Regal Ware Marks Its 17th Birthday

Seventeen is typically the age of boundless energy optimism and enthusiasm—a fitting description of Regal Ware, Inc. as the Kewaskum cookware firm observed its 17th anniversary on Aug. 6. It is the spirit which has been virtually a company trademark from the very beginning.

Back in 1945, Regal Ware president J. O. Reigle and his associates from Massilon, Ohio had been operating their newly acquired company only eight days when World War II came to an abrupt and unexpected end. With it came the automatic cancellation of three million dollars worth of government contracts, and the task of converting to peacetime production in the face of machinery and material shortages. The energy and ingenuity of the new company received its first test—and succeeded in record time. Within 30 days the firm was turning out aluminum sauce pans.

Regal's history since those trying early weeks has been one of steady growth and improvement. It has gained a position as one of the country's leading manufacturers of high quality stainless steel and aluminum cookware and automatic electric kitchen appliances. During the Korean conflict, Regal supplied over 3,000,000 steel shell casings to the armed forces.

Manufacturing facilities have grown along with the firm's sales volume. A 37,500 sq. ft. addition, more than double the plant's original 18,000 sq. ft. of manufacturing area, was completed in July and is now in use. It was the twelfth such addition since 1945 and brought the total production space to nearly 300,000 sq. ft.

Regal products are marketed throughout the United States, Canada, and several foreign countries. Branch offices and display rooms are maintained in New York, Chicago and Los Angeles.

TOUR THROUGH REGAL WARE PLANT MADE BY FIREMEN

About 18 to 20 members of the Kewaskum fire department were taken on a tour through the Regal Ware Inc. plant last Thursday evening. The group was shown through the plant by Charles Sparks and Leroy Keller, Sr. The firemen were shown the plant's overhead sprinkling system and fire fighting facilities and equipment, also the location of various motors, the boiler room, electrical outlets, main switches, natural gas connections, etc. in case of fire.

Cancer Crusade Concluded With Record Results

FINAL REPORT SHOWS THAT \$8,037.53 IS CONTRIBUTED TO TOP COUNTY GOAL

D. J. Kenny, chairman of the Washington county unit of the American Cancer society, reported this week that 135 volunteer workers have concluded their 1962 educational and fund raising campaign with record results.

In making public a detailed report, Kenny announced another record Crusade total for the county of \$8,037.53. More than 4,808 individual, business and industrial gifts were given for the continuation of cancer research, education and allied services. The county quota was \$7,500, which was exceeded by \$537.53.

Kenny also announced that the Washington county unit will hold its annual meeting for officers and directors at 7:30 p. m., Aug. 27 in the second floor conference room of the Security Building in West Bend. The public is invited to attend the gathering, where the principle business will be nomination and election of officers and directors for the coming year.

As the Washington county unit topped their Crusade goal this year, a trend continued that has seen county residents support the Cancer society year after year with record contributions. In 1961 the county contributed a record \$7,800, and in 1960 the goal was topped with \$7,515.

Chairman Richard C. Klein headed Crusade activities, with 135 volunteers circulating "Neighbor to Neighbor" packets in Kewaskum, West Bend, Hartford and Germantown. A direct mail campaign was carried on in every township in the county.

Direct mail receipts from townships and villages amounted to \$1,687.75; businesses and industries in West Bend, Hartford and Kewaskum added \$2,041.74 and memorial contributions amounted to \$286.94.

In the "Neighbor to Neighbor" phase, Kewaskum residents contributed \$357.88, West Bend \$2,398.49, Hartford \$1,079.62 and Germantown \$185.11, bringing the total amount given to \$8,037.53.

Kenny pointed out that while the local drive has ended, the Crusade continues throughout the year. Persons who have not had the opportunity to contribute or those who may wish to make a special contribution in memory of a friend or loved one who has fallen victim to cancer can do so by mailing their envelope directly to "American Cancer Society, Washington County Unit, Security Building, West Bend."

Information regarding specific bequests in wills can be obtained from Atty. Henry F. Renard of West Bend, chairman of the Washington county legacy committee.

Mrs. Paul Albrecht and Mrs. Ralph Rimmel served as co-chairmen in the "Neighbor to Neighbor" campaign in Kewaskum. Alfred Seefeldt was Kewaskum township chairman.

DEVIL'S LAKE

We realize that Devil's Lake near Baraboo has had a lot of promotion as a scenic and camping area in Wisconsin. Nor do we recommend that you take your family there in July and August when it is crowded most weekends.

But if you haven't been to Devil's Lake, we suggest you plan a day's outing there in September or October when it won't be so crowded and the scenery will be just as magnificent. This is all the more true if you have youngsters in the climbing age, 6 to 50.

You can climb these unusual rock formations and huge boulders at the west, east or south of the lake. In any case, you and your children will be rewarded by a marvelous view from the top, plus an exciting trip up and, believe it or not, a slower one down. It is easier to climb up those rocks than it is to climb down!

Two Bathhouses

Devil's Lake Park is unique in that there are two bathhouses, one at either end, excellent swimming beach with lifeguard on duty, and you can swim in other sandy beaches at your own risk. There are many picnic and camping sites, but this park does have a tremendous traffic on warm July and August weekends.

Maps available at the park locate a number of foot trails

through the bluffs, and also the many interesting rocks, such as "Devil's Doorway," "Balance Rock," and "Elephant Rock," which our boys climbed several times in the same day!

Concession stands are available for most picnic and camping supplies, and today fishing is becoming more and more popular at Devil's Lake. You might see the lights of the fishermen at night trying their luck for trout. Many birds, unusual trees and flowers can be seen. Bring along your camera for spectacular shots along the high ridges.

Baraboo Nearby

We should mention, of course, that the Circus World Museum at Baraboo is less than five miles from the park. We will do a separate column on that museum which is even more interesting to adults than it is to children.

Incidentally, if you belong to the State Historical society, you and your family can visit the Circus World Museum free of charge in addition to other sites operated by the society such as Wade House, Villa Louis, etc., each of which alone is worth the price of the family membership.

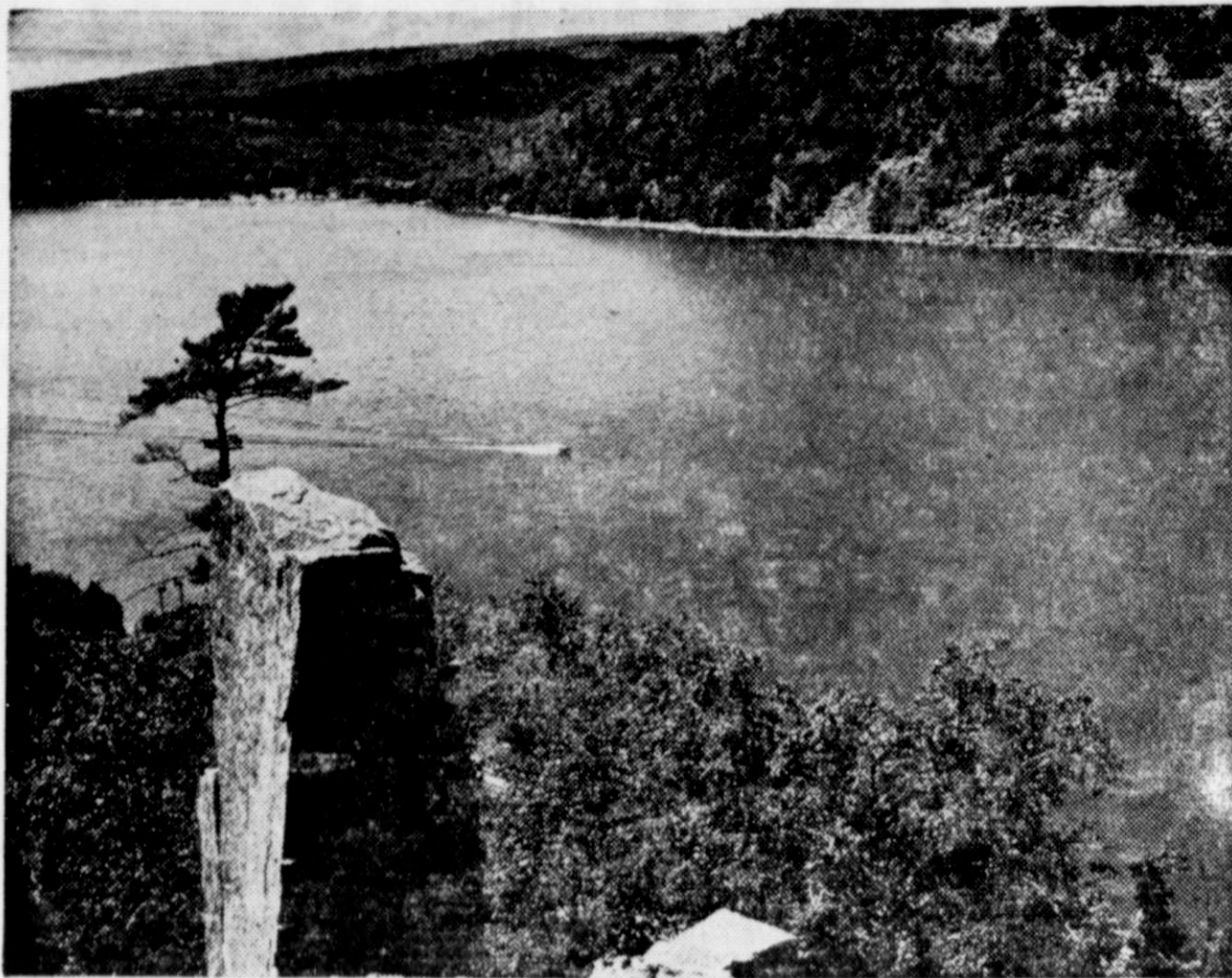

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all Board Members present except Trustee Wieter.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Geidel, seconded by Trustee Eberle and duly carried.

Mrs. Laura Schaefer appeared to complain about excessive noise at night from school ball diamonds and of stray hardballs breaking windows and damaging property in the immediate vicinity.

The commissioner was instructed to inform the Doane Appraisal Service to make an appraisal of all village buildings in the spring of 1963, said appraisal to be used for fire insurance purposes.

The commissioner was authorized to make additional payment of \$4,000.00 on the water department mortgage.

PETITION OF ELECTORS AND PROPERTY OWNERS FOR DIRECT ANNEXATION

The undersigned, constituting the owner of all of the real property in the following territory of the town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, lying contiguous to the Village of Kewaskum, petition the honorable village to annex the territory described below and shown on the attached scale map to the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin:

The North 200 feet of the East 165 feet of the West 363 feet of the SE ¼ of the SW ¼ of Section 9, Township 12 North, Range 19 East.

TOGETHER WITH an Easement for right-of-way purposes over and along the S. 40 feet of the N. 240 feet of the W. 363 feet of the SE¼ of the

SW¼ of said Section 9; and the use of the right-of-way described in Right-of-Way Easement recorded in Vol. 352 of Records on page 179, Washington County Records, as Doc. No. 257579. It being understood, however, that the right-of-way easements herein granted are not exclusive, but are to be used in-common with any other persons or corporations that now have or might hereafter acquire ownership of any of the real estate in the aforementioned ¼-¼ section. Said parties, of the second part, their heirs and assigns, by acceptance of this deed agree to pay and assume their pro-rate cost of any improvements to the right-of-ways hereinbefore described, including but not limited to grading, gravel and paving.
