Heavy Vote Expected At General Election On Tuesday, Nov. 6

Indications this week are that a heavy vote will be turned in throughout the village and county at the general election next Tuesday, Nov. 6. With the population steadily increasing, a record county vote may develop. The interest in the gubernatorial and senate race is expected to bring out the heavy vote.

Sales Taxes Hard on Pensioners and Widows

John Reynolds, Democratic Candidate for Governor, **Opposes Republican Plan**
