for the year

Rev. Budde's Mother Dies at Beaver Dam

Mrs. John M. Budde, 83, 110 Willow st., Beaver Dam, the mother of four sons who became Catholic priests, passed away Friday morning, July 20, at the home of her son, Richard A. Budde, R. 2, Beaver Dam, following a lingering illness of several months.

Mrs. Budde, nee Julia Weix, was born on Feb. 16, 1879, at LeRoy, Wis., the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Weix. She attended St. Andrew's Catholic school at LeRoy, and on Nov. 10, 1898, was married to John M. Budde. They lived on a farm in the town of Beaver Dam from 1898 to 1952, and since 1952 at Willow st. in Beaver Dam.

Surviving are eight sons, Rev. George R. Budde, Franklin, Wis., Rev. John T. Budde, pastor of Holy Trinity church, Kewaskum, Rev. Raymond F. Budde, Milwaukee, and Lawrence J., Felix H., Henry S., Richard A. and Leo J. Budde, all of Beaver Dam; 38 grandchildren, 29 great-grandchildren, and one brother, John Weix, Colby, Wis. Preceding her in death were her husband in 1953, one son, Rev. Gerard J. Budde in 1960, and a daughter, Barbara, in 1961.

Mrs. Budde was a member of St. Peter's Catholic church, the Christian Mothers society, Third Order of St. Francis, and other missionary societies.

Friends called at the Murray Funeral Home in Beaver Dam after 2 p. m. Sunday and until the hour of funeral services at 10:30 a. m. Monday from the funeral home and at 11:00 a. m. at St. Peter's church. Archbishop William E. Cousins of Milwaukee preached the sermon during the Requiem Mass which was celebrated by Mrs. Budde's surviving priest sons, Rev. George R. Budde as celebrant, Rev. John T. Budde as deacon, and Rev. Raymond F. Budde as sub-deacon. Interment was in the parish cemetery.

Father John Budde remained at Beaver Dam until Wednesday evening for the funeral of his mother and to be with relatives.

POYNETTE GAME FARM

If you wish to combine nature, animal and conservation education along with a family outing on spacious picnic grounds, you should be interested in the conservation department's game farm at Poynette, in south-central Wisconsin, about 30 miles north of Madison.

Although used by schools, 4-H, and other groups as a conservation education center, the game farm is open to the public daily from 9 a. m. until 4 p. m. with large parking and picnic areas available.

Here all of Wisconsin's game animals and bird life are on display along with most game and pan fish.

But of even more interest and learning is the unusual trail and forestry exhibit. Along the nature trail are posts in the ground with colored pictures and descriptions of every type of tree, bush, flower, and insect in Wisconsin. The colored picture and description can be compared to the real bush, flower or tree on that very spot.

Even Poison Ivy

Even poison ivy is included. As a matter of fact, we grabbed our youngest just before he yanked a few leaves of the stuff to compare it with the picture!

Also included along the nature trail is a model forest nursery, and a logging museum displays a pine log cut in 1936 at the ripe age of 281 years.

A small deer farm is included next to the nature trail, with deer tame enough to sniff around as

you draw near to the fence. Also exhibited in the wildlife display are black bear, porcupine, woodchuck, ducks, geese, pheasants, ruffed grouse, partridge, quail, muskrat, mink, beaver, skunk, opossum, badger, raccoon, coyote and fox, all native to Wisconsin woods.

Here is a chance to show your youngsters the native animals of Wisconsin, to learn the importance of the many conservation practices which are colorfully exhibited here, and to learn by picture, description, and in "person" every tree, bush and flower native to Wisconsin.

Picnic areas with tables, benches and fireplaces are available, but if it's a hot day and you want a swim, you'll have to drive west another 12 miles to Lake Wisconsin.

And if you still have some daylight, you might be interested in ferrying your car across the Wisconsin River at Merrimac—no charge—and another 10 miles to Devils Lake where you can climb bluffs, swim, or fish. This would make a full day.

Minutes of School Board Meeting

Kewaskum Community High School, Jt. Dist. No. 2
May 28, 1962

The regular monthly meeting of the Jt. School District No. 2 was attended by all members of the Board of Education.

Mr. Merlin Capelle was present and presented plans for installing drain tile on the high school athletic field. He gave an estimated cost of \$1,700.00 to cover the trenching, tiling, stone for fill, catch basin and the man-hole cover on the storm sewer. The Board asked Mr. Capelle to obtain bids for this work and then present the bids to them for their approval.

The minutes of the April 30th meeting were read. L. N. Peterson moved to approve the minutes as read. Paula Petri seconded. Carried.

The board asked that a notice be placed in the newspaper, in keeping with the instructions received from the electors at the last annual meeting, so that those people who wish to be candidates for membership on the board of education can make their wishes known to the public through the press.

Discussion was held concerning

delinquent utility taxes; a letter was composed by the board to be sent to the town boards involved. Mr. Rose presented the members of the board with information regarding the driver education classes in our school and the possibility that it would not be offered during the '62-'63 school year unless certain requirements would be fulfilled. The members of the board asked Mr. Rose to discuss the situation with Mr. LaMarche, instructor of the driver education classes.

Mr. Rose indicated to the board that because of the heavy enrollment of students who expressed a desire to take the homemaking courses, it would be impossible for Miss Leonhard to handle the load. Therefore, either a part-time homemaking instructor would have to be employed, or the other alternative would be to have the senior girls change their programs so that the fourth year of homemaking could be eliminated. The members of the board felt that if the latter of the two solutions could be arranged, Mr. Rose should proceed on that basis.

Surviving are his wife, a son, James, Sheboygan; five daughters,

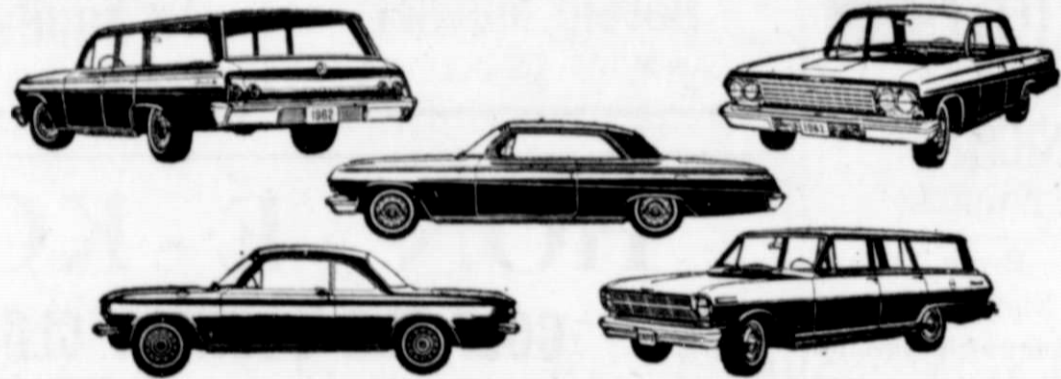
