## Enrollment of 465 Students In High School Sets Record; Freshmen Class Numbers 137

### 422 Enrolled in Elementary School

TOTAL NUMBER OF PUPILS  
ATTENDING PUBLIC  
SCHOOLS IS 887

Kewaskum Community High school opened last Tuesday (freshmen) and Wednesday (upper classmen) with an enrollment of 465 students, largest in the history of the school. The record enrollment of 465 topped last year's total of 455 by 10 students. Freshmen entering high school numbered 137, just one less than last year's record-breaking class of 138.

Enrollment in the elementary school dropped to 422 after last year's record-setting total of 442, a difference of 20 pupils. The reason for last year's surge was an exceptionally large kindergarten class of 81. At that time a peak was reached in the number of children of kindergarten age. This term's enrollment in the kindergarten classes is 57, which is 24 fewer than last fall.

Total enrollment in high school and the grades is 887, just 10 under that of last year's 897. This figure added to the enrollment of 258 pupils in Holy Trinity school this year brings the total number of young people attending school in Kewaskum this school year to 1,145.

## \$162,000 Program Of Telephone Co. Nears Completion

CUSTOMERS URGED TO CUT  
THEIR WIRE AT 7 A. M.  
NEXT WEDNESDAY

A \$162,000 program to convert the Kewaskum exchange to dial operation is nearing completion, according to M. F. Benish, local manager for the General Telephone company.

"On Sept. 19, at 7:00 a. m., many months of work and planning will culminate in the cutting of the wires, cables and lines serving the magneto telephone system, and the Kewaskum exchange will be on a dial operated basis," he said.

He went on to say, "As this cut-over is partly on a co-ordinated effort between our customers and our own forces, I would like to urge all customers to be sure and cut their wire at 7:00 a. m. on the morning of the 19th. Their failure to do so will result in their dial telephone, and that of other customers on their line, being out of service."

CUSTOMERS ARE REMINDED THAT THEY MUST DIAL ALL SEVEN NUMBERS TO REACH THEIR PARTY.

Mr. Benish pointed out that the new dial equipment would be of the latest design and would be terminal per station equipment. "This means that once a customer is given a number they will retain that number as long as they have continuous service, regardless of where they might move in the exchange or the type of service they have," he added, "in addition full selective ringing on party lines will be provided. All customers will hear only their own ring."

"This modern equipment, which can be expanded, is our way of showing our confidence in the future of Kewaskum. Our records indicate we had 714 telephones in the Kewaskum exchange on Jan. 1, 1956, 860 on Jan. 1, 1960, and 980 as of July 31, 1962," Mr. Benish went on to say. "Sometime very soon in our conversion program one of our customers will be using our 1,000th telephone in the Kewaskum exchange."

The Telephone company had occupied the present building since 1920. The new dial central office equipment building is located at 1315 Park View dr.

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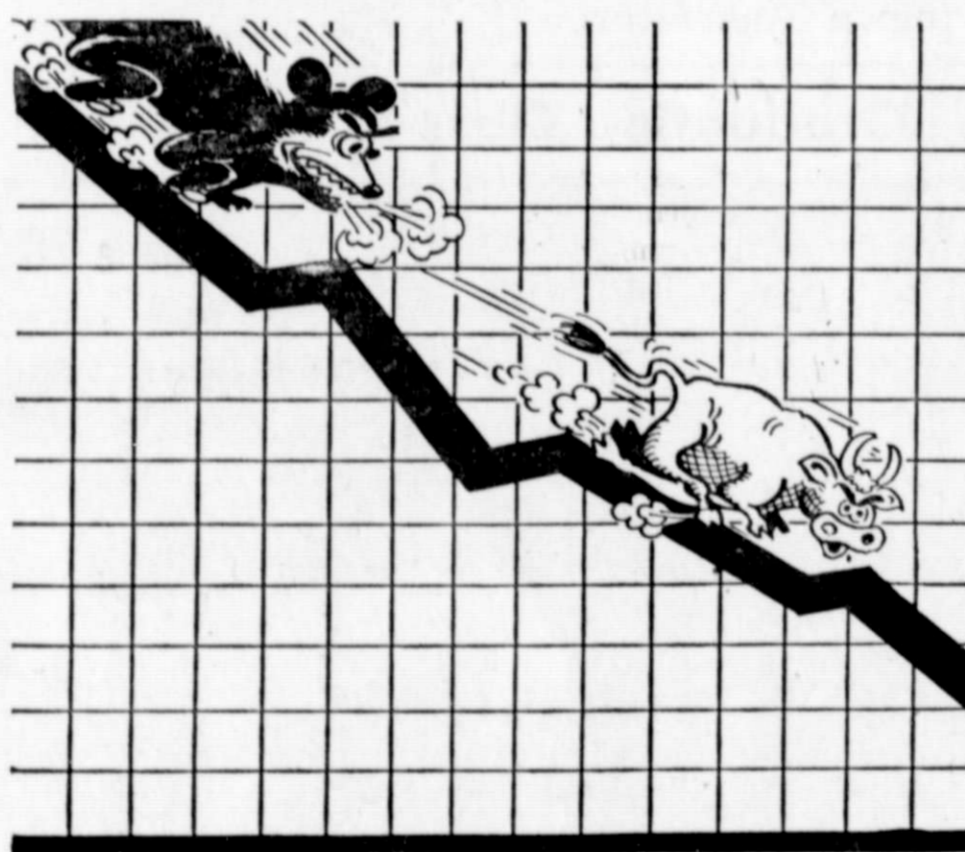

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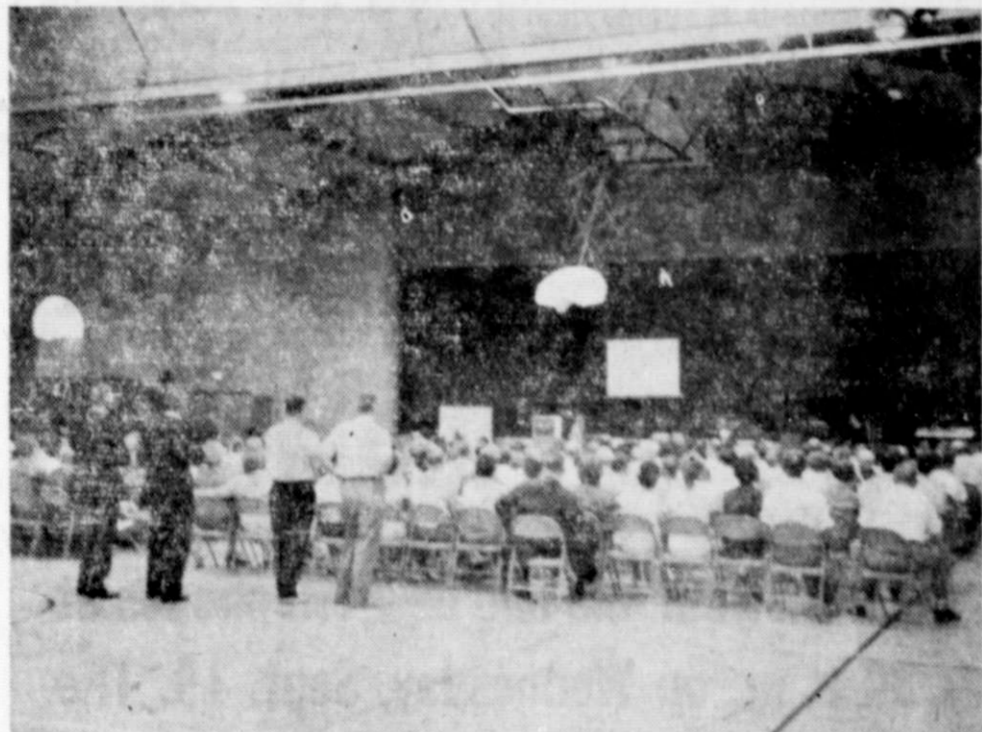

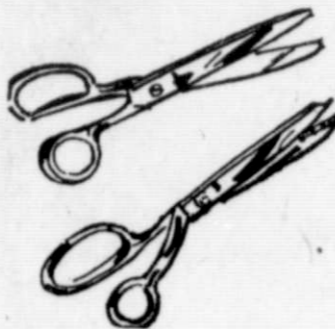

## It's Easy to Dial

Look up the correct number in the latest issue of the telephone directory—and jot it down for easy reference when dialing.

1. Lift the receiver and listen until you hear the dial tone—a steady humming sound. **DO NOT DIAL UNTIL DIAL TONE IS HEARD.**
2. As soon as you hear the dial tone, and with receiver off, place your finger in opening associated with the first numeral of the telephone number you are calling.
3. Pull the dial around until your finger strikes the stop. Release the dial and allow it to return. It is the return trip that sends out the dial impulses. Do not interrupt the return trip or force the dial back.
4. In the same manner dial the remaining numerals.
5. After you have finished dialing, you should hear the ringing signal a burr-rring sound or the busy signal a rapid buzz-buzz sound.

## Dialing Errors

Mechanical recorded announcers are provided, to inform you of incorrectly dialed or vacant numbers. Refer to your directory to be sure the no. you have dialed is correct. If a mistake is made in dialing, replace the receiver for a few minutes. Then lift it, listen for dial tone, and dial the complete number again.

## To Call Another Party on Your Line

1. Always listen for the dial tone before dialing.
2. Dial "7" followed by the complete directory listed number of the party you are calling.
3. After dialing, you will hear the busy tone. Then hang up. Allow time for the other party to answer his telephone, then pick up your handset and talk.
4. When the party you are calling answers his telephone, he will hear a "ticking" sound which indicates that he should not hang up.

## 4 Important Points to Remember

1. Be sure you have the correct number.
  2. Jot it down for easy reference.
  3. Always wait for dial tone before dialing.
  4. Dial carefully. Do not interrupt the return of the dial.
- Your new telephone number consists of 7 Numerals. This is the newest concept in telephone numbering, commonly referred to as "A.N.C." (All Numeral Calling). The complete 7 Numerals must always be given to the operator when placing a toll call.

### Our Police Chief Says

One person was killed in Wisconsin traffic accidents every 9.6 hours during 1961. In 1960 one person was killed every 9.4 hours.

30% of persons killed in Wisconsin traffic accidents in 1961 were in the 16-25 age group.

It is estimated that over 10,000 years of life were lost by persons killed in the 16-25 age group.

76% of persons killed in Wisconsin traffic accidents in 1961 were males.

34,563 persons were injured in 19,860 reported injury accidents.

Over 65% of the drivers involved in fatal accidents were op-

erating in violation of traffic laws. Of vehicle defects reported in accidents 33% were for defective brakes.

In 1961 50% of all pedestrians killed were age 65 and over.

One of every 15 Wisconsin motor vehicles was involved in an accident in 1961.

8,907 Wisconsin citizens were killed in motor vehicle traffic accidents during the last 10 years—8,300 Wisconsin soldiers were killed during World War II.

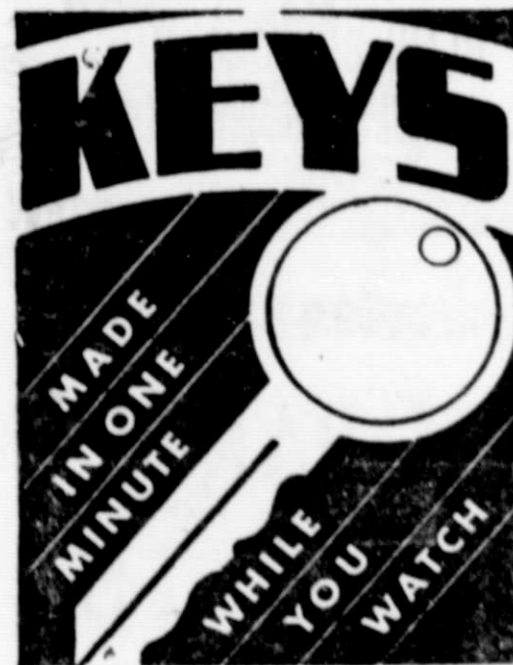
