3-Car Crash Disrupts Electric Service; Man Burned, 5 Others Hurt

Hwy. 33 was lined with traffic for at least two miles west of West Bend from one to two hours Monday evening as a result of a three-car collision 1 1/2 miles west of the city at 7:20 p. m. Six persons, including a Kewaskum driver, were injured, one of whom was taken to the Milwaukee Burn Center at St. Mary's hospital with serious burns.

One of the cars broke off an electric pole, cutting off the main supply line from the St. Lawrence bulk station, and electrical service in West Bend, Kewaskum, the Big Cedar lake and rural areas went dead as circuit breakers went into action. A considerable amount of switching and some repair work was required to restore service, which took about 20 minutes. First the power failure and later a "sonic boom" mildly alarmed residents and had them wondering what had happened.

Luckily the broken lines, which apparently brushed across one of the cars, before landing on the pavement, almost immediately became dead lines. West Bend firemen were called, taking a precautionary measure, and kept the large crowd back from the scene until electrical servicemen arrived. Water fog was applied to the burning car. Although dangerous, passers-by reportedly removed one of the two occupants, Richard Yochem, 31, R. 2, West Bend, from the burning vehicle.

It was reported that well over 1,000 curiosity seekers jammed the highway making it difficult for emergency vehicles to get through.

FIREMEN SNUFF OUT FARM GRASS FIRE, HOLD DRILL

The firemen were called out at 5:20 p. m. Monday to put out a grass fire on the Louis Habeck farm in the town of Kewaskum, located about two miles southeast of the village. The blaze was in a field and no damage resulted.

The fire alarm sounded again at 7 p. m. Tuesday and brought firemen hurrying to the station but it was for a drill called by Chief Oppermann to test some of the equipment. The firemen made a simulated run to the public grade school building. There they layed out several lengths of 3" and 1 1/2" hose, set up ladders to reach the third story rooms and roof of the building, carried the hose to the roof and played water from the top of the school. After completing this drill, the fire fighters and equipment moved to the high school parking lot. There they set up the portable water tank used for rural fires, filled it with water from the tank truck, and pumped it through two hose lines.

LETTER OF COMMENDATION GIVEN CZAJA IN GERMANY

Specialist Four Richard E. Czaja, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Czaja of Kewaskum, who is serving with the 28th Ordnance Company in Zweibrucker, Germany, on July 20 received a Letter of Commendation from his officer in command, Major Frank S. Hertzog.

Czaja, who has been stationed in Germany for the past 2½ years, where he serves as chief clerk in the Classified Documents Section at Zweibrucker, will receive his discharge about Aug. 25 and return home. In a letter to his folks, E-4 Czaja wrote that Major Hertzog was officially relieved from command of the company by Major Johnson on July 21 in the presence of representatives from the battalion headquarters, including Col. Spiva, battalion commander. Before the official ceremony of changing command took place, Czaja was called out in front of the entire company, 350 strong, and while everyone stood at attention, Maj. 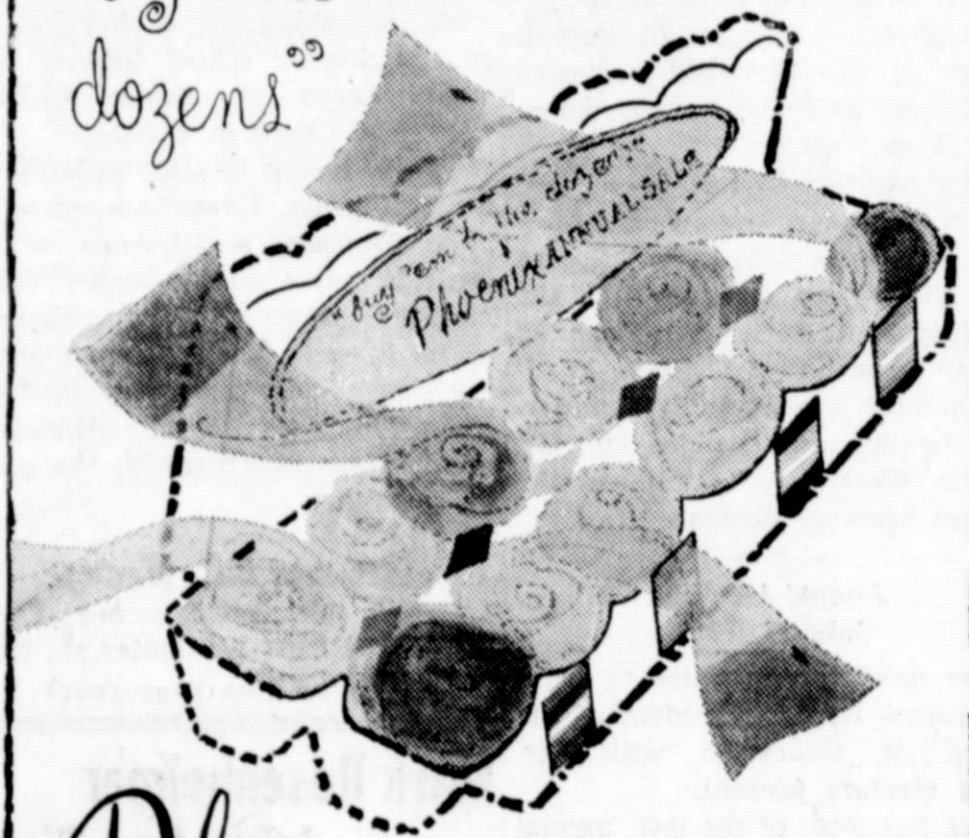

YOUR OWN BACKYARD!

Recently we discussed places to visit with Jim Page, editor of the Union Grove Sun, about 15 miles west of Racine. Jim told us about entertaining Iowa friends who wanted to see the scenic sights of Wisconsin—in one day. Jim showed them the lush countryside around Union Grove and then wondered where to take them.

His friends suggested seeing Lake Michigan—about 15 miles away—which they did. They were most appreciative.

This was an eye opener to Jim as it is to most inland people. The Lake Michigan shoreline is well worth the drive and visit to those people who have not seen a large body of water.

As a matter of fact, we spent the whole morning driving the 10 miles between Kenosha and Racine on Highway 32—the 32nd Division Memorial Highway. Kenosha has a wonderful city park where you can watch large lake ships move in, unload and move out. We stopped at a number of places between the two cities.

Restful Sight—Cool, Too

And if you haven't seen heavy waves roll in across the sandy beach you can stop almost anywhere along the Lake Michigan shore for a restful sight and generally a cool breeze. This is not only true between Racine and Kenosha, but further north, even along the extensive Milwaukee shoreline, and park system, and still further north including beautiful parks at Port Washington, Sheboygan, Manitowoc, Two Rivers and right up through Door county.

There are literally hundreds of places one can stop to picnic, let the kids run, dig in the sand, search for stones and driftwood, and gaze out on lake action. This is appreciated most by people who

live away from water. Often, however, such pleasures are so close to us, or taken for granted that we fail to appreciate what we have on hand—in our own backyard.

Excellent Parks

Kenosha, for example, has a beautiful park along the lakefront, sandy beach area and plenty of benches at Simmons Island park and beach. Little north of Kenosha is Alford Park which includes a drive along the shoreline, sandy beach, and family picnic area. Watching the waves roll up the sandy beach is a restful and exhilarating experience.

The more we travel around Wisconsin, the more we realize how much the state has to offer. We are surprised at the work already accomplished at state parks by the conservation department, and for other recreational facilities by most cities and counties; also by the State Historical society.

If you haven't had the pleasure of driving along Lake Michigan shoreline, try it someday for a restful afternoon. Start anywhere, from Kenosha in the south, or from Door county or Marinette in the north. You will be rewarded.

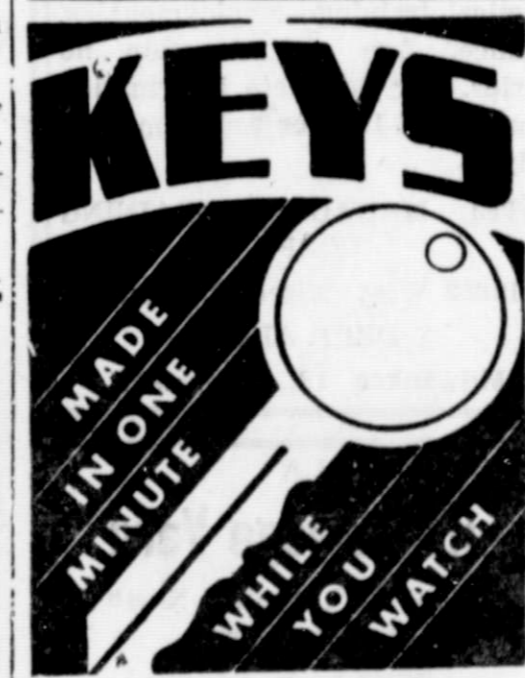

An overload at the West Bend and Kewaskum telephone offices was caused by the very large number of people using telephone service to find out what had happened. The local office accepted only emergency calls during the overload.

Involved in the mishap were cars driven either by Robert Ward, 25, West Bend, or Yochem; Glenn E. Gutjahr, 39, R. 1, Allenton, and John H. Vorpahl, 18, Kewaskum. Ward was traveling eastbound on Hwy. 33 when his auto struck the right rear of Gutjahr's station wagon, also eastbound. Ward's convertible careened into the right ditch, striking and breaking off the electric pole. The Gutjahr car was pushed into the westbound lane, striking the Vorpahl vehicle in the left side. Gutjahr's wagon then skidded into a bank on the north side of the road, bouncing back into the roadway. After impact, Vorpahl's car spun on the highway, losing a passenger and stopping in the north ditch, facing east.

Injured were: Ward car—Yochem, severe electrical burns, taken to Burn Center; Ward, possible neck fracture, scalp lacerations, bumps and bruises. Yochem was still in critical condition earlier this week. Gutjahr car—Gutjahr, chest pains; Barbara Gutjahr, 19, R. 1, Allenton, lacerations to right hand. Vorpahl car—Vorpahl, lacerations to left arm, bruises and

abrasions; Teresa Coulter, 16, R. 1, Allenton, head injuries, bruises and abrasions. Five of the injured were hospitalized.

With electrical service out, the fire siren could not be sounded in West Bend. However, the fire sirens blowing on the trucks brought out enough firemen to handle the situation. The electrically operated overhead door at Fire Station No. 1 had to be opened by a policeman by the hand method.

Asst. Police Chief August Zell, West Bend, without immediate telephone service, sent one squad car to the Electric Co., one to the Schmidt Funeral Home for ambulance service and one to the Station 2 (Barton) fire department.

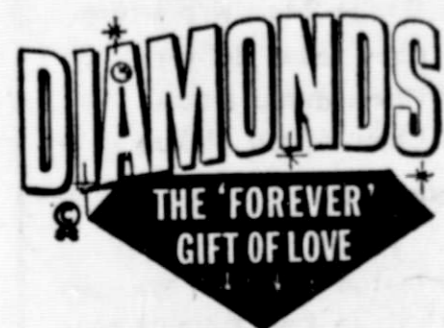
