Heavy Vote Expected At General Election On Tuesday, Nov. 6

STATE, NATIONAL & COUNTY OFFICES TO BE ELECTED, REFERENDUMS VOTED ON

Indications this week are that a heavy vote will be turned in throughout the village and county at the general election next Tuesday, Nov. 6. With the population steadily increasing, a record county vote may develop. The interest in the gubernatorial and senate race is expected to bring out the heavy vote.

Election polls in the village of Kewaskum will be open from 9 a. m. until 6 p. m. and voting will be done in the municipal building as usual. Balloting for the town of Kewaskum will take place at the Labor Center in the village and the polls will open at 9 a. m. and close at 5:30 p. m.

Four referendum questions will also be voted on in Tuesday's election. They are as follows:

Number 1—Shall section 3 of the state constitution be amended to strike the exclusion of "Indians not taxed" from the description of persons to be counted, in determining the population for apportionment purposes?

Number 2—Shall Article IV, section 23, and Article VI, section 4, be amended to authorize the legislature to provide for the election of a chief executive officer for a 4-year term in counties with a population of 500,000 or more, who shall exercise such administrative powers as the legislature shall prescribe?

Number 2a—Shall Article IV, section 23a, be created to require that in counties with a population of 500,000 or more all resolutions and ordinances of the county board must be submitted to a chief executive officer for his approval or

Appoint August Koch As Representative Of Investment Firm

This was issued in 1912 by the Wisconsin Railroad Commission, and the original license today hangs in the offices of Link, Gorman, Peck & Co.

Attend Sessions on Bombs, Explosives

REMINDER ISSUED PUBLIC ON SIREN ALERTING SYSTEM FOR EMERGENCIES

What to do about unexploded bombs and explosives was one of the main purposes of a four-session course in "explosive ordnance reconnaissance" held four evenings last week at the West Bend city hall. The course was conducted for firemen and policemen of West Bend, Kewaskum, Newburg, Jackson and Germantown, as well as the sheriff's department, by the 85th Ordnance Detachment, EOD, Fifth Army, Fort Sheridan, Ill. Several members of the Kewaskum fire department, auxiliary police and Civil Defense attended.

Sgt. Ronald A. Cole, Lt. John P. Sweeney and Sgt. Harry L. Menius of the 5th Army exhibited rockets, land mines and other ordnance pieces. In the event of an exploded bomb, the main job of a civilian group would be to locate, mark, determine size of bomb, rope off area and evacuate people if necessary, until a military demolition squad arrives.

A reminder to the public is issued in regard to Kewaskum air raid and Civil Defense instructions and the siren alerting system for emergencies.

Alert signal — An alert is a steady blast of the sirens from 3 to 5 minutes. A take cover is a wailing blast of 3 minutes or longer. In the event that the sirens are sounded and people are not able to tell if it is an alert they can tune in the conelrad station, 640 or 1240.

What to do—Do not use telephones. Tune in AM radio conelrad 640 or 1240 for emergency instructions. Do not become panicky if your radio is silent for a short time. This is necessary to switch to emergency broadcasting frequencies. Kewaskum is in the fringe of the target area, our citizens do not evacuate. Obey police and Civil Defense instructions.

Race Lashes Out at Van Pelt's 'Do Nothing' Record at Supper Here

At a testimonial supper for John Race at the Kewaskum Opera House on Monday night, Oct. 29, sponsored by the Washington County Democrats, John Race, candidate for Congress said:

"I challenge Republican Congressman William Van Pelt to take a stand on some of the important issues, tell the farmers of the Sixth District if you agree with your right wing friends in the Senate in supporting the Tower Amendment which would cut fluid milk prices to \$2.50 per hundred weight."

Race said, "Senator Wiley, Republican of Wisconsin is on record of supporting this drastic anti-farm measure. The radical right wing and the John Birch Society have made the Tower plan the chief farm plank in their farm legislation program. Congressman Van Pelt has never denied that he is a member of the radical far to the right John Birch Society and his voting record in Congress coincides with many of the Birch Society beliefs. The 'do nothing' record of the Republican Congressman in the past 12 years is a disgrace to the intelligence of the people in this district and should be repudiated at the polls on Nov. 6.

"If elected I will meet with the farmers at town hall meetings and discuss the issues and their problems, then go back to Washington and take a stand in their behalf. This has not been done in the past 12 years under Mr. Van Pelt. James Smyth, Sheboygan, his opponent in the primary, used the slogan 'elect a Do Something Congressman.' Republicans themselves hung the 'Mr. Do Nothing' sign on Van Pelt. It does not make sense to me that Smyth can now support the Republican incumbent who he branded as a Mr. 'Do Nothing'."

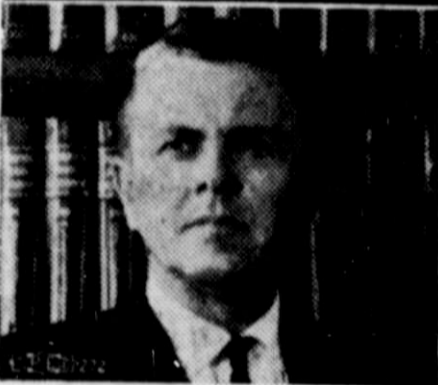

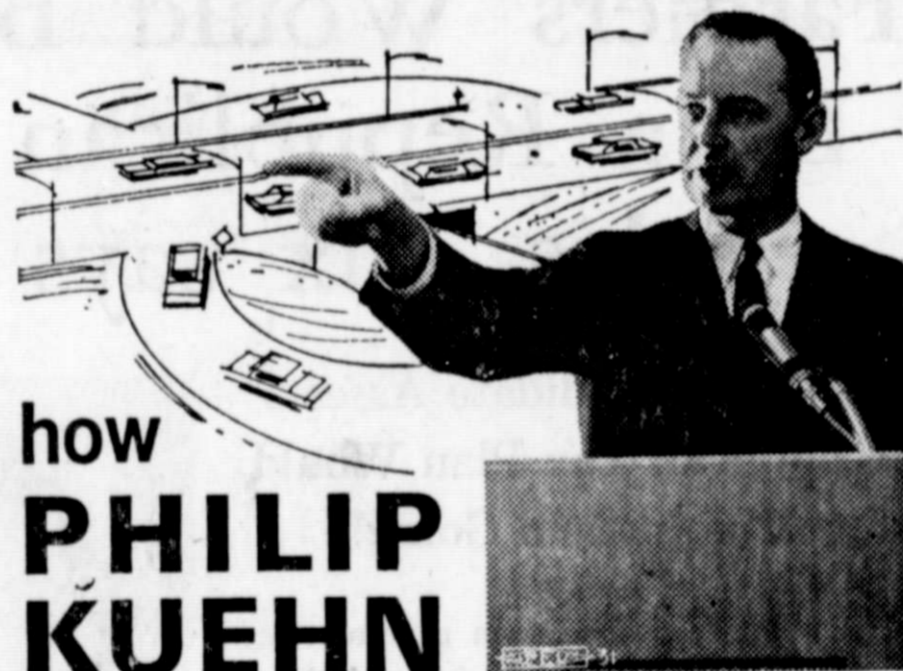

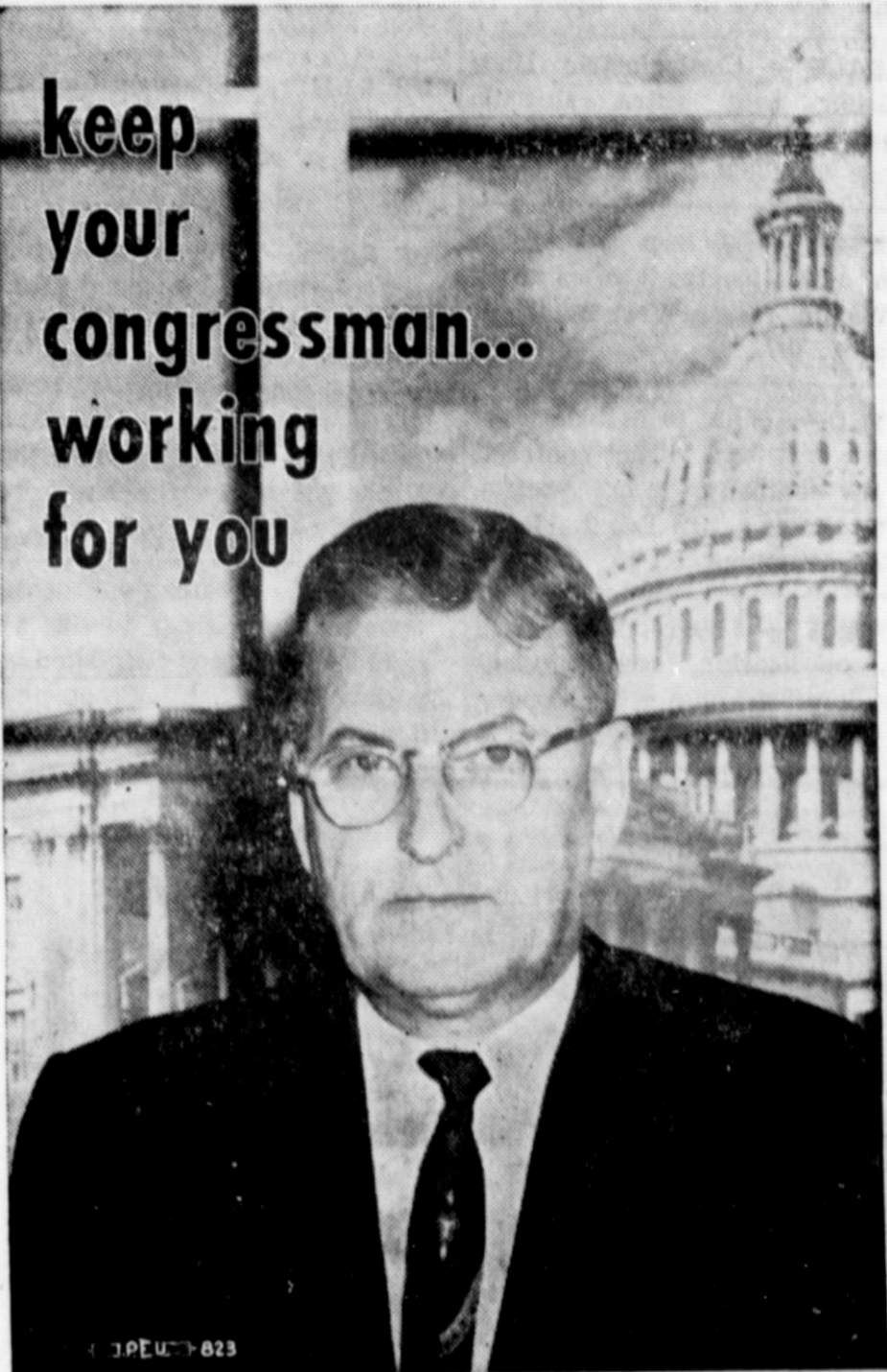

Sales Taxes Hard on Pensioners and Widows

John Reynolds, Democratic Candidate for Governor, Opposes Republican Plan

Attorney General John Reynolds, the Democratic Candidate for Governor, made a slashing attack on the unfairness of Republican sales tax proposals during a recent campaign rally.
