Public Schools Open Sept. 4 With Staff of 39 Teachers

UPPER CLASSMEN IN HIGH SCHOOL REPORT DAY LATER, SEPT. 5

The Kewaskum Elementary school for all grades, kindergarten through 8, will open on Tuesday, Sept. 4, at 9:00 a. m. Incoming freshmen and transfer students will report at the high school on Tuesday, Sept. 4, at 9:00 a. m. All other high school students, sophomores, juniors and seniors, will report for the first time on Wednesday, Sept. 5, at the usual time of 8:15 a. m.

The cafeteria in both the grade and high schools will be open for the first time on Wednesday, Sept. 5. Grade and high school youngsters reporting on Tuesday will have to bring their own lunches for that day and will have to be able to provide money for their lunch tickets for the balance of the week which will be 75c. All students reporting for the first time on Wednesday and who wish to eat in the school cafeteria Wednesday, Thursday and Friday should report to the school office immediately upon arrival Wednesday morning to purchase their lunch tickets. WEEKLY LUNCH TICKETS FOR THE BALANCE OF THE SCHOOL YEAR MUST BE PURCHASED ON FRIDAY OF THE PRECEDING WEEK.

Buses will make their usual runs as they did during the first semester of last year beginning on Tuesday, Sept. 4, the only difference being that on this first day of school they will be running one-half hour later than on subsequent days.

It is the hope of the administration that parents will insist that their children will be in regular attendance that children maintain a high interest in school and school activities. Regular attendance invariably reflects a higher degree of academic performance.

Parents of children who will be attending the kindergarten and who have not registered for them are asked to do so in the grade school office on Tuesday, Aug. 28. Parents of kindergarten youngsters will be informed which session their children will be assigned to attend.

Kindergarten and both sections of grades one and two will be housed in the upper elementary building.

Welcome Home Party For 32nd Division, Parade This Sunday

CELEBRATION AT WEST BEND PARK STARTING AT 2 P. M., FAMILIES INVITED

Plans have been completed for the mammoth "Welcome Home" celebration in honor of 32nd Division members and independent reservists to be held at the West Bend City Park, Sunday, Aug. 26, under the joint sponsorship of the City of West Bend and the veterans organizations from throughout the West Bend area.

A parade down Main st. from Poplar to the West Bend City Park will kick off the afternoon's festivities, with all returning servicemen riding in convertibles. The West Bend High school and Port Washington City bands, as well as army equipment, will be in the line of march. The massed colors of cooperating veterans' organizations will lead the parade followed by dignitaries, members of the 32nd Aviation Company, members of the 432nd Aircraft Maintenance Detachment and individual reservists who were recalled to active duty during the 1961 emergency. The cavalcade of convertibles will form at the armory building at the West Bend airport at 1:00 p. m. and all participating returnees, including independent reservists, are asked to be at the airport armory by 1:00 p. m. in uniform, so they can be assigned to convertibles.

The parade will start at the old court house at 2:00 p. m. proceeding down Main st. north to the city park.

Additional convertible are needed so that all returnees can be driven down the parade route and anyone who could provide a convertible for the parade is asked to contact B. C. Ziegler at West Bend FE 4-2311.

At city park a brief welcome ceremony will be held at the bandstand with D. J. Kenny serving as master of ceremonies.

Members of the immediate families of the returnees are invited to join in the ceremony and party which will follow at the park. Lunch and refreshments will be served to all returnees and their families. Members of the West Bend Fire Department have volunteered to prepare and serve hundreds of bratwurst, hot dogs, etc. to the group. The West Bend High school band will play a concert during the party following the official ceremony.

Some 250 members of the two West Bend based units and independent reservists are expected to join in the Welcome Home festivities, and with members of their immediate families participating, the group will number an estimated 800.

The celebration will serve as an official welcome and recognition by the City of West Bend and cooperating veterans' organizations to the men from this area who were called to duty during the emergency last year.

Every community has something worthwhile for tourists to see or buy. But we must let them know about it!

Example: Just west of Highway 51, between Stevens Point and Wausau is Dancy, probably the smallest unincorporated village in the state. But the Dancy store has five cent ice cream cones, two soups, yet!

Carl Zielke of the Wisconsin Press Association doubted this news, and investigated. He asked the English store keeper, "How much are your ice cream cones?" She said, "Five cents." Carl, playing the part of the big operator, replied, "Then give me one with two soups."

"It's still five cents," she said, "all our cones have two soups."

Just around Dancy are excellent fishing areas and parks for camping, swimming, and picnicking, but the "natives" will not always tell you just where the fish are.

Visit Farm

On the west side of Highway 51, about seven miles south of Stevens Point is a large farm with a sign in front: "Visitors Welcome." Large, clean white buildings and a Holstein herd can be viewed from the highway. Many tourists and people from large cities have never been inside a barn. Communities through their chamber of commerce groups might promote farms in their areas available to visitors.

We have received requests from people who would like to visit cheese factories, saw mills, and paper mills in central Wisconsin, and from others who would like to tour factories, even newspaper plants. Local Chamber of Commerce groups might look at their communities with "new eyes" to discover what they have to offer.

Mineral Point Plan

Mineral Point, about 55 miles southwest of Madison, has an unusual promotion system. Settled in 1827, Mineral Point does have much to see including the famous "Shakerag" street and Pendarvis

House, a restoration of the early Cornish houses of 1830, typical of the cottages of Cornwall, England.

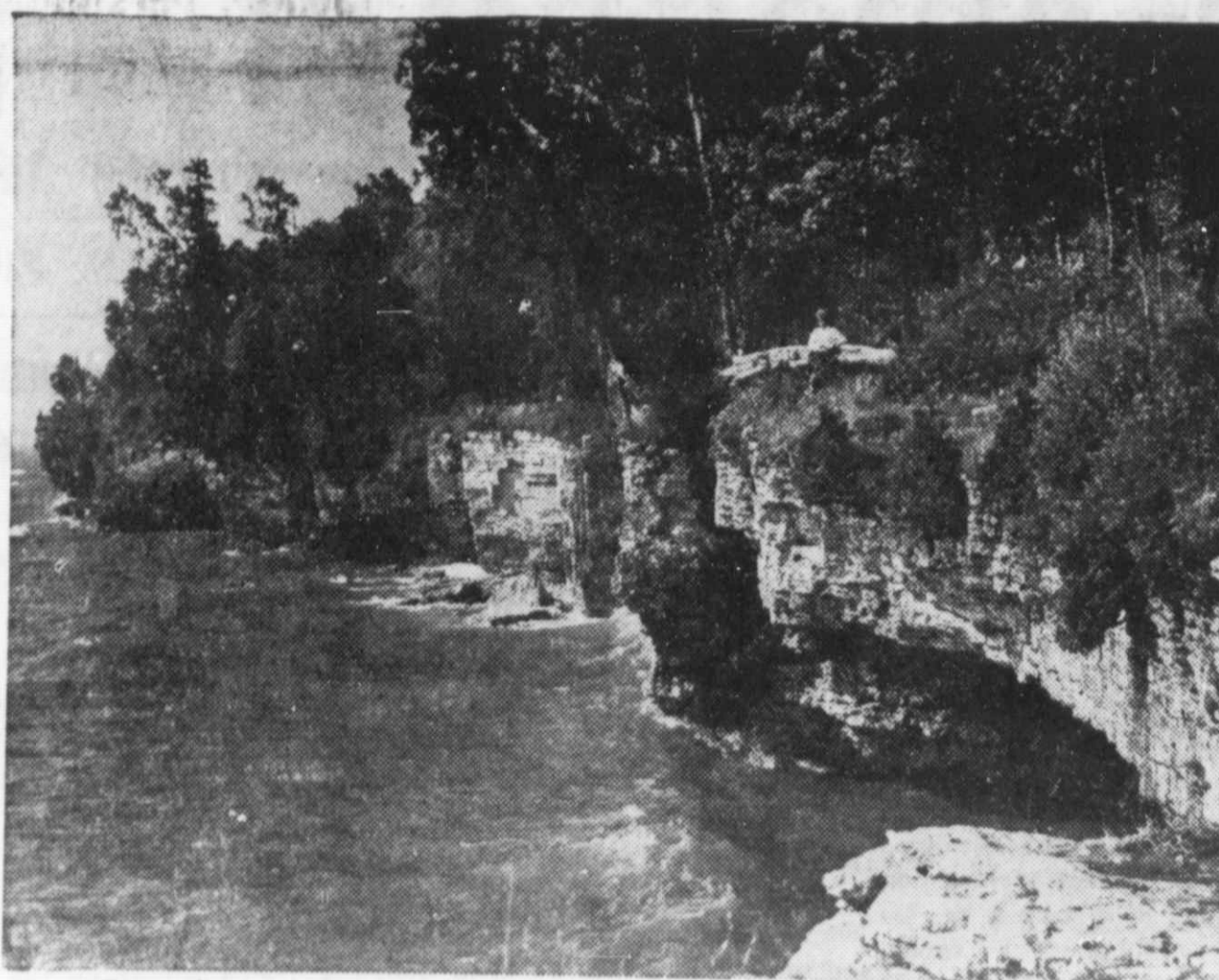
Maps of the community may be obtained almost anywhere in the city. On the city maps are listed places of historic interest indicated by a number, the same number which appears in front of that historic spot in the community.

In this way, without a guide, people will tour the city on foot or car and check the numbers they come across with those on the map to discover where General U. S. Grant stayed over night, the spot where the only legal hanging took place in Wisconsin, the site where Henry Dodge took the oath as Territorial Governor of Wisconsin, the first Oddfellow's Hall west of the Alleghenies, the first lead mines, and of course, "Shakerag Street."

The street was so named because wives would signal the men home for meals from their mining on the opposite ridge by shaking the rag from their doorsteps. Pendarvis House, a typical century old Cornish home, is worth a story in itself.

Every community could follow Mineral Point's example.

25 Years Ago

Aug. 20, 1937

The four big prizes were awarded to Sylvester Volm, 1st, accordion selections; Miss Marion Meis and Clyde Darmody, 2nd, violin and guitar; Miss Leyla Domman, 3rd, singing; Doris May Koenig, 4th, singing. Judges selected by the audience were Miss Jenny Byrne, Leo Wietor and Rudolph Kullman. Miss Rose Schmitt received the most votes and was awarded a wrist watch and the honor of being the most popular lady.

Mr. and Mrs. Reinhold Boegel of St. Kilian moved to the K. A. Honck farm west of the village.

Two men were injured, one fatally, in a collision between an auto and truck at the Washington-Fond du Lac county line 2½ miles north of here, on Hwy. 45-55. Gilbert Halverson, 30, Sheboygan, a passenger in the car, died at the West Bend hospital eight hours after the crash. Carl Althaus, 44, West Bend, driver of the car, was seriously injured. Officers reported that Althaus was driving south and attempted to pass a car at the bridge. A truck coming from the opposite direction was too close. Althaus braked and his car skidded into the path of the truck striking it broadside. The truck was driven by Fred Malzahn, 56, Ripon livestock dealer, who was not injured.

FIFTY YEARS AGO

Aug. 24, 1912

Michael Geidel, one of the oldest residents of this community, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Jacob Becker, at the age of 79.

A farmers' organization was organized in Groeschel's hall when about 35 farmers of this community assembled for the purpose of forming an organization. The name adopted was the Kewaskum Agricultural society. Officers chosen are: President, F. C. That the village has a craze for automobiles is shown by the number of car owners. At present there are 17 owners.

The Milwaukee Journal band attracted a large crowd of people to Long Lake Sunday. The crowd was the largest ever seen there. It is estimated that between 1500 and 2000 persons were present.

G. Reindl Plans to Attend Camp Wawbeek

The season's final group of campers will arrive at Camp Wawbeek to spend two weeks, beginning Sunday, Aug. 26. The Easter Seal camp will be host to about 60 handicapped people between the ages of 15 and 45. The camp's last session is reserved for the more severely handicapped people who come with attendants.

Buildings at camp have been designed and equipped to meet the special needs of the handicapped. All have ramped entrances and extra-wide swinging doors. Double rows of hand rails in the dormitories, wheel-in bath and shower rooms and hydraulic lifters make care and movement of the campers easier.

Although severely disabled, the campers in this session will join in most camp activities which have been modified to their abilities.

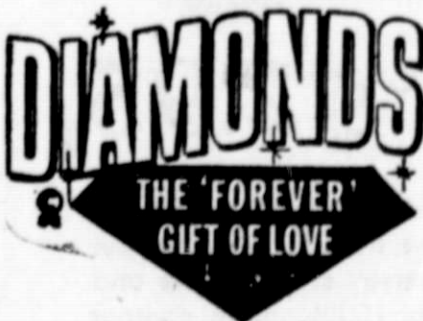

event, which will begin at 6 p. m. promises to provide "good fellowship, good food, and good government"—GOP style.

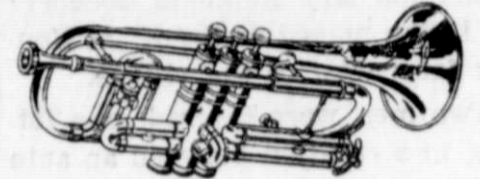

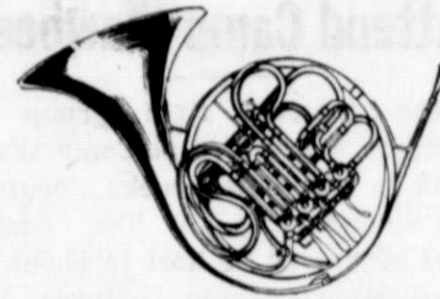

DEER KILLED HERE

Fishing slow, fishing pressure light. Northerns starting to bite in the Milwaukee river. Local lakes producing a few bass and bluegills. However, fishermen must work for them.

Bluewing teal and widgeon showed up at their favorite spots on the Milwaukee and Rock rivers about ten days ahead of last year. Just what caused this early migration is hard to tell. The local hatch of pheasants, rabbits and squirrels appears to be above that of last year. There are plenty of deer in the county, in fact one was killed on Highway 45 north of Kewaskum Sunday evening.

Sportsmen's licenses are now available and the big game as well as the small game hunting regulations will be in the hands of the license depots in the near future. The regular hunting license and the sportsmen's license expires on Aug. 31, 1962.

We know that many of you are now planning fall vacations and like to get the dates on hunting seasons as soon as possible. Although all the information is not available at this time, we will give you what we have.

We have nothing yet on the waterfowl seasons as these seasons are set at a later date after reviewing the framework for such seasons from the federal government. The reports on waterfowl prospects from Canada are not good, but there does appear to be a fairly good local population of ducks.

The bow and arrow seasons for deer are from Sept. 22 through Nov. 13 and from Dec. 1 through Dec. 31. The seasons are statewide and deer of either sex are legal game.

The gun deer season will be Nov. 17 through Nov. 25; spike bucks and larger will be legal. There will be an either sex season south of Highway 60 and the Wisconsin River westward from Sauk City for the first 2 days (Nov. 17 and 18)

and an either sex season on the Apostle Islands (except Madeline) Oct. 15 through Nov. 25.

Mississippi river counties will also have a two-day season on both sexes, and this will be followed by a five-day buck season to close Friday, Nov. 23. Counties included in this Mississippi river zone are Pierce, Pepin, Buffalo, Trempealeau, LaCrosse and Vernon west of Highway 131.

Ruffed grouse season will be as follows:

Northern zone, Oct. 1—Nov. 13; central zone, Oct. 1—Nov. 30; southwest zone, Oct. 20—Dec. 16; southeast zone, Oct. 21—Nov. 13.

The bag limit is 3 and possession limit 6.

Pheasant season—statewide, opens Oct. 20 and extends through Nov. 13. The bag limit is one and possession limit 2 for the first 2 days (Oct. 20-21). Starting Oct. 22, the bag limit is 2 and possession limit 4.

Hungarian partridge season is concurrent with the pheasant season; bag limit and possession limits are 3 and 6.

Squirrel season in the southeast zone is Oct. 20 through Jan. 31, and in the northwest zone Oct. 1 through Jan. 31. The bag limit is 5 and the possession limit is 10.

Cottontail rabbit in the northern zone is Oct. 1 through Jan. 31 and in the southern zone Oct. 20 through Jan. 31. The bag and possession limits are 3 and 6.

Raccoon season in the southern zone is Oct. 15 through Dec. 31, with no closed season in Walworth, Racine and Kenosha counties. In the northern zone the season is Oct. 1 through Dec. 31. There is no bag limit on raccoon.

This is all the information we have at the present time. We will have information on the waterfowl seasons and other changes in the regulations sometime in September.
