Three Promotions Announced By Regal Ware, Inc.

J. O. Reigle, president of Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum, has announced the promotions of three members of the firm's direct sales division to positions of increased responsibility.

Ronald O. Reigle, formerly sales manager, direct sales division, has been promoted to the newly established position of field sales director. Replacing him as sales manager, direct sales division, is Robert Zarling, formerly assistant sales manager of the division. Paul Winkler is the new assistant sales manager, installment division.

As field sales director, Reigle will supervise the company's field personnel and coordinate the functions of the field men and sales managers of Regal Ware's various marketing divisions. The Oshkosh State College Marching Titans, 112 strong, will make a national television appearance on Nov. 18, when the band performs during the half-time program of the Green Bay Packer-Baltimore football game to be played at Green Bay.

When the band appears, it will be wearing newly purchased uniforms of black, white and gold, and will be accompanied by a newly organized group of dancing coeds called the "Titanettes."

25 Years Ago

Nov. 12, 1937

Gordon McQuarrie, outdoor sports writer on hunting and fishing for the Milwaukee Journal, was the guest of a local group of hunters on the opening of the rabbit season Nov. 1 at Joe Eberle's "shack" in the Wayne swamp Sunday. McQuarrie wrote a lengthy article on the hunt in Tuesday's Journal. Excerpts from the item follow: "Ten minutes in the dripping, foggy cover of the Wayne swamp near Kewaskum and we were soaked to the thighs as brief showers pattered into the leaf strewn forest floor. But we got a few rabbits. It was almost impossible not to get a few shots after Eberle, Kewaskum beagle fancier, set down an armful of three little prize winning beagles, which put up the cottontails, ran them in circles and brought them within range of our guns. The elect of the Kewaskum beagle men and rabbit hunters had gathered to try their luck. They were Kilian Honeck, Dr. Leo Brauchle, Norbert Becker, Clarence Kudek, Don Harbeck and Eberle, whose beagles are famous in the middle west. The first cast was made in a grove owned by Honeck, rolling land, six inches deep with leaves, and densely grown to brambly undergrowth. Lunch at noon was in the 'shack' acquired for rabbit hunting alone. In few places in Wisconsin does the rabbit hunting fever strike so hard as it does up Kewaskum way. Interest in the sport there is reflected by the great number of beagle owners. The hunt ended in late afternoon when the party trekked into the 'shack' to partially dry clothes before starting home." McQuarrie went into much detail in describing the hunt, the swamp and work of the beagles in his article.

The living quarters above the garage, vacated by the Schaefer family, who moved into their new home, are now occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Lester Kohn, who had been living in the G. B. Wright house on Fond du Lac ave. Kohn is a machinist at Koch's.

September 24, 1962

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Education of Jt. District No. 2 Kewaskum Community High School was attended by all members with the exception of Melvin Riley.

School Offers Course In Disaster Survival

It is increasingly evident that we will be living under the threat of nuclear attack for years to come. Besides the threat of nuclear devastation, we live with the ever-present possibility of disaster through fire, flood, tornado and other natural disaster. How well we survive war, or natural catastrophe, and how rapidly we restore ourselves to normal living after such an event depends largely on how well we have prepared ourselves to meet these problems.

"Individual and Family Survival" is a part of the public adult education program, administered by the State Board of Vocational and Adult Education. It is designed to educate adults to be better prepared to meet the serious problems posed by natural or war-time disasters. Qualified instructors, specially trained to teach this subject, are available in a number of areas of the state at this time. West Bend School of Vocational and Adult Education is currently conducting two such classes with Carl Kuss as instructor. Both classes have an overflow attendance with interest extremely high.

The fact that many of us live in areas not subject (as some of Wisconsin is) to serious floods; or that we have not happened to be living in an area devastated by tornado or fire, does not mean we do

not have to worry about these things. Our increasing mobility, our wide-ranging vacation travels, take most of us into areas where earthquake, flood, and tornado are ever-present dangers.

Nuclear testing certainly has made clear to us the tremendous potential for destruction that we and other countries possess. Our best defense against nuclear or natural disaster is understanding and a healthy respect for these forces, coupled with education for survival which will help us avoid panic and terror, as well as reduce the time required to restore natural living following disasters.

Another 12-hour adult course in "Individual and Family Survival" will be offered in West Bend immediately after the first of the year. Persons will be accepted ONLY ON ADVANCE REGISTRATION for this course. Call the West Bend Vocational school office, FEderal 4-9131 for advance registration and further information.

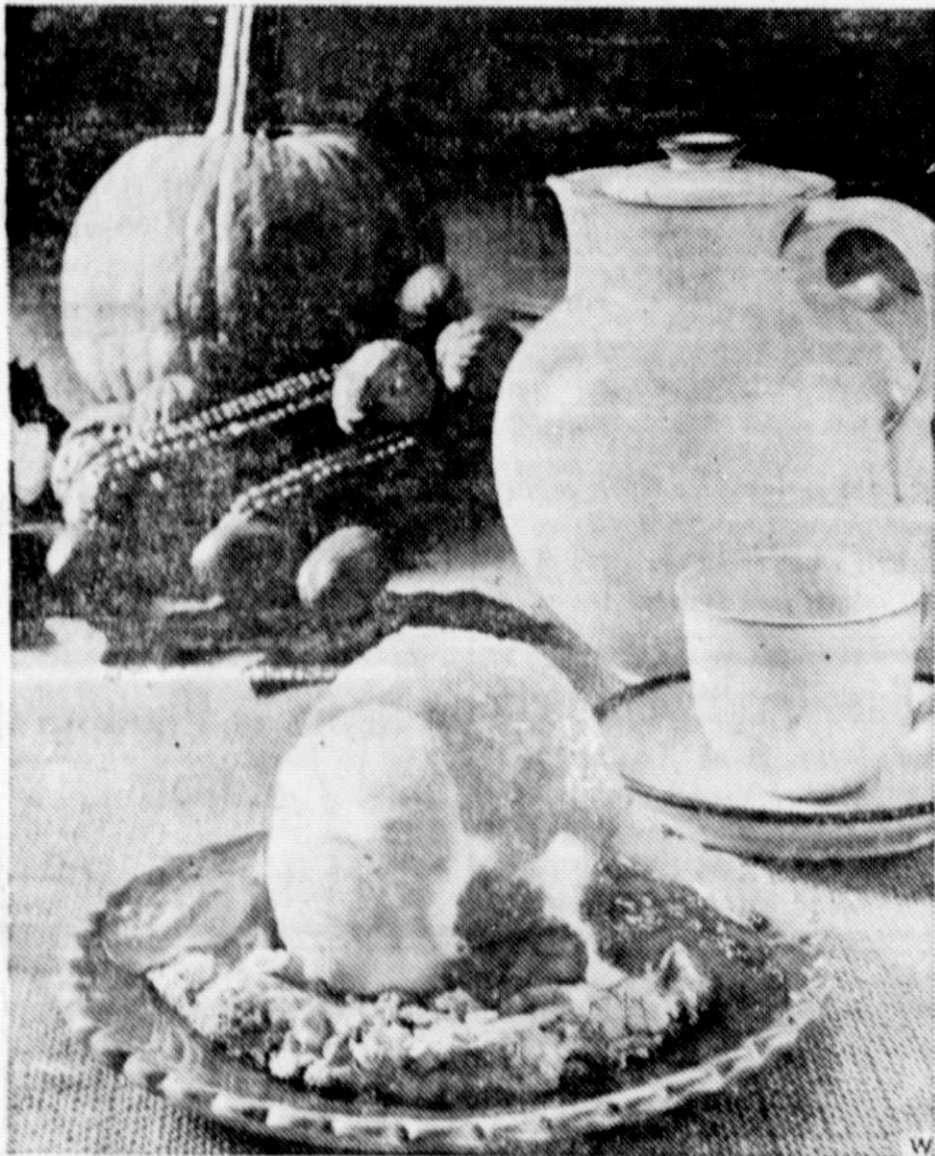

APPLE MINT ANGEL SHELLS . . . for Thanksgiving Dinner



One thing that makes holiday foods fun is that they generally look the part . . . rich, extravagant, beautiful. That is certainly true of Apple Mint Angel Shells.

The crisp shells are a delicately chewy meringue and made with chopped nuts and broken, buttery crackers mixed through the egg white froth. After the shells have cooled, they're filled with ice cream. Then they're topped with big spoonfuls of green tinted, peppermint flavored apple sauce. And there's your dessert . . . deliciously pretty, a blend of chewiness and meltingness, of crispness and creaminess, the lively tang of apples and peppermint a contrast to the soft delight of the ice cream.

With Thanksgiving dinner in mind, you could bake the shells the day before. And prepare the canned apple sauce. Then at serving time it's just a quick flash to add the ice cream and top with the peppermint apple sauce.

The Shells

3 egg whites
¾ cup sugar
½ teaspoon vanilla extract
½ teaspoon baking powder
14 scalloped buttery salty crackers
¾ cup chopped walnuts

The Sauce

2 teaspoons cornstarch
2 cups canned apple sauce
¾ cup sugar
15-20 drops peppermint extract
6 drops green food coloring
1½ pints vanilla ice cream

Beat egg whites very stiff. Gradually add ¾ cup sugar, beating constantly. Add vanilla extract and baking powder. Break crackers into large pieces; add with chopped walnuts. With tablespoon make 6 mounds of meringue ¾ inches in diameter on moistened unglazed paper on baking sheet. Make a deep well in center of each meringue. Bake at 275 degrees, about 50 minutes. Cool. Remove meringues from paper.

Moisten cornstarch with a little cold water; combine with apple sauce, 2/3 cup sugar, peppermint extract and green food coloring in saucepan. Cook slowly, stirring constantly until sauce is thickened. Chill. Just before serving, place ice cream in center of meringue shells. Top with minted apple sauce. Serve immediately. Makes 6 servings.

DEER HUNTING SEASON OPENS SATURDAY; SIX MORE KILLED BY CARS

A buck deer was killed election night on Highway 33 a mile west of 144, another Sunday morning on Hwy. 141 and the Sheboygan county line, and a third about the same time on Hwy. 41 just north of the Waukesha county line. That evening a buck and a doe were killed just north of CTH K on 41. Another deer was killed early Monday at the south limits of Richfield.

It was surprising the number of prominent people who wanted to know where the fire was when the siren was sounded at eleven a. m. Sunday.

The deer season will open at 6:22 a. m. Nov. 17, in Washington, Ozaukee and Dodge counties. There will be a two day any deer season south of Highway 60. Satur-

day and Sunday, Nov. 17 and 18 only, deer shot south of Hwy. 60 must be registered there. Registration stations for that purpose have been set up at the Telly-Ho Inn on Highway 83 south of Hartford, Knipple's Meat Market, Richfield, Habermacher's tavern at Germantown and the DX Service Station at Cedarburg.

North of Highway 60 the season is for bucks only and the season closes on Nov. 25. Deer killed north of 60 may be registered at the Ozaukee county sheriff's office, the Hartford Police Department and the office of the Washington county sheriff.

The season in the above three counties prohibits hunting with rifles. Shotgun with slug only may be used. ALL HUNTERS must wear red clothing. This means rabbit and squirrel hunters as well as those hunting deer.

DEER HUNTING SEASON OPENS THIS SATURDAY

Deer numbers in most of the state are at a high level and with favorable weather Wisconsin's 300,000 big game hunters can look forward to a successful season during the nine-day period from Nov. 17-25. Hunting will be restricted to bucks with a 3-inch spike or larger over most of the state's 29,000 square miles of deer range. Numerous hunters from Kewaskum and area began the trek to the north woods Thursday with larger numbers taking off on Friday.

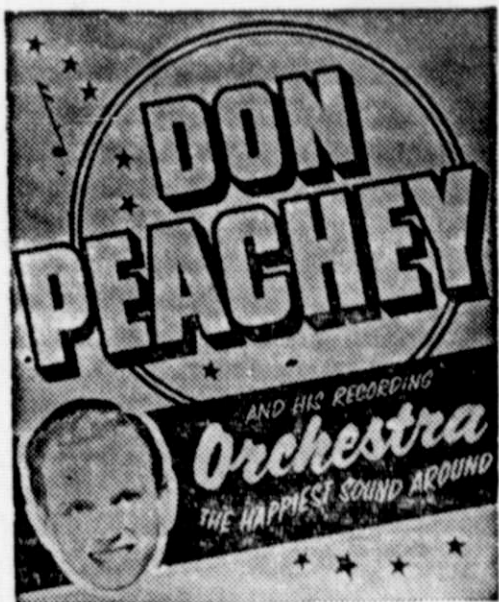

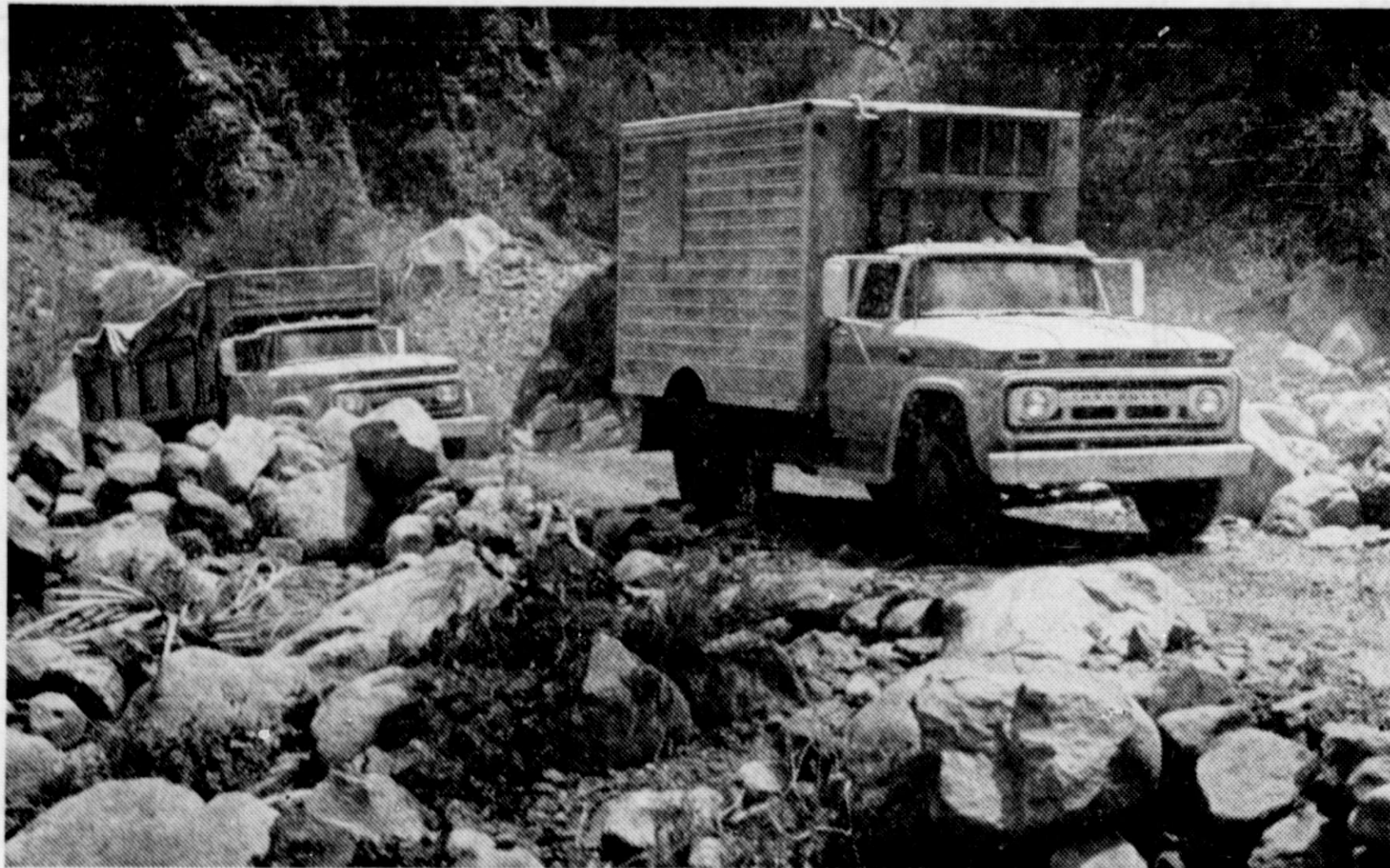
