Nelson, Reynolds Elected, **GOP** Sweeps Rest of Offices

Village Records Heavy Vote As 557 **Ballots Are Cast**

In Tuesday's general election, Gov. Gaylord Nelson, Democrat, unseated veteran incumbent Republican Sen. Alexander Wiley in the race for U.S. Senator and Democrat John W. Reynolds defeated Republican Philip G. Kuehn by a narrow margin in the contest for governor. GOP candidates swept the rest of the state, national and county offices.

A heavy vote was recorded in the village of Kewaskum with a total of 557 ballots being cast. In the last election of this kind in 1958, 461 votes were cast, 96 fewer than Tuesday. The record number of votes recorded here was 750 in the 1960 presidential election. In Tuesday's voting there were 220 straight Republican and 144 straight Democrat ballots cast as the Democrats registered a gain on the GOP in the village. Wiley topped Nelson by only 65 votes in the village, always a Republican stronghond. Donald Koerble, a Kewaskum candidate for clerk of circuit court, polled the largest number of Democratic votes with 252.
