Man Fatally Hurt, Kewaskum Couple, One Other Injured in Two-Car Collision Near Here

Wm. Luecke Dies at Hospital, Lehman Rosenheimers Hurt

A West Bend man was fatally injured, one other and a Kewaskum couple were seriously injured in a two car crash about three miles southwest of Kewaskum shortly after 9 a. m. Saturday.

Fatally injured was William Luecke, 63, of 605 S. 16th ave., West Bend, whose car collided with one driven by Lehman L. Rosenheimer, 48, 1233 Roseland dr., Kewaskum, at the intersection of County Trunk Hwy. B and a town road at the Leroy Becker farm southwest of the village.

Officers investigating the crash said that the Luecke vehicle was traveling west on the town road and the Rosenheimer auto was proceeding south on CTH B. It was indicated that Luecke failed to stop for the arterial sign at the crossing and the two cars collided, the right front of the Luecke car striking the left front of the Rosenheimer auto with terrific impact.

Luecke was reported to have suffered severe head and chest injuries and he died at St. Joseph's Community hospital in West Bend at 3:10 a. m. Monday. Rosenheimer, his wife Charlene, 40, who was riding with her husband, and William Lutz, 22, of 449 N. 9th ave., West Bend, were all critically injured in the mishap and are confined at St. Joseph's hospital.

Luecke's death was the 19th fatality in Washington county this year, nine more than the 10 recorded at this time last year and four more than the total deaths in the county for 1961 when 15 fatalities were recorded.

Funeral rites for Mr. Luecke were conducted by the Rev. W. P. Sauer in St. John's Lutheran church, West Bend, at 2:30 p. m. Thursday, Oct. 4. The body was in state at the Ohlrogge Funeral home there after 2 p. m. Wednesday. Burial was in Washington County Memorial Park.

Mr. Luecke, a West Bend Co. employee for the past ten years, was born in the town of Addison on April 25, 1899 and lived there until coming to West Bend in 1932. He and the former Mabel Bauer were married at Hartford on May 12, 1923.

Survivors include the widow, seven children, including Mrs. Ronald Dins of Campbellsport; 14 grandchildren, three sisters, including Mrs. George (Esther) Kibbel, R. 1, Allenton, and a brother.

Minutes of School Board Meeting

Kewaskum Community High School Jt. District No. 2
August 27, 1962

The members of the Board of Education of Jt. District No. 2 Kewaskum Community High School met for the regular monthly meeting on August 27, 1962, at 8:00 p. m. with all members present.

The minutes of the August 9th meeting were read. A motion was made by Roger McKenna, seconded by Leo Bingen to accept the minutes as read. Carried.

The Board approved the purchase of a small second hand refrigerator for the teachers' lounge.

Mr. Rose was asked to contact the Viking Research Corp. in Sheboygan and request their representative to come and demonstrate their equipment for cleaning boiler flues.

The Board reviewed and decided on a policy for building rental.

The Board reviewed and decided on the policy and rates for time put in by a janitor over and above the required hours for non-school activities on school days, and time put in for non-school activities held on non-school days.

Mr. Rose was authorized to purchase additional hall lockers for students if they are needed.

It was moved by Leo Bingen, seconded by Paula Petri, that the fuel oil bid of .0995 per gallon from the Schaetzel Oil Company of West Bend, Wisconsin, be accepted for the 1962-63 school year. Carried.

Mr. Rose was requested to obtain bids for a larger air conditioner unit to replace the one installed in his office.

The Board denied the request for a cement base for the outside

incinerator. They felt that the door to the chute for the incinerator in the basement should be made larger.

The Board denied the request for tile flooring to be installed in the basement hallway and the Boys' Physical Educational Instructor's Office.

Paula Petri moved that \$12,784.66 be approved for payment of salaries and other expenses of school operation from the General Fund for the month of August, 1962. Roger McKenna seconded. Carried.

Kewaskum Community High School Jt. District No. 2 September 5, 1962

The special meeting of the Board of Education, Jt. District No. 2 Kewaskum Community High School held on September 5, 1962, at 8:00 p. m. was attended by all members.

Mr. Merlin Capelle was present and recommended that an addition of approximately 140 feet of drainage tile be laid to catch the excessive water which the original tile did not take care of. Paula Petri moved and Leo Bingen seconded that the necessary tile (approximately 140 feet) be installed. Carried.

Discussion was held concerning the need for further grading and leveling of the athletic field on the high school grounds. It was agreed that Mr. Rose write Gartman's Gardens and tell them that no seeding is to be done until the seed bed is approved by the Board of Education.

Roger McKenna moved and Leo Bingen seconded that the Village

be contacted and asked to paint the necessary markings for crosswalks, etc. on the parking lot and street.

Discussion was held regarding the repair and replacement of the lights and lighting for the grade school athletic field. It was felt that a meeting attended by members of the Village Board, members of the grade school Board of Education and members of the high school Board of Education to discuss the costs, etc. involved, would be of benefit to all. No date was set.

The Board denied a wage increase for the cafeteria workers.

Mr. Rose reported that the equipment demonstrated by the Viking Research Corp. of Sheboygan to clean the boiler flues would not be the solution to our problem.

The Board members agreed that it would be all right for two of last year's seniors to return to school as members of the 1963 graduating class to earn credits they were short for graduation.

Mr. Rose recommended that members of the high school Board

of Education attend the meeting scheduled to be held at Plymouth regarding the detaching from one school district and attaching to another for those parcels of land in the Towns of Scott and Mitchell owned by the Ninneman and Hiller families.

Motion to adjourn was made by Paula Petri, seconded by Roger McKenna. Carried.

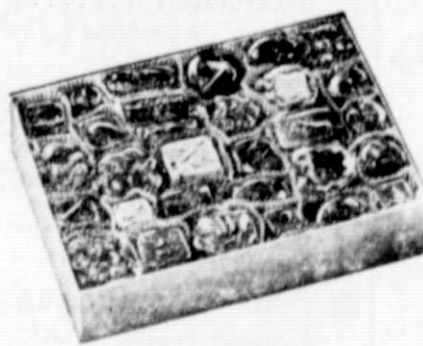

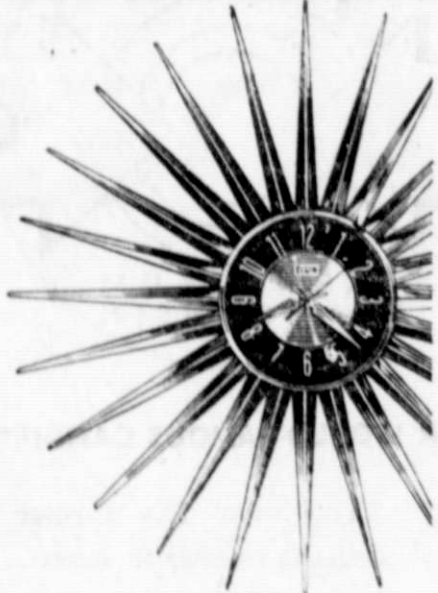

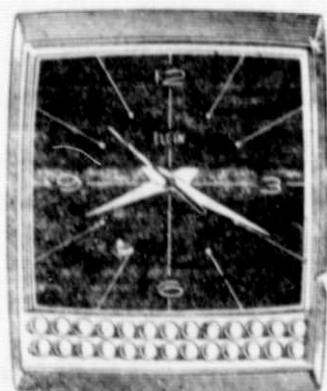

From Oct. 1 to the 15th it is illegal to run dogs at night, either on protected game such as raccoon or unprotected game such as fox. The raccoon season will open in Washington county on Oct. 15.

We now have official information on the 1962 waterfowl season. There has been a considerable amount in the papers about it and we have had many phone calls.

The duck season opens Saturday, Oct. 13, at 12 noon and extends through Nov. 6, for a total of 25 days.

The bag limit is two ducks, nor more than one of which may be a mallard, or black duck, or hooded munganser.

In addition to the above, there is a bonus bag limit of two scaup.

The possession limit is twice the daily bag limit, with the exception of wood ducks on which the possession limit as well as the bag limit is two.

The goose season in most of the state opens Oct. 13 at 12 noon and

closes Nov. 29. The bag limit is 5, no more than 2 of which can be Canada's or its sub-species or white-fronted geese.

However, in Dodge and Fond du Lac counties and the area surrounding the Necedah Wildlife Refuge, the goose season opens at 7 a. m., Oct. 1. In these areas the bag limit on geese is 5, nor more than 1 of which may be a Canada or its sub-species or white-fronted goose. The possession limit is the same as the daily bag limit on geese.

In the managed hunting blinds only, the bag limit is 1 goose of any species.

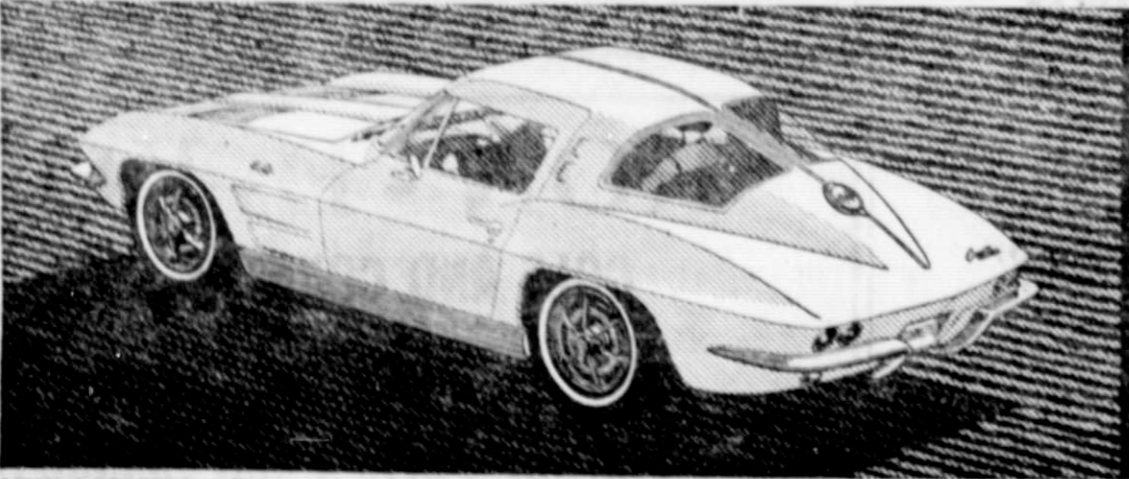

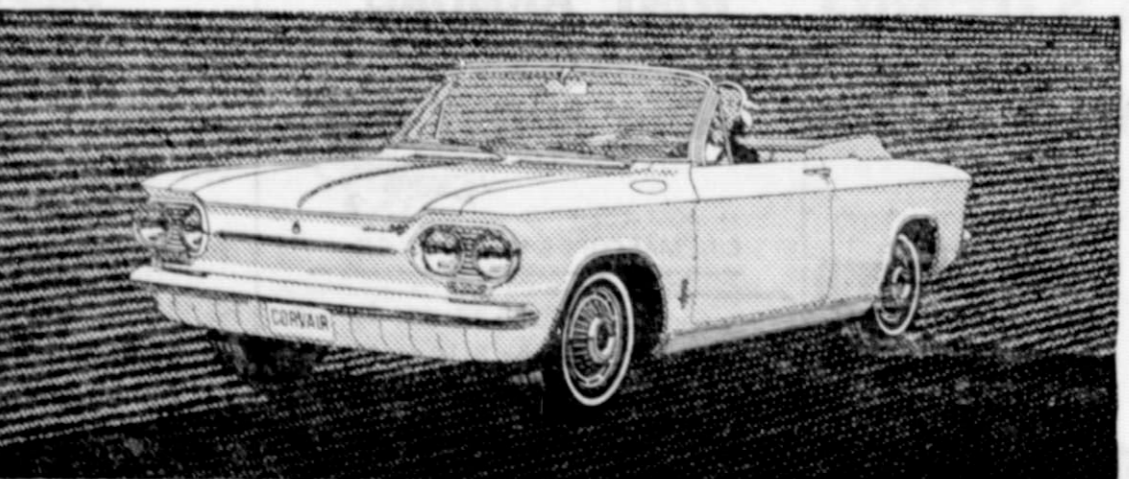
