Fighting One Blaze, Firemen Receive Call To 2nd Fire Wednesday

STATE FOREST FIRE CREW, CAMPBELLSPORT DEPT. CALLED TO AID

Much confusion and excitement was caused to say the least among our residents by the screaming of fire and police sirens on Wednesday afternoon. Alarmed residents ran out into the streets all over to find out what was happening.

It started at 3:10 p. m. when the fire sounded to summon the firemen to a threatening grass fire at the town of Kewaskum dump off Kettle Moraine drive southeast of the village. The blaze was a serious one and burned over several acres of grassland and wooded area on state owned land before the fire fighters got it under control. Fortunately the flames were stopped just feet short of a large woods. Had the fire reached the woods it would have been very difficult to get at and extinguish.

The blaze threatened to burn over much more surrounding grassland and a nearby rural home as it spread very rapidly fanned by a strong wind. The firemen played water from two lengths of hose on the flames and every other available man fought them with brooms and rakes to check its spread. Equipment, including the fire truck, equipment truck and tank truck had to be moved several times over hills and very rough terrain to get at all sources around the outside of the crackling flames. The department fought the fire almost two hours.

State forest headquarters at Mauthe lake was also informed of the fire and sent some of their fire fighting equipment and a crew

Local Members of 32nd Division Return Home

Kewaskum and area this week has been welcoming home members of the advance group and main body of the two West Bend units of the famed Red Arrow Division, the 32nd Aviation Company and the 432nd TC Maintenance Detachment. Most of the local 32nd Division members arrived last week or over the week end.

A formal retreat was held Friday afternoon at four o'clock, signifying the units' reverting from active duty to National Guard status. All but the rear detachment was expected to be home and present at the West Bend airport armory.

West Bend's official "Welcome Home" celebration, planned by area veterans organizations in cooperation with local communities, will be held Sunday afternoon, Aug. 26, including a ceremony and picnic at Regner City park for guardsmen and their families. Some 66,000 army and air national guardsmen are coming off active duty, following their callup last October for the Berlin crisis.

Names of the many Kewaskum members who have ended active duty with the 32nd Division and returned home have not been made available.

Word was received here this week that a station wagon, house trailer and all its contents owned by Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Mitchell of Kewaskum were destroyed by fire in the Black Hills of South Dakota the forepart of this week while the couple and their two daughters, Patty and Pammy, were returning home from an extended vacation trip.

The Mitchell family had been on a trip to California and other western states and were visiting the Black Hills enroute home when the fire occurred. It was reported by local residents who heard from the family that the blaze started in one of the front wheels of the trailer, caused either by a blowout or a brake bearing tightening and the entire wagon, trailer and belongings were destroyed.

It was stated that Mr. Mitchell's brother from Mineral Point would go to South Dakota to bring the family home.

Mr. Mitchell is a teacher and athletic coach at Kewaskum Community High school.

Charles Schultz Hurt In Fall Off 15 Ft. Wall

Charles Schultz, 29, of Kewaskum suffered injuries when he accidentally fell 15 feet to the ground from the top of a concrete wall at the Kewaskum Frozen Foods plant on Wednesday morning.

A new slaughter house addition is being built at the locker plant. The work is being done by Schultz Brothers, with whom Charles, a son of one of them, is employed. He was walking along the top of the east wall when he tripped on one of the steel bars protruding from the cement, lost his balance and fell to the ground.

The firemen's ambulance was summoned but before the attendants left the station they were informed that their service was not needed. Schultz said he did not believe he was injured, only wounded and stunned. Later, however, he consented to be taken to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, for observation and examination. He was taken there by Chief of Police Roland Pledl. The extent of Schultz's injuries has not been learned.

Wisconsin's flag and banner will be acknowledged in an avenue of flags on Tuesday morning, Aug. 14. Local Boy Is OK Again After Suffering Burns

Carl Marquardt, the five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerome Marquardt, Kewaskum, has recovered after suffering second degree burns to his face, neck and chest on Monday afternoon of last week when his shirt caught fire while he played with matches in his backyard on River View dr. Carl is out playing again with his friends.

When his shirt caught fire, the boy, according to Police Officer Marriner Frank, ran into the house, fanning the flames as he ran. An older brother, Leo, 12, probably saved Carl's life or prevented him from being seriously burned by smothering the flames with his hands, the officer said.

Leo suffered second degree burns to his left arm and hands. Frank took both boys to a physician's office for treatment. Neither boy was hospitalized.

NORTHERN HIGHLAND AMERICAN LEGION FORESTS

Wisconsin abounds in camping areas, but those in the southern and central part of the state are heavily used during the summer time because they are closer to both state and out-of-state population areas.

But if you want room, peace and quiet in Wisconsin's wilderness areas, drive further north to the Northern Highland and American Legion state forests in north-east Wisconsin. Here your chances of being crowded out of camping and picnic areas, even in August, are remote.

For Northern Highland Forest has 127,000 acres of wilderness that includes 150 lakes with over 300 miles of lake frontage. There are no less than 25 special camp sites along beautiful lake shores that provide swimming, boating and fishing in crystal clear waters.

Lack Neighbors!

This is the real forest, and some campers, not so hardy, have complained about the lack of neighbors!

The Legion Forest which adjoins Northern Highland at the south has another 38,000 acres of wooded wilderness with many lakes for swimming, fishing, camping, and nature itself.

A look at the map of this area reveals why it is called the "World's Most Concentrated Lake Region," which it is. These for-

ests cover much of Vilas and Oneida counties, and start 16 miles northwest of Rhinelander, near Minocqua and Woodruff, and include Lake Tomahawk, Arbor Vitae, Boulder Junction, and Manitowish Waters.

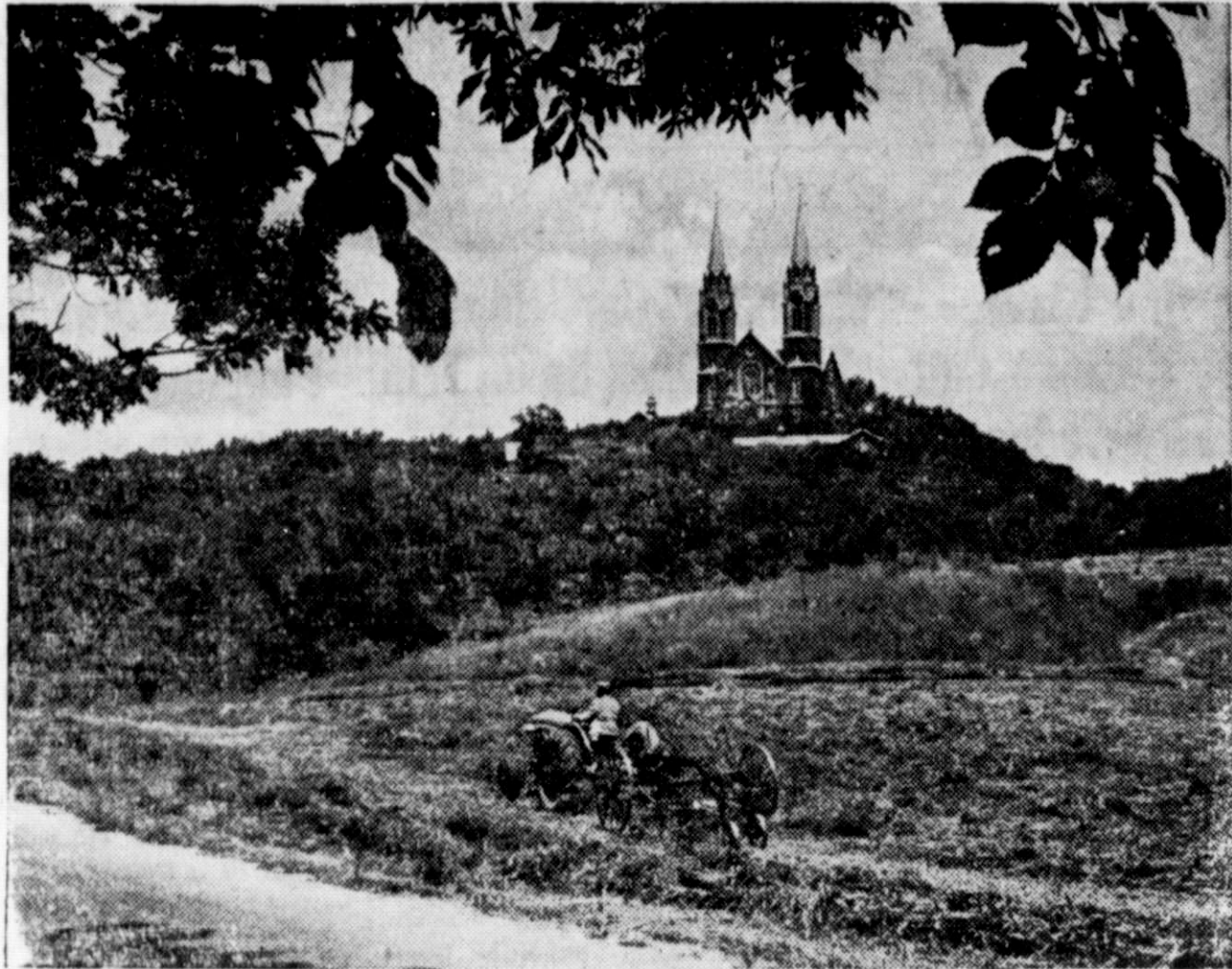
Of course, there are some fine resorts and motels in the area for overnight stays, but for a family on a low budget vacation, there are excellent camping sites in most beautiful natural surroundings, and they are very clean. They have good drinking water, and proper sanitary facilities.

In Midst Of Wilderness

Most important, however, is that these grounds are in the midst of wilderness areas where wild animals can be seen for the search off the beaten highways, and most of the lakes have sandy beaches and crystal clear water.

Actual location of the camping grounds may be obtained from the booklet available through the State Conservation Department on state parks and forest, at most tourist centers. If you drive in this area, you should obtain one of their maps.

It is not necessary to camp in this area. You may wish to drive from one lake to another for there are numerous picnic and boat landing sites which afford attractive scenic enjoyment. Do get off the main state highways onto town and country roads to enjoy Wisconsin's cool wilderness areas. Bend from one to two hours Mon-

HELEN DEGNER ASSUMES DUTIES AS COUNTY NURSE

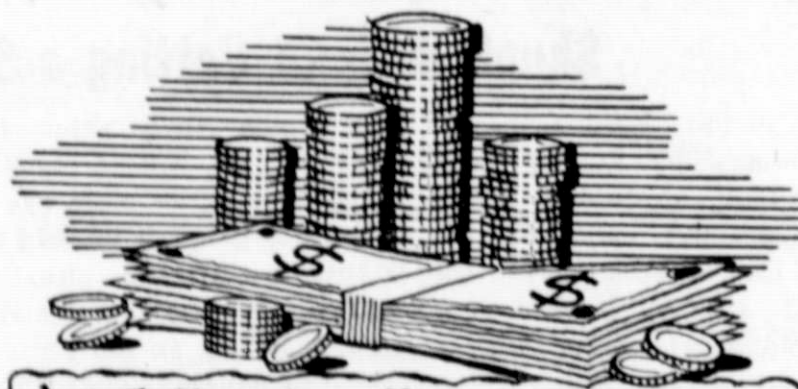

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Gordon Drake Speaker At County Meeting of AFL-CIO Members Here

"Inflation has forced the American public to become security conscious," Gordon V. Drake said Monday night in speaking at a Washington county meeting of AFL-CIO members in Kewaskum. Dr. Drake, Democratic candidate for Congress in the Sixth District, is an associate professor on the faculty of Wisconsin State college Oshkosh.

"In their attempt to be prepared financially for the needs and catastrophes of tomorrow, anxious families, especially in the middle and low income brackets, grasp frantically at a multiplicity of overlapping insurance type security plans. These can overburden the family budget to such an extent that there are no funds remaining for normal savings or investment to insure coverage of their future needs. The family's buying power is curbed, its ability to increase future income is limited, it remains in debt, and rapidly becomes insurance poor.

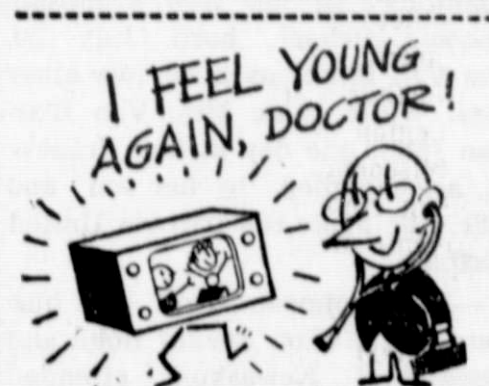
"On the other hand, there is a very definite need for insurance

type plans because the costs of educational expenses are deductible for low income families.

"However, let me emphasize this point: I do not believe in a federal or state handout program. Rather, I firmly submit that if financial assistance in these areas is necessary, it should be cautiously disbursed according to realistic criteria of need."

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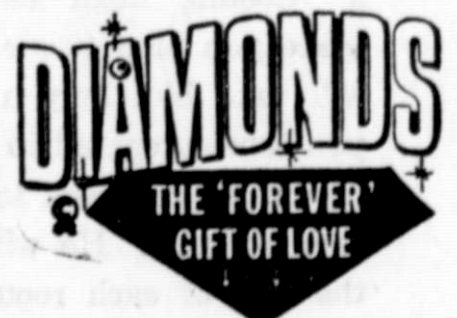

of all available men to help battle the blaze. When they arrived the Kewaskum firemen had the flames under control so that most of the danger of spreading further was over. The state crew immediately joined in the work and with Indian pumps and brooms helped continue the job and snuffed out flames that broke out anew. It is believed that the blaze began when someone started a fire at the dump and the wind blew burning bits of paper across the road and into the grass.

While the firemen were at the scene the local siren wailed again for another fire at the Ray Bales farm in the town of Auburn north of the village but firemen were unable to hear the siren. Chief of Police Roland Pledl then attempted to contact the radio equipped firemen's equipment truck to inform them of the Bales fire. Usually there is always one man remaining in the truck to receive and make radio calls to remain in contact with headquarters in case the tank truck, more equipment or firemen, police, ambulance or outside help is needed. But as all the firemen were busy at the time no one was in the truck for a few minutes and Chief Pledl couldn't get the call through. With his squad car siren screaming he did the only thing left to do, racing to the scene in person to inform the firemen of the second blaze.

In the meantime when the firemen couldn't be reached and to save time, one fire department member who had remained in town called the Campbellsport department and asked them to answer the call to the Bales farm, which they did at once. As soon as Chief Pledl got word to the local firemen that they were needed at the second blaze, the men pulled out, leaving the state crew to finish the job there.

With sirens again sounding, they raced back to the village, stopping at the fire station to refill their truck tank with water, and then sped to the Bales farm. When they arrived the Campbellsport firemen were there with two trucks and had the fire under control. The services of the local department were not needed so after remaining at the scene for a time they returned here, while Camp-

bellsport's men stayed at the farm to guard against further fire.

The blaze started in a chopper box containing straw which was being blown into the barn. The floor of the chopper box caught fire under the straw. These flames were put out handily but it was feared that some of the burning straw might have been blown into the barn as there were reports that smoke was seen coming from the barn. Firemen found no blaze inside the barn but stayed at the scene to make sure there was no fire in the straw there. Some of the straw was removed from the barn as a precautionary measure so the firemen could search for possible fire.

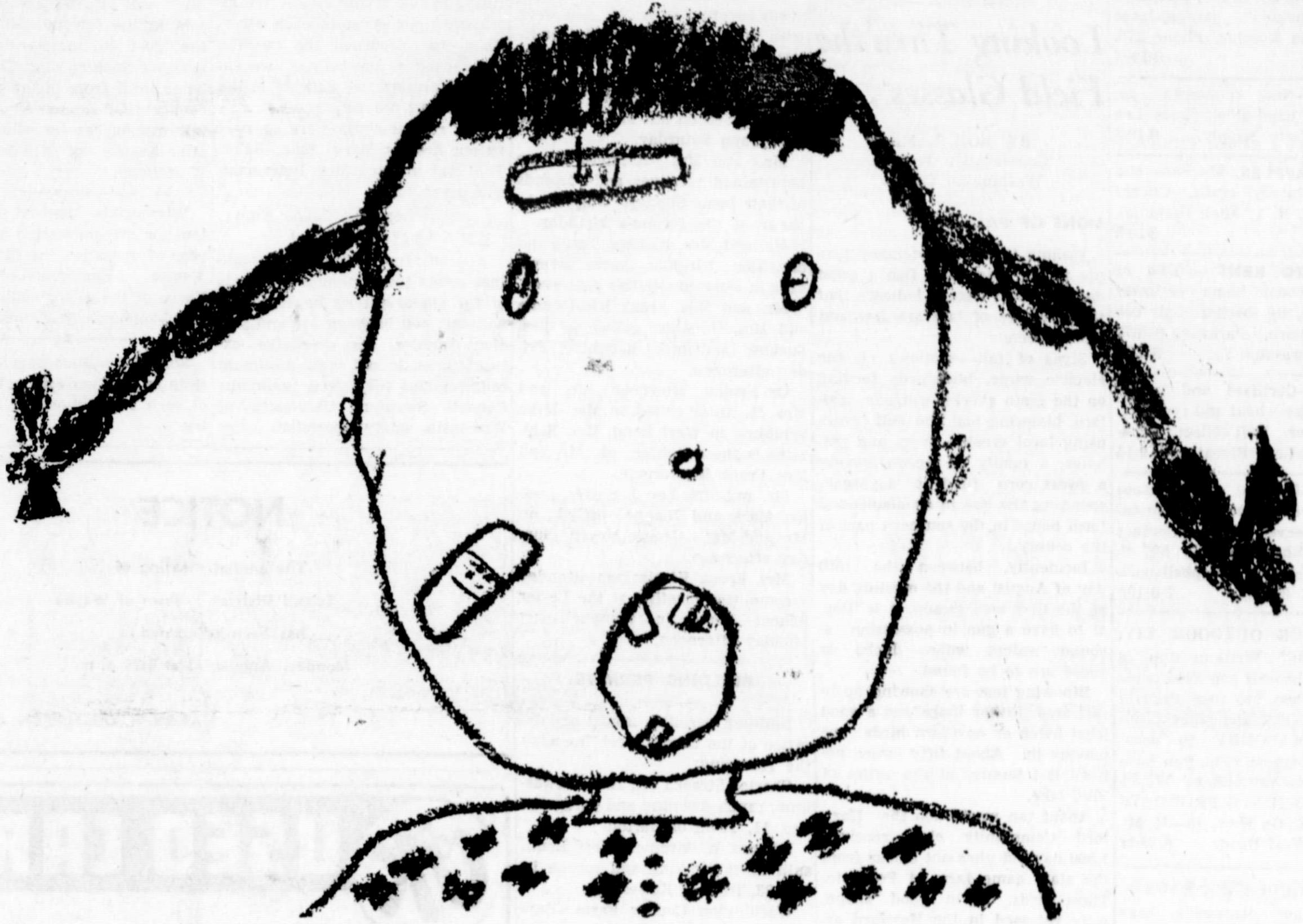

SIGNS OF FALL

Fishing is slow, not many people fishing. Men who fish a great deal on local waters indicate that their catches of late are few and far between.

Signs of fall—swallows on the electric wires, blackbirds feeding on the grain shocks, widgeon, mallard, bluewing teal and hell divers using local creeks, rivers and pot-holes; a family of racoon leaving a sweet corn field at daybreak, spending the day in an abandoned farm house in the southern part of the county.

Incidentally, between the 15th day of August and the opening day of the first bird season, it is illegal to have a gun in possession around waters where ducks or geese are to be found.

Bluewing teal are showing up in this area. Either there was a good local hatch or northern birds are moving in. About fifty were noticed last Sunday at the outlet of Pike lake.

About ten weeks ago the Hartford Community club received 1,500 day old pheasant chicks from the state game farm at Poynette. These birds, all in good shape, were released in the Hartford area July 29. Motorists should try to avoid hitting them in the event they wander on to the highway.

Many complaints are coming in from people living around the lakes in the county, that racoon are raiding their garbage cans. This will not last long. When the sweet corn is in the milk stage they will spend their nights in the farmers' fields. Barns used for the

storage of hay are an ideal home for them, and they create quite a mess when a family or two have lived there for sometime.

Badger are on the increase. They kill many gophers and when they dig for these animals in a cemetery they do considerable damage.
