## Opening PTA Meeting Will Be Held Monday

JOSEPH RAAB, MATHEMATICS  
PROFESSOR AT OSHKOSH  
COLLEGE TO SPEAK

Joseph A. Raab, assistant professor of mathematics at Oshkosh State college, will speak at the opening meeting of the Kewaskum Grade school PTA Monday, Sept. 10. The meeting, to be held in the grade school cafeteria, will start at 8 p. m.

Prof. Raab is a member of a four men mathematics educators' committee planning a \$1,300,000 film program to train elementary mathematics teachers.

In a recent article in the Milwaukee Journal, Prof. Raab stated that the program is aimed at avoiding such inaccurate questions by kindergarten teachers as "which half of this apple is largest?"

He said the films, heretofore of generally poor mathematical quality, would train teachers from kindergarten level through eighth grade to use correct mathematical terms at all stages of instruction.

The new approach to mathematics instruction emphasizes the reasoning factor because the student will learn why the rules are made, not "because the book says so."

In his talk Prof. Raab will discuss the "why" and "what" in changes in mathematics instruction along with various aspects of the training film program which his committee hopes to have ready for production by 1966. The public is invited to attend.

## Holy Trinity School Opens With Increase In Enrollment to 258

Holy Trinity Catholic school opened on Wednesday morning with an enrollment of 258 pupils, an increase of six over last year's total of 252 on opening day. The enrollment was larger by 14 children over the expected total of 244. Enrolled are 140 boys and 118 girls. There was only a half day of school on opening day.

Thirty-eight children started school in the first grade, an increase of six over last year's total of 32. Seven of last term's pupils have transferred to other schools. ## Voters to Cast Ballots In Primary Election On Tuesday, Sept. 11

Next Tuesday, Sept. 11, is primary election day throughout Wisconsin and voters will go to the polls to select a complete slate of state officials, a U. S. senator, representative in congress, state senator, assemblyman and complete slate of Washington county officials.

Voting for the village will take place at the municipal building and the polls will be open from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. Town of Kewaskum balloting will be done in the Union hall in this village with the polls open from 9 a. m. until 5:30 p. m.

Main interest in the election has been spotlighted on the race for governor of Wisconsin with three candidates in the running for the Republican nomination. They are Philip G. Kuehn, who gave Governor Gaylord Nelson a close race in the last gubernatorial election; Wilbur N. Renk and Robert LaFollette Sucher. John W. Reynolds, present state attorney general, is unopposed for the Democratic nomination.

Another three way race which has aroused considerable interest is the GOP contest for nomination as the county's assemblyman. Elmer Schowalter, Jackson, incumbent, will be opposed by Betsy Ann Breitling, also of Jackson, and Charles E. Dickenson of Colgate.

### Several Accidents Occur Over Week End

Three persons were killed and more than 17 injured in traffic accidents in Washington county over the Labor Day week end but only one of the mishaps occurred in the Kewaskum area. The crash in which three lost their lives took place on Hwy. 41 at the southern end of the county.

The only accident reported locally occurred at the junction of Hwys. 45 and V at the overhead bridge just north of Kewaskum Monday morning. Ronald Voecks, about 18, of R. 1, Kewaskum, lost control of his auto in making a turn from Hwy. 45 onto V and the vehicle plowed into a guard rail, tearing up a large section or rail. The car was damaged but Voecks escaped with only minor injuries.

Several mishaps in Fond du Lac county occurred in the surrounding area or involved Kewaskum drivers.

### School Has Openings In Driver Classes

The West Bend School of Vocational and Adult Education has openings in its driver education program beginning Sept. 19, 1962. Any person wanting to learn to drive is requested to contact the vocational school office, phone FE 4-9131 or FE 4-9132.

The driver education program is a fully accredited and highly recommended course consisting of 20 hours of classroom instruction and 8 hours of practice driving instruction in a dual control car. The classes meet from 7:30 - 9:30 on Wednesday evenings in room 266 for ten weeks and the behind-the-wheel driving schedule is arranged with the individual learner for one hour per week for eight weeks. A fee of \$9.00 is charged for the course. Non-residents are charged an additional \$10.00 tuition fee.

Classroom instruction covers a variety of subjects including the following: securing the instruction permit personal fitness for driving, knowing your car, driving maneuvers, good practices in traffic, driving on expressways, skillful driving under adverse conditions, traffic laws, car purchase and insurance protection, and automobile economy.

The behind-the-wheel instruction

is offered in a 1962 dual control, automatic shift car. The actual driving instruction includes starting and stopping on a hill, turning, backing, signalling, parallel and angle parking, driving in traffic, and driving on the open highway.

All persons interested in enrolling in the driver education program are asked to register before Sept. 14 in order to assure themselves of receiving the instruction at the time they wish.

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


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

### Indian Grid Squad Has Only 6 Lettermen Back

Graduation may cause some big changes in the championship outlook of the Scenic Moraine conference this fall. Defending Champion Random Lake has 12 lettermen back but is minus all but three of its key players from last year's squad, leaving the door open for Pewaukee and North Fondy to move in as threats.

Leading in number of lettermen is Germantown with 15 returning from a 7th place team. North Fondy has 11 back from a 3rd place team. With 30 varsity prospects, he says that he will be starting with a nucleus of the 1961 team that finished with a 3-4 record. Kewaskum lettermen include Mark Kral, Gerald Geidel, Jack Theusch, Russell Breit, Robert Ewert and Mike Coulter. The Indians have been drilling hard for the opening of the season.

Grafton and Random Lake were first to get into action. Grafton invaded Cedarburg for a non-conference game Sept. 7, while Random Lake opened at Cedar Grove. Campbellsport and Slinger open their season at Campbellsport Sept. 14, while North Fondy prys off the Lid at Germantown the same day. Kewaskum and Pewaukee will square off in the opener on Sept. 14.

pastorate at Kewaskum. In each of these pastorates his years have been filled with a fruitful ministry. His talents as an administrator were readily apparent not only in the congregations he served but also in the communities, synods and the denomination of which he is a member.

From the early years of his ministry he revealed his concern for Christian education and the youth work in the church. He is credited for establishing the Christian Education Leadership Training schools and workshops and the youth conferences which have been held at Green Lake (Pilgrim Camp) since 1933. He has personally directed or taught in these for more than 20 years, many of these years for the National Board of Christian Education.

Another of his interests through the years has been in the Ecumenical movement. In every parish he has served he has been an organizer and officer of ministerial asso-

ciations, council of churches, councils of religious education, community vacation bible schools, community thanksgiving and Lenten services, etc. He conceived the plan for Union Pentecost services, the first to be held in Illinois and Wisconsin and now being promoted by the National Council of Churches. For six years he served as chairman of the planning and strategy committee of the Wisconsin Council of Churches after which he served two terms as president of the Wisconsin Council of Churches. He was a visiting delegate of the council to the World Council of Churches meeting at Evanston, Ill.

In his denomination he has served on special committees for the study and preparation for the merger which resulted in the Evangelical and Reformed church in 1934 and more recently the merger

which brought into being the United Church of Christ. He was a delegate to three General Synod meetings of the Evangelical and Reformed church and to the Merger Synod in Cleveland, Ohio in 1957. He served two terms as vice-president of the South Wisconsin Synod.

His travels have taken him over much of our nation and visits to the Central American countries with extra time in Honduras and Mexico.

In the various communities he has been a member of Rotary or Kiwanis and has served on community welfare agencies, community advisory associations, cemetery boards, planning groups, etc.

In each of the congregations he has served, it has been a part of his mission to either help liquidate a building indebtedness, carry out

an extensive remodeling project, or develop and carry out a building program. The inviting and serviceable addition at Peace church is the latest of these developments.

Mr. Hammen is married and has two children, Mrs. Ray Pritchard of Whitestone, New York, and Philip at home.

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
