Nelson, Reynolds Elected, GOP Sweeps Rest of Offices

Village Records Heavy Vote As 557 Ballots Are Cast

In Tuesday's general election, Gov. Gaylord Nelson, Democrat, unseated veteran incumbent Republican Sen. Alexander Wiley in the race for U. S. Senator and Democrat John W. Reynolds defeated Republican Philip G. Kuehn by a narrow margin in the contest for governor. GOP candidates swept the rest of the state, national and county offices.

A heavy vote was recorded in the village of Kewaskum with a total of 557 ballots being cast. In the last election of this kind in 1958, 461 votes were cast, 96 fewer than Tuesday. The record number of votes recorded here was 750 in the 1960 presidential election. In Tuesday's voting there were 220 straight Republican and 144 straight Democrat ballots cast as the Democrats registered a gain on the GOP in the village. Wiley topped Nelson by only 65 votes in the village, always a Republican stronghold. Donald Koerble, a Kewaskum candidate for clerk of circuit court, polled the largest number of Democratic votes with 252.

Despite Republican defeats for the offices of U. S. Senator and governor on a state level, all GOP candidates carried the village and Washington county as usual. Nelson's win over Wiley marks the first time in history of the state that Wisconsin will be represented in the U. S. Senate by two Democrats. Nelson will join the other Democratic senator, William Proxmire. Wiley's defeat brought to a close his 24 years of service in the senate. A total of 14,722 votes were cast in the county.

Tuesday was the largest potato day in the village's history, about 5,500 bushels being received here. L. Rosenheimer took in 3,400 bushels and A. G. Koch 2,000 bushels. The price paid was 50 and 55 cents. If all cash had been paid for the potatoes it would amount to \$2,750. At one time before noon there were 29 double wagon box loads in line.

The bowling season in the village opened Saturday evening at Eberle's alleys. Landlord Eberle also served a very fine lunch. The alleys this year are in better condition than ever before. The pins have already dropped well as Wm. Eberle, who led the league last year, bowled two 200 scores this week.

COUNTY'S SHARE OF STATE HOUSING-FUND ALLOCATION FOR VETERANS IS \$19,099

Washington county's share of the new \$2,615,794 state housing fund allocation is \$19,099 John R. Moses, director of the Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs, announced this week.

This money is now available and veterans interested in getting a housing loan should contact their local county veterans service officer. The maximum loan available is \$3,500 and the dwelling to be purchased, improved or constructed can cost no more than \$17,500.

In counties which ran out of funds before Nov. 1, housing applications were accepted and processed and approved loans were held in abeyance until the new allocation was made. Commitments for these loans are now being sent out. There is no chance that additional funds can be made available for counties with low allocations unless more housing money is appropriated, Moses added.

The next reallocation of housing funds will be made on March 1, 1963 when the unused funds will be turned back and redistributed according to the veteran population in each county as determined by the 1960 census. Moses explained that prior to 1961 funds were reallocated only once a year.

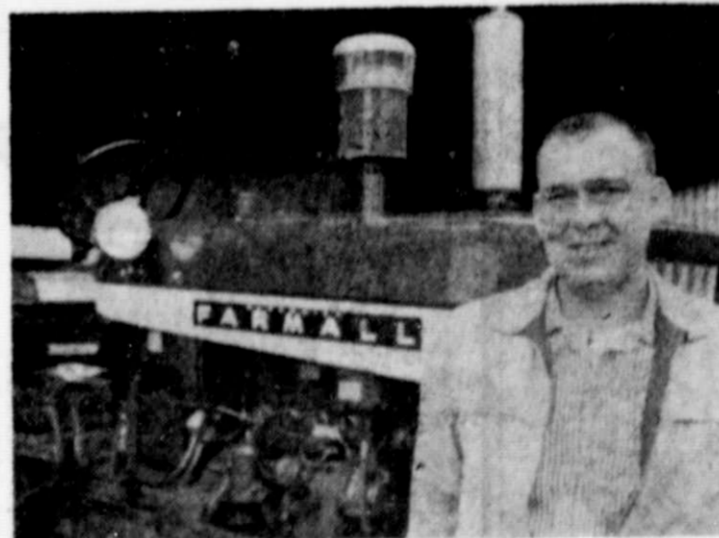

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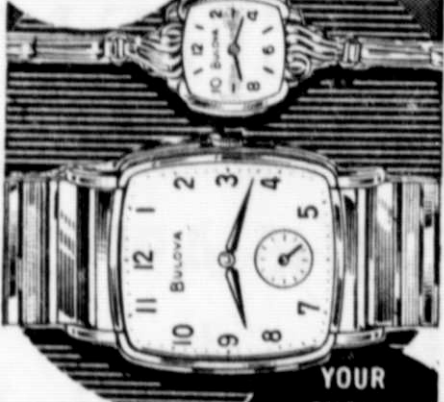
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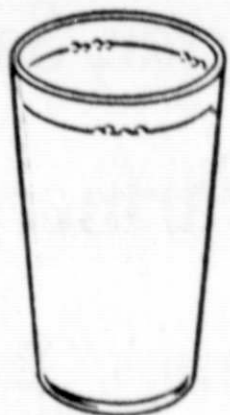

Shooting preserves are a grand idea. Talk about long seasons! On many of them you can hunt pheasant, quail, partridge and mallard, just as fast and wary as their wild relatives, well into March and April, and some have year-round shooting. No bag limit,

either — you take as many as you like.

Shooting preserves are growing by leaps and bounds. There are over 1800 of them in 44 states now, and you can get a National Directory of Shooting Preserves from the Sportsmen's Service Bureau, 250 East 43rd St., New York 17, N. Y. Some preserves are private clubs, with a wide range of membership fees, others are open to the public. Most of them provide gun dogs with expert handlers. Some offer food, lodging, even clay target practice. Believe me — try a shooting preserve for fun and fine shooting by the barrel-full!

PHEASANT, PARTRIDGE HUNTING ENDS NOV. 13; DEER SEASON NOV. 17-25

A large doe deer was car killed on Nov. 1 near Highway 60 and the Ozaukee-Washington county line, another was killed the following night near the entrance to the West Bend airport on Highway 33.

Hunters are reporting an occasional sick raccoon in the Jackson-Germantown area. It has been proven by a professor of the University of Wisconsin, College of Agriculture, that it is canine distemper.

The season on Hungarian partridge and pheasants will close on Nov. 13. The trapping season for mink and muskrat opened north of Highway 60 on Nov. 8. South of the highway it remains closed until Nov. 15.

Again this year few changes have been made in the deer hunting regulations.

(1) The general statewide season on spike bucks and larger is Nov. 17-25.

(2) The Mississippi River counties will have an any deer season Nov. 17 and 18 and a buck only season Nov. 19-23.

(3) Those counties or parts of counties being south of Highway 60 will have an any deer season for two days only, Nov. 17 and 18.

(4) There will be no party permit this year.

(5) It is again unlawful to transport any deer in or on any motor-driven vehicle from the time it is killed to the time it is lawfully registered unless the deer is carried

openly exposed and in such a manner that the deer tag attached cannot be handled or manipulated by any occupant of the vehicle.

These regulations are certainly not complicated and compliance with them will be expected.

The legal kill of deer this year will in all probability be considerably more than last year. There will be no party permit, and there was none last year and the herd appears to have increased considerably.

A man from Colorado killed a large doe deer at Highway 41 and CTH DW a mile north of Allenton early Friday evening. A yearling doe was found caught in a woven wire line fence in the Town of Trenton on Saturday. It was so exhausted that it had to be destroyed. Sunday afternoon another animal was car hit on CTH W south of Allenton.

Pheasant hunting in this area has certainly changed in the past twenty years. Prior to World War II, most of the hunters had dogs and worked the fields, swamps and hedgerows, those without dogs hunted in groups with fair success. Nowadays, within two hours after the season opens you find them driving the roads; when a bird is spotted they pile out of the car, load up and blaze away, sometimes in front of the farmer's home. Most of the birds are ground swatted, never have a chance to get off the ground. The

day will come when shooting from or hunting within 200 feet of any road will be requested by land owners, or large areas will request a law such as Milwaukee county has, no discharge of firearms in the entire county.

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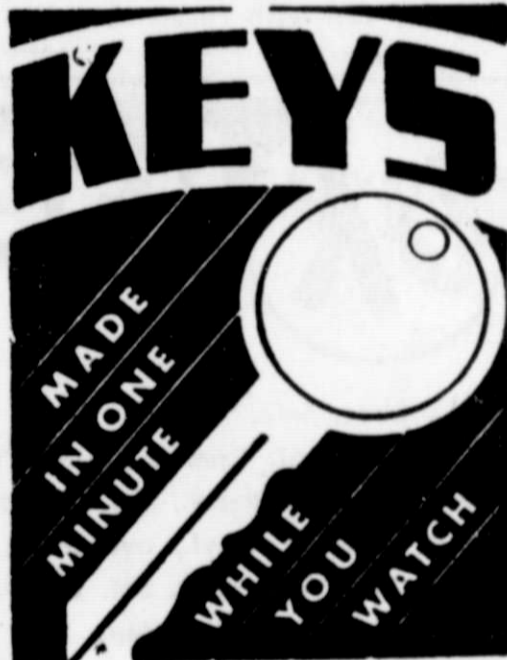
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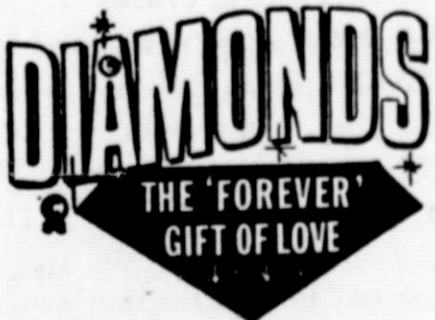
